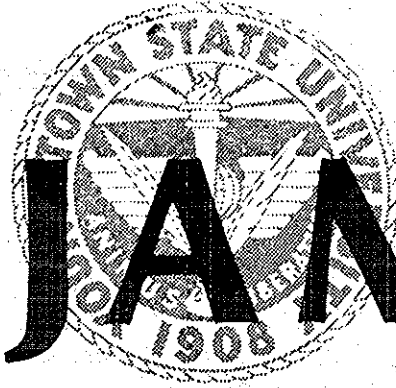

## Nation Mourns Eisenhower

WASHINGTON (AP) - After three days of military pomp and ceremony and a last trip together through the streets of Washington, Mamie Doud Eisenhower is now taking her husband's body back home to the plains of Kansas.

After the rigors of the state funeral, the family left Washington last night aboard a special train winding through the heartlands of the nation toward Abilene where Gen. Dwight David Eisenhower will be buried.

It will be peaceful in Abilene, half a nation away from the manicured green and chiseled marble where the leaders of scores of countries gathered yesterday to attend services for the 34th president of the United States.

At the rear of the funeral train, like a riderless horse, trails the private railroad car of the former president, this time carrying his widow on the long trip westward from Washington.

Baggage car No. 314, freshly painted to hide its blotches of age, holds the plain black bier, flanked with the U.S. and presidential flags.

The funeral train is scheduled to arrive in Abilene, Kan., at midnight tonight for the burial tomorrow at the Eisenhower

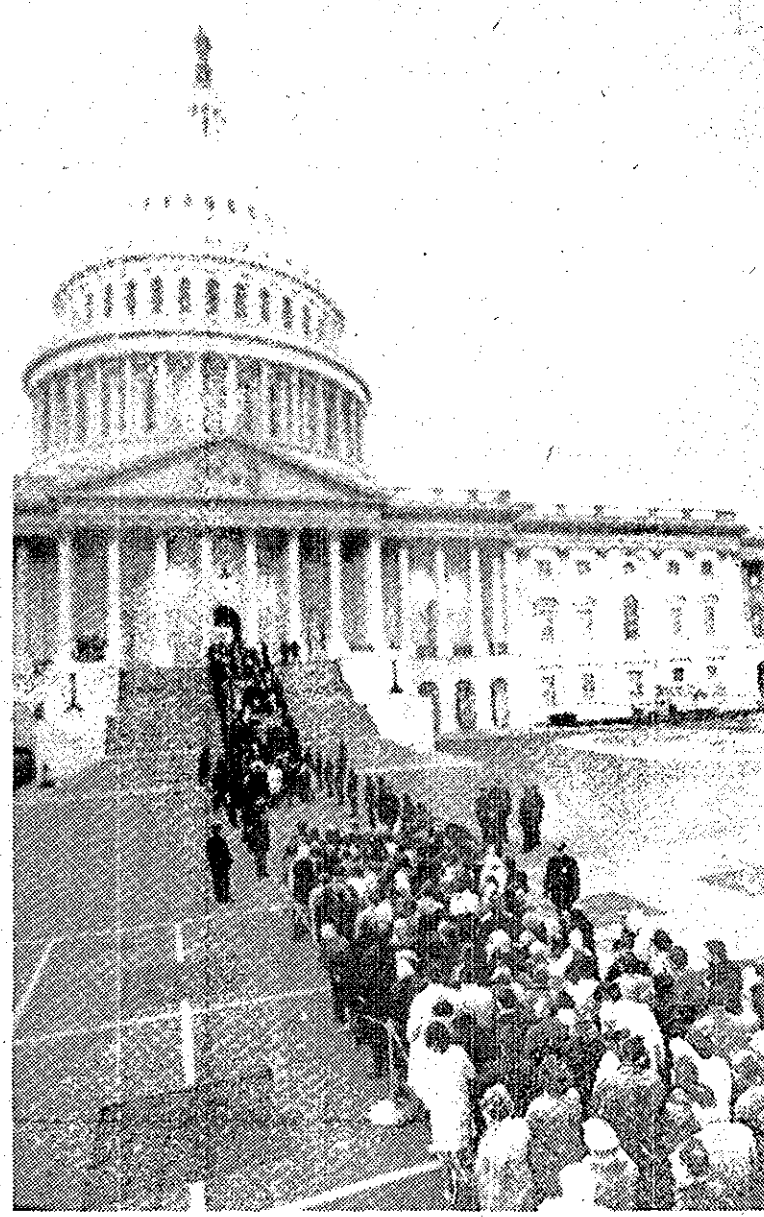
Center within sight of the general's boyhood home.

The funeral car is the second in the 10 car train. Built in 1938, it was picked at random from the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad yards and retouched in blue, silver and yellow to cover up its rusty scars.

Black drapes were hung in the baggage car to form a small, ceremonial compartment for the coffin. An honor guard is posted to stand watch through the long ride.

The private Eisenhower car had been brought to Washington for the funeral train.

It was last used by the former president a year ago on his final trip to California for a golfing vacation where he suffered the first in a series of heart attacks that kept him hospitalized until his death Friday.

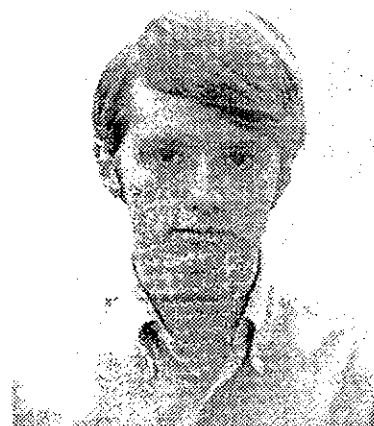


Thousands of Americans waited in line to pay their last respects to General Eisenhower in the Capital rotunda.

### Pifer Protests Draft; Sends Card to Nixon

Myron Pifer, YSU freshman from Canfield, returned his draft cards to President Nixon late last month and in an accompanying letter, protested what he termed the "unwarranted military involvement of the United States in Southeast Asia" and the "unconstitutional slavery of men—the draft system."

In an interview yesterday, Pifer stated that the letter to Nixon was sent via registered mail and that he had not, as yet, received a receipt verifying that Nixon had received the letter.

Pifer is believed to be the second YSU student to voluntarily violate Selective Service Regulations. Earlier in the Fall Quarter, David Beacom, also a freshman from Canfield, returned his draft cards to Local Board 80 in Youngstown.

Beacom was ordered for induction January 28 but did not report. No further action, according to Beacom, has been taken on his case by the Justice Department or the Selective Ser-

vice System.

In his letter to the President, mailed from Youngstown March 14, Pifer affirmed his belief in the "concept of democracy—equality for all."

Pifer added, however, that a "government which intentionally forces its young men into compulsory military service is by no means democratic because the draft violates the Jeffersonian tenets of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

"The sin of conscription," the letter continues, "is greater when it demands young men to serve in a war that they either cannot comprehend, or understanding the evils the war represents, firmly do not believe in."

Pifer stated that the Vietnam War "represents the imperialistic advances of America against a smaller, weaker country."

He condemned in his letter the "atrocities committed against the Vietnamese people" by the United States.

Though admitting that his personal freedom will be endangered by condemnation of the war and the draft, Pifer concluded that "I cannot allow myself to be a part of something so evil and malevolent."

### Grad School Accepts 160

The YSU Graduate School has accepted 160 applicants for the spring quarter, announced Dr. Earl E. Edgar, dean of the Graduate School, earlier this week. The 160 were chosen from over 190 applicants.

Sixty-six applicants were from Youngstown, 5 from other Ohio cities, 20 from out of the state and 30 foreign students. Ninety-one were YSU graduates.

### Foley Named Governor At Circle K Meeting

Mike Foley, outgoing president of the YSU Circle K, was elected Circle K Governor for the Ohio District at their annual convention held last weekend at the Mansfield, Ohio campus of Ohio State University.

In addition to Foley's election as governor, John Long, a YSU Circle K member, was elected Lt. Governor, and the YSU Chapter was named Best Circle K Club in the state of Ohio.

Foley, who headed the largest Circle K delegation at the convention, has been a member of Circle K for three years and has held two positions as vice-president and most recently

president of the local Circle K chapter.

His responsibilities as Governor of the Ohio District will include membership drives, inter-chapter communications, finances and the geographical apportionment of chapters in Ohio.

Long, elected Lt. Governor, will be the organization's chief executive officer for Division Three, which is a geographical area comprising four member universities.

The YSU chapter totaled over 6,000 hours of school and community service which enabled it to be named Best Circle K Club for the state of Ohio. Their

nearest competitor totaled 2,000 hours of service.

Thirty-five chapters were represented at the two day convention.

## News Briefs

Compiled By The Associated Press

### National

MEMPHIS, Tenn. - Shelby County Criminal Court Judge W. Preston Battle, who presided over the James Earl Ray case, was found dead of an apparent heart attack in his chambers Monday afternoon.

Battle was listed as dead on arrival at a Memphis hospital. The death was confirmed by Capt. A.C. Gilles of the Shelby County sheriff's department.

Battle was the judge who accepted Ray's guilty plea March 10 to the murder of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and sentenced Ray to 99 years in the Tennessee penitentiary.

While Ray entered a guilty plea to the King slaying, he later said he was pressured into doing so and would seek a review of his case.

Under Tennessee law, it would have been Battle, as the judge who passed sentence, who would grant such a review.

WASHINGTON - Congress is expected soon to consider proposals for a coin bearing former President Dwight D. Eisenhower's image. Chairman Wright Patman, D-Tex., of the House Banking Committee, said he has received several suggestions along this line "and I am heartily in favor of doing something."

LOS ANGELES - Polls showed Mayor Sam Yorty trailing a Negro city councilman on the eve of Tuesday's election for mayor of Los Angeles.

CAREFREE, Ariz. - Ford Motor Co. took the wraps off its new subcompact Maverick car Monday and set forth to do battle with Volkswagen, long the king of imports.

### International

TEL AVIV, Israel - Defense Minister Moshe Dayan warned Monday that Israel faces new tests from her Arab neighbors and declared: "We can't waste a day preparing ourselves for the possible battle that might 'The Arab public may push their leaders to act,'" said Dayan.

"We have to assure ourselves that we can hold on to the cease fire lines and also fight successfully against the fuerrillas."

Dayan appealed, however, for increased coexistence with the Arabs in the occupied areas.

BEIRUT, Lebanon - The extreme leftist civilian leadership of Syria's ruling Arab Socialist Baath party has resigned to make way for a compromise reform program, reliable Baathist sources in Beirut reported today.

CAIRO - An earthquake shook the populated eastern region of Egypt Monday, injuring several persons and damaging buildings in some cities. No deaths were reported.

RAWALPINDI, Pakistan - Gen. Agha Mohammed Yahya Khan named himself president of Pakistan Monday, six days after proclaiming martial law to quell civil unrest that forced President Mohammed Ayub Khan from office.

PARIS - South Vietnamese sources reacted coolly Monday to Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird's statement that he would be prepared to see Communists in a freely elected coalition government in South Vietnam.

These sources said they had not seen the text of Laird's interview in U.S. News and World Report, but they stressed the provision of the Vietnamese constitution barring Communists from taking part in elections.

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## CLEO to Aid Graduates Entering Law School

YSU Spring graduates from minority groups will have an opportunity to increase their chances of entering law school by attending a summer institute at the University of Virginia, one of ten such programs sponsored by the Council on Legal Education Opportunity (CLEO).

The CLEO program is aimed at identifying and aiding Black, Indian and Spanish-speaking students who might succeed in law school, but who may fail to pass the rigorous standards and tests for admission to most schools.

Forty such students will be awarded all-expense paid scholarships including tuition, room and board, living allowance (\$15.00 per week), and a \$50.00 per week stipend to cover what the student may have earned in a summer job, in the program scheduled from June 13 through July 24 at the University of Virginia Law School, Charlottesville, Virginia.

Included in the program will be classroom study, moot court experience, seminars, a research and writing program and activities designed to give the student an insight into the concrete operation of the legal system.

The staff will be comprised of students and professors from Virginia, Texas and Howard Universities. Co-directors of the Institute will be Associate Professor John N. Moore and Assistant Professor Jerry L. Mashaw of the University of Virginia.

### YSU Clinic Available To Students

The Youngstown State University Health Service is located on the second floor, Central Hall. A nurse is on duty from 8 a.m. until 10 p.m. Monday, through Friday, and 8 - 1 on Saturday. The clinic is equipped to give first aid to treat some minor illnesses. There is no doctor on campus at any time, but the nurse will assist any out-of-town student to get medical attention if he requires it.

When the clinic is not open, students who live in dormitories should contact the person in charge of the building if they need medical attention. Other students can call the Medical-Dental Bureau for assistance in locating a doctor, or go to the emergency room of one of the hospitals.

AT NO TIME does the Health Service OR ANY OTHER Department in the University provide free medical examinations for any student (Athletes Excepted).

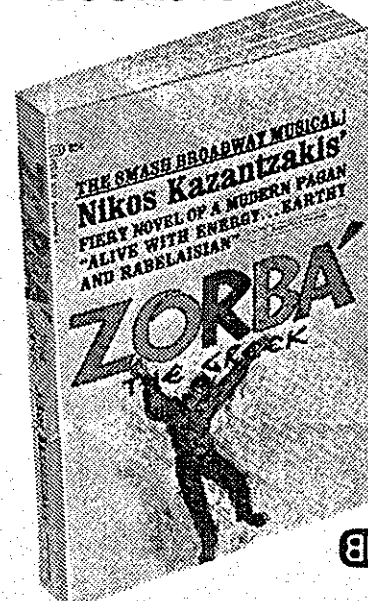

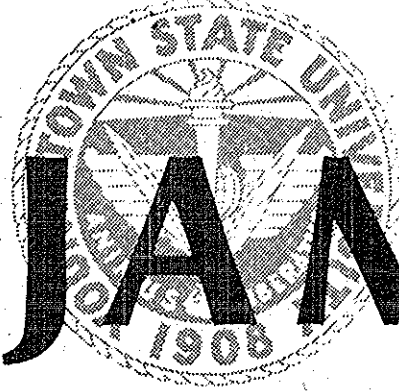

## Students Protest With Park-In

Last Sunday, some 50 members of the Students for a Groovy Society (SGS) staged a massive 3 hour park-in on Bryson Street to protest the "No parking" restrictions on all the streets that border the campus.

Mark Mud, a national leader of the SGS, explained that the Park-In was to show the city officials that the student demands must be heard.

Many complaints were brought to the attention of the campus Secure Office, but chief Phil Crisp told reporters that the secure men were always busy in jobs elsewhere, and until the SGS people were actually causing trouble, his office would do nothing about the Park-In.

For three hours Sunday afternoon, all traffic had to be re-routed to bypass the trouble spot on Bryson St. There were unfortunately 300 cars that got caught between two waves of the SGS demonstrators, and these cars were forced to sit for some 2½ hours.

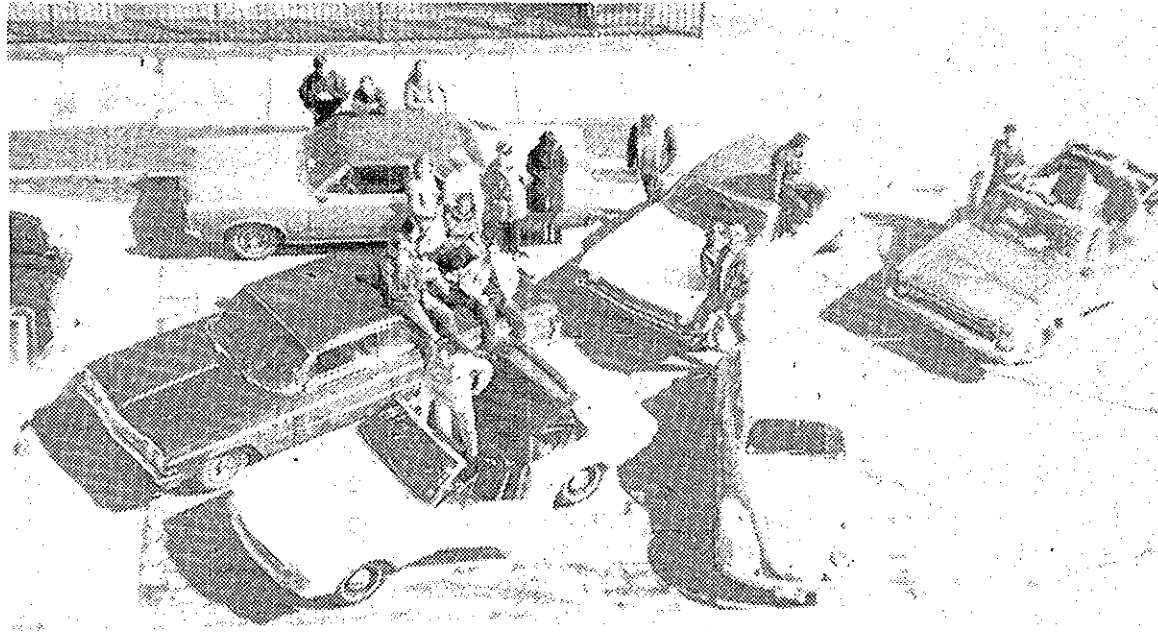
At approximately 4 p.m., the Young City police department was called in to break up the traffic tie-up. The policemen were very polite to the students as they proceeded to use mace and night sticks to break up the

demonstration.

Other student leaders on the campus of the Young City College said that they were glad to finally see the students getting interested in something.

When the city officials finally relented and announced that they would open the streets for parking for the college, several motorcycle policemen were reported to have had heart attacks because they were out of a job. The city of Young also announced that there would have to be a budget reduction due to a loss of revenue from parking violations. Prior to this time, Young City had been getting up to \$7,500 per day from the parking tickets that were issued to the students.

The university also announced that reductions would also have to be made in its budget as a result of the loss expected when the students begin to park on the streets rather than in the parking lots.

Reports filtered over the campus of the Young City College that the people who reside on the streets bordering the campus would disregard the removal of the "No Parking" signs and continue to complain about the students' cars in "their" streets.

The police department of Young City assured the students of the college that any of the neighbors who dared complain about students' cars bothering them would be treated like any other protestor. These complaining people would simply be put

in jail.

# Science Senior Socks Self with Suicide

Morris L. Merkin, a senior majoring in Virgin Forestry, who maintained a four point average for three and a half years, took his life yesterday by jumping out of the ninety-sixth floor window of the unnatural Science Buildign shortly after receiving his grades in the mail.

Merkin's grade sheet, upon which he had hastily scribbled a parting note was found in his pocket. The grades on the sheet showed that Merkin had failed

cident by Youngstown City Vice Squad men, who commented that the student is lucky he is not around to be charged for his somewhat questionable parting prose.

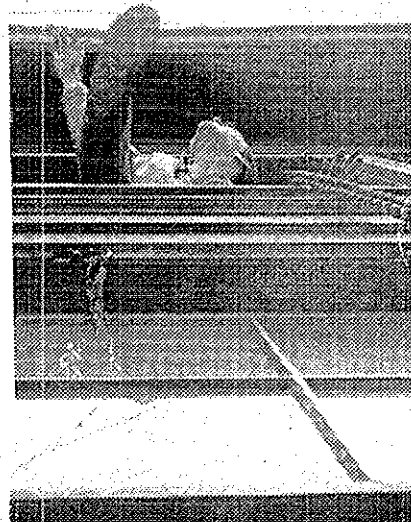
In what almost seemed an ironic twist of-fate it was later disclosed by the University's crack computer center that Merkin's grade sheet was misaddress-

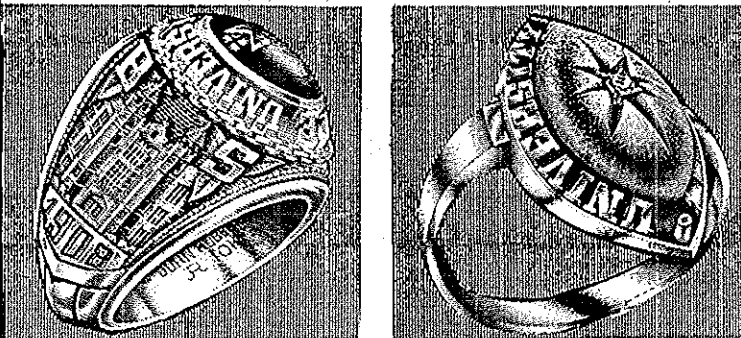

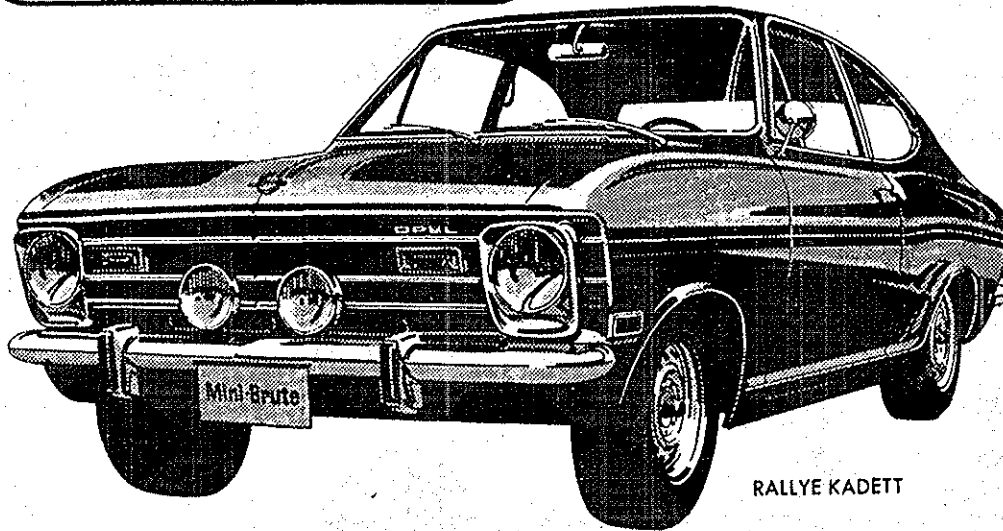

Of course, the above statements are supplied through the courtesy of April Fool's Day and are to be taken in that respect.

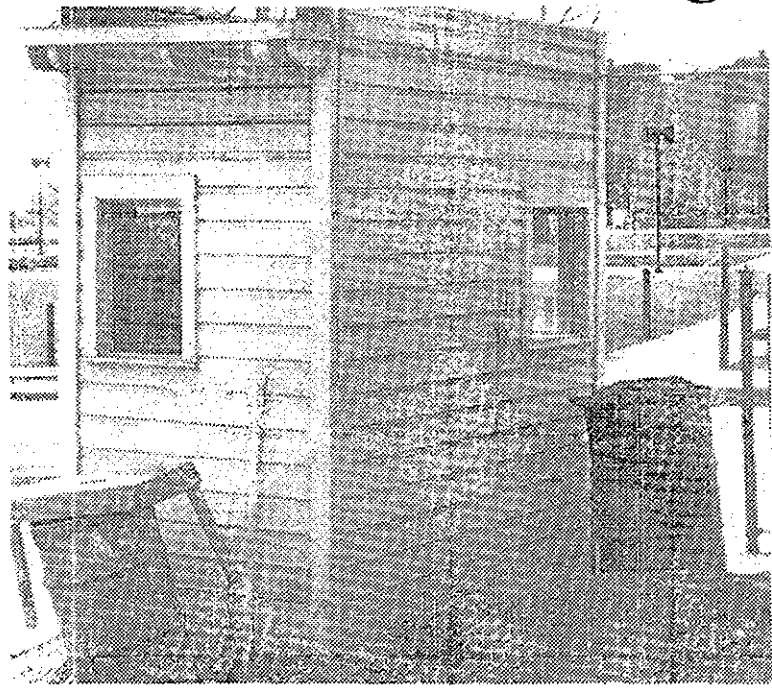

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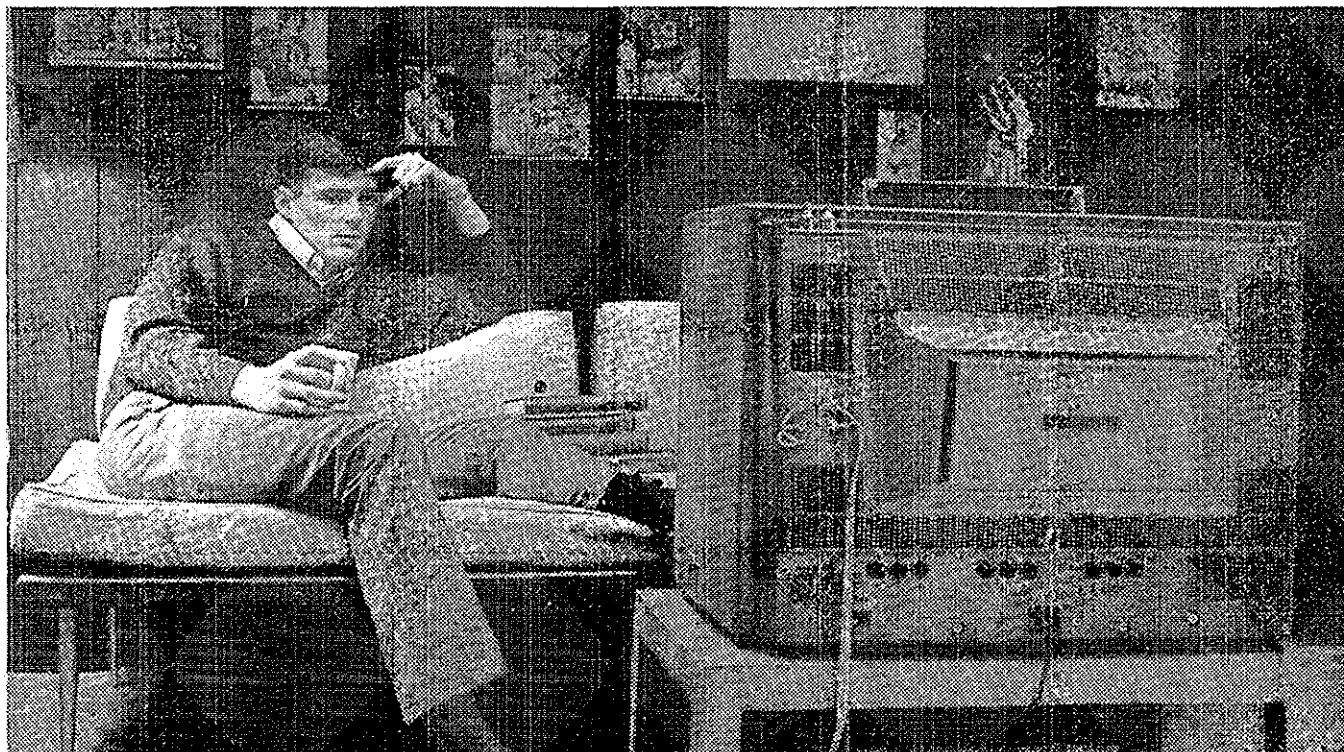

# Spring Sports Program To Open Soon

Contrary to winter's cold-weather comeback, YSU's Spring Sports program is destined to open next week as the Penguins host Western Reserve University on the baseball diamond. The Penguin "racketeers" make their 1969 debut by hosting Miami University on the weekend, while the YSU golf squad set their match opener the following week with a visit to Toledo University.

In alignment with all YSU coaches, golf mentor Bill Carson boasts a phenomenal winning record as he unveils his 18th Penguin season. Coach Carson, tasting a losing season only once during his YSU career, has put together 193 triumphs against 55 defeats and nine deadlocks.

The Penguins, who sported a 19-2-1 mark last year, are expected to exceed this winning pace with lettermen Tim Miller, a senior and the Penguins No. 1 clubman with a 73.6 average, Rusty McDonald, a southpaw ace from Jackson-Milton who slotted himself into the Penguins number two position with 75.6, Gary Hathaway, a junior from Boardman who won 17 individual matches with his 765 average, and Denny Rose, a senior who was the Penguins No. 7 shooter during last season's campaign.

With a flurry of new talent, which Coach Carson considers to be one of his best crops in recent years, the Penguins will be attempting to duplicate their 1966 outing of 16-0-2.

Building his nucleus around Miller and McDonald, Coach Carson points out the abilities of juniors Norm Woodward and Jerry Doctorn, while sophomores Tom Riley, Rick Slifka, and Jim Grunenwald will also be challenging for a starting berth.

The Penguins open their hopefully unbeaten season April 14th at Toledo University, a squad who handed the Penguins their first loss last year in an individual match while losing to YSU in a quadangular encounter a few days later. YSU, while enjoying the "green, green grass" of home only four times in this campaign, face 15 individual matches on their 1969 agenda including participation in the Mid-American Invitational, where they placed sixth last year; the Gannon Invitational, in which the Penguins were victorious in the field of four; and the NCAA College Division

Championships at Albuquerque, New Mexico, on June 10-13. Incidentally, Youngstown State will have the honored privilege of hosting next year's NCAA Championships in golf.

**Tennis**

On April 11th Miami University will invade YSU's Volney Rogers Tennis Court to test the debut of the 1969 edition of the Penguin racketeers! Coach Bob Thompson, plagued with seven rained out matches last year, saw his Penguins manage a 4-4 seasonal mark across the nets.

Coach Thompson has built this year's Penguins around his three returning lettermen: Bob Elias, a senior from Youngstown and the club's number four man last year with another year of experience under his belt, which should prove invaluable to the Penguin winning cause; Bill Glaser, a junior from Pittsburgh with high ranking in the Middle States Association and the Penguins top man of the coming campaign, and Steve Wilt, a junior from Geneva who is expected to take over the work-horse duties of the Penguins this year after landing the number five slot from last year's .500 season.

Tom Kester, a junior from Youngstown, Jim Lanz, a sophomore from Youngstown, and Bill Neff, a senior from Youngstown, round out the six-man squad of Coach Thompson's 1969 roster of "racketeers."

Miami University, who spoiled the Penguins' hopes of

getting off to an undefeated start last year with a 7-2 setback on opening day, invade the YSU campus April 11th at Volney Rogers Park in Mill Creek at 2:00 p.m. for both school's opening match of the 1969 campaign.

**Baseball**

Finally, the Penguin nine-man squad of baseballers complete the spring sports program for YSU with their opener slated Monday, April 7 by hosting Cleveland's Western Reserve University Pemberton Park at 3 p.m. Coach Dom Rosselli, the master of the roundball campaign, continues his winning ways with a 36-game schedule this year.

The Penguins, who tied a YSU mark with 19 wins last year, seemed to have lost a little and gained a little by losing All-

American Tony DelBene and Detroit Tiger hopeful, Don Leshnock, while gaining a tremendous amount of strong freshman and returning lettermen in which to establish another winning nucleus.

Brad Lawson, who batted .414 last year, returns to lead the Penguin home plate attack backed by Nick Gesacion, a .324

slugger. The Penguin baseball roster, which has been formulated from over 80 applicants, would be too numerous to mention but freshmen do seem to be the main spark plug of this year's Penguin diamond club with a solid foundation of returning lettermen applying the Penguin frontal attack against their 36-game agenda.

## A Fond Farewell

### Dwight David Eisenhower

#### 1890-1969

The University observed the National Day of Mourning for the late President Dwight D. Eisenhower yesterday by closing classes and all administrative offices.

The empty halls and classrooms reflected the sense of loss felt by every American on the passing of the five-star general.

The national and international respect that the General commanded is clearly exemplified in the presence of nearly every national and international leader at the funeral ceremonies over the past few days.

General Eisenhower set an example for every world leader to follow. He was a military man by training who knew the power of force, but who preferred and strove for settlement of world problems via a bargaining table rather than a battlefield.

He clearly saw the military threats to the world, and with equal clarity attempted to avert any military clash while he was President.

He knew war, but detested it.

He also knew peace, and that he loved.

The proper memorial to President Eisenhower would be world peace. That is a goal toward which we all can dedicate our lives as he did.
