A new program to recruit college men forthe army's air service has been added to the college's defense program.

The college was invited to take part in the new plan a week ago, and necessary forms were mailed to the War Department last Mon-

Dr. Castle W. Ford, who has been in charge of the civilian pilot training program at the college, has been named faculty air force adviser, and will serve as a contact man between the army and college personnel.

The program is designed to supply crews to man fighting planes and supporting ground crews. It calls forpr ocurement of aviation cadets through preliminary en. listment onthe deferred basis, enabling cadet candidate to continue his education until he is actually required for army training.

Fulstment reservets are subject to call to actve duty if and when they are needed. If possible, however, they will be allowed to complete their college work.

The college has been informed that complete plans for the new program will be given advisers at the meeting at some district college in the near future.
