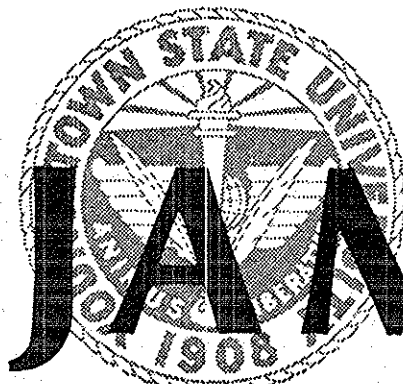

## Faculty Considers Promotion Policy

The present University policy concerning faculty promotions has recently been questioned by various concerned faculty members and faculty organizations who have initiated steps to study and offer solutions to the problem.

### AAUP Forms Committee

A committee of the American Association of University Professors has been established to investigate several policies currently in question. The committee, chaired by Dr. Robert Hare, associate professor of English, was formed following an address on March 11 on the promotion system by Dr. Earl Edgar, dean of the Graduate School and a member of the University Promotions Committee.

Another faculty effort to institute change in the present policy has been initiated by Dr. Joel Henkel and Dr. Paul Dalbec of the physics department and Dr. Bhaqwati Poddar of the sociology department, who circulated a petition to various faculty members and secured approximately 20 signatures. The petition which is addressed to President Pugsley, urges reconstitution of the promotions committee by the addition of more faculty members to the committee, that these additions be elected by the faculty and department chairmen only, that this committee convene as soon as possible to reconsider denied promotions and to establish a new criterion to serve as a basis for the future promotions as well establishing a redress procedure to handle grievances concerning promotions.

### Promotion Involves Administration

The present promotion procedures involve the promotion committee which includes three administrative officials: Dr. William Coffield, Vice-President of Academic Affairs; Dr. Earl Edgar, Dean of the Graduate School; and Dr. Karl Dykema, Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences, serving this year in the position which is rotated between the eight deans of the various schools. Also on the committee are two faculty members who are appointed by the administration.

Promotions are recommended by the various department chairmen and deans of the eight schools to the Promotions Committee where they are considered and decided upon.

## Lounge Use Restricted

The Faculty Student Center Committee decided yesterday to temporarily restrict student use of the Kilcawley Student Lounge as a temporary solution to problems that have arisen concerning its use.

Effective immediately, the lounge will be closed to general student use after 5 p.m. Monday through Thursday, and after 5 p.m. on Friday. Use of the lounge on Saturday and Sunday will be restricted to Kilcawley residents and their guests. These measures will be in effect until May 11 when the matter will be put to further consideration.

The action was taken in response to charges that there has been a flagrant disregard for the rules and regulations set by the Student Center Committee. Dean Rishel stated that the lounge has been subject to "deteriorating conditions", especially in the late evenings and Friday afternoons. Furniture and paintings have been slashed, and carpeting and plants damaged. There has been evidence of alcoholic beverages, and drug distribution." He further stated that

there are a "substantial number of persons using the lounge during evening hours and Friday afternoons who are not affiliated with the university.

Mrs. Lois Vahey, manager of

the lounge stated that she has been having trouble over a period of time, but that lately it has gotten entirely out of hand. "There are around 50 students

## Schlesinger Speaks On 'Crises' Tonight

Arthur M. Schlesinger, Jr., noted political historian, educator, and former special assistant to President John F. Kennedy, will discuss "America and The World Crisis" when he appears as Youngstown State University's second Skeggs Lecturer of the year at 8 p.m., Friday, April 10 in Stambaugh Auditorium.

The lecture is part of the YSU Artist Lecture Series and is free and open to the public.

Schlesinger, who became special assistant to President Kennedy in 1961, continued briefly in that role for President Johnson, resigning in 1964 to write the Pulitzer Prize-winning biography, "A Thousand Days:

John F. Kennedy in the White House," which also won the National Book Award for History and Biography.

Currently in his fourth year as the Albert Schweitzer Professor of the Humanities at the City University of New York, Schlesinger continues to record and interpret modern American history. His recent best-selling chronicles are "The Bitter Heritage: Vietnam and American Democracy 1941-1966," "Violence. American in the Sixties," and "The Crisis of Confidence: Ideas, Power and Violence in America."

He is presently working on the fourth volume of "The Age

# Nine Arrested Because Of School Closing By Fla. Gov.

BRADENTON, Fla. AP — A U.S. marshal yesterday served arrest warrants on three aides of Gov. Claude Kirk, a sheriff and five sheriff's deputies but took no prisoners when the men refused to go to jail.

The aides were in Bradenton to administer Manatee County schools which Kirk took over on Sunday and again on Wednesday in a bid to thwart federal court orders to integrate by busing.

Lloyd Hagaman, Kirk's top aide, and Manatee County Sheriff Richard W. Weitzenfeld locked themselves in the office of the Manatee County school superintendent and refused to come out. The other two aides and five of the sheriff's deputies refused to accompany the marshal.

U.S. Marshal Johnnie Barr of Tampa said, however, he considered the nine under arrest although they were not in custody.

Kirk has been ordered to appear in federal court Friday to show why he should not be held

ious times, and 20 who are constantly causing trouble. The conduct is awful."

Dean Rishel stated that vandalism of lounge property has been a country wide problem, and that various solutions had been considered. According to Miss Loretta M. Lipiak, associate professor of health and physical education and member of the committee, three alternatives had been considered. "We could either close down the lounge completely, hire a security guard to check all identification, or close the lounge for certain hours only."

Members of the committee decided that with such a small number of students actively involved in the abuse of the lounge that the third consideration would best benefit all concerned.

in contempt of court for taking over the school system. Today, however, Kirk was in Tallahassee with his wife who gave birth to the couple's second child, a boy who weighed 10 pounds and one ounce. The child was named Erik.

About a dozen Florida Highway Patrol troopers in riot gear appeared at the school a short time after the nine men refused

arrest. The troopers moved into the anteroom outside the office where hagaman and Weitzenfeld were holed up.

Oscar Blassingame, an assistant U.S. attorney from Tampa, said the arrest orders were issued by U.S. District Judge Ben Krentzman who has ordered Kirk to court to show why he should not be held in contempt of court.

# Pleads Innocent In Airline Pilot's Death

BOSTON AP — John J. DiVivo, 27, of West New York, N.J., pleaded innocent in Suffolk Superior Court today to a charge of murder in connection with the airborne shooting of an Eastern Air Lines copilot last month.

DiVivo is charged in the death of James E. Hartley, 30, of Fort Lee, N.J., during a scuffle in the cockpit of a twin-jet DC-9 as it approached for a landing at Logan International Airport.

Capt. Robert M. Wilbur, the pilot, was wounded in both arms during the incident, but managed to bring the shuttle from

New Jersey, carrying 72 persons, to a safe landing.

DiVivo was also wounded during the melee and was arrested on a warrant today upon his release from Massachusetts General Hospital.

He reportedly has entered the plane's cockpit and ordered the pilot to "fly east." But the scuffle began as the plane banked for a landing.

Judge Wilfred J. Paquet ordered DiVivo held without bond and committed him to Bridgewater State Hospital for 35 days observation.

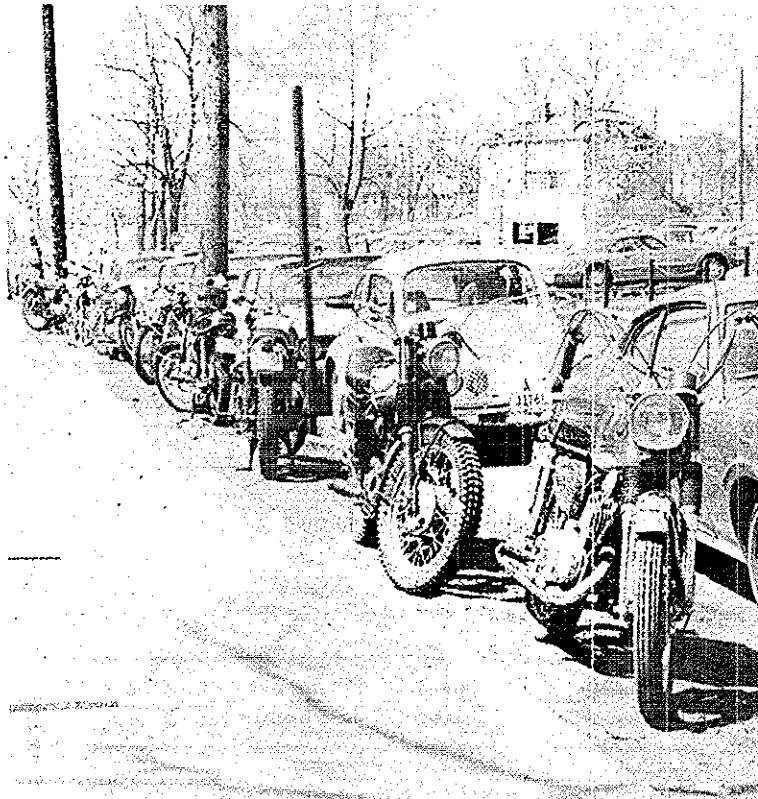

### New Campus Rep. Theatre Presents Play

The newly formed Zoo Repertory Theatre will begin a series of experimental plays beginning Tuesday, April 14 at 3:00 p.m. in Strouss Auditorium with *Convention* by Dan Greenburg and *The Sandbox* by Edward Albee.

Under the direction of Mr. David Reeves, Associate Professor of the Drama and Speech Department, the Zoo Repertory Theatre will augment the major productions of the YSU Drama and Speech Department to give students of Play Production classes 620 and 721 opportunities to produce, direct, design, and act.

The cast of *Convention* include Steve Gifford, Paul Waldman and Pat Ennis. *The Sandbox* is acted by Cathy Riffle, Mike Duquin, Paul Waldman, Eric Sellers and Pat Ennis. Future plays may include *No Exit* by Jean Paul Sartre, *Antigone* by Jean Anouilh, and *The Death of Bessie Smith* by Edward Albee.

### Three-Phase Library Plans Are Released

A six million dollar appropriation for the University by the 1969 Ohio General Assembly has been announced by Dr. Earl E. Edgar, Chairman of Academic Affairs. The money will be used to construct and equip a new library building.

The area to be used for the building is bounded on the west side by Ward Beecher and the existing library building, and on the south side by Ward Beecher, and Jones Hall. East Hall, Central Hall, West Hall, the Bookstore and possibly the Executive Offices will be demolished. An open, glassed-in area on the ground floor will permit a view from Wick Avenue, through the library and across the campus to the west.

The President has appointed a committee to work with University Consultant, Dr. Robert A. Miller, Director of Libraries, Indiana University. Projected li-

brary plans will be met in three phases: 1) the new library building, an addition to the existing library, is to be completed and occupied by 1973; 2) a proposed addition, approximately equal in size to the new library building, is to be added from anticipated appropriations in the 1973-5 biennium; 3) a third expansion of library facilities will be needed by 1980 as the University's projected full-time-equivalent enrollment approaches 20,000.

Phase 1 is designed to meet the immediate needs of the University but with flexibility to accommodate future needs.

A copy of the minutes of the meetings of the Program Planning Advisory Committee for the library building is on file in the library. The Committee invites suggestions of the YSU community and suggests they be forwarded to one of the members of the committee.

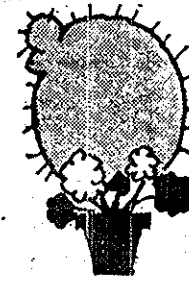

# Hunt Controversy Goes On PSA Expresses Concern For Dr. Hunt

To the editor of the Jambar:

Being a student at this university and having had the pleasure of having Dr. Hunt as an instructor has been an inspiring experience. I would go so far as to say that whoever hired Dr. Hunt outdid themselves, and I think Miss Boyer may be undoing herself with his firing.

If there are some good reasons for Dr. Hunt's dismissal I'm sure that both he and all of us who are supporting him in his bid for reinstatement would welcome them. We wouldn't support some one we didn't believe in. The reasons set forth by Miss Boyer seem totally inadequate and lead me to ask the following questions.

1. Why is it when every other department in the university is pulling teeth to find people with doctorate degrees to teach here, that the Political Science Department sees fit to release Dr. Hunt who comes with very good credentials, and even states that it is not for academic reasons?

2. I would like to think that a man with the education of Dr. Hunt could make up his own mind to resign if he was that

upset with night classes - (and apparently he isn't that upset). Right or wrong?

3. Is it true that just because an educator stands up for smaller sized classes (a recognized fact of better communication and the best learning situation) that he must be fired? (If these are absurd we can only read into the matter more logical questions).

4. Are Miss Boyer and Dr. Hunt known to have differing opinions as to political systems and theory? If so, is this the cause of dismissal?

5. If the above is true, don't you feel that the Political Science Department should take great pains in preserving as many diverse political theorists as possible in order to give YSU an adequate acquaintance with as many views in the political spectrum as possible?

6. Lastly, can it be that Miss Boyer feels Dr. Hunt's presence in the department is a threat to her position?

Come on, Miss Boyer. If there are any good reasons for Dr. Hunt's dismissal let them be known or reinstate him. For we

need as many fine professors as we can get.

I am a commuter student, and like all commuter students I have the tendency to become apathetic, but this matter could definitely affect the quality of my education and that of a number of current and future students. Therefore, I plan to be in attendance at the next meeting of the board of trustees, hoping that I won't hear the phrase that for too many years has been echoing around this campus every time the administration bungles something or the students suggest a course to follow in some matter, - that phrase being, "The matter is closed."

Let's open it - or every one of us 300 to 400 students who complain about parking conditions and large classes may come up in front of the discipline board for expulsion!

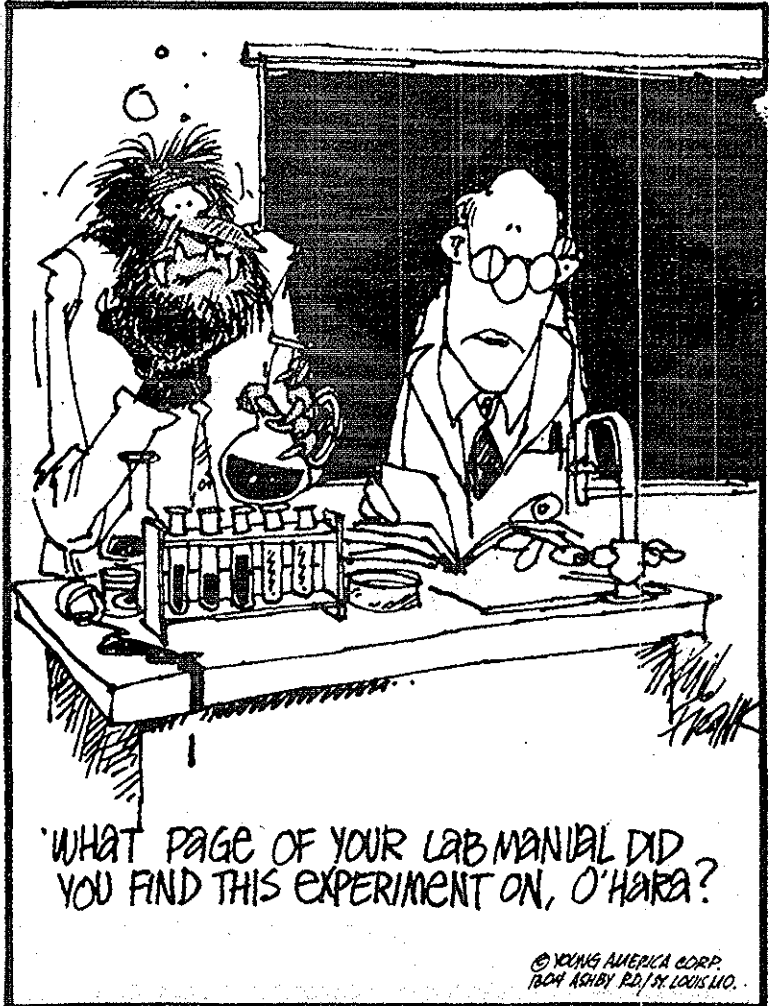

## Asks Questions On Hunt Situation

To the editor of the Jambar:

The Youngstown State University Association of Political Scientists wishes to formally express its concern over the decision not to renew the teaching contract of Dr. William Hunt for the coming academic year. As students within the fields of political science and combined social studies, areas in which Dr. Hunt has taught, members of the Association take a vital interest in the consequences of that decision and feel that an expression of confidence in Dr. Hunt's competence as a teacher and as a scholar may provide a rational basis for a reconsideration of the decision.

As a student organization,

the Association wishes to officially recognize Dr. Hunt's excellence and effectiveness as a teacher. In terms of both preparation for and communication within the classroom setting, he has been outstanding. His approach, style, and expertise have made his courses in comparative government and political behavior an intellectually rewarding experience. As an academic organization, the Association recognizes Dr. Hunt's scholarly achievements and qualifications to the field of political science reflect well upon himself and upon the University. As personal associates of Dr. Hunt, members of the Association regard his rapport with and inter-

est in the students' personal growth within the University.

The Association therefore requests that, in light of the above considerations, the decision regarding Dr. Hunt's continuance at this University be reappraised. The Association hopes that such a reappraisal may be conducted in as rational and responsible an atmosphere as possible. It further hopes that in any action taken in this situation primary consideration be given to the possible consequences of such action for the future of Dr. Hunt and of the Political Science Department.

## Graduate Hits Chuck Hettler

I have come across a piece of campaign literature which one of the candidates for a Student gov't position is distributing among the student body. The flyer starts off by saying, "I know Chuck; he has done a fine job as Student Council Finance Chairman and has been a qualified and capable Rep. at Large..." This letter to the student body was signed by Chuck Hettler, who was only too willing to praise himself and his accomplishments. This alone would seem to be slightly nauseating to the prospective student voter. However if one looks at the accomplishments Mr. Hettler claims to have personally made, a subtle taste of vomit becomes apparent in the throat. Mr. Hettler claims that on Nov. 10th he "introduced a bill creating the cabinet level position of Sec. of Student Grievances and the Student Grievance Committee." At first glance the average student voter would be led to believe that Mr. Hettler thought up the idea of creating this committee, wrote up this bill, and then single handedly pushed it through Student Council for

passage. However, those who have been seated on council for a while quite clearly remember that this was first proposed by Jim Joyce and myself while members on Council. When we both left the task of completing the bill creating this position was taken over by Pete Isgro and Mike Foley who wrote up the bill as it appears today. The rules which Student Council abides by state that a bill must be introduced by a member of council. Besides taking credit for one and a half years of other people's hard work, Mr. Hettler listed other accomplishments such as introducing a bill to get flashing lights and warning signs at pedestrian crosswalks. 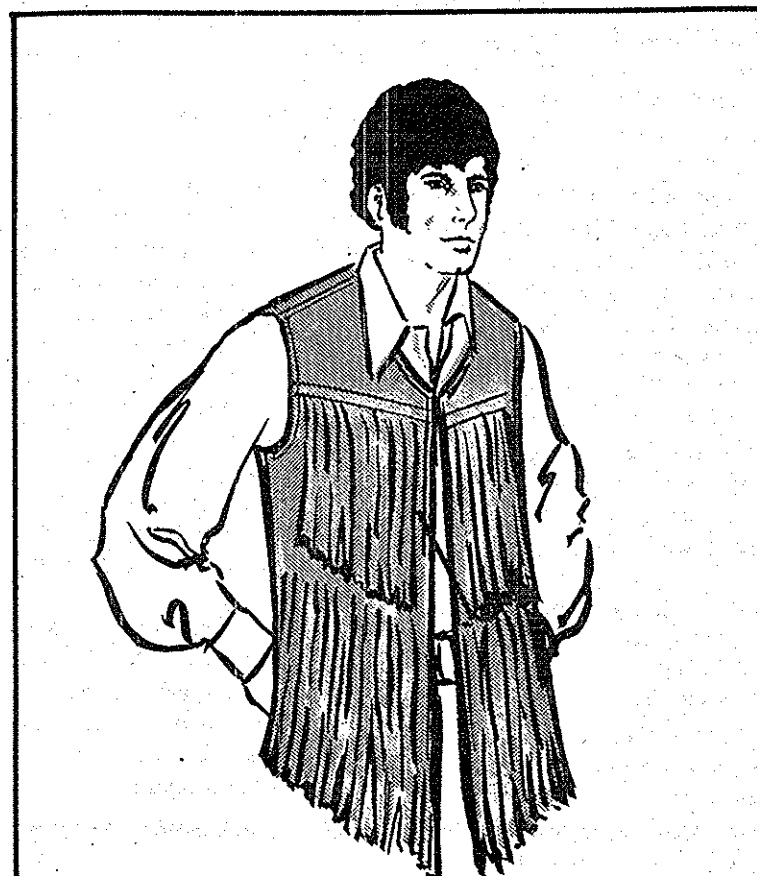

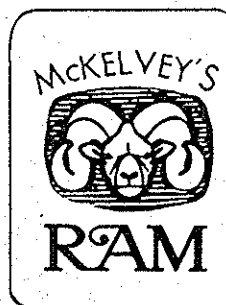

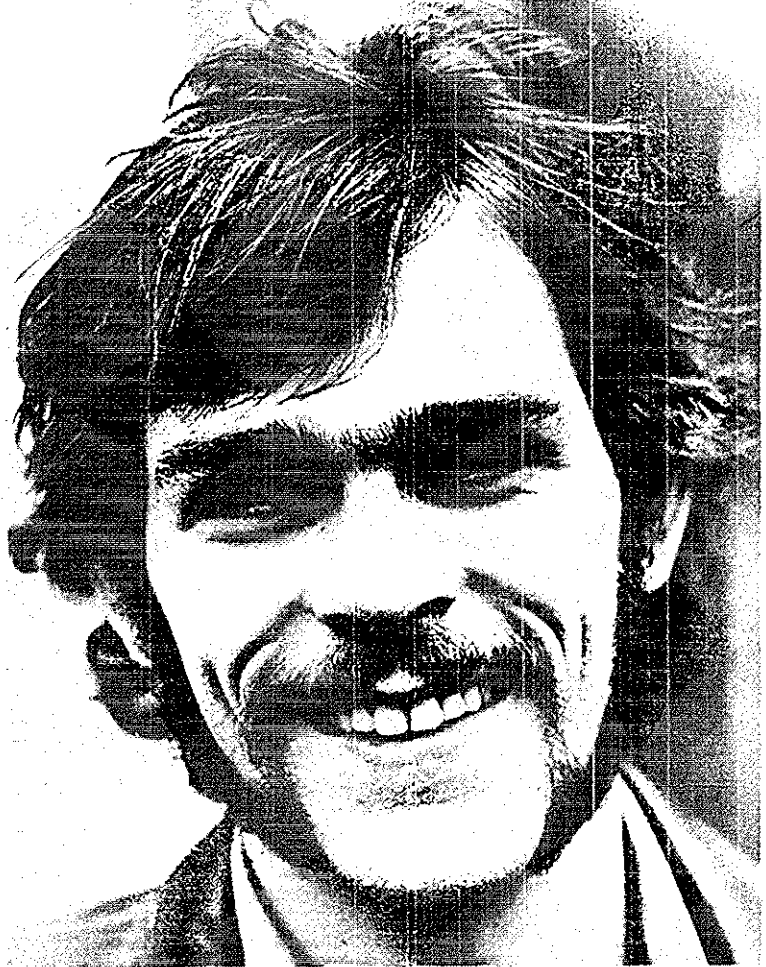

*Waiting For Godot* is directed by Dr. C. D. Haller with the scenery and lighting by Mr. David Reeve. This production is presented through funds provided by the Student Council.

## Tutoring Program Provides Benefits

Many valuable resources at YSU remain undiscovered and unused by students who could reap benefits from them. The Mentor Tutoring Program is such a resource.

The purpose of the program is twofold. While aiding students who need academic assistance, it provides financial aid for their tutors by paying them two dollars an hour. However, unlike other campus tutorial programs, this service is funded by the state rather than the tutee.

"In this way," explained Gerald Burks, the program's coordinator and senior accounting major, "a person could be tutored as long as he needed help. In fact, the way our program is set up, a person could both tutor and be tutored."

The Mentor Program is not based on the fallacy that one must be brilliant in a subject to be a tutor. No specific qualifications exist except that a student must be in good standing with the university.

## Computer Watches Campus Chislers

You've gotta go a long way baby - to bribe, beg, or forge your grades or point average at Youngstown State University. At least that's the latest report from Dr. Ronald W. Jonas, Director of the Computer Center. Dr. Jonas explained that the iron-clad mechanism, which keeps student's grades recorded, has too many "checkpoints" and students who would try to fool it would eventually be caught.

Three other departments (Registration Office, Records Office, and instructors of different schools) deal with a student's grade and each must correlate with the other inside the Computer Bank.

The Computer Center, located in the Engineering Science Building, has recorded "a memory" since January 1969. Any students entering the University after that period or enrolled in the University at that time have a report in the Computer Center.

Information recorded for each individual is placed in an "inactive status" when the student graduates, and is reactivated if the student returns to the University.

The memory records the student's application form, his registration, activities, schedule, change of department, grades, and finally, his intention to graduate form.

"The record of each student is almost like a student's Permit to Register form with the addition of ACT or SAT scores, campus information, courses, and grade average" Mr. Jonas said.

Various other checkpoints are made by the University Computer Center to validate these grades. First, the grades are tallied by the computer and three copies are made: One to be sent to the instructor, dean, and registrar. Then a second checklist of two copies is made to be sent to the Dean and the Registrar.

Then the grades are tabulated for each student, and recorded in the memory bank of the computer.

Grades cannot be recorded unless registered under the proper procedures, given a grade by the correct instructor, and finally tallied in the "memory bank" of the computer.

## YSU Host To NCAA Tourney

Youngstown State University will host its first NCAA championship ever this summer--the eighth annual NCAA College Division Golf Tournament to be held June 16-19 at Warren's Avalon and Avalon Lakes Golf Courses.

Bill Carson, veteran Penguin coach, will serve as director of the 72-hole tourney which is being co-sponsored by the Warren Area Chamber of Commerce. In addition to being a first for YSU, this marks the first time the tournament has been hosted by an Ohio school.

Close to 300 golfers representing some 40 schools are expected to enter. The top ten finishers will be eligible for the NCAA University Division Tournament to be held at Ohio State on June 22-27.

San Fernando Valley State won last year's tourney played at New Mexico University. San Fernando's Corky Bassler and Mike Spang of Portland State tied for medalist honors with 297's YSU, led by All-American Tim Miller who tied for eighth place with a 305, placed 13th.

The tourney provides an annual showcase for outstanding amateur golfing talent, spawning

many future pros. Larry Hinson, 1967 tournament medalist whose 276 is still a record, was 32 on the PGA money list last year including a victory in the New Orleans Open.

Bill Taylor, YSU sports information director, will serve as publicity director for the tourney. Further tournament details will be released from his office.

### Dana Seniors Hold Recital

A Senior Composition Recital written by Roger Steinman will be presented at 8:00 p.m. on Monday April 13 at the Engineering Auditorium.

The works include three songs, sung by Cheryl Bell, a string quartet performed by the Dana String Quartet and a woodwind quintet performed by the Dana Woodwind Quintet.

The last work is scored for woodwind quintet, string quartet, bass guitar (Larry Paxton), percussion (Robert Bedell), and piano (Roger Steinman). Dr. William Conable will conduct.

The recital is free and open to the public.

## Teague Signs With Washington Caps

William Teague, a 6-foot 10, 240 pound honorable mention All-America center from Youngstown State University has signed a one-year contract with the Washington Caps of the American Basketball Association.

The 22-year-old Youngstown, Ohio native was the 10th draft pick of the Caps after earning defensive honors in the Mid-East small college regional tournament.

The tallest player ever to perform for Youngstown, Teague averaged in double figures for both scoring and rebounding in

three of his four varsity campaigns. His career highs include 26 rebounds and 25 points.

Teague's signing brings to five the number of draftees inked by the Washington Caps. The others are North Carolina's Charlie Scott, Brigham Young's Scott Warner, Adams State's James Gilbert and Anderson Broadus's Andy Jennings.

the University and willing to help someone else, Burks said.

Entering its second year of existence, the program is gradually expanding. "We aided only 150 students last quarter. That's just one percent of the student body here. We need to reach more students than this because many students at the University don't have the equivalent of a high school education, as evidenced by our high drop-out and flunk-out rate.

"These students," Burks continued, "are overcome with the difference between high school life and the demands of Uni-

versity life. They need someone to help them make this transition. The University must be the source of this aid if it is going to be an institution of learning."

The Mentor Program is flexible enough to meet an increase in tutors and tutees. Consequently, Burks is urging students who need financial or academic aid to take advantage of the program's facilities. "We would also like for teachers to send us students who need help," Burks added.

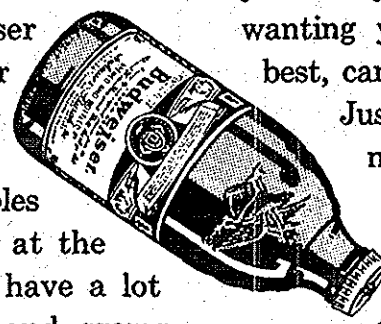

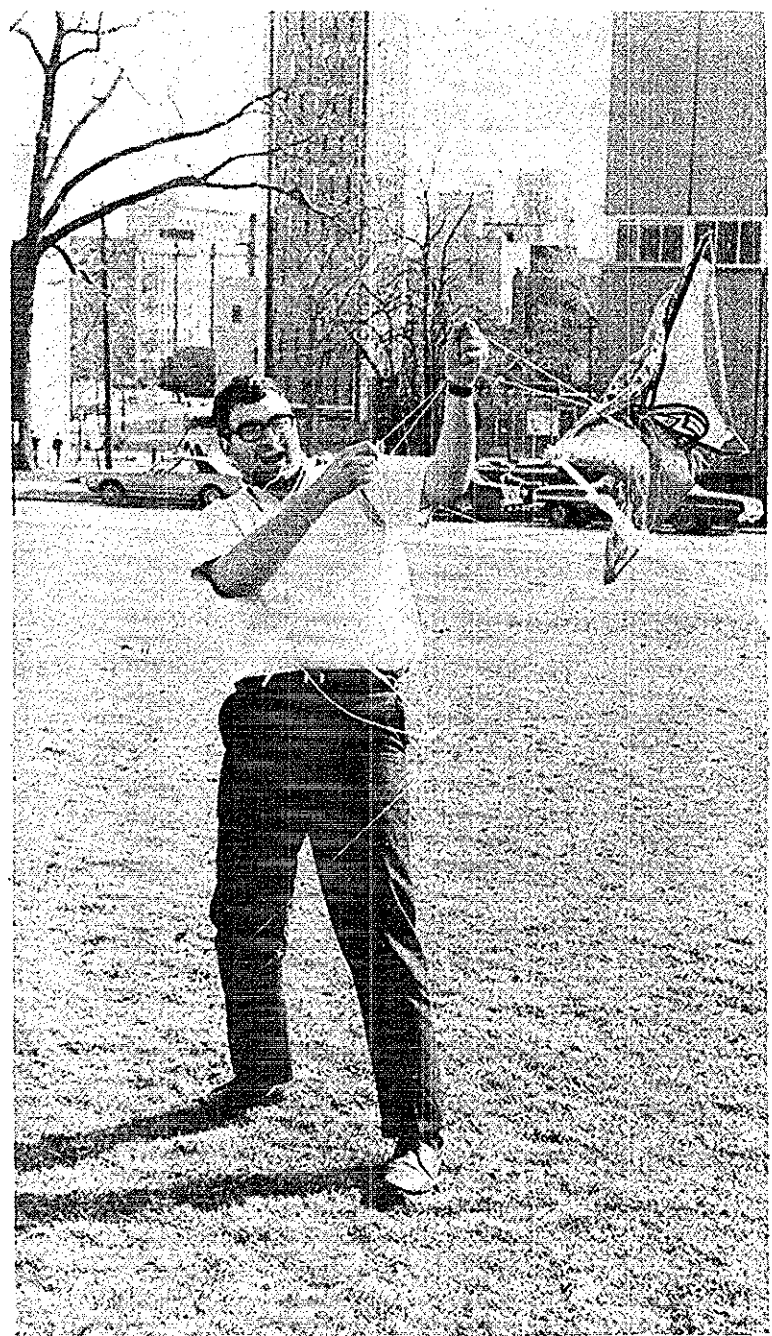
