

Case To Be Reheard-

Leheny's Appeal Granted

Dennis Leheny's appeal of his summer expulsion from the University has been granted by the Appeal's Board. On October 12 the Board ruled unanimously to remand the case to the Discipline Committee for rehearing.

The Appeals Board based their decision on the following irregularities in the original case:

(1) One professor bringing charges against the accused was not on campus during the sum-

mer and not available to appear at the original hearing to answer questions directed through the chairman by the accused or by the committee members.

(2) One witness whose testimony may have been relevant to the decision was away from the Youngstown area at the time of the hearing and unable to ap-

Other alleged irregularities in procedure were rejected by the Board of Appeals. According to

Leheny these include refusal to permit Leheny to bring a court stenographer to the hearing, that he was denied permission to allow his attorney to cross-examine any witness against him, that the committee refused to grant him a continuance of the hearing until after

Voting Continues In Queen Election

Voting by students for the 1970 HomecomingQueen ends tonight at 8 p.m. at all of four polling booths. One of six coed nominees will be crowned Homecoming Queen at half-time of Saturday's YSU-Northern Michigan football game.

The candidates, representing six social sororities on campus, will be present at a table today in the Engineering Science Lobby from 10 a.m. to noon, 1 to 2 p.m., and 6 to 8 p.m.

Under new rules this year, campaigning by the respective sororities has been abolished. No violations to this rule have been reported in the light vote turnout yesterday.

The contestants are: Emily Mittacos, representing Delta Zeta Sorority. Emily is a senior majoring in business education. Suellen Stiffler, representing Zeta Tau Alpha Sorority, who is a junior English major; Anna Marie Schiavone, a member of Sigma Sigma Sigma Sorority who is majoring in sociology; Peggy Riley, affiliated with Alpha Omicron Pi Sorority who is a senior pursuing a nursing degree; JoAnn Suhar, representing Phi Mu Sorority, who is a senior majoring in education; and Rosemary Putarek who is representing Alpha Sigma Tau Sorority.

Sponsored by Major Events Committee, Homecoming will feature the theme "Greek Odyssey," October 16, 17, and 18, according to committee chairman, Michael Duquin.

The weekend begins with the sounds of "The Omegas" Friday from 8 p.m. till midnight at Kilcawley Hall. The Homecoming finalist will be announced at that time.

Saturday the Homecoming football game between Northern Michigan and Youngstown will be highlighted at halftime when the queen is crowned.

Sunday at 6, and again at 9:30 p.m., the 5th Dimension will perform at the Struthers Fieldhouse. Each concert will last for two hours.

The ticket price will include the dance on Friday as well as the concert on Sunday. Tickets will be on sale to students with ID's at the Bursar's Office beginning today, and ending at noon Saturday, October 17 for the price of \$2.50 per ticket, two tickets per ID.

During the 1964 presidential campaign, Miss Sanders traveled with Mrs. Lyndon Johnson on

her campaign trips and coanchored ABC's coverage of the inauguration with Peter Jennings. More recently, Miss Sanders traveled with Senator Eugene McCarthy during his campaign and covered the assassination of Senator Robert

Kennedy. Award Winner

In 1964 Miss Sanders won McCall's Golden Mike Award for "skillfully interpreting New York's many problems." During the same year she also won the Writers Guild of America Radio Award for a two-part series called "The Battle of the Warsaw Chetto."

Her lecture will be free and open to the public.

In Chronological Order-

Cities Bombed Since August

Since a bomb exploded Aug. 24 at a University of Wisconsin Army research building killing one person, there have been major bombings in seven other American cities.

In chronological order, major bombings have occurred in:

MADISON, Wis. - Aug. 24. an Army research building at the the University of Wisconsin blew up, killing one or more persons and causing more than \$1 million damage. A group calling itself the "New Year's Gang" took credit for the explosion.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. -Sept. 6, James Lawson, 19, was blown to pieces after explosives police said he was carrying went off as he walked along city street. The explosion also severely damaged two houses. Police said Lawson had lived in a Black Panther house in Des Moines, Iowa, from February to July.

Chicago's Haymarket Square. The next day, a tape recording reportedly made by Bernardine Dohrn, a fugitive leader of the Weatherman, claimed responsibility for that blast and said the Weatherman and the radical underground would launch a "fall offensive" against "the enemy."

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. -Oct. 8, a bomb damaged a military armory. The "Perfect Park Home Grown Garden Society," a radical group, claimed responsibility.

SAN RAFAEL, Calif. - Oct. 8, a county courthouse was the target of a bomb which severely damaged a courtroom and a rest room. A group calling itself the "Weatherman Underground" took credit.


SEATTLE, Wash. - Oct. 8, a bomb damaged heavily an ROTC building on the University of Washington campus. An underground group known as the "Quarter Moon Tribe" said it had planted the bomb.

NEW YORK - Oct. 10, a bomb went off in a Queens courthouse 10 minutes after a caller saying "This is Weatherman" phoned a warning.

ROCHESTER, N.Y. - Oct. 12, a federal office building, a county office building, two churches and a private home were hit by bombs within a 25-minute period.

Graduate Assistantships

Dr. Frank A. D'Isa, acting dean of the Graduate School at Youngstown State University, has announced the appointment of four additional graduate assistantships effective with the fall quarter, 1970. The appointments round out the assistantships for the quarter

The duties of the graduate assistants include instruction, research and other academic services as determined by the department to which they are assigned.

Engineering Appointments

Dr. Harry B. Skinner of Cleveland and Dr. Dennis F. Sobota Presents Paper

Dr. Anthony E. Sobota, associate professor of biology at Youngstown State University, recently presented a paper entitled "RNA Metabolism Associated with Cell Elongation" at the 21st annual meeting of the American Institute of Biological Sciences at Indiana University.

Constitutional Rights Redefined In Elimination Of Racial Schools

The government argued yesterday in the Supreme Court that the Constitution does not require the elimination of racially identifiable public schools.

What is required, Solicitor Gen. Erwin N. Griswold said, is that school boards "achieve a truly unitary system."

"This is not a retreat," the silver-haired former Harvard law school dean told the nine justices. "There must not be a retreat in this area where so much has been done to redeem the promise of America." Before the court are three key test cases

from the South that may lead to a fresh definition of the constitutional rights of black children and the obligations of school boards.

A black civil rights lawyer, Julius Le Vonne Chambers of Charlotte, N.C., pleaded with the court to rule out racially identifiable schools in areas where segregation had been enforced by law.

The NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund lawyer defined such schools as those in which the concentration of blacks is disproportionate to the black percentage in the district over-all.

Chambers said he is not arguing for "radical balance"—that every school in a district have the same black-white ratio.

Explaining. Chambers said he would consider it illegal to have more than 50 per cent of an individual school in Charlotte black while the black percentage of the entire Charlotte-Mecklenburg county school population is 29 per cent black. By the same token, he said, a white population of more than 90 per cent in any school would be illegal.

State charges were adjudicated, and that the Discipline Committee did not contain a quorum.

Leheny said that the University is pursuing the incident far too strenuously and is doing so since he was a member of the Criminal Justice Department and an officer in the Criminal Justice Fraternity.

A new hearing will be scheduled before the University Discipline Committee as soon as possible, probably within the next three weeks, according to the Dean of Student Affairs, Darrell F. Rishel.

"I think they are all right as long as students don't go overboard. It should be a happy medium."






Kappa Chi became the 178th chapter of Delta Zeta in the United States.

YSU Folds In 3rd Quarter

YSU's winless Penguins played well for three quarters last Saturday night, but a third-period collapse gave Murray State a 42-32 victory.

Youngstown State railied for two touchdowns in the second quarter to take a brief 20-14 lead. The Racers struck back with 10 seconds left in the half to go ahead 21-20 and set the stage for things to come in the following period.

The Penguins took the kick to open the second half and

drove to the Murray State 12. There Fred Bruderly tried a 29-yard field goal that was wide. The Racers, with sophomore quarterback Garnett Scott at the controls, engineered an 80-yard drive in 8 plays to go up 28-20. Scott burned the YSU defense twice with screen passes to fullback Rick Fisher, the first good for 27 yards and the second for 36 yards and touchdown.

Youngstown fumbled the ensuing kickoff and Murray scored on the first play, Scott hitting halfback Jimmy Brown with an 11-yard toss. The Penguin offense never got untracked in the quarter, turning over the ball three more times on two interceptions and a fumble.

Bob Ferranti, sophomore split end from Boardman, tied the YSU one-game reception record for the second time this year with seven catches for 127 yards and one TD. The mark is shared by Ferranti, Rosie Blackwell and Dave DelSignore.

The three plays selected are: "You Never Told Me," a sensitive treatment of the social and sexual relationships of teenagers brought to a crisis involving two parents and a young "steady" couple; "Help Wanted," in which the prospect of vocational "emancipation" for a woman whose family is nearly grown comes into sharp conflict with traditional concepts of the married woman's responsibilities; and "Boys at Large," a play showing some of the causes of juvenile delinquency and why every "bad" boy should be treated as an individual if he is to be guided to a new and useful life.

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an hour in length, the Family Plays are designed to be followed by a discussion period which is an essential part of the program. The play itself presents food for thought and the period of oral communication following each performance allows the audience to evaluate and enlarge upon the ideas presented in the play.

Any group interested in a Family Play presentation should write or call the department of speech and drama.

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
