Who's The Ambassador?

Among other things, Heidelberg College has an excellent newspaper, the KILIKILIK. In their April 16 issue there appeared an interesting editorial entitled "Look Around."

This editorial pointed out that "Time and time again we see examples of people surrounded with things they know little if anything about." ... "We are (the student body) representatives of Heidelberg and should know the different departments as well as every building on the campus."

The above is, of course, applicable equally to Youngstown College students. We are ALL ambassadors for our college and it is OUR college. It is our college when we are members of the student body and it is our college after we leave or graduate from it.

In other words, our public remarks and attitude about our college are extremely important and decide the opinion that outside persons will have about our college.

Many people in the Mahoning Valley have seen our college, but how many have ever been through it or know any of its faculty, personally? The faculty and administration is small in number compared to the larger amount of students. Hence, it is quite logical that, being more in number, students provide the liaison between our college and the rest of the Mahoning Valley.

And so we have a definite responsibility to our college and ourselves. That responsibility is two-fold. First, we must know about our college and second, we must be proud of it when its name is mentioned in our presence in public.

By word or deed, we represent our college. If a citizen meets but one student from our college and receives a bad impression, then it is quite logical that he will rate the college that student is from in an equal manner. Illogical as the citizen's thinking is, that is the way he does think.

How can we explain our college to strangers if we know little about it. Here is a little test you might rate yourself by:

How many students attend Youngstown College? Who are the administrative leaders and heads of the different departments of the college? What kind of sports program do we have at YoCo? How much do you know of the variety of courses offered here? Who is your Student Council representative? Can you name the different fraternities and sororities, local or national, on campus? Do you know the location of most of the college buildings and offices on campus?

From all those questions, we have one even more revealing. Could you, without special preparation, give a stranger an informative guided tour of our college?

Perhaps you think we are devoting too much space to a relatively simple matter. Yet, is it really so simple? Public relations in these days is an extremely important facet of any institution and it is a job for every student, not to be shoved on to just the faculty and a few student leaders.

Good salesmen of the past will tell you one universal motto of their trade. "You've got to believe in what you sell to convince a customer and keep him a customer."

Do not underestimate your individual responsibility in presenting to strangers the true role our college plays in the Mahoning Valley and Ohio. The burden rests on YOU.

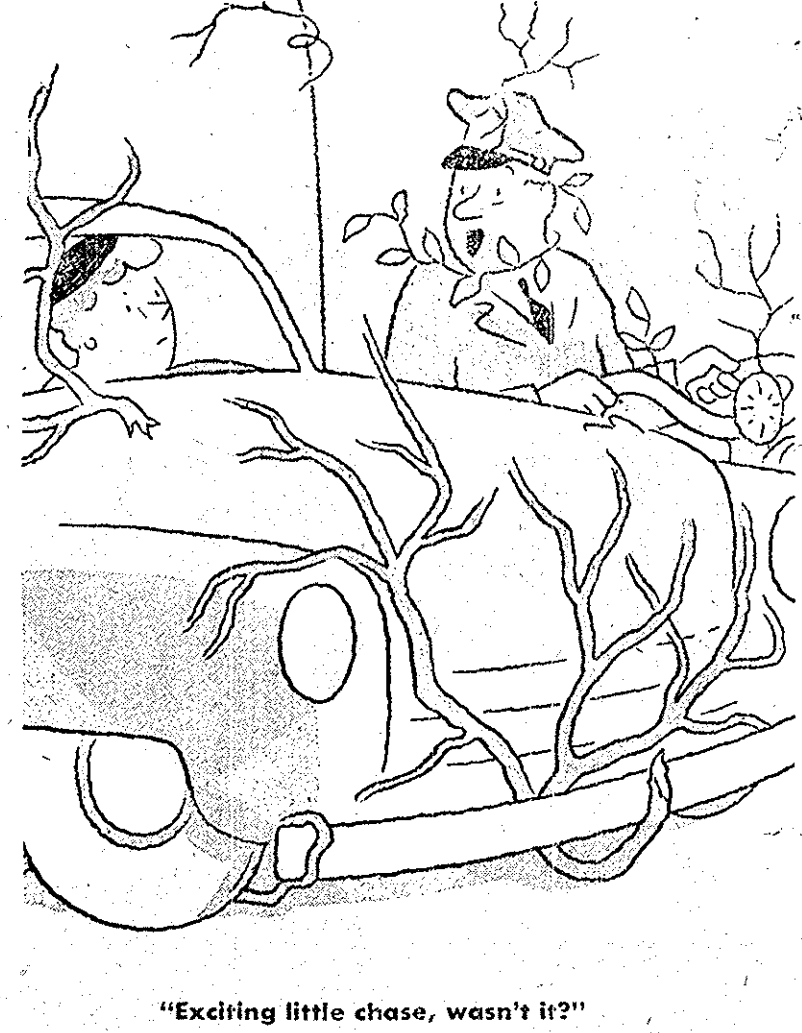


Agnes Cassidy - Freshman

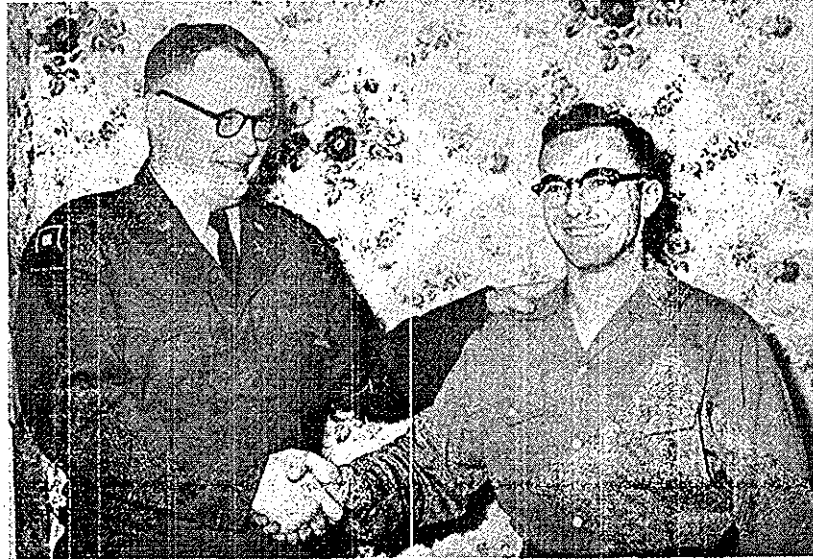
Are Looking Forward

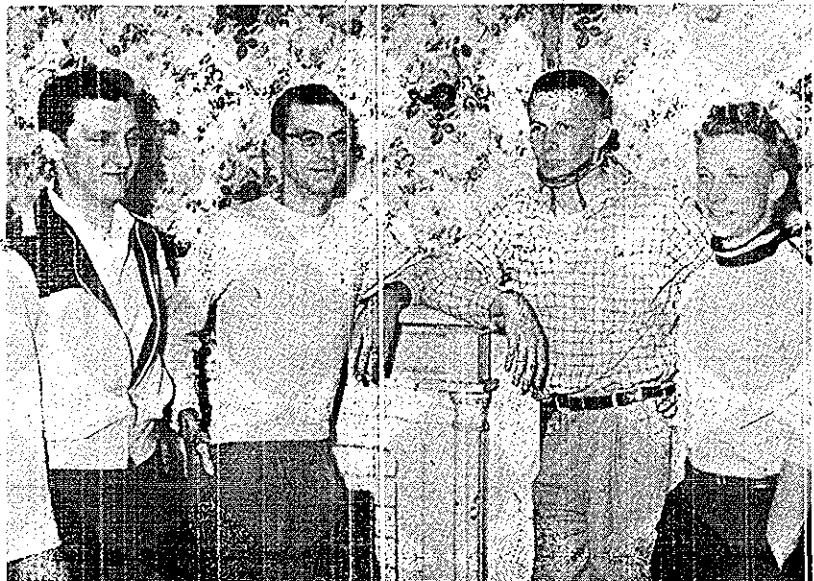

Vet's Questions And Answers

Q - I am planning to take a correspondence course under the Korean GI Bill. For purposes of my GI allowance payments, what does VA consider as the beginning and ending dates of the course?

A - The beginning date of your course is the date on which the school furnishes you with your first lesson. The ending date is the date the school services your final lesson.

Q - I hold a permanent GI insurance policy. Since it has been in force for more than one year, I have the right to borrow money on it. How much can I borrow?

A - You may borrow an amount that does not exceed 94 percent of the reserve of your permanent GI policy.

Q - I am drawing a VA pension, and I have just received a legacy that will push my yearly income above the maximum allowed by the law. Am I supposed to inform the VA about it?

A - Yes. You should notify the VA immediately, so that your pension payments can be stopped. Failure to inform VA of your added income will result in an overpayment of pension that you may have to pay back to the Government.

Q - Where may I obtain the forms required to apply for a GI home loan?

A - You should be able to obtain the necessary forms from your lender. Lenders who do not have the forms may get them from their nearest VA Regional Office.

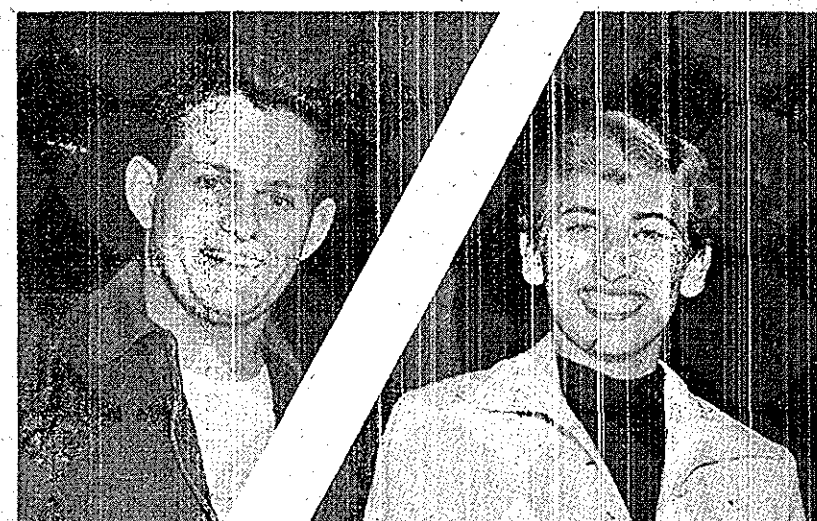

Speech, Drama Dept. Presents One Act Plays

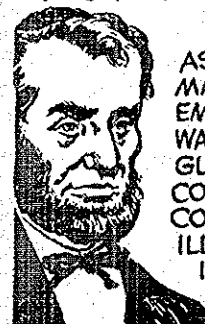

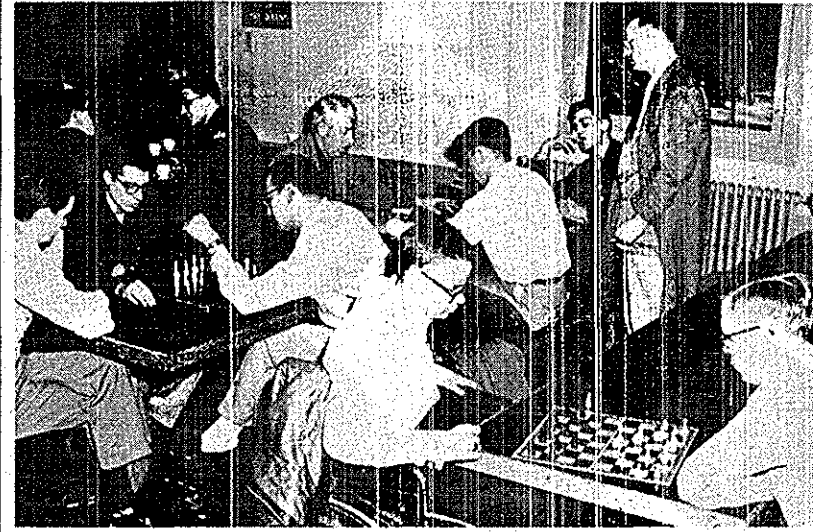

Woodwinds Program Held

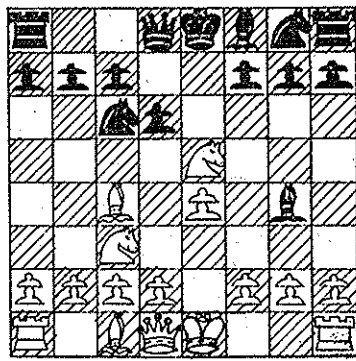

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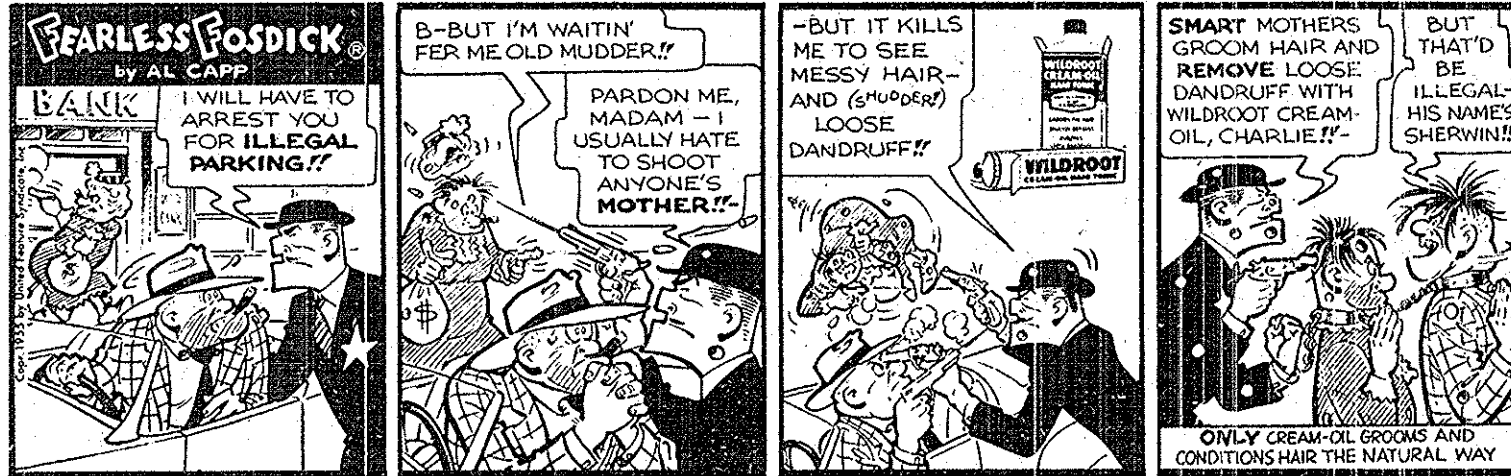
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
