He is now undergoing instruction in instrument flying at the Corry Field Naval Auxiliary Air Station, Pensacola, Florida.



Always Plenty of Questions

Everyone is talking about class schedules and courses they want to take now that the semester is drawing to a close. As usual, the students' look to upperclassmen for advice on what courses and instructors to take and which to avoid.

Many a "You're taking that?" and, "Boy, what a bore!" is heard. And there are many courses which deserve such a description. There have been many such "bores" for years and they will probably remain "bores" for many more years unless some effort is made to improve them.

Deans do not always know the weak courses in their colleges. A professor rarely is aware that the course he teaches is considered a bore. Only students can supply such information, but they rarely do - to professors.

Many courses at gestions from students, or at least from a knowledge of the situation; graduating seniors logically could provide such information.

A very likely and interesting solution has been presented in an editorial written by the editor of the Ohio University Post, which states that after four years of college "students develop definite ideas about some of the courses they have taken, and they sometimes feel a little cheated when they recall this 'worthless' class and that 'nothing' course. Someitmes, 'senioritis' stimulates heavy cutting of such courses.

If capable students continually cut a class when they get the chance, the course needs revamping. There are courses well attended, although virtually no attendance is taken. This is excellence. To constantly improve the curriculum, an endeavor a university must always be interested in, every senior should be required to

write a critique of the department courses he has taken. Without a length requirement, disinterested students could write a paragraph, but conscientious seniors could turn in pages. Among the manuscripts there undoubtedly would be many helpful suggestions."

Such a plan as this would need the support of administration, deans, and the students themselves. Youngstown's Senior Class officers still have time to investigate the possibility of such a procedure at Youngstown. This would be a very worthwhile and needed contribution to our university.

We Regret-

Attendance at chapel services prior to the holiday season reached a high. Students filled both the Protestant and Catholic chapels in a genuine example that the student body is not so detached from spiritual meditation as certain quarters might claim.

Yet it is lamentable that the student body does not turn out in such force during the regular weekly chapel services. A considerable amount of the lack of attendance is a direct result of various group meetings (and some classes) being scheduled for the noon hour. In most cases these instances cannot be helped and are usually justified.

President Jones' repeated examples of attendance at chapel services when possible, despite his often heavy noontime schedule has been much appreciated by both students and faculty.

But at a university that wisely does not require compulsory chapel attendance in deference to the granting of the right for each person to decide for themselves, increased examples of certain members of the faculty at chapel services would be an excellent example to members of the student body.

Let us trust that this will be remedied in the near future.



The French Government is offering approximately thirty university fellowships through the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and forty teaching assistantships through the Ministry of Education. The fellowship awards are for students with definite academic projects or study plans.

The assistantships afford language teaching experience and an opportunity to become better acquainted with

Nominations of candidates for fellowships and assistantships will be made by a joint committee of French and American educators working in cooperation with the French Cultural Services and the Institute of Inter-

Closing date for application is February 1, 1957.

Must Be Citizen

The French Government awards are open to men and women preferably under 30 years of age. Applicants must be U.S. citizens. Other eligibility requirements are: a bachelors degree from an American college or outside and couldn't find him. Elections of new officers for Student Council will take place today for the following year.



The ACS celebrated the Christmas season by presenting a chemical open house for the freshmen students. The students were given a guided tour of all the chemical labs.







The team's smooth functioning, in toppling almost all early season opponents, is interesting to watch, as is confirmed by the attendance jump at the homegames played at the South High Field House.

Every member of the starting five has shown quite well his scoring ability, and this year's squad has a well-balanced attack. An interesting sidelight on early season statistics show that the Penguins, in capturing five of their first six contests, have averaged 84 points to 69 for the opposition.

Top Record

This, incidentally, is one of the top records in the Buckeye State for a point spread between teams.

To show the stiff opposition the Penguins have this season, four of the nations top seven small college offensive teams, as of Jan. 1, are on the Red and white's schedule.

These teams are: John Carroll, Baldwin Wallace, West Virginia, and

Early as the season is, already two important basketball winning streaks have stopped. San Francisco University, minus gangling Bill Russell and K.C. Jones, tasted defeat after copping 60 wins in succession.

Steelers Streak Stopped

The Farrell Steelers, a perennial Pennsylvania powerhouse, surrendered a 99 game winning streak at home.

Speaking of Bill Russell, unanimous All-American choice last season, brings up the fact that he has finally joined the ranks of pro basket-

After a successful tenure with the U.S. Olympic championship team, he has made quite a splash with the pros. Already setting a rebounding record. Rival coaches have started to pounce on him with all sorts of accusations of unfair play.

No Fuss Made

These accusations include his staying in a zone defense, particularly around the net, which is outlawed in professional play. However, officials have not yet made too much of

The other big boy of basketball in the nation today is Wilt "the Stilt" Chamberlain. His antics at Kansas University have earned the team a top ranking spot in the sportswriters nationwide polls.

"The Dipper", an old moniker unknown to most fans, is leading the nation's big colleges in scoring and promises to have a tremendous season in his first year with the varsity

A sharp cager to watch is Lennie Rosenbluth of North Carolina who led the squad through the first seven games undefeated. He has set an alltime scoring record and may have some surprises for the fans before he graduates.

Scores Most Points'



This topped Chamberlain's previous high of 52 against Northwestern in Kansas' curtain raiser.


