According to the new policy sentatives have full voting rights in departmental meetings. The number of representatives will be determined ty a ratio of one student for every six full-service culty members.

It is for these reasons that we of the Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship affirm the congressional resolution fasting, and prayer and encourage others to do so an participate. We believe, in the words of the resolution, that "It is the duty of nations as well as of men to owe their dependence upon the overruling power of God, to confes their sins and transgressions, in humble sorrow, yet with assured hope that genuine repentance will lead to mercy and pardon; and recognize the sublime truth, announced in the Holy Scriptures and proven by all history, that those nations are blessed whose God is Lord. Wo blieve that, no simple solution exists, the root cause of this country's turmoil is our refusal to acknowledge our dependance on God.
It is our request that each person in the university community will consider seriously what this day of life and the life of the nation. We hope that people will once more admit at least the possibility that dependance on God of the scriptures is essential in our lives as individuals and as a nation.
Finally, we believe that the God of the scriptures is not an abstract concept but a personal God who acts on the prayers of his people. In II Chronicles 7:14 his promise to the people of ssrael was, if my people who are called by my name shall humble themselves and pray, and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, will forgive their sins, and will heal their land."
