Social Science Club Hears Area Lawyer

Members of the Youngstown University Social Science Club heard Attorney John Kerensky, of the Humane Society, explain his functions as a defender of animals and minor children.

He noted that the protection of animals actually began before the protection of children, though today the Society functions largely in the latter capacity. Some of these functions are: collecting alimony, trying paternity and abandonment cases, determining neglect of children, and helping the aged.

In speaking of the Legal Aid Society, Attorney Kerensky explained that the Society provides legal counsel for those who are indigent and in need of legal representation.

Cites Cases

He concluded by citing some interesting cases he has handled. Following the discussion the members of the club enjoyed a social hour.

The Social Science Club is made up of students representing many of the social sciences including sociology, psychology, personnel management, and education.

Its officers are: President, Donald DeMarinis; Vice President, Aubrey DeSousa; Secretary, Waltraut Stein; Treasurer, Semidula Steffanudakis; and Program Chairman, Mary Butch. Advisor to the group is Mrs. Edna K. McDonald.

The next activity in which members will learn about another side of dealing with people will be a trip to Woodside Receiving Hospital on Thursday, October 25. They will tour the hospital and participate in a dance for the patients.

Mrs. Kelly Resigns NEON; Council Must Name Editor

Faced with the same dilemma twice in one month, Student Council must now look for another NEON Editor. Mrs. Jean Kelly and her staff have resigned for the second time their capacities in connection with the University annual.

At the Student Council meeting of Oct. 10 a letter from Mrs. Kelly was read to the Council stating the resignation of herself as editor of the NEON, and her staff, 'effective immediately.'

Student Council selects and approves both the JAMBAR (Youngstown University student newspaper) and the NEON (Youngstown University yearbook) editors and staffs. According to the Student Council By-Laws they must open the position to new applicants.

Adjourned

Council adjourned without completing plans for the appointment of a new NEON editor and staff.

Mrs. Kelly explained in her letter of resignation "Since we believe that the editorial policy of the NEON should be determined by the staff, responsible to Student Council; since we believe that the students should control the Yearbook which they financially maintain; since we find that such freedom is denied us, we herewith tender our resignations effective immediately, from the 1957 NEON."

Mrs. Kelly's earlier resignation was withdrawn when certain changes were made through Student Council without which she felt she could not remain as editor.

'Fitzgerald' Next English Society Topic

What I like best about Youngstown University is the warm friendliness of the kids, and the way the upperclassmen laugh at us when we walk around with the "typical freshman look" on our faces.



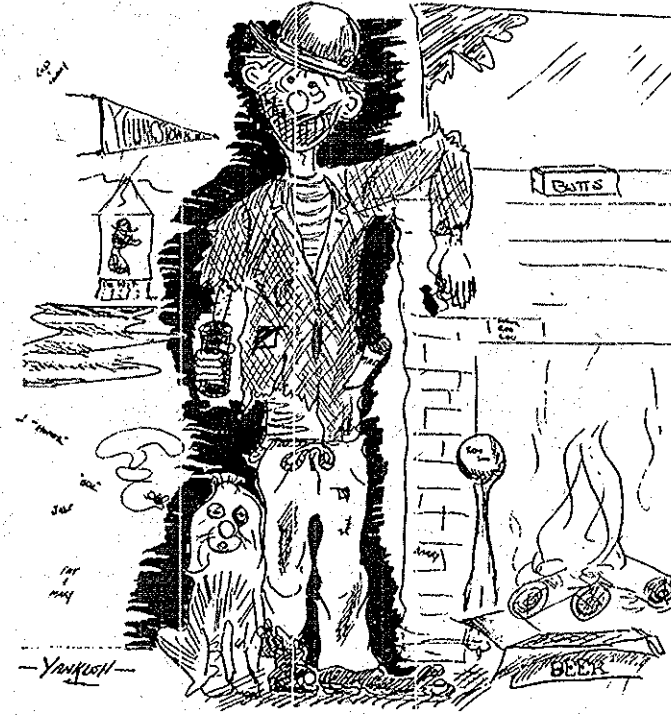

The members are planning a trip to The University of Buffalo for a match in the near future. Various other matches are being arranged with local chess clubs.

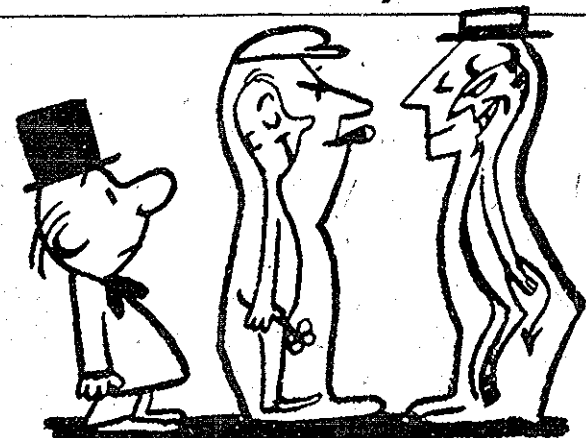
