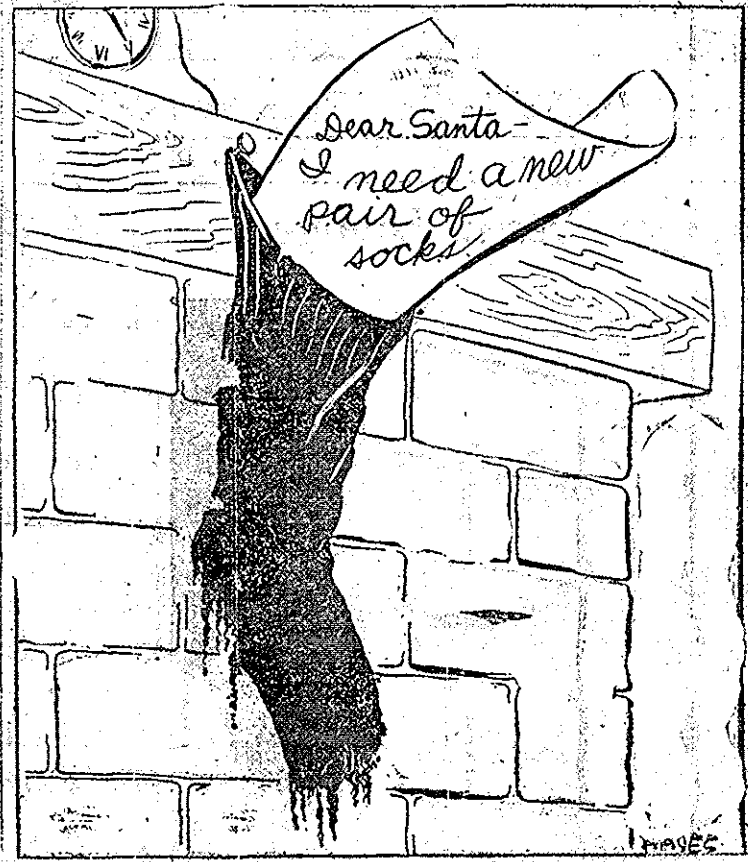

## Campus Comments - "

I had a dream the other night and the terror of it woke me up. Realizing its worth I leapt from a bed and great goose pimples grew on my cold flesh as I hastily recorded it:

There was a great multitude in the lounge; base-appearing freshmen, sprightly sophomores, base juniors and weary seniors. This multitude had fallen into groups; some to play cards, others to gossip (harmless and poisonous).

But the act went astray and the match was impelled heavenward in a graceful burning arc, however, the sloven who flipped it had no eye for this beauty. ### DEFENSE

These big cars have caught, directly and indirectly, a most biting piece of offrontery. The morsel, oft repeated, and never changing in form is that "YoCo is nothing but a glorified high school". Though trite, it is a well directed thrust aiming for and striking, nine times out of ten, the Achilles heel of man, his pride. And so our prides are hurt and in the heat of the moment we search our tired minds for a sharp decisive rebuttal; but our minds are tired and so our rebuttal is the sword or more commonly and without metaphorical brilliance, the fist.

Let us, if we can, be rational. Just for a moment let us consider the source of said trust.

I have heard it from those attending other distant colleges and, school spirit forbid, from students at YoCo themselves. There's a place for this caustic earthling somewhere in the world but censorship forbids my naming it.

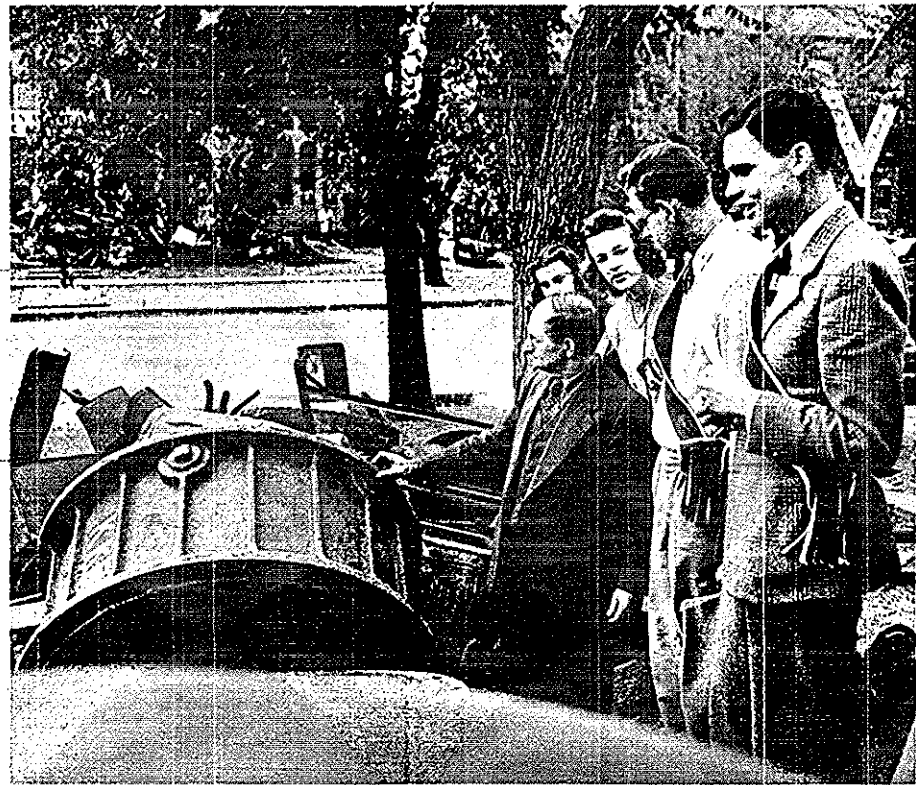

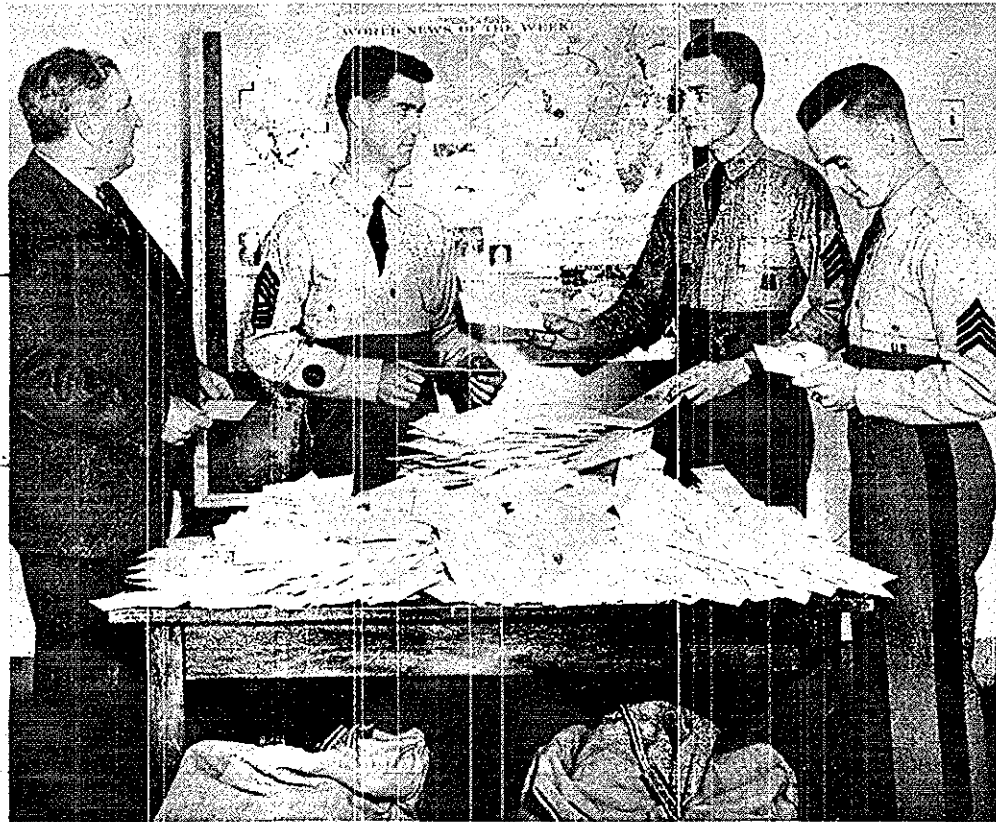

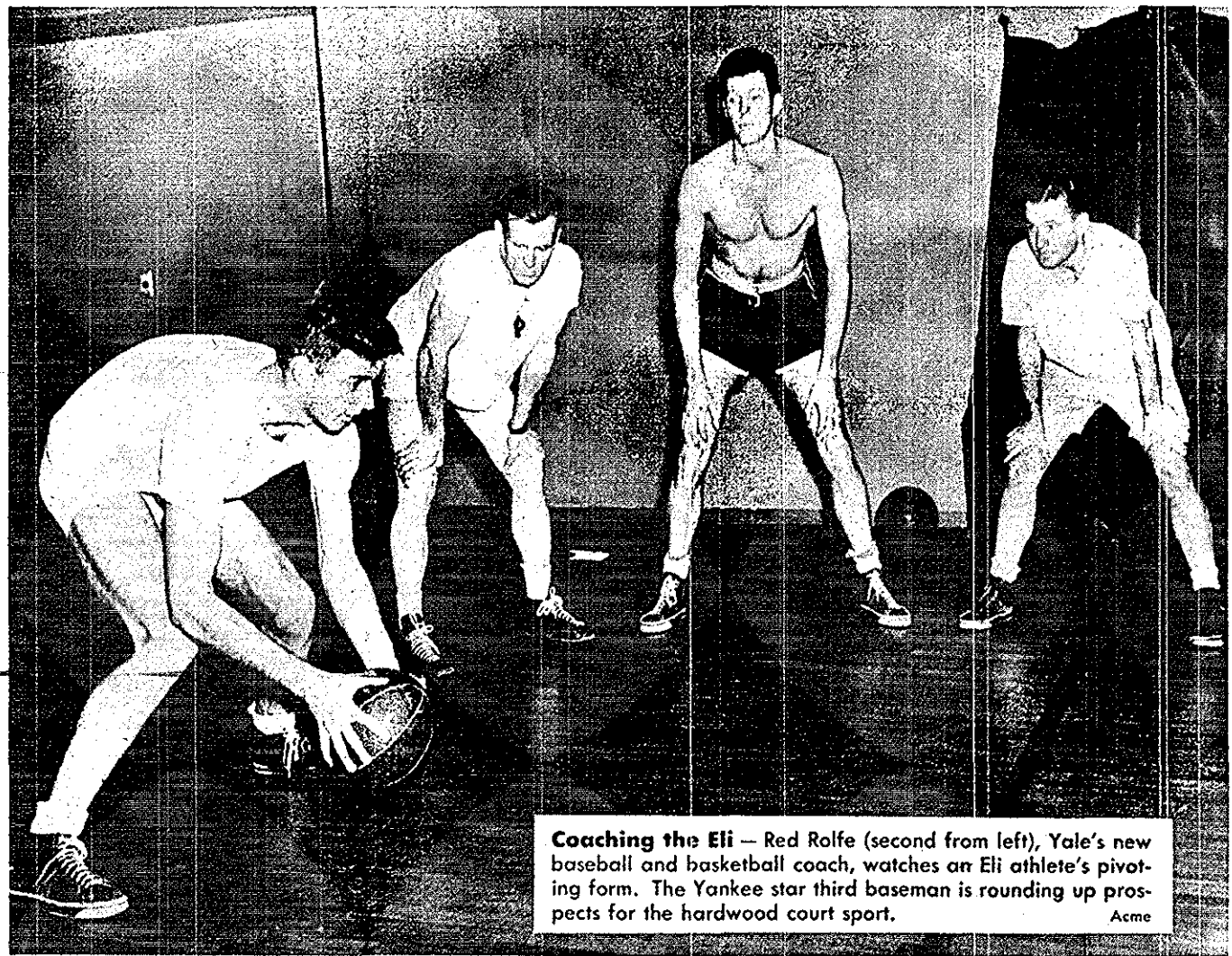

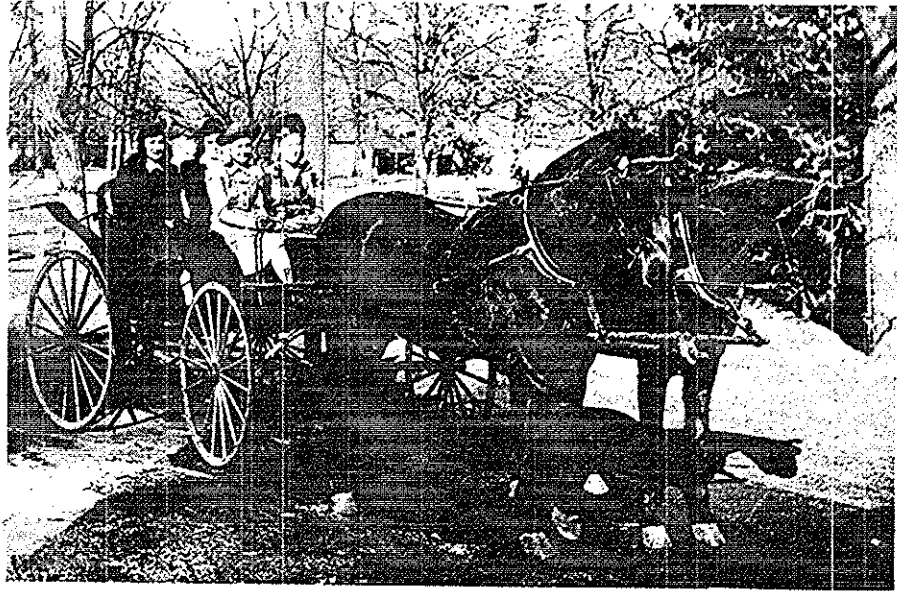

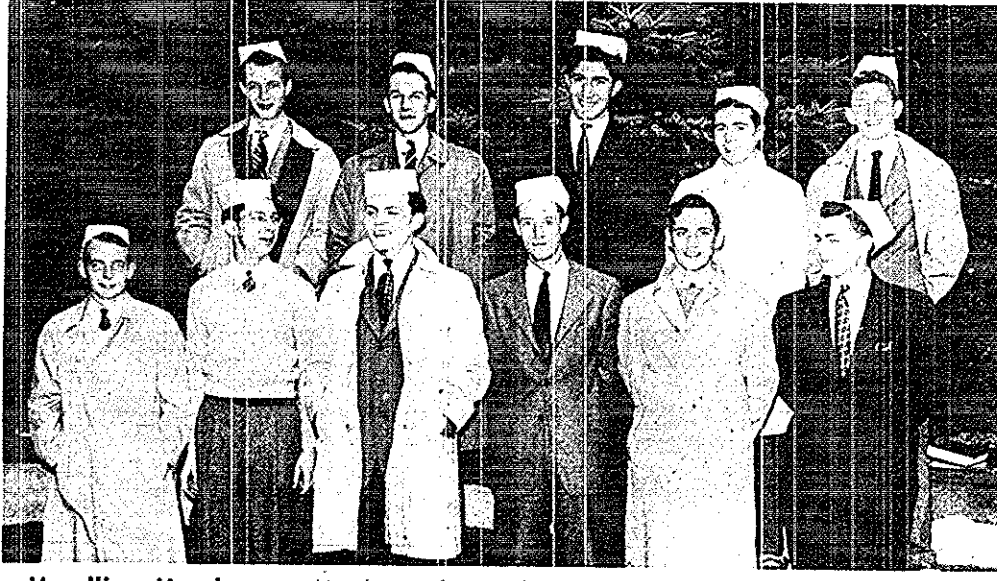

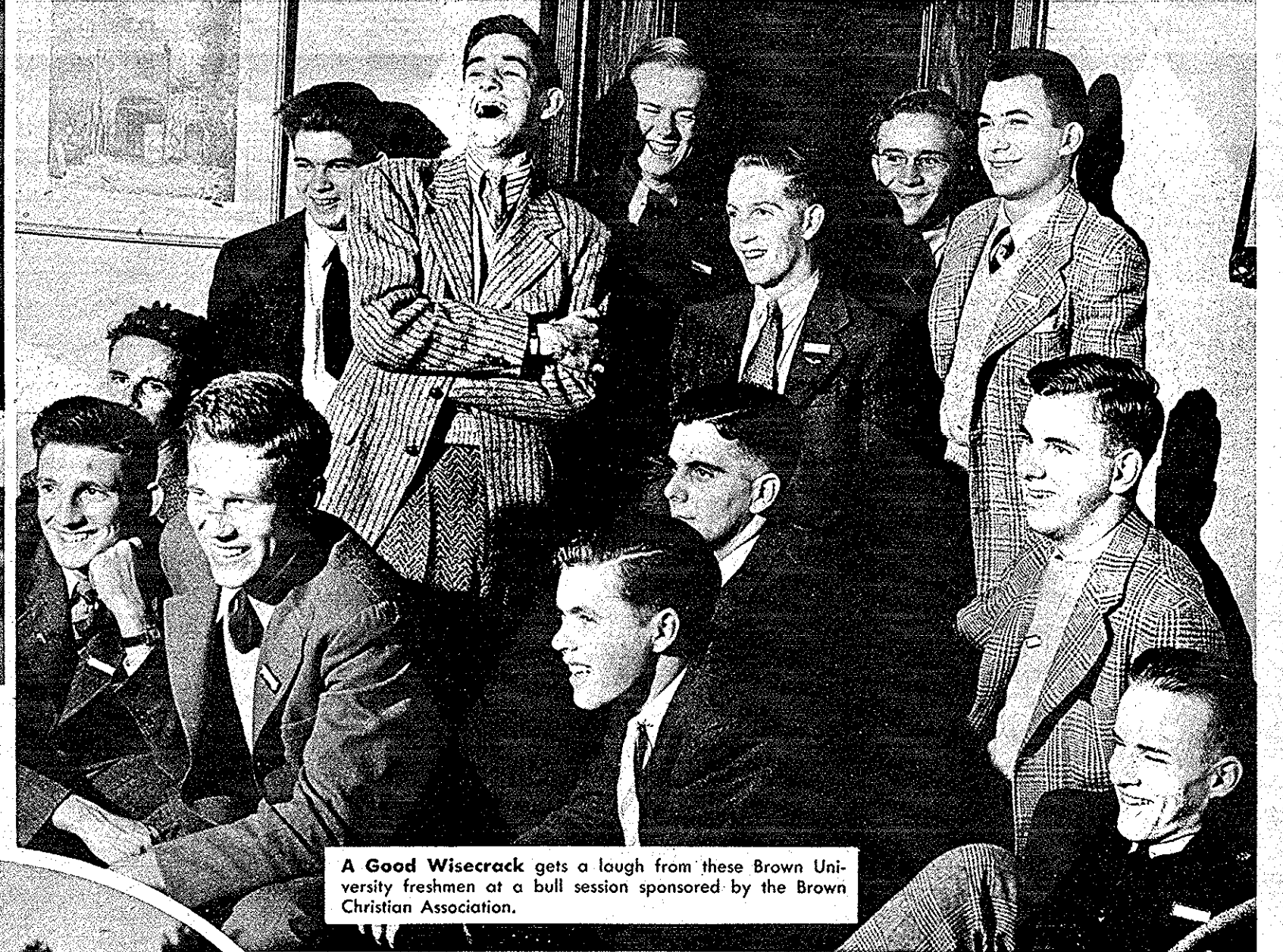

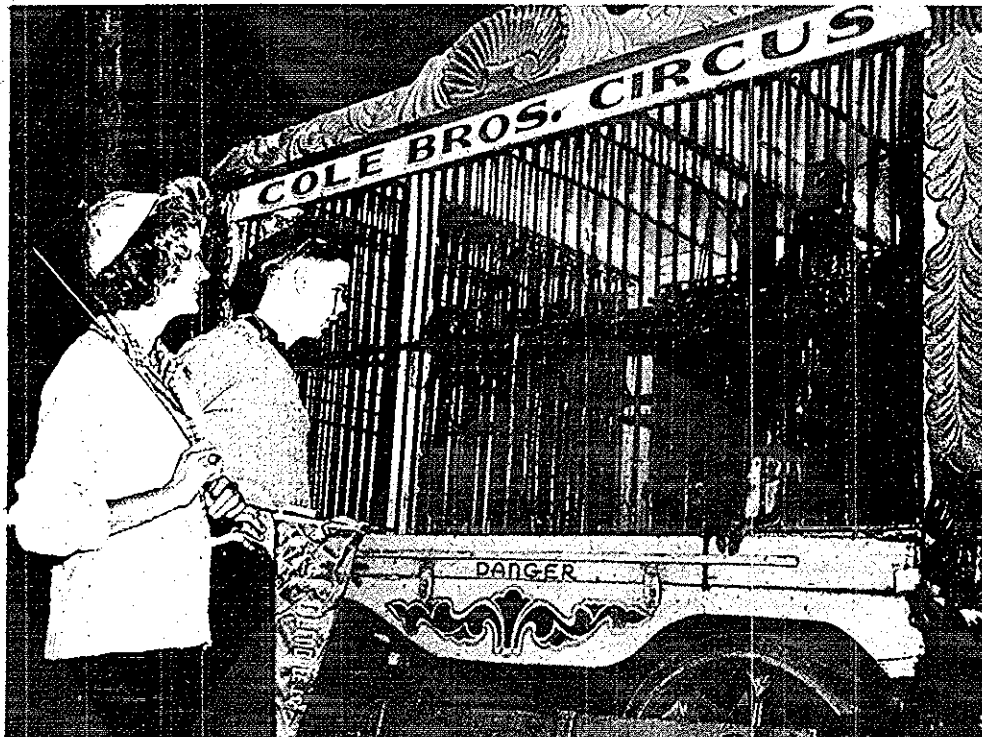

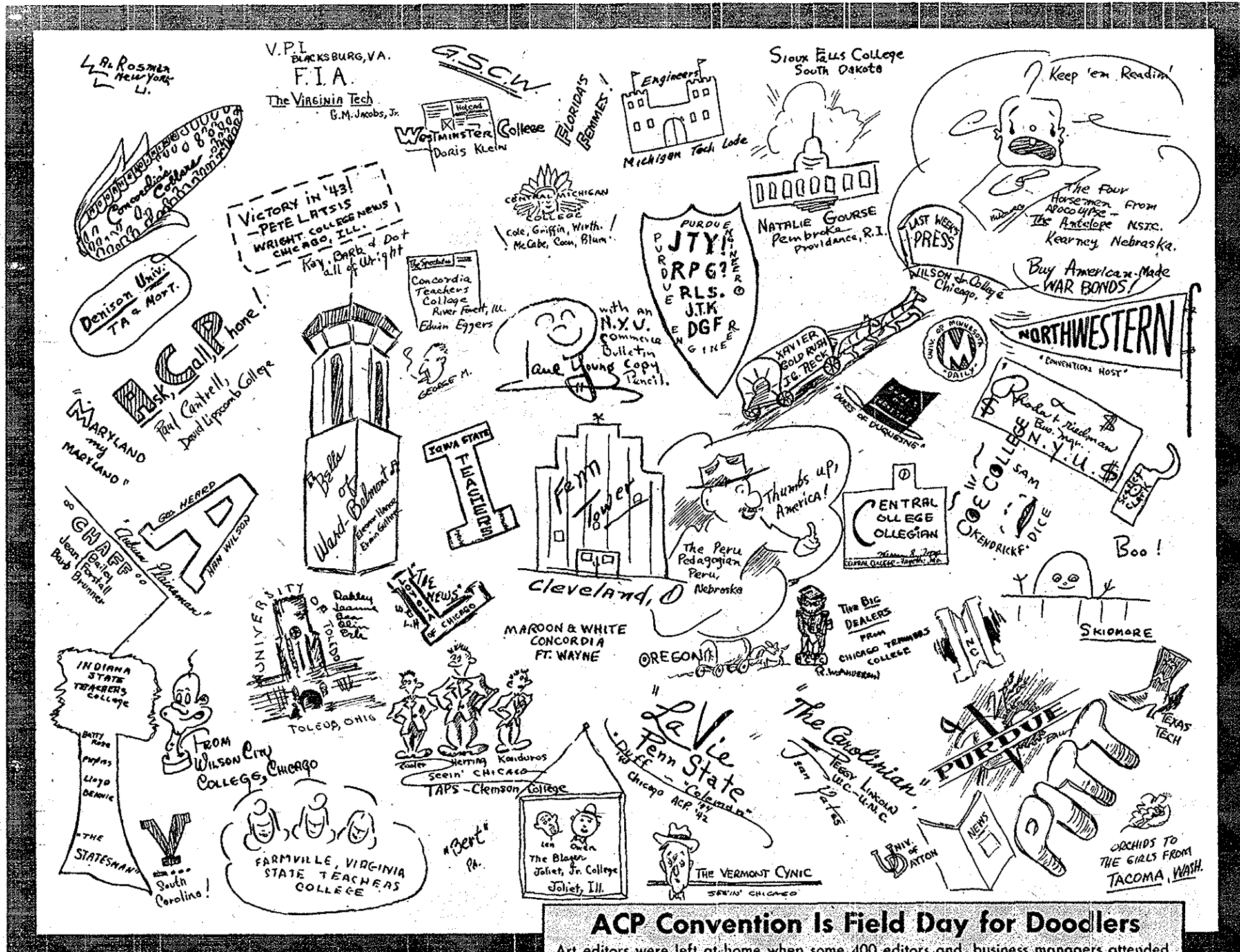

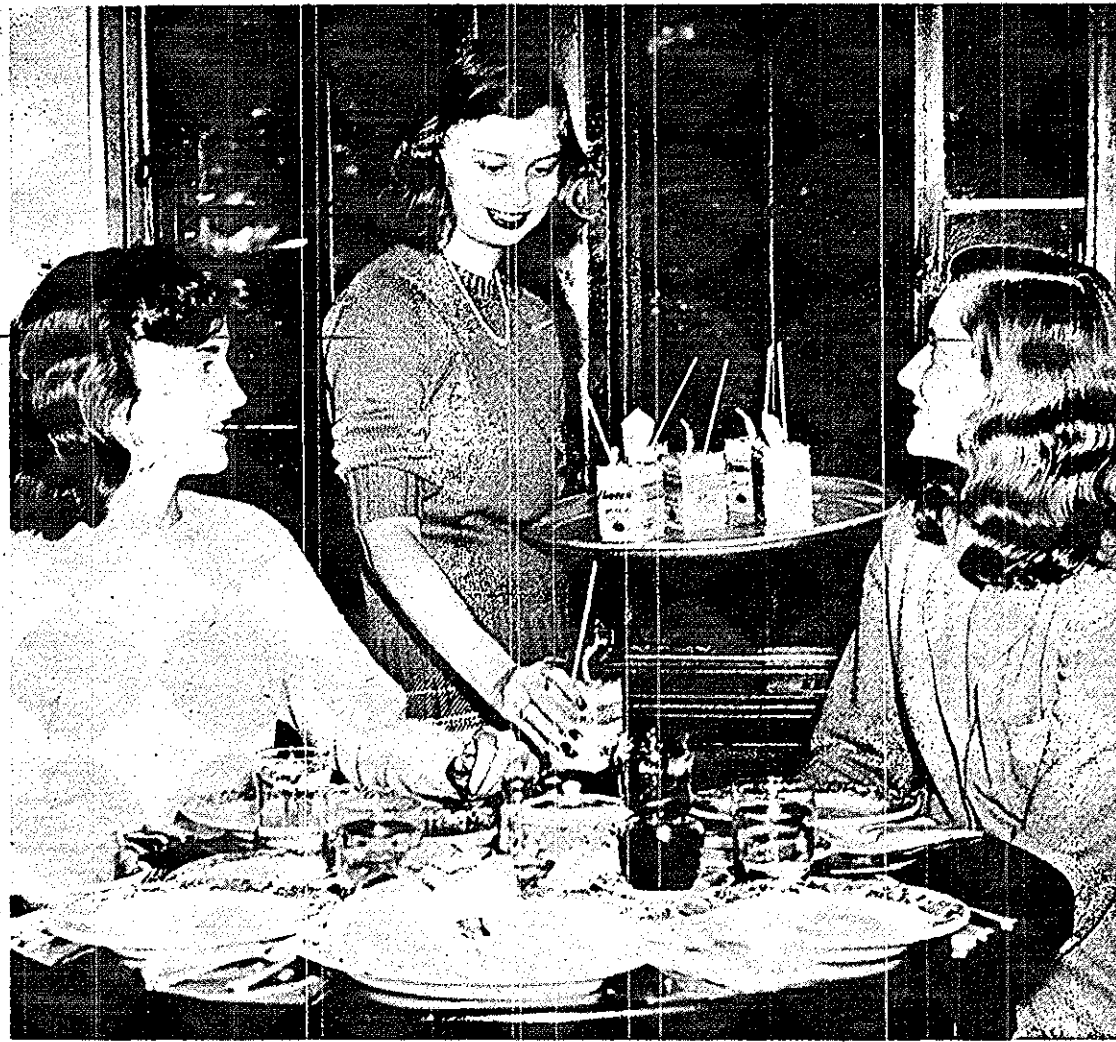

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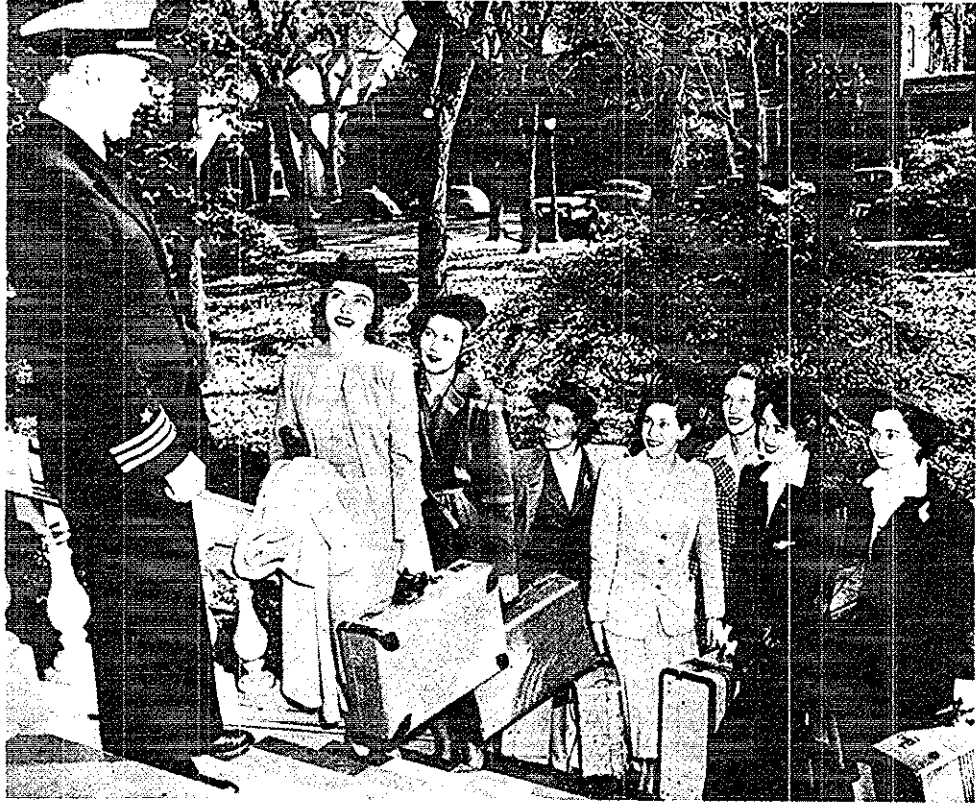

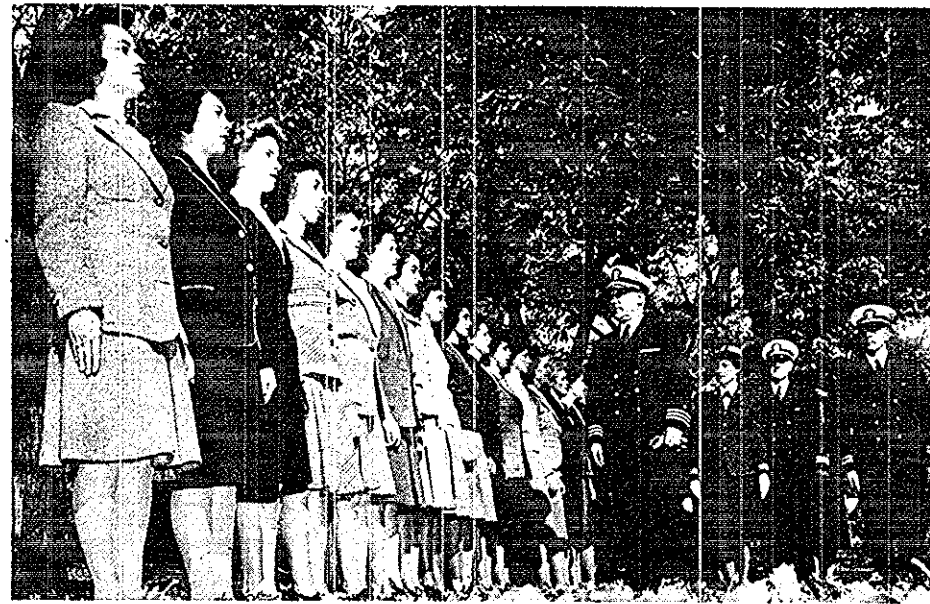

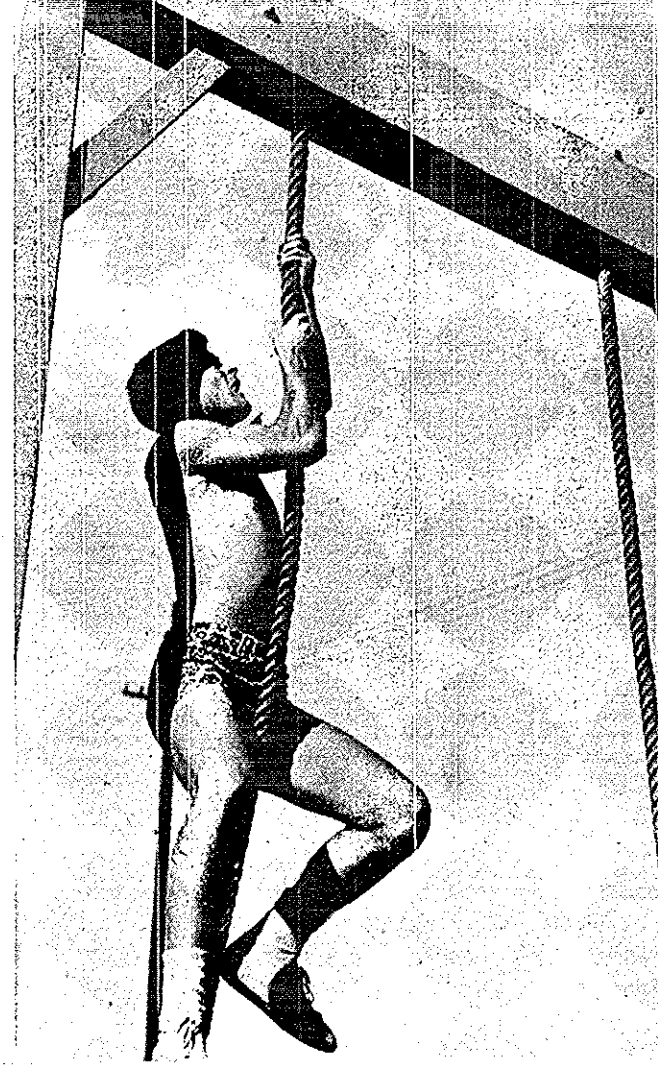

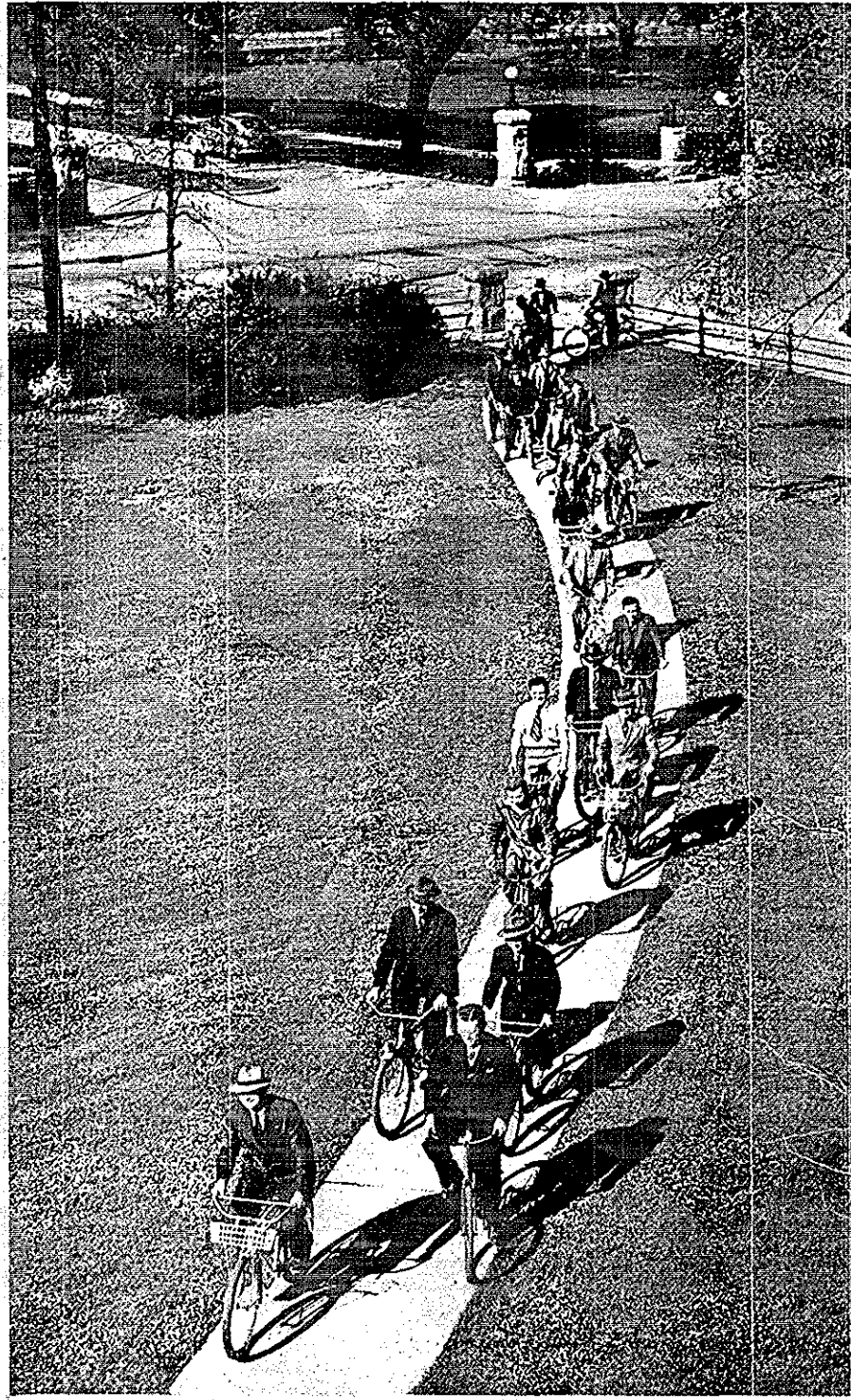

## GAMMA SIGMA SORORITY

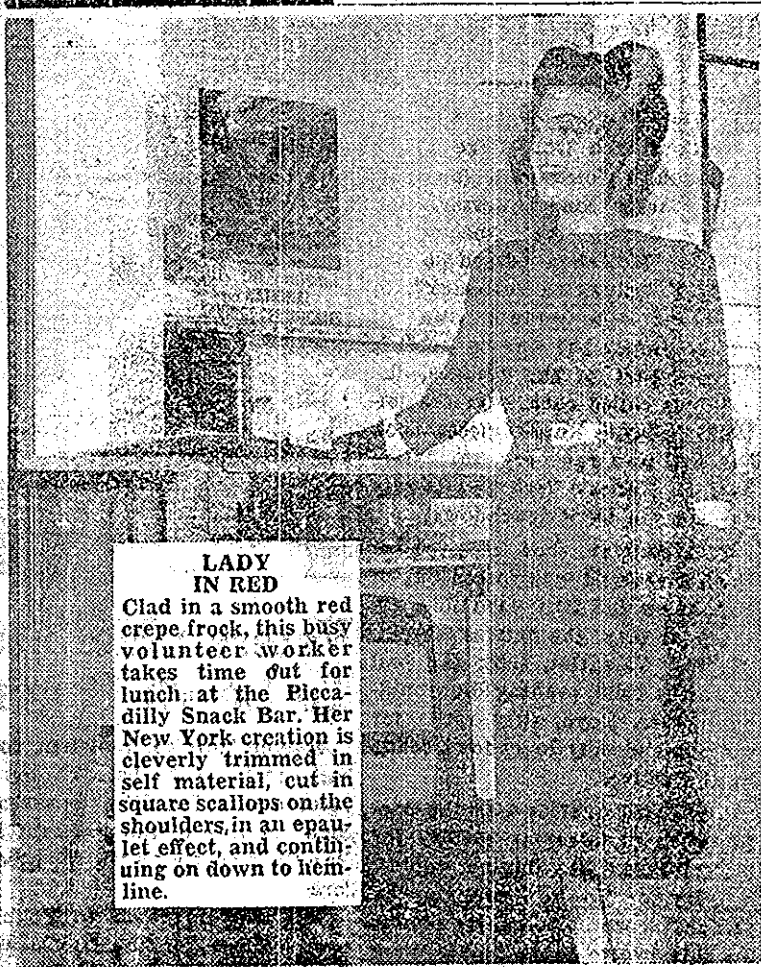

The Youngstown College basketball team, led by Leo Mogus scored their first victory in as many starts as they outshot the Kent State University Golden Flashes by a score of 56-45 last Tuesday night.

Mogus got a good start in the race for individual scoring honors this year by sinking 10 field goals and three fouls for a total of 23 points. Last season Mogus averaged 15 points per game.

Jack Cramb scored 9 points, Al Petrollini scored 8, Duffy 8, Bennett and Richetto each 4. There were 25 field goals and 6 fouls scored by the Penguins for a total of 56 points. The Kent State squad scored 18 field goals and 9 fouls for a total of 45 points.

Youngstown led 14-6 in the first quarter and increased their lead to 33-15 at the half. In the third quarter the Golden Flashes started hitting the hoop and scored 21 points to the Penguin's 6 during the quarter to make the score 39-36. In the final quarter Youngstown once again found the range and started pouring hot ball into the hoop and pulled well out into the lead.

The first home appearance of the Penguin squad will be on December 16th, when they engage the Grove City College squad at South High Field House.

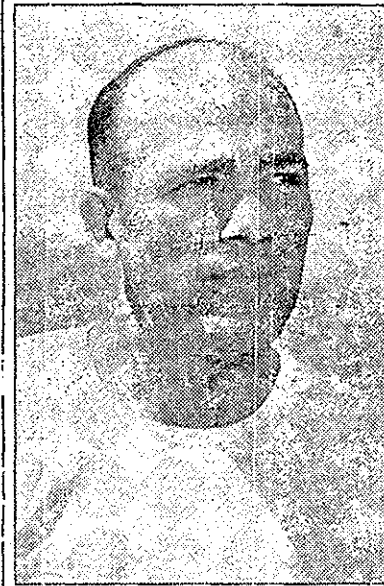
