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Alleged stabbing incident proven to be fake

The YSU student who reported on April 27 that she had been stabbed in the Lincoln Avenue parking deck pleaded no contest and was found guilty on a charge of obstruction of an official police investigation yesterday, according to Jeff Limbian, Youngstown assistant prosecutor.

Debra Lynn McCambridge, 35, of East Palestine, was sentenced by Judge Andrew Polivischak to pay a \$100 fine, counseling sessions.

The jail time was suspended upon successful completion of one year of

Limbian said McCambridge provided YSU police Lieutenant Greg Clemente with "false and misleading information" throughout the investigation that ran from April 27 to May 24.

According to Clemente, the informa-tion that was falsely provided revolved around her entire report.

Clemente said that on May 24, McCambridge told him that the wound

serve 180 days in the city jail and attend was self-inflicted and that it was not a planned action.

Clemente said police found in her car a single-edged razor with dried blood on it and a towel between the front seats with blood spots on it.

Clemente said he was suspicious of the claim from the first day of the investigation. He said at that time, the wound appeared to be more of a slice than a stab.

According to Clemente, McCambridge told him that she was assaulted by a white male on the morning of April 27 at 7:45 a.m. in the Lincoln Avenue park-

She was treated for a stab wound in her lower right abdomen at St. Elizabeth's hospital.

Clemente stressed that, when confronted with the evidence, McCambridge cooperated fully at the end of the investigation although she told him she does not know why she wounded herself. Limbian said that he is pleased with the sentence.

"I feel the sentence was appropriate in light of the fact that she did not have a past criminal record," Limbian said. "I think it is more appropriate that she received counseling.'

National honors and recognition have again come to YSU and some very special students. And the awards will keep coming.

The YSU student chapter of the American Arab Anti-Discrimination Committee (ADC) came away from its annual convention in Washington D.C. being named the best student chapter in the country.

The National Convention, held this year from April 22 to 25, was its 10th and was well represented by YSU.

The President of YSU's chapter, Sahar Mawlawi, senior, A&S, opened this chapter in the spring of 1992, and has distinguished herself along the way as being named the recipient of YSU's Edna K. McDonald Cultural Awareness Award in recognition for being the, "outstanding individual who has made a lasting contribution to encourage and increase awareness

of cultural diversity at YSU."

And to top things off, YSU's ADC chapter will be presented The Nova award on May 27 here on campus for being the most promising new organization.

Mawlawi was born in Lebanon and lived in Switzerland for 10 years before moving to Youngstown two years ago. Mawlawi is majoring in Foreign Languages and speaks French, German and Italian. "My dad moved from his job in Saudi Arabia, so the whole family moved here also," Mawlawi said.

On the ADC and the National award Mawlawi said, "This is a National Organization; it was founded in 1980 by Senator James Abourez in response to discrimination against Arab people and negative stereotyping. There are National offices in Washington D.C. and in almost every state there is a community chapter, so we are one of the 22 student chapters across the country."

June interviews set for Student Affairs finalists

YSU - Three candidates for the position of vice president for student affairs will visit the YSU campus for two-day interviews early in June.

Interviews are being arranged for Dr. Jack Taylor, assistant vice president for multicultural affairs at Bowling Green State University; Dr. Raymond E. Dye, vice president for student affairs at San Francisco State University; and Dr. George D. Taylor, vice president for student affairs at California State University in Los Angeles.

Dr. David Sweetkind, dean of YSU's College of Fine and Performing Arts and chair of the search committee, said the names of 10 candidates, out of the 72 applicants who expressed an interest in the position, were advanced to YSU's President, Leslie H. Cochran.

Dr. Sweetkind noted that of the nine male candidates who were advanced as acceptable for further consideration, five were African-American.

He said one female candidate was also advanced for further consideration.

The three candidates who have been invited for an interview, stated President Cochran, "have the best level of experience and preparation."

Cochran emphasized that two of the three candidates are currently vice

presidents and that the other candidate is an assistant vice president at Bowling Green State

University. Cochran indicated that he was pleased that the strongest candidates also "support an institutional priority to attract an African-American to senior level position at YSU."

Cochran added that he is particularly impressed by the candidates' experience at institutions similar to YSU.

Cochran also indicated that there is a possibility that other candidates might be invited to campus for an interview. He noted that such a decision would depend upon the assessment of the first three candidates who have been selected for an interview.

For Dr. George D. Taylor, who earned his Ed.D. from Illinois State University, and for Dye, who earned his Ph.D. from the State University of New York at Buffalo, the YSU position offers an opportunity to leave the troubled California public higher education system and re-establish earlier ties to the Midwest.

For Dr. Jack Taylor, who earned his Ph.D. from Bowling Green State University, the YSU position offers a natural and progressive move among Ohio's public universities.



The students making the trip to Washington were: Suhad Hadi, Seadah Hadi, Kasra Rafia and Samer Mawlawi, along with their advisors: Dr. Robert Weaver, sociology, and Dr. Nawal Annar, criminal justice.

The local committee didn't know previous to the trip that they had won first place. "They called us and said we were one of the five finalists, so please be there in case (we won). They knew from the beginning, but they wanted it to be a surprise for us," Mawlawi said.

The ADC office here has to do a report every two weeks on what they've done, every letter they've written and all correspondence from other organizations. They then make a copy and send it to the National office. "You cannot just be on your own and use their name. They always have to know what you are doing. You

are following their law and their ideas," said Mawlawi.

The National organization has a newspaper called the ADC Times and through it, people learn what ADC is doing throughout the entire country. They learn what the community chapter and the student chapters are doing and what issues the Arab-Americans are confronting right now.

Mawlawi continued, "The organization is open to any students and we are proud to say that we are not only Arab in this organization; we have African-Americans, Asians, Spanish and Iranians, so it's really a mix. It's not only Arab; we are not isolating ourselves."

"The main goal, of course, is to fight discrimination against Arabs, but also against any other ethnic group, or one minority under attack, we will also be under attack one day. We are trying to preserve a positive image and promote the rich Arab culture and heritage."

described as regular football with the hits of ice hockey and the scoring of basketball. The smaller than regular football field and a continually running clock favor the offense.

Arena football is played indoors on a 50-yard field that is half as wide as a regular football field. The goal posts are also narrowed to nine feet across with rebounding nets on either side. Any ball that bounces off the nets, such as a missed field goal, remains live and can be recovered by either team.

Each team fields eight-man squads with most of the players playing both sides of the ball. Only the kicker, quarterback and defensive specialist stay on side of the ball.

Salary for AFL players are \$500 per game with a \$150 bonus for each victory.

Trying to improve on its 4-6 record in 1992, Cleveland acquired former YSU quarterback Ray Isaac and ex-Ohio State quarterback Greg Frey, who played in the World League's Ohio Glory.

The team is coached by second-year coach, Dave Whinham. Whinham has been an assistant with the Detroit Drive's two AFL Championship team's in 1988 and 1990 and was the strength and conditioning coach for the Detroit Red Wings of the National Hockey League.

Whinham said that last year's 4-6 playoff team wanted to set a standard by making the playoffs.

"[Last season] we didn't feel that we stacked up team for team with the elite of the

Whinham said that the passing game needed improvement from last year. He considered 1992 as a learning experience for the wide receivers.

"They aren't rookies anymore," said Whinham. "They know their way around the league."

Whinham, however, expressed a concern with injuries, especially in the defensive backfield and offensive center.

"We're pressing a couple of guys into service who aren't natural centers," Whinham.

Whinham feels that as a whole, the Thunderbolts have as good a chance as any other team in the league to win the AFL Championship

"If we can fill those voids [at defensive back and center] we have a good chance to be an excellent team."

Whinham said that arena football is a great product for the

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


