The purpose of this visit was for a better outlook on educational facilities and to further their interest in the teaching field.



#### **Potential Disaster**

Cigarette smokers, do you realize what damage one cigarette butt can do? Because of the negligence of someone, a cigarette butt caused a fire on campus which could have been disastrous. Located behind West Hall, the contents of a dumpster was ignited by a

Cigarettes usually cost a little more than one cent apiece. This one, however, cost \$115. An analysis shows why - 300 gal water, \$75 for the appearance of the fire dept., and \$30 damage to the dumpsters. The quick arrival of Capt. Vesmer of No. 7 fire station and his coherts saved an old garage and several cars from being damaged in the fire.

He stated the cause was due to a cigarette butt thrown in a waste basket, later emptied into the dumpster.

If you as students insist on smoking, then smoke in an area not designated "No Smoking". When finished make sure the butt is put out and placed in a container designed for their disposal. Don't throw butts on the floor or on the campus.


I believe big "name" bands at school sponsored functions are a must for any modern day university. Students look forward to the big dances of the year with much anxiety

"What we want is that the trainees be allowed to enter into University life and be invited into the homes of faculty members and homes of other families in the community." Dean Smith declared.






## Sophomore's Art **Work Displayed**



## Student Activity Regulations

I. SOCIAL CONDUCT

A. Only students with their invited guests, faculty and alumni may attend University social functions.

B. Students on disciplinary probation may not participate in any extracurricular activity. Social privileges may also be suspended for organizations which fail to comply with the below regulations. II. CLASSIFICATION

A. Priority of FUNCTIONS

1. Class I. Religious or strictly academic. (Chapel, Lectures etc. sponsored by Student Council or The University Administration.)

2. Class Ia. Social academic.

(Films, speakers, plays, operas, recitals etc. sponsored by Student Council and conducted by other organizations.) 3. Class II. Social nonprofit.

(Dances etc. sponsored by Student Council.) 4. Class IIa. Social profit making.

(Dances etc. sponsored and conducted by student organizations other than Student Council.) 5. Class III. Social academic meetings.

(Speakers, films etc. sponsored and conducted by stu-

dent organizations other than Student Council. 6. Class IIIa. Business meetings.

(Student organizations other than Student Council.) 7. Class IIIb. Private social.

(Parties, dinners etc. sponsored and conducted by student organizations other than Student Council.) B. Priority of ORGANIZATIONS 1. Class A.

a. Religious organizations.

2. Class B.

a. Governing bodies other than Student Council. 3. Class C.

a. Fraternities and Sororities affiliated with Pan-Hel. or I.F.C.

b. Strictly service organizations.

4. Class D.

a. Departmental service organizations 5. Class E.

a. Departmental honorary and Professional organizations

b. Special social organizations

C. Responsibilities 1. It shall be the responsibility of the Student Council Constitution Committee to maintain a current accurate roster of all active student organizations and their priority class. A copy of this roster shall be on file with the Co-ordination and Calendar

Committee. III. SOCIAL REGULATIONS

A. Class I, Ia, II, and IIa rules 1. General

a. All such functions for the following school year must be registered with the University Calendar Committee in the Office of the Dean of Women before the tenth of May.

b. All such functions shall be open to all students entitled to, or possessing student activity tickets and invited guests.

c. Chaperones must be present at every all-university function. Two members of the University faculty must be chaperones. Approval of dates and chaperons will be sent to the sponsoring organization by the Office of the Dean of Women. Proper invitations for chaperones will be sent ten days before the event and written acceptances will be filed in the Office of the Dean of Women two days prior to the

d. All social functions conducted by a student organization must be under the direction of a responsible committee and a faculty advisor.

e. Any all-university social function must be over by one o'clock, unless a weekday follows, in which case it must be over by twelve o'clock.

1. Extract from the Youngstown University Faculty Handbook - (University social regulations forbid any drinking at University functions, on penalty of expulsion. Chaperones are expected to check any violations of the social regulations.)

f. Alcoholic beverages must not be available at any such function.

a. No organization may conduct more than two Class Ia functions per semester and not more than three per

b. No organization may conduct more than two Class IIa functions per year.

B. Class III, IIIa, and IIIb rules

General

a. There shall be no function scheduled at the same or in an overlapping time with any function of higher priority.

b. These functions shall be open only to members and invited guests.

c. Reservations (if for the use of school facilities) must be in the Office of the Dean of Women one month in advance of date.

2. Specific

a. Mixed parties must last no later than twelve o'clock when a weekday follows.

b. An advisor and/or faculty member must be present at

any Class IIIb function. d. All such functions shall be registered with the Calendar Committee two days prior to the event, including the name of the chaperone.

Tom Richards, freshman, scored both times on short plunges.

The Texas coach said before the game that Kimmel is the most dangerous runner that his team will face all season. He was probably basing his thought on the fact that Kimmel gained 147 of the 177 yards run up against his team last year.

#### Used 5-4-2 Defense

The Texans used a wide spread 5-4-2 defense with their secondary man rotating to the wide side of the field. Several Penguin linemen remarked that it was difficult to achieve the right angle for a block in this type of a defense.




Jim Vechiarella, Ronnie Stoops, Davey Kimmel and George Saadey trampled the Rayen turf for the last time as Penguins.
