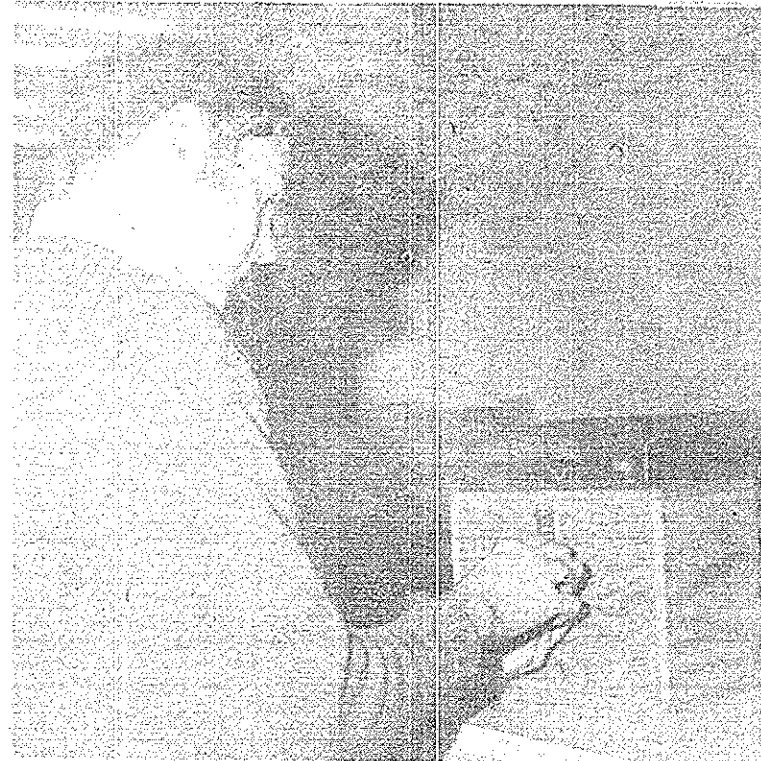

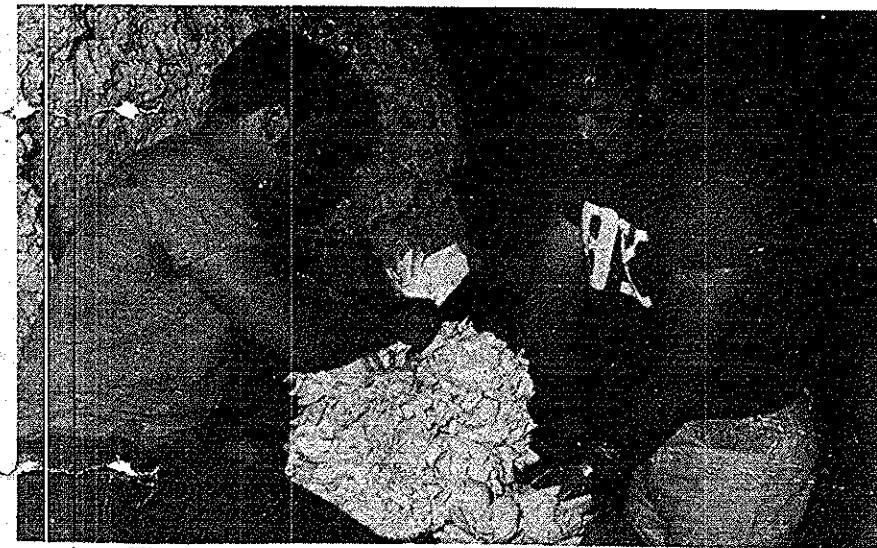
Don Leone opens the ballot boxes.



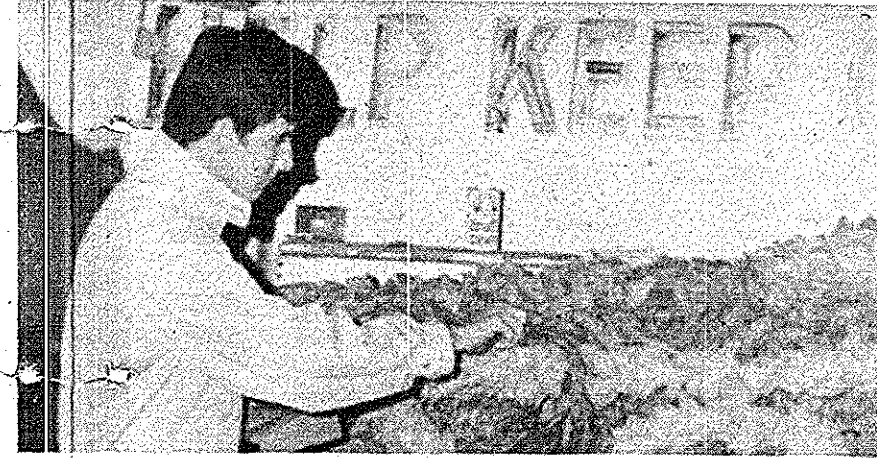
Dan Chiron operates card perforator.



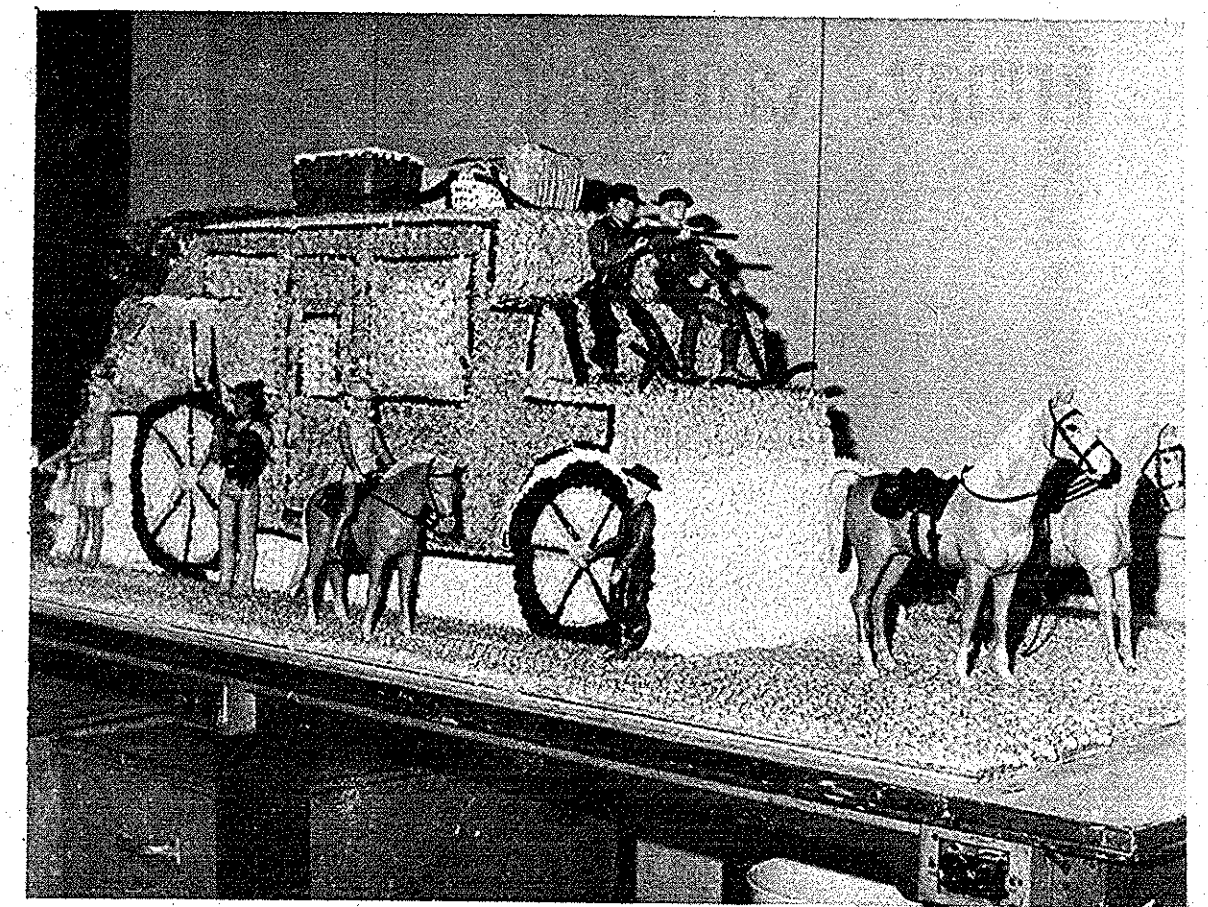
Alpha Phi Delta's put their mechanical float together.



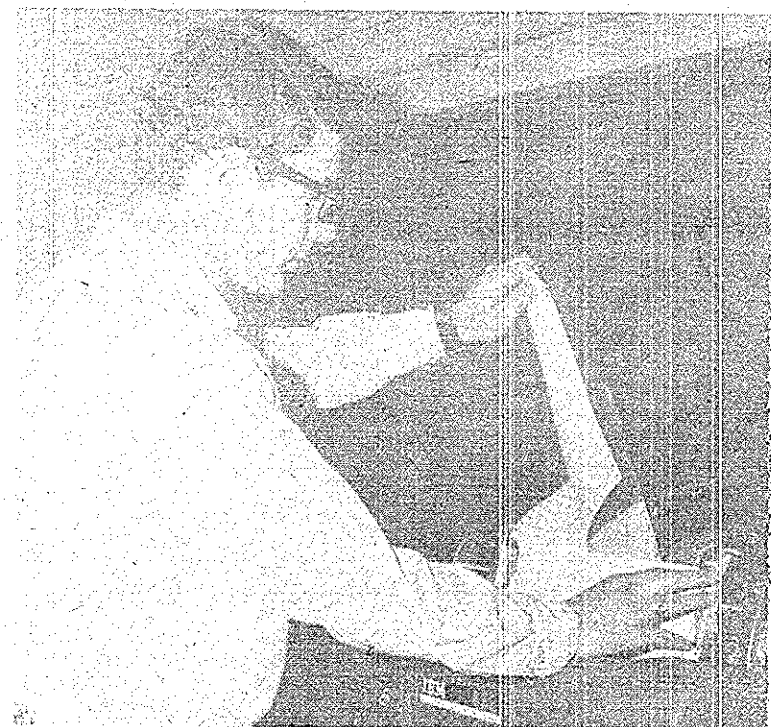
Theta Chi's stick flower's in a hat for their float's horse.



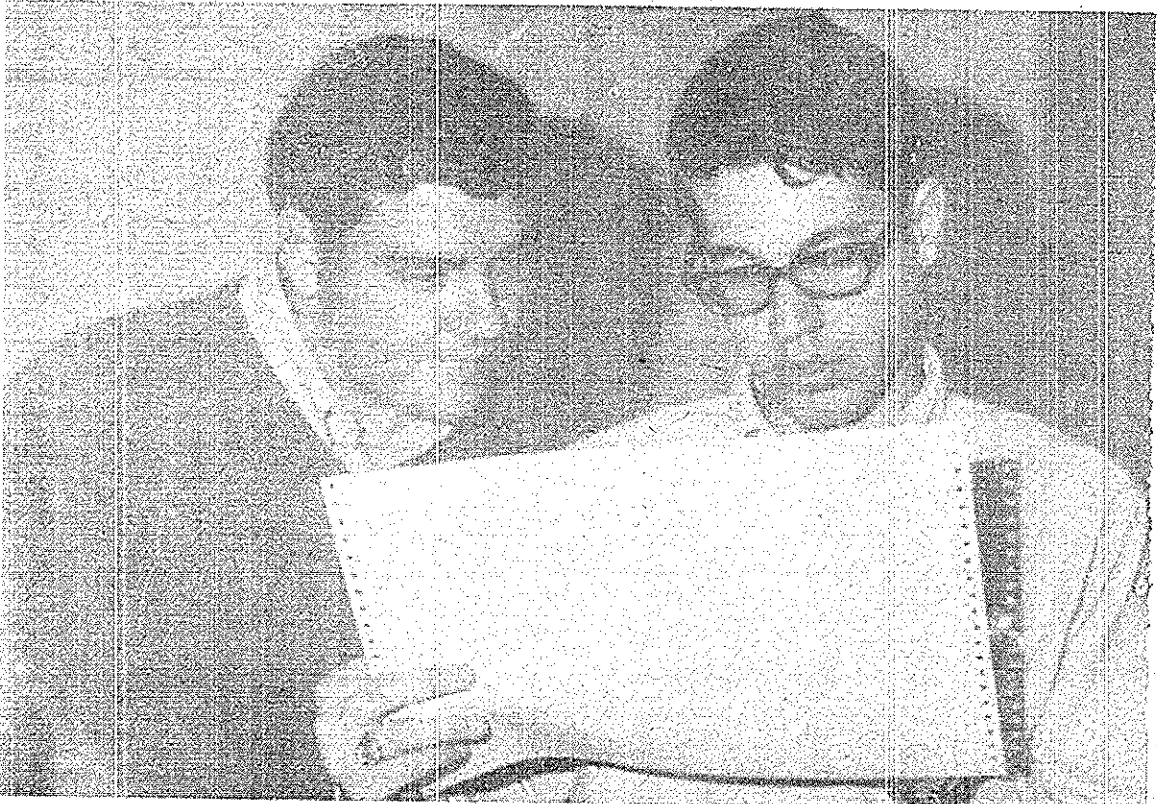

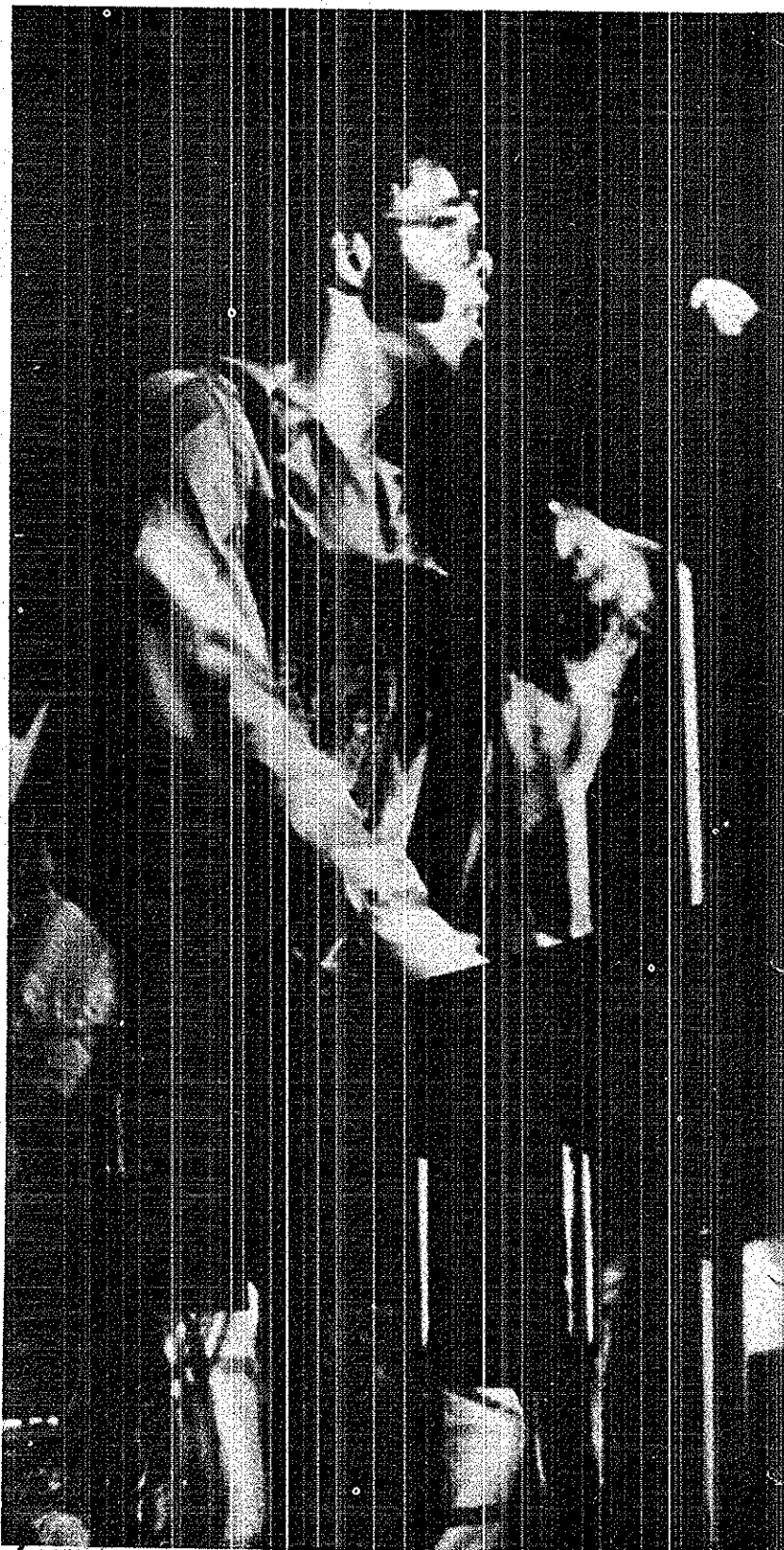
Greg Bednarcik feeds the perforated ballots into the accounting machine.

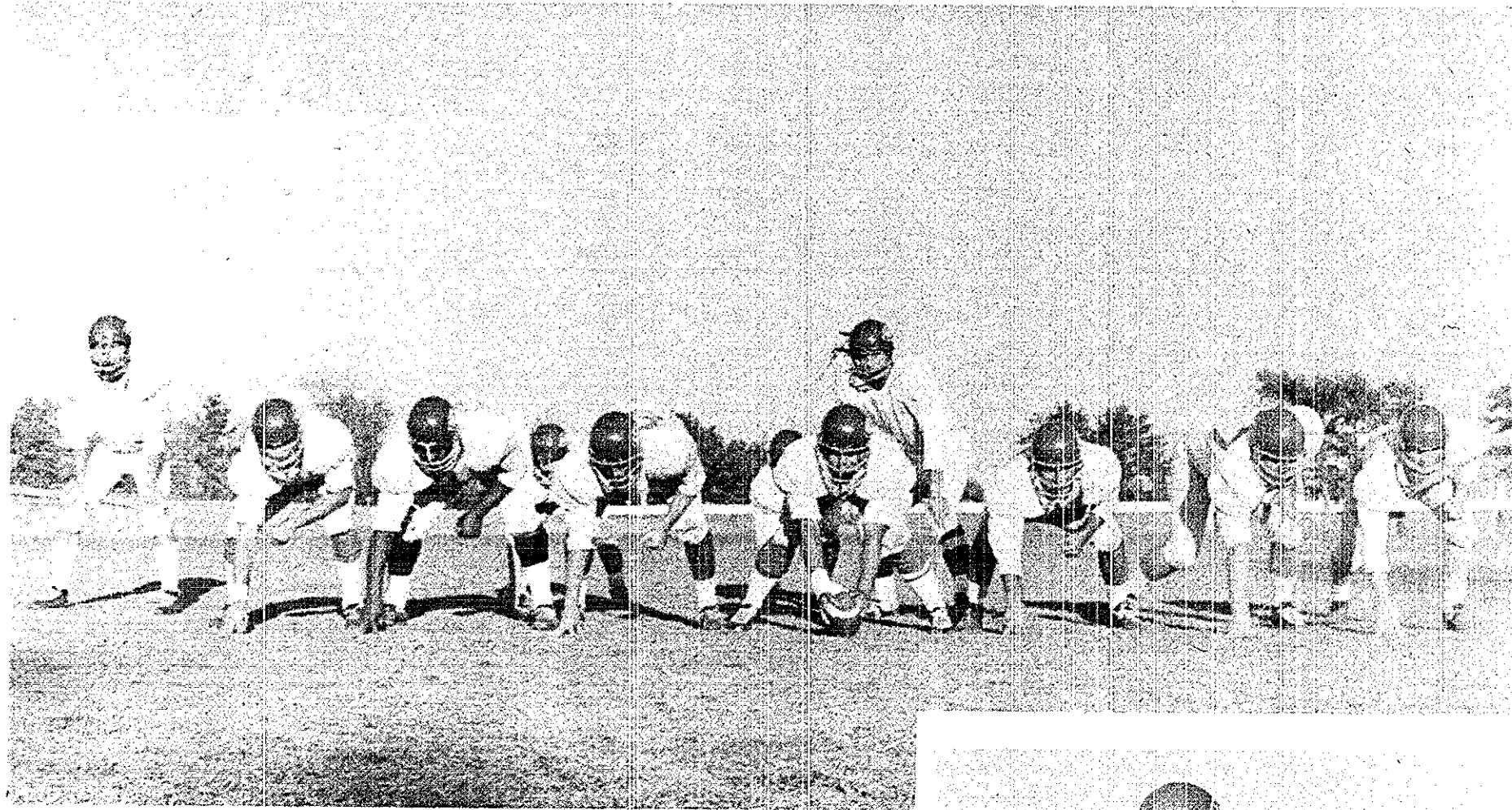

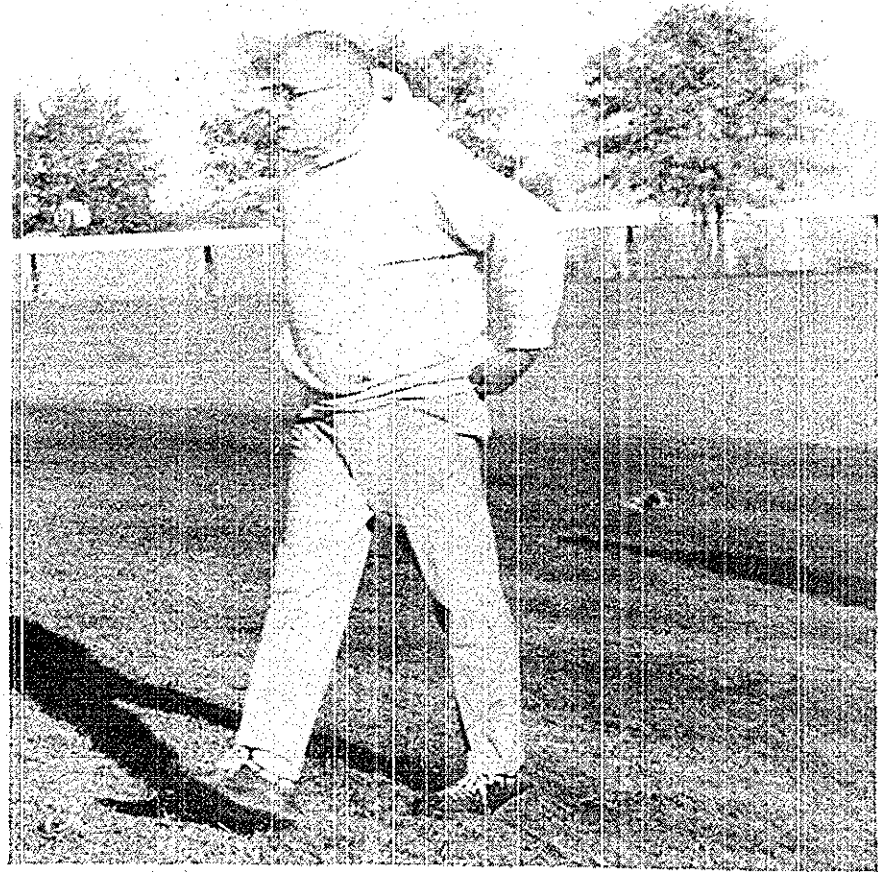
The offensive line with Klembara at the controls prepares for Southeastern Louisiana.

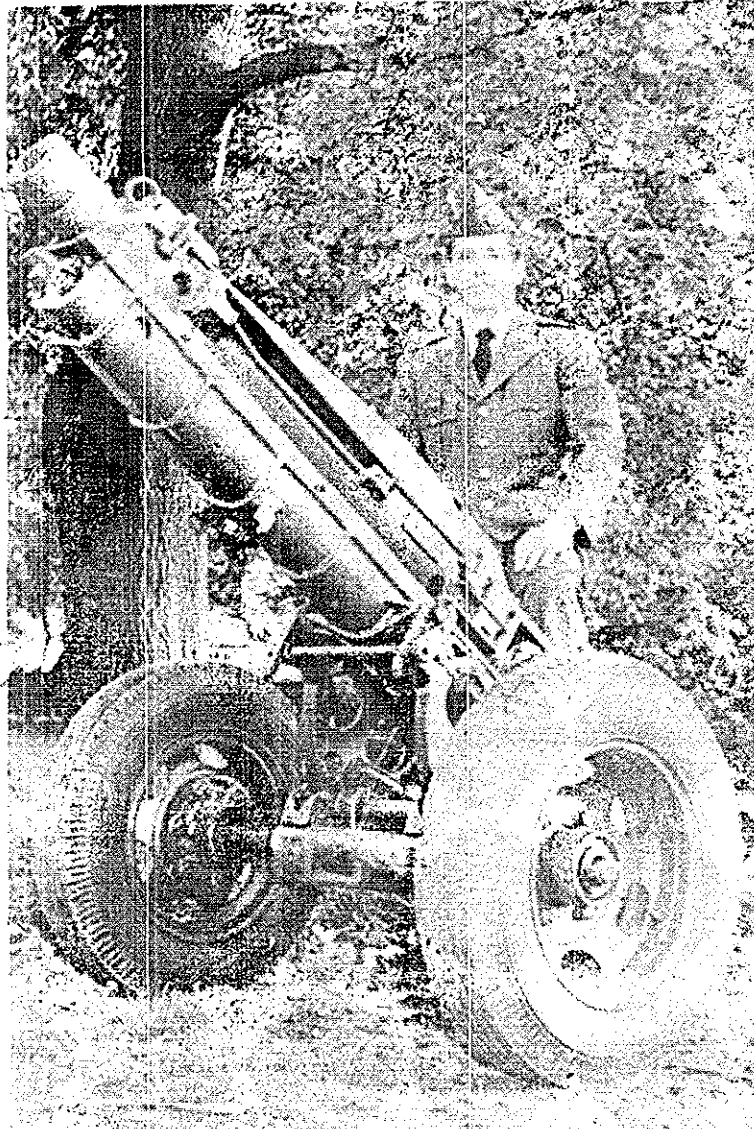

Leone said the picture of Tri Sig candidate, Janice Santangelo, was damaged by a soft drink being thrown on it. "Some of the girls pay as much as \$70 for these pictures" stated Leone "but they may not do it in the

future because of that incident. The Elections Committee tried to have the pictures of the candidates moved to the cafeteria where student traffic is greater but was told that this was against university regulations.

2,294 Students voted in this year's election and according to Leone the process was not slowed because of the new double identification card requirement. Leone went on to state that no cheating was reported in the balloting.

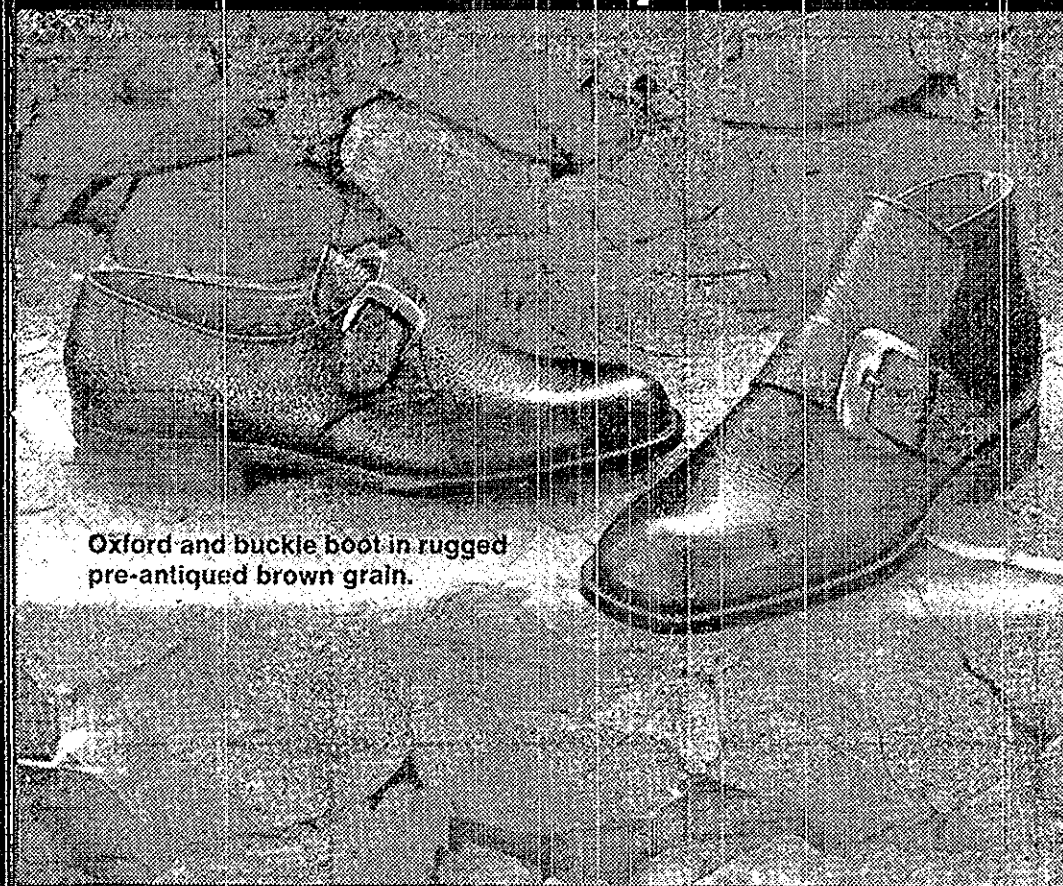
After delivering and setting up equipment for Sunday, the committee's efforts for a successful weekend will climax when they hand Sly the remainder of his fee.

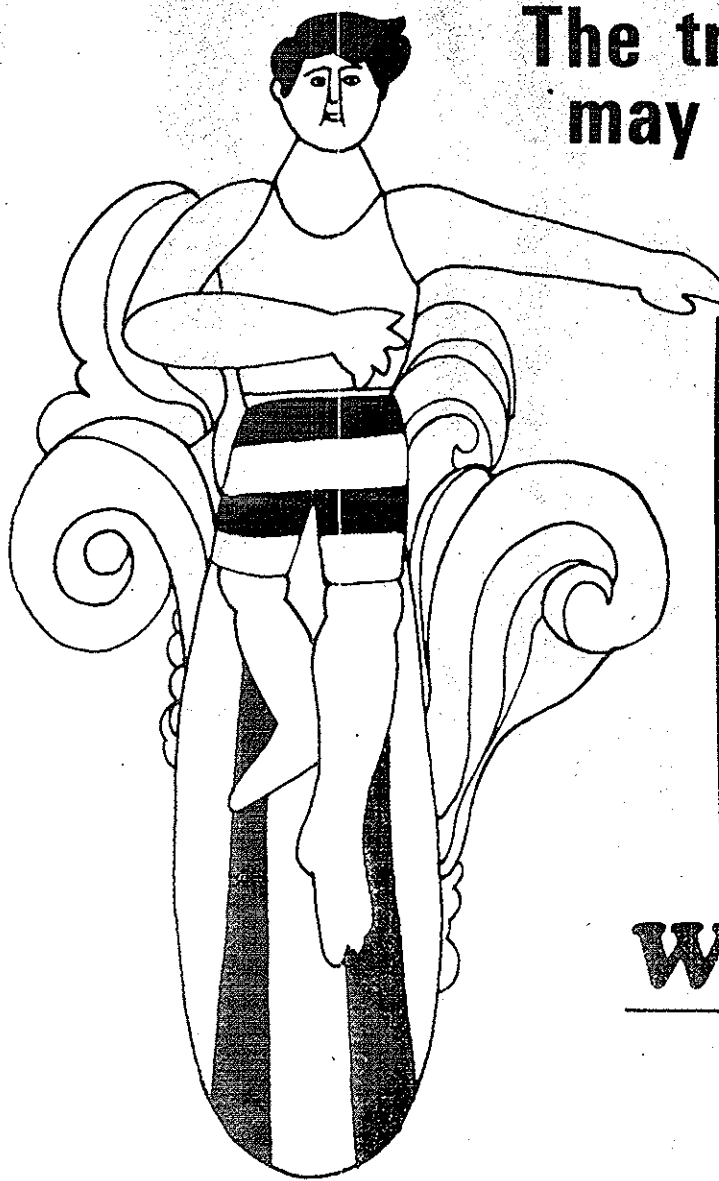

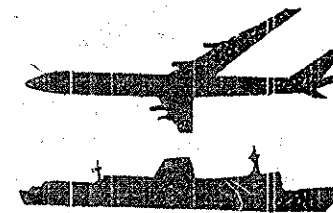

Coffield Wants Money For Urban Studies By July

Dr. William H. Coffield, vice president for academic affairs, stated in an interview this week that by next July 1, he would like to see an urban studies center in operation at YSU.

Dr. Coffield continued that he will propose the funds be set aside in February and March to establish such a project. Such a budget request will be made to the University operating budget committee which will come under consideration at that time. Dr. Coffield did not rule out the chance of government grants which might aid in the funding of the center and expressed doubt in the possibility of receiving monies from the Board of Regents as their budgetary

The main problem in such a move, he explained, is finding the appropriate funds. The University, which is an instructional organization, is run on a basis of an instructional budget and these specific funds must be requested and budgeted as public service.

Although the center appears to be somewhat in a state of limbo, with this set in the next budget its progress will move much more rapidly," he added.

The trustees have approved the establishment of the center, and information has been collected about other centers and about legislation concerning such centers. Also, a list of names from other universities has been contacted in order to aid in establishing the center. The director of the center will come from another university but his advisory committee will be established from the faculty.

Dr. Coffield states that he has talked to some initial people in regards to the position of director and with the passing of the budget hopes to appoint the director and get the project off the ground.

One of the difficulties thus far has been the space and housing of the center which is still undetermined.

Dr. Coffield pointed out also that once the urban studies center is established it is feasible that it will become self supporting through grants and contracts.

The center has been in the planning stages for two years with many meetings, conferences and consultations in order to establish it and begin operation as soon as possible. The work has been done by interested faculty members and includes such names as Mr.

Michael Klasovsky of the geography department, Miss Ivas Boyer of the social and political sciences department, Dr. Sanford Hotchkiss of the psychology department and Dr. James Kiriazis from the sociology department.

Dr. Coffield further stated that he feels that one of the major objectives of the urban universities is urban service.

The urban studies center, when established, will be devoted to the problems of urban America with specific problems of the Mahoning Valley. It will serve in such areas as economic, social, land, and pollution problems.

Arabs Voice Displeasure To Lebanon's Herlou

Angry Arab students here sent a telegram Wednesday to Charles Helou, President of the Lebanese Republic's government in Beirut, which expressed displeasure with that government's handling of the Palestinian Revolution.

Riyad Mansour the President of the 30 member Organization of Arab Students at YSU said they sent the telegram because they believe "where there is occupation there must be resistance." Mansour went on to say

that the revolution is not along religious lines, but that the Palestinian Commandos were rising against "the Imperialism of the Lebanese Government."

The one sentence telegram read "We denounce your fascist action against the Palestinian Revolution."

The Organization of Arab Students meets every other Saturday to discuss Arab student actions and, according to Mansour, American students are welcome to sit in.

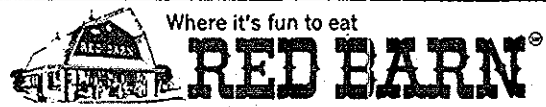

Penguins to Tame SLC Lions

With the season's initial victory now to their credit, the YSU Penguins will attempt to win their second straight when they entertain the Lions of Southeastern Louisiana State University this weekend.

The Homecoming clash is slated for 2 P.M. Saturday at Rayen Stadium and should prove to be a rugged tilt.

"I would say from looking at the films that Southeastern Louisiana will be the toughest team we've played this season. They made Pensacola Navy look like a high school team." That was "Dike" Beede's comment concerning this week's foe as he began to ready his Penguins for the forthcoming contest. His

comments were well supported by the Lions' trouncing of the Goshawks two weeks ago by a margin of 20-7.

The experienced Lion defense, playing in top form against the Pensacola eleven when they intercepted five passes and recovered three fumbles, is considered the best against the rush in the entire Gulf States Conference. Southeastern has limited its foes to a mere 77.2 yards per game while allowing

173.3 yards per game passing.

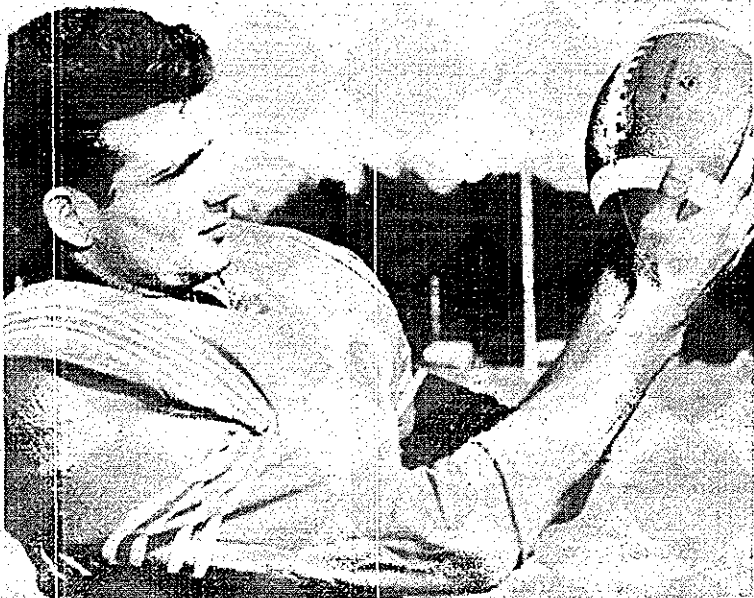
Spearheading the Lion defense is a pair of junior All-GSC performers, linebacker Ronnie Hornsby and tackle Bobby Vicknair. Junior defensive end Roger Gill, the lightest man on the defensive line at 205, is also a rugged contender.

Offensively, the Lions rely on the rushing of sophomore tailback Darrell Beard. He has gained 421 yards this season and is expected to rebound from a recent injury to start against the Penguins. The total offense leader of Southeastern Louisiana is quarterback Clell Rosetti, who has developed his passing in the last

three weeks to give the Lions still another scoring weapon.

The punting of Dennis Smith and the place kicking of Roy Hurd has added two more threats for opponents. Smith's 42.4 yard average ranks him among the nation's top ten punters while Hurd has four field goals to his credit, one of 50 yards.

If the Penguins are to fare well against the lions, they must rely on the passing arm of Denny Klembara, who has competent receivers in Dave DelSignore and George Miller.

Del Signore Key To Flight Plan

Even though YSU holds an 1-4 season slate, the opposition does not look forward to facing the Penguins.

The main reason is the infallible Klembara-to-DelSignore combination. The receiving end of this duo is the Jambor's pick for "Penguin of the week."

Dave DelSignore, a senior candidate for All-American, has been termed by Coach Dwight "Dike" Beede as the best receiver in YSU history.

He has the record to prove it. His five catches earlier this year against Pensacola Navy gave him 79 for his career, the most ever by a Penguin receiver.

He holds or shares every reception record at YSU and needs only four TD passes in a single game and four more this season to have sole possession of every record.

Besides the most catches in an individual career, DelSignore also holds the most passes caught for a single game, 7, and for an individual season, 43, the most TD passes caught in a career, 19, and the most yards gained by pass reception in a game, 212, for a season, 722, and for a career, 1677. He is tied with Paul Ceremuga for the most TD passes caught in a single game, 3, and for an individual season, 8.

DelSignore, a physical education major, was a 1966 graduate from Chaney High School where he lettered three times in football and three times in track. He was All-City end and a member of the NEO District Team in 1964 and 1965. He also lettered in football and All-State end also in 1965. He also led the Cowboys to their first and only undefeated and untied team in school history (9-0-0)!

Chaney coach Louis Angelo described Dave as "one of the best athletes and certainly the best defensive back I've ever coached. He had an instinctive nose for the ball, and made even the most difficult catches look easy."

DelSignore has long-range plans of becoming a gridiron coach after his football career, and one thing is certain, opposing teams will only be too happy to see that day come.
