

YSU swim team resigns, Johnson blames Webster

Coach Ralph L. Johnson's resignation as swimming coach gave rise yesterday, in rapid succession, to the following developments:

1. A vote by the swim team in which four of the thirteen members agreed to swim. These four were allegedly advised by Athletic Director Mr. Willard Webster that they would lose their scholarships if they decided not to swim for the team. Nine voted not to swim.

2. The imminent cancellation of the swimming team's ten-meet schedule by Mr. Webster and Dr. Lewis Ringer, physical education chairman and interim swim coach.

3. Charges by Mr. Johnson that Mr. Webster is a "one sport athletic director" and that football coach Dike Beede is running the athletic department.

Members of the swimming team met Wednesday with Mr. Webster and most of the swimmers expressed a desire not to swim, according to Chuck Nienhius team captain. He also said yesterday a second meeting was held between swim team members and Mr. Webster, and Webster told them that he recommended to University President, Dr. Albert Pugsley, that the swimming schedule be cancelled.

Official cancellation of the schedule must be voted on by the University's Athletic Council.

Apparently, Dr. Ringer, who was appointed Monday as interim coach, is head of a non-existent team that probably won't have a schedule.

Petitions ask for Beede's removal, football boycott

Petitions calling for the resignation of football coach Dwight "Dike" Beede and urging the boycott of the YSU-Gustavus Adolphus game on Saturday, are circulating on campus.

According to George Heidish, a

Mr. Johnson claimed yesterday his resignation was brought about by a "total disillusionment with the athletic department here." He said that YSU's athletic program is in a "state of confusion and turmoil" and that Mr. Webster is directly responsible for the general deterioration of the department.

Mr. Johnson said that Mr. Webster does not co-operate with any of the coaches of athletic personnel except Coach Beede and that presently no athletic policy exists at all there. In his eight years as head swimming coach, Mr.

Johnson said, Mr. Webster has never called for a staff meeting. Mr. Johnson said that Mr. Webster had attended only two swimming meets in the last eight years. He said also that Mr. Webster has refused to attend the swimming awards banquet for eight years.

Mr. Johnson also responded to several specific points made by President Pugsley in accepting Johnson's resignation last Monday. Mr. Johnson said he never resigned as an instructor and therefore was never in violation of his contract. Johnson said his contract stipulates

that he was receiving a salary as a faculty member only. There is no mention of coaching or getting paid to coach in the contract he said. NCAA recommended policy for universities calls for coaches to enter contractual agreements similar to those of faculty, he added.

Mr. Johnson also denied that there was any dissention on the swimming team. He produced a statement dated November 10 from four swimmers who quit the team prior to his resignation which stated that the "definite lack of academic

campus life" was the reason for their resignations from the team. The statement emphasized that their reasons for leaving were "in no way a result of their relationship with Coach Johnson." One of the swimmers blamed the cut of his scholarship as the primary reason for his leaving.

Mr. Johnson said that he was aware that swimming scholarships would be cut for this year, but was not aware of the repercussions. He said that his limited

budget enabled him to sign-up only 1 of 13 possible recruits.

Mr. Johnson said that a 45% swimming budget cut-back by Mr. Webster doomed swimming here. Johnson also questioned Mr. Webster's judgment in spending "extravagant sums of money" for football, while preventing an All-American from defending his title in the NCAA swimming championships. Johnson said that funds to permit the team to compete in the tourney were cut by Mr. Webster. He claimed that Mr. Webster has used similar "poor judgment" in appropriating funds for sports other than football.

Mr. Johnson said that he would like to see "some very definite changes made in the athletic department here even

though I will not be involved with it in the future." He said that YSU's swimming and athletic program has developed only because of President Pugsley's support and foresight. Mr. Johnson added that Mr. Webster's "de-emphasis of programs other than football has been a definite detriment to the total athletic program at YSU."

Post Office offers part-time jobs

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Journalism here to qualify students for H.S. teaching

YSU students interested in teaching journalism at the high school level may now qualify for that position by taking existing courses offered at YSU it was announced yesterday. Consultation between members of the English Department and the School of Education officials in charge of certification requirements has resulted in a tentative agreement that the English Department journalism courses will qualify students for such certification.

Dr. Robert R. Hare, associate professor of English and supervisor of the journalism courses, said he is "satisfied that our existing courses fit well into the new State requirements."

Recently revised Ohio certification requirements call for thirty quarter hours for certification to teach journalism at the secondary level. Courses satisfying this requirement are offered at YSU through the English Department's courses in communications and journalism, said Dr. Hare.

Although the new requirements in certification will not be effective until January, 1972, students may pursue appropriate courses before that date and receive full credit toward certification.

13 universities to participate in tournament

The first debate tournament to be held at YSU will occur tomorrow. Sixteen debate teams representing 13 universities and consisting of 65 debaters will be participating.

The debate will be held from 9-4 in the Lincoln Project and will be open to the public.

Dr. Robert K. Smith, acting dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, will host the tournament.

1,569 vote in Council election

A total of 1,569 students voted in last Monday and Tuesday's Student Council elections. The figure represents about 10% of the student body.

Those elected were: Elaine Prochiro, Bill Jones, Andy Bresko, and Becky Dixon in Arts and Sciences; Suellen Stiffler, Marilyn Guerra, Pat Galterio in education; Tom Hronek in music; Len Fumi in engineering; Dennis Rowlands and James LaRosa in business; and Chuck Hettler and Mary Ann Doumont as representatives-at-large.

Elected as senior class officers were Denny Jones, president; John Zuppo, vice-president; Joe Petrarca, treasurer; and Charles Savikas, secretary.

Journalism offerings include two courses in basic journalism, a course in American periodicals, and a number of journalism workshop courses. The journalism courses include practical experience working on the *Jambar*.

A minor in journalism is also available, said Dr. Hare, as well as the requirements in journalism leading to certification in communications at the secondary level.

It used to be that YSU's athletic department was like a mountain; formidable, impressive, and ever changing. Now, it seems that mountain is crumbling.

YSU was once respected for its athletic programs. Today, that respect is gone. It is obvious that not only our football team needs help, but our entire athletic department as well.

The developments of the last few days have lead us to believe that our athletic program is about as modern as the "flying wedge." At best, it has been severely weakened by a lack of interest and co-operation by athletic director Willard Webster. At worst, it has tarnished the reputation of the University, its athletic teams, and the students who play on these teams.

We cannot be optimistic about the future of YSU sports. We have asked for change and been rebuffed on several occasions. Meanwhile, all we see is the football team getting outplayed and outcoached, and the swimming team not playing or getting coached at all.

It is time to face the fact that the YSU athletic department is missing the boat. Unfortunately, others are paying for it.

Perhaps, it is time to move the mountain.

Letters to the Editor Says YSU caused swimmers to quit

To the editor of the *Jambar*:

I am commenting on last Tuesday's article concerning the swim team. I would like the *Jambar* to understand that I am not blaming them for the inadequacies of the article, but their biased source of information.

The *Jambar* stated that "it has been rumored for some weeks that there has been disunion between the coach and members of his team." I would like to clear this rumor (I hope) once and for all. The four swimmers (Mike Morrison, Bill Opydyke, Mark Brumbaugh, Tim Lafferty), upon withdrawal, wrote a letter to Mr. Willard Webster, the Athletic Director, clearly stating that their reasons for withdrawing from swimming

(and YSU) were not caused by ill-feelings toward the coach, but by the school as a whole. YSU, being a commuter school, lacks the "college atmosphere" desired by the four. YSU has a "high school atmosphere" where the students come to the campus for classes and return home after classes. The four stated in the letter that the college did not have to offer what they desired in their respective fields of study. Being a swimmer, I noticed no ill-feelings toward the coach at any time. When we went into the pool to practice, we went in 100% as a team, and gave a 100% effort as a team.

Intercollegiate athletics at YSU is at least (if not more) five years behind other schools. The administration refused to set money aside in the budget to

send swimmers to the NCAA championships for this coming season, but will set money aside to take Pete the Penguin plus a trainer to SE Louisiana for a football game. This is outrageous and short sighted on the part of the Budget Committee. Furthermore, it is hard to swim under these conditions. It has always been my understanding that you work and strive for an established goal which (in college) should be the NCAA Championships. It is hard to swim and WIN (contrary to Dike Beede's present philosophy) knowing that you can only go half-way - it should be all the way or not at all. That is why YSU no longer has a swim team.

Defends self on Kent fund issue

A few weeks ago I wrote a letter expressing my feelings on the subject of the Kent State allocation issue. In the two issues that followed my point was attacked, as was my person. I now feel it is time for a defense.

First, as to the charge that if everyone in the United States would give me a 1/2 cent I could live a "Life of leisure." When civilization is at the point of constant warfare in given parts of the world; when thermo-nuclear holocaust hangs over radical and conservative alike their can be no room for leisure. When children live like dogs in Calcutta, surviving on plit and garbage, no man can live in leisure. When men are so stupid as to let their lives be determined by what can only be called the "national warfare

state," then leisure must be left to another time....

Second, as to the Kent State students that were indicted. They were indicted on riot charges. The fact that two federal commissions placed the blame on the National Guard seems to have escaped the notice of the Portage County grand jury along with many of the students at YSU. I did not arrive at these facts, Federal Commissions appointed to study these matters did. If the Portage County grand-jury indicts one side and not the other, aren't they provoking an injustice of implication.

Fact - four students were killed, nine students were seriously wounded by National Guard.

Fact - two were hit in front at a distance of fifty to a hundred and fifty feet. All others

were hit by bullets striking in the side or back at a distance of one hundred fifty to seven hundred fifty feet.

Fact - not one National Guardsman required even first aid. Not one was injured except from their own tear gas.

We can each draw our own conclusions from these facts. If you support law and order then you must support the findings of the two Presidential commissions. Therefore, I must conclude that anyone, not supporting these commissions, does not support law and order. This includes the Portage County grand-jury and anyone else who supports the whitewash of the National Guardsmen....

Ohio colleges raise tuition rates

Youngstown State University is not the only college in Ohio to hike up its tuition rates in the past year. In telephone conversations yesterday with the admissions offices of Ohio State, Kent State, and Bowling Green State, the following information was learned:

Beginning with Ohio State, it was discovered that their tuition had gone up this fall quarter. The increase was ten dollars per quarter (from \$210 to \$220 per quarter). This money was an instructional increase and it was used mostly in faculty salary increases. As far as the admissions office knew, Ohio State's Board of Trustees are planning no other increases in the near future.

The admissions office at Kent State University stated that the school also had a ten dollar per quarter increase. The rates were raised from \$214 to \$224 per quarter. However, this had not been done within the past year. Like Ohio State, Kent used the money to pay faculty salaries and had no plans for near future raises.

In a final conversation with admissions representatives at Bowling Green State University, it was learned that tuitions had gone up \$20 during the past year. The school used the increase (from \$200 to \$220) as an operational fund and also to pay wages.

Summing up, it seems that

even with YSU's \$40 increase, it is still lowest in tuition compared to these other three universities. Also, some of the money that the school is receiving will be used for intra-campus

improvements, while the other colleges used their hikes merely for wages. The only drawback in YSU's case is that its raise of \$40 may be too much of a jump from 1970's rates.

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Catalogs available in Jones Hall

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University Catalogs for the 1970-71 school year are available to all YSU students in the Admissions Office in Jones Hall 103 according to the Admissions Office.

In the past catalogs were made available to incoming freshman only but this year they are available to any student who requests one.

Advisors request that students check the catalog for degree requirements prior to coming in for advisement.

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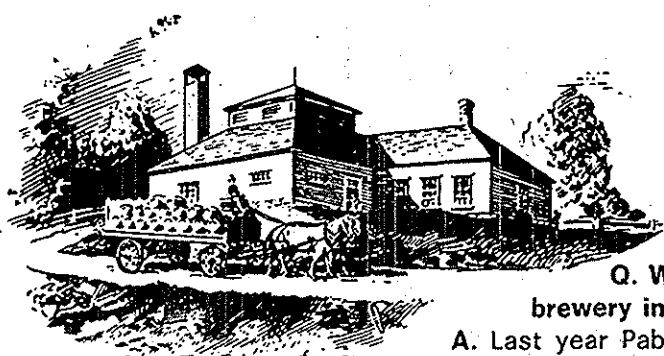

Twice-beaten Gustavus Adolphus, featuring a high-scoring offense built around the best fullback Youngstown State will face this year, invades Campbell Memorial Stadium Saturday night to close out the Penguin home season. The kickoff is slated for 8 p.m.

The Golden Gustie dreams of a championship season went down the drain last Saturday with a 13-0 loss to Concordia in a game that decided the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference title. It was the first time the Gusties had been shut out since 1961 and was due

mainly to the loss of quarterback Rick Webb in the first quarter with a shoulder separation.

Coach Jocko Nelson still has a potent offense, however, with super sophomore Tom Dahlberg at fullback. Dahlberg, a 6-2, 212-pounder, is the prime reason Gustavus ranks fifth in the nation in scoring (37.4 ppg.) and ninth in rushing (257.7 ppg.).

Dahlberg has carried 219 times for 1,074 yards, a new Gustavus rushing record. He averages 4.9 yards per carry, 119.3 yards per game and has scored 11 TDs. He'll be no stran-

ger to YSU defenders since he gained 145 yards including a 10-yard touchdown scamper in the Gustie's 40-8 win last year. The Gustavus ground game accounted for 390 yards in that contest.

The Gusties have rolled to a 7-2 record with wins over Wisconsin State-Eau Claire (42-6), Bemidji State (62-6), Augsburg (63-14), St. John's (24-8), Hamline (13-0), St. Thomas (44-14) and University of Minnesota at Duluth (41-15). The first Gustie loss was to Malcalster (17-14).
