### College Offers Naval Course

Gould Prepares Future Officers

A course in maritime navigation netading a small amount of sea manship, began last week at Youngstown college. Planned especially for those students who will go into naval officers' training schools, the course is open to others who are interested in the student study.

Dr. C. P. Gould, member of the college social science faculty, will teach the course. During the first World War, he took the navigation course with the U.S. Shipping Board, and taught at the Pelham Bay Officers Material School before being assigned to convoy duty. His duties in connection with the convoy service include the practice of navigation.

The course will cover dead rec koning, piloting, celestial navigation and the maneuvering board.















# Accelerated War Program Brings ... Registration Rush!

Speeded-up registration this fall was in line with the entire college program as more than 800 colleges and universities shaped their curriculums to meet war demands. Texas A & M College was one of the first to inaugurate an accelerated college course to supply trained men for the armed forces. Freshmen entering this fall will finish the regular four-year course in two years and eight months by attending three summer sessions.

The nation's largest military school, Texas A & M will send about 80 per cent of her graduates into the army as second lieutenants. As soon as registration was completed, the students donned khaki uniforms and got underway with their war education.

A boatload of Wisconsin commandos, their faces blackened and wearing lifebelts, leaves for the night trip across Lake Mendota for the raid.




Approaching the "enemy" shore, the commandos leap into the waters of Mendota, wade quietly, quickly to shore to commence the attack.


Wisconsin carries on its raid against the "enemies." The raid brought to a close six weeks of intensive training for the group made up of more than 100 Wisconsin ROTC members.


