Announce Fee, Payment Changes For Sept. 1957

Announcement of Following Fee and Payment Changes for September 1957:

1. Tuition will not be increased, but there are changes in student fees:

- a. \$5.00 will be added to full-time fees for the University Development Fund.
- b. Part-time fees will be \$1.00 per credit hour starting with the first credit and extending through 11½. Athletic and Activity Books are optional for an additional \$5.00 charge.

2. Changes in special fees:

- a. The late registration fee will be \$5.00.
- b. The \$2.00 change of registration fee remains unchanged, but will be enforced.

3. Payment Procedure:

- a. Minimum down-payment will be 33 1/3. This payment must be paid at registration for the registration to be acceptable.
- b. Bills not paid in full at registration will be regarded as installment accounts. Heretofore installment accounts started with the third week, now they will start immediately, but if the account is paid in full by the 10th day of school the deferred fee will be refunded in full.

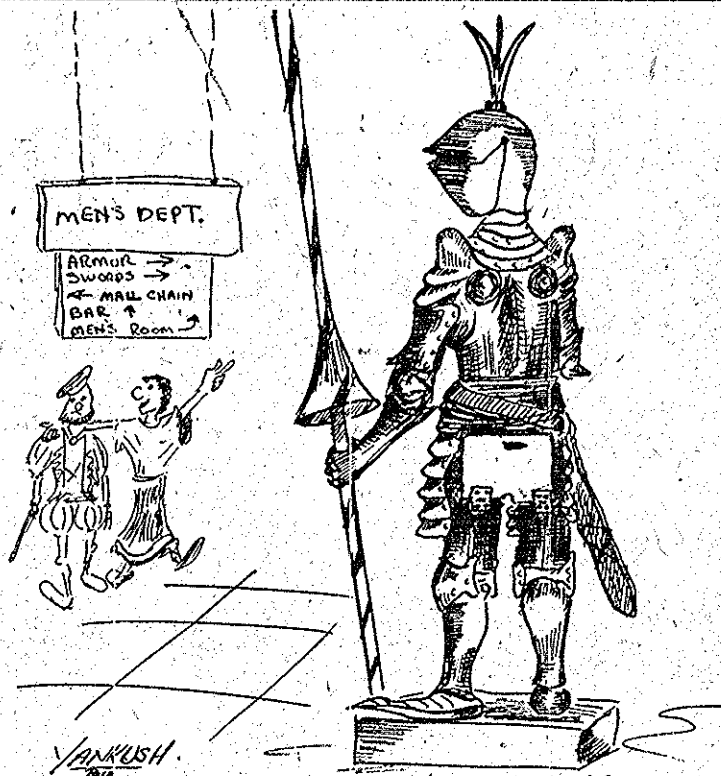
Soc. Sci. Dept. To Hold Contest

There would also be an election of a "King" for the dance. It would be carried on in the same manner as a queen election only this time a male would be in the limelight.

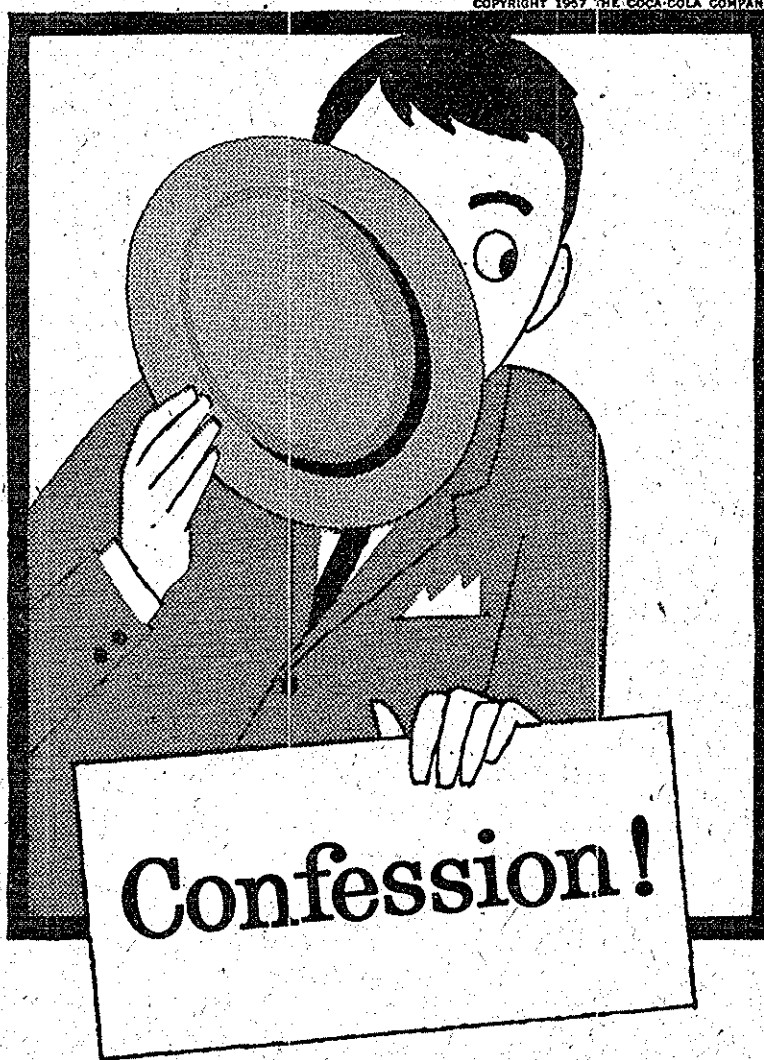

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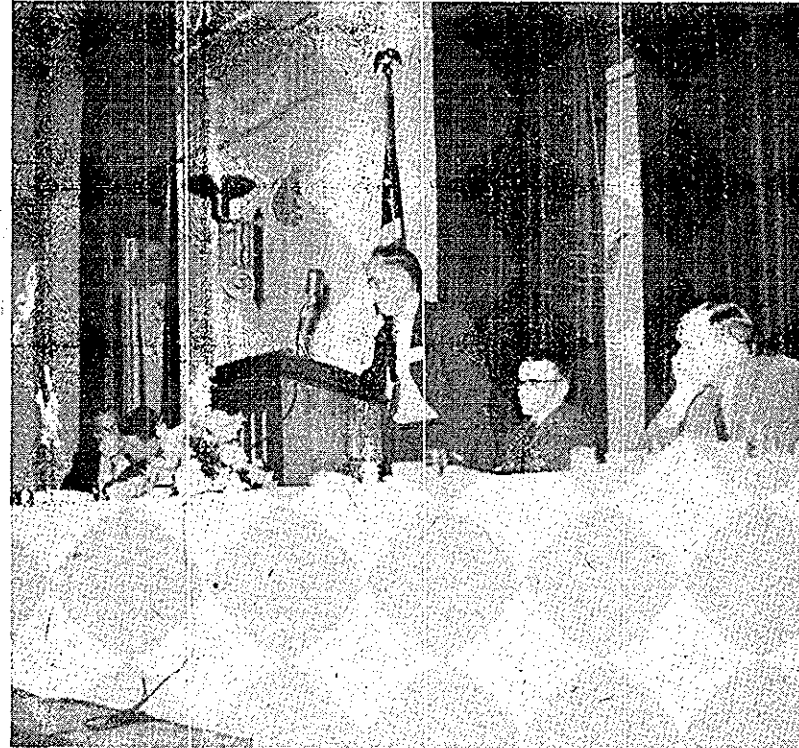

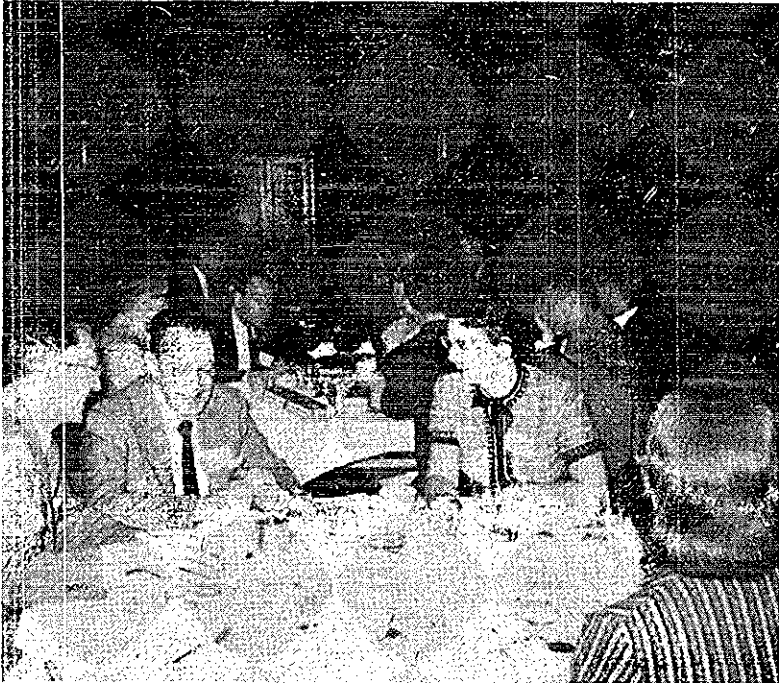

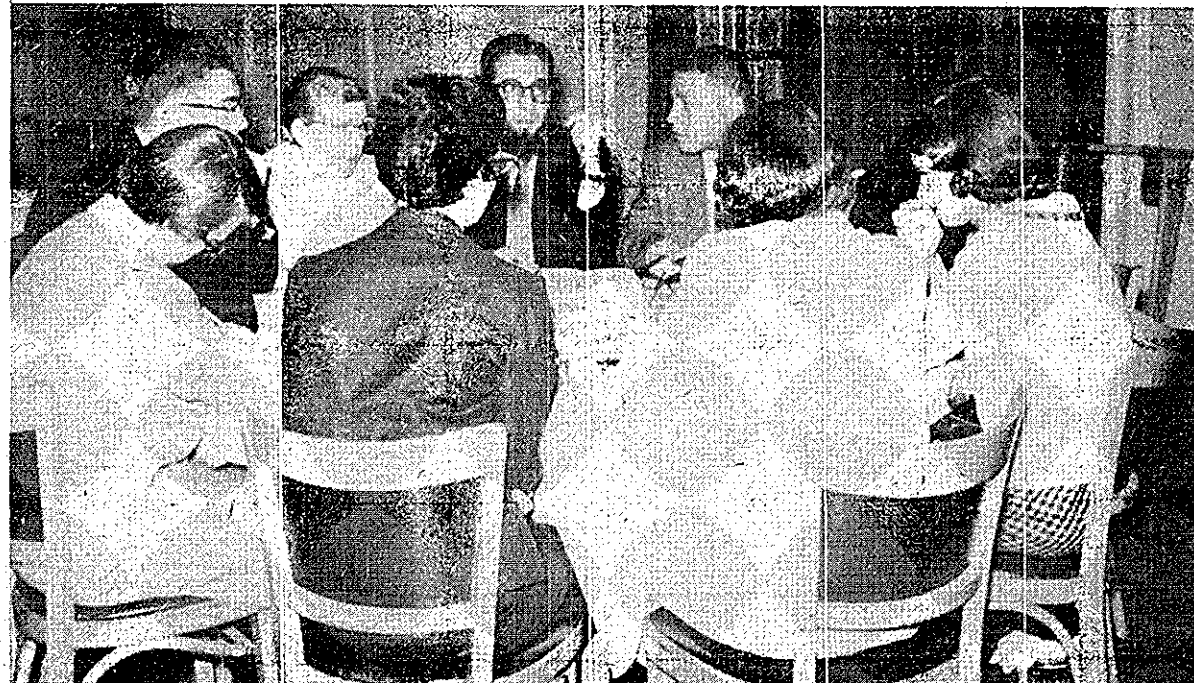

Twenty Students Have Contributed

The third issue of "Horizon," university literary magazine, is now on sale at the University Bookstore and the Trading Post on Lincoln Ave. There are 600 copies available at 25 cents each.

"Horizon," originated in 1956, as a semiannual publication containing poetry, short stories, essays and literary criticism. It is designed to reflect the creative writing talents of students at the university.

The editorial committee, in addition to this writer, includes Peggy Tiller, Keith B. Scott, Jean McClure Kelly, Sam Sanfilippo, Mary Jean Hodor and Richard Hixson. Bruce Bond is advertising and business manager and the faculty advisors are Dr. Kelsie E. Harder and Dr. Jayne C. Harder of the English Department.

Twenty Contributors

Twenty students from every school in the university have contributed short exercises in creative expression for the Spring edition. Betty Malno, an art education major, designed the cover, a penetrating study of the human form.

Mary Jean Hodor and Keith Scott, both staff members and English majors, have made a study of modern trends in poetry. Scott examines the imagery in Dylan Thomas' "Fern Hill," while Miss Hodor analyzes the validity of nostalgia in poetry.

William R. Park, a business student, satirizes the television viewer in "Public Enemy Number One."

Various Short Stories

Short stories include "Fall From Grace" by Jean Kelly, "Giovanni" by John Kenneth Altier and "End As A Youth" by Richard Groucutt. Mrs. Kelly, whose material has appeared in every issue of "Horizon," vividly portrays sensory impressions.

"Giovanni" is the story of a monk disturbed by his emotions. Groucutt examines the character of a boy at a crucial period in his life.

Poetry contributions include: "The City Asleep" by Ronald Zupko, a second semester freshman; "Requiem for the Original Sin" and "Variations on the Same Theme" by Marjorie Smith of the Secretarial School; and "Hope is a White Kite" and "Wanderer" by Agnes Biscan. Also included are "As Unto Early June" and "The Intellectual" by John Baker, an English and drama student; "Snow" by Jo-Ann Kaschak, another English major; "Claim Your Maiden" by Barbara Tindle, a pre-med student; several untitled poems by Pat Muretic and Ann Seitelstad.

"The Sea" by Gladys Garey, an engineering student; "The Scientist" by Winifred Roberts Rousseau of the education department; "All That Glitters," satirical verse, by Anita DeVivo; "Faith" by Robert J. Dugan, and "The Changing Scene" by James Bordenkircher, a philosophy major and editor of "The Heart."

Also included is an editorial urging students, faculty members and the general public to purchase yearly subscribers to "Horizon." It is believed that financial contributions will enhance the future of "Horizon."

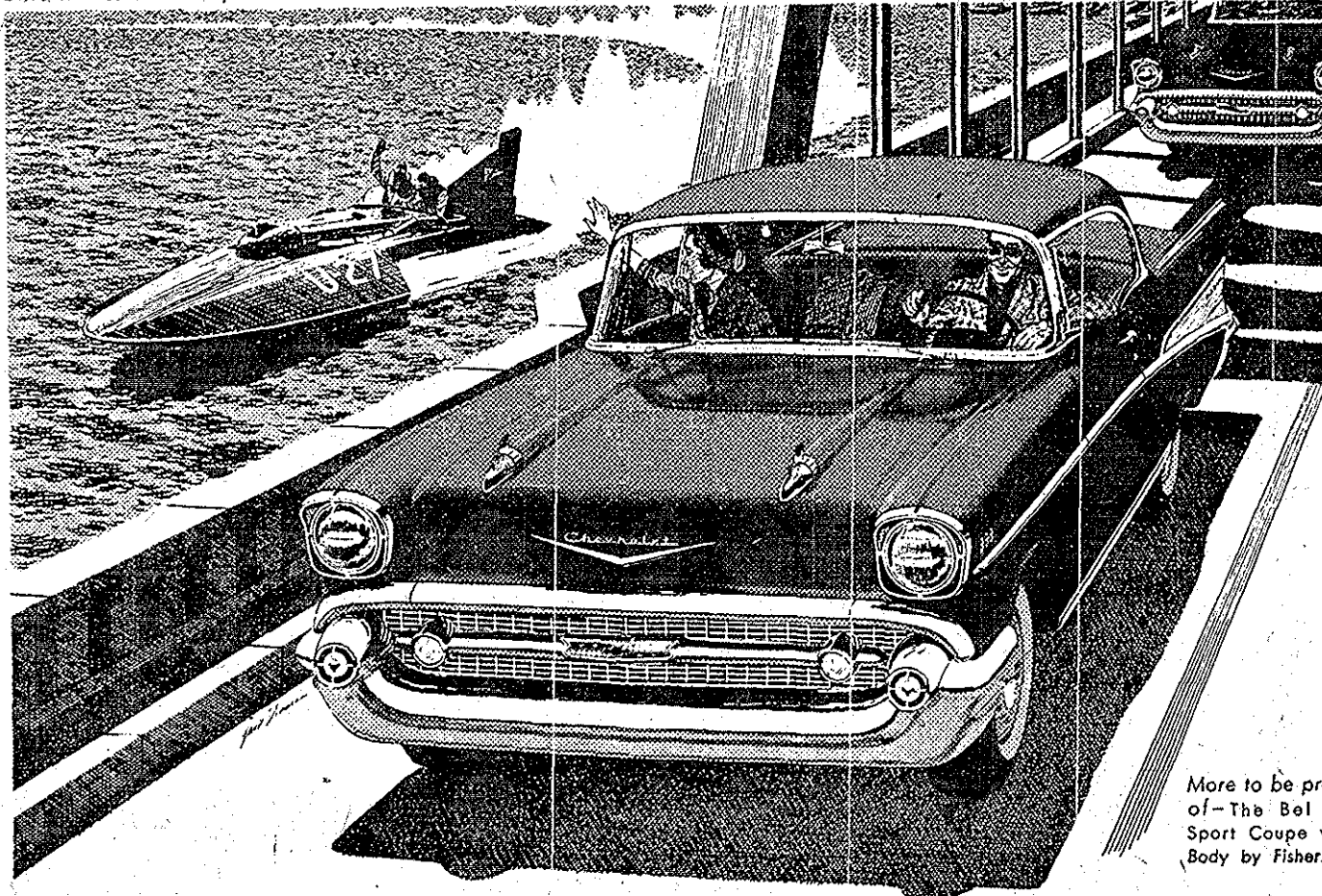

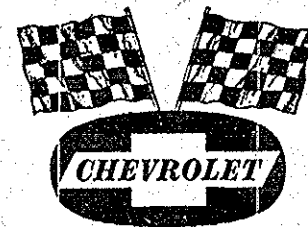

Present Flag to Univ.

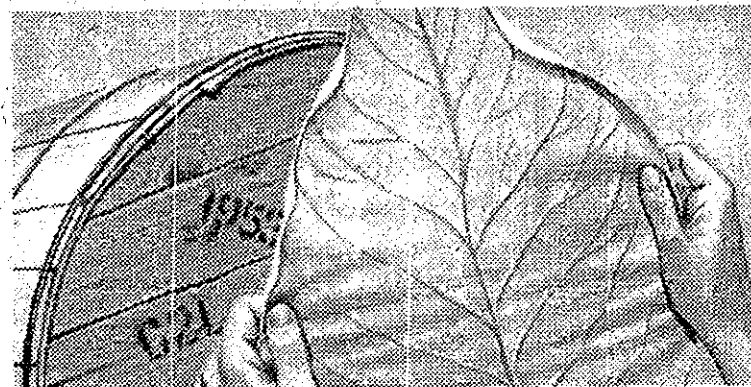

Alfred Zega Presents Recital; Has Appeared On TV's 'Omnibus'

The Dana School of Music of Youngstown University presented guest artist Alfred Zega, a lyric baritone and his accompanist George Malloy last Friday evening, in a recital at the C.J. Strouss Memorial Auditorium. The public was invited and there was no admission charge.

Mr. Zega made his recital debut at New York's Town Hall in 1952 and since then has sung in most of the major American cities as well as on the Master Series of such well known universities as Notre Dame and the University of Washington.

Zega was a scholarship student at the Julliard School of Music and studied privately in Paris with Pierre Bernac and in New York with Maria Kurenko and Estelle Liebling with whom he is still associated.

Made Two Tours

Although primarily a recitalist, Zega made two transcontinental tours in opera singing the title role in Humperdinck's "Hansel and Gretel".

For the past five summers, Zega has been the assistant musical director

of the Connecticut Valley Music Festival where he annually presents a program of song cycles from both the romantic and contemporary repertoire. Earlier this season he was heard on television's Omnibus in the "Ballad of Baby Doe" an opera by Douglas Moore.

Is An Authority

Zega is one of the outstanding authorities on the Polk and Art songs of Poland. His next Town Hall recital will take place in November.

The program consisted of Handel's "Si, tra i ceppi" from Bernice; "Sel Nur Still" by Johann Franck; "Trois poems d'un jour" (Three Poems of a Day) Rencontre (The Meeting), "Toujours" (Forever), and "Adieu" (Farewell) composed by Faure. Also

included were: "Dichterliebe" Op. 48 (Poet's Love) by Schumann; "Lieder eines fahrenden Gesellen" (Songs of a Wayfarer) by Mahler; "Moja Piescota Op. 74" by Chopin; "Wojak Op. 74 (The Warrior) by Chopin; "Warm as the Autumn Light" from "Ballad of Baby Doe" by Douglas Moore; "Requiescat" by Ronald Murat; "The Vendor's Song" by Ronald Murat; and "The Donkey" by Paul Chancellor.

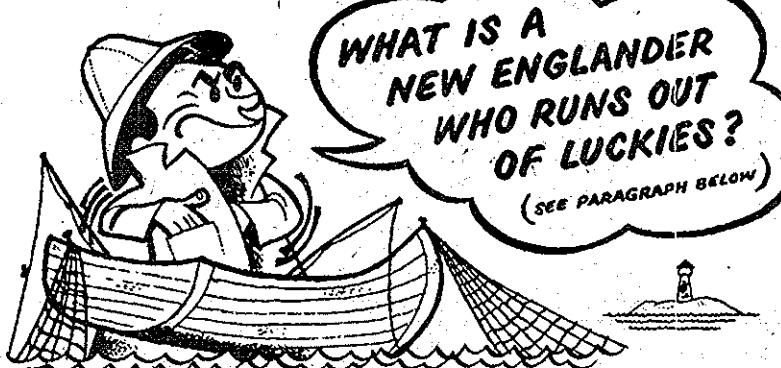
In an attempt to encourage maintaining high academic standards among fraternities, Student Council has resumed the practice of honoring the fraternity with the highest cumulative point average.

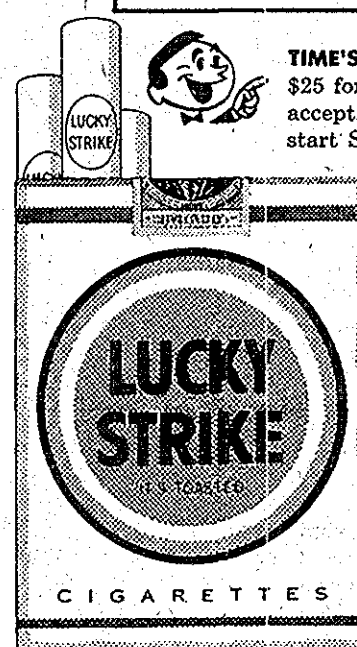
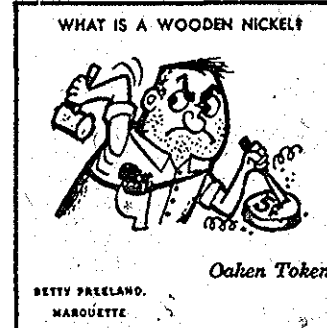
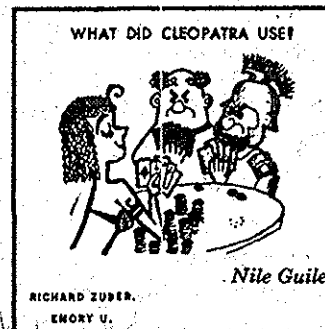
