The wheels have been set in motion for additional student

Board of Trustees meeting in Tod Hall.
By a vote of 6-1, trustees ap-
moved the use of a section of the north side for a new student housing development. The area is bounded by the Madison
Avenue Expressway to the Avenue Expressway to the
south, Elm Street to the east, south, Elm Street to the east, Madison Avenue to the north,
and the intersection of Michigan
Avenue the Avenue, the freeway, and
Madison Avenue to the west, Madison Avenue to the west,

A retired YSU history professor addressed the 747 fal and winter quarter graduates at commencemen ceremonies which were held at 10 a.m., Saturday
March 25 in Beeghly Center. March 25 in Beeghly Center.
Dr. Morris Slavin, professor emeritus of history a dressed the issue of illteracy and the "right to read."
Slavin emphasized in his speech the public's need and the importance of reading and learning. "Our culture taken for granted."

The speaker used the recent controversy over Salman Rushdies' book The Satanic Verses as an example of the truggle for the freedom to read.
Slavin also told graduates the b enter the working world is to develop the ability to adapt to new kinds of jobs. "The best preparation for work is the ability to adapt to new jobs," he said. He
also said that society has an obligation to help citizens adjust.
During the graduation ceremonies Slavin received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree from the University.
The former YSU history professor has written numerous articles and two books on 18 th century France
and the French Revolution. Slavin has won both na-
tional and international recognition as an authority on the French Revolution.
Slavin, who received his bachelor's degree from Ohio state University his master's from the University of Pittsity, has taught at YSU since 1948 .
Slavin, who retired in 1981, was amg hose named last year to receive the YSU Heritage Award for outstanding contributions to the University. During Saturday's commencement 109 graduates

students seeking information on possible occupations. Information acquired during Discover sessions can be stored over time, thereby allowing
the student to review his or her career choices and the student to review his or her career choices and
make any changes needed. Discover operates in two distinct ways: the guidance approach and the information approach.
The guidance approach is designed to guide students through a series of nine modules, each
dealing with a separate area in career planing. The user can elect to take an interest inventory. which will be used in profiling occupations that are related to the user's self-assessed interests,
