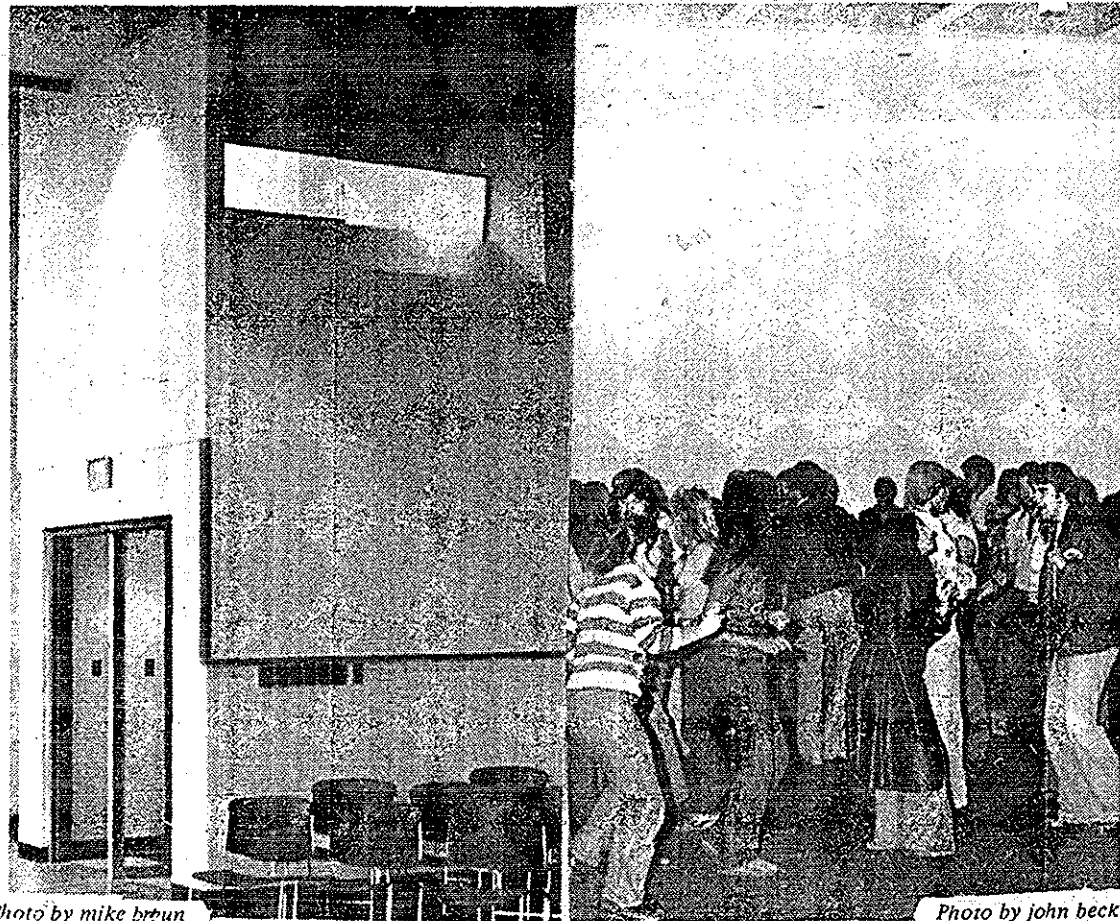

Kilcawley accepting entries for creative arts spring festival "77"

Are you a struggling young artist or just a talented person looking for an outlet for your creativity? If you are one of the above or if you are just interested in the creative arts then YSU may have something in store for you. The "Creative Arts Festival Expressions 77" planned for spring quarter of 1977, has been designed to promote awareness in the fine and performing arts.

The festival will provide an outlet for student, faculty, staff and any other university personnel to display their particular talent to a large number of people.

Sponsoring the program is the Creative Arts Festival Committee. Comprising the committee are: Dr. William McGraw, Dean of Fine and Performing Arts, Elaine Juhasz, art, Wendall Orr, music, Dr. Bill Hulsopple, Drama, and Christine Blice, student. Committee members from other university departments are Al Bright, Black Studies, Wendy Goodridge and Barbara Scott, University Relations, K.J. Satrum, Karen Smith and Collen Bosak, Kilcawley Center, Dr. Warren Young, planetarium, Marilyn Kocinski, modern dance, Randall Gerber, broad-

casting, and James Senary and Tom Jones, Student Government. Chairperson for the committee is Mark Shanley, coordinator of student activities.

As the sponsor for the program, the Creative Arts Festival Committee will handle the overall coordination of scheduling, facility requirements and provide a comprehensive overall campaign.

Specific questionnaires dealing with production and set-up requirements will be handed out to the program sponsors whose programs have been selected. Interviews will be scheduled between the sponsor and the Committee after the questionnaire has been completed and returned. After the interview a space reservation form will be initiated with the Calendaring Office, detailing all the set-up requirements for the program.

Application deadline for program entries will be Friday, December 3. Applications should be returned to the Student Activities office, Kilcawley Center.

All interested groups and organizations are encouraged to participate in the festival by

sponsoring an event. Some examples include drama, film, painting, sculpture, crafts, art exhibits, dance and any related fields.

Council election held; chairman seats filled

Sept. 8

In a special pre-quarter meeting, Wednesday, Sept. 8, YSU student council voted in a new council Chairperson and vice-chairman of council, since both positions had been vacated over the summer months.

Lynn Johnson, who had been elected chairman, resigned because of personal reasons. Johnson, a senior business major, had applied and was tentatively accepted to an out of state school. Since she wouldn't know until the first two weeks of school if she had been accepted or not she explained that it would be better for council to have a permanent chairman so confusion could be avoided.

Two nominations were offered and accepted by council, Jim Senert, Jr. Business, and Camilli Cotelesse, Soph. A&S. Jim Senery won the council vote and was installed as the new Chairman of Council.

Since the Vice-chairman's position had also been vacated (the Vice-chairman had graduated) council offered three nominations for voting, Mario Massaro, Linda Hayes and Marc

Stec were the nominees. After voting twice and coming up with ties between Stec and Hayes both times, council voted a third time and finally chose Hayes as vice-chairman.

In other council business several changes were made in the homecoming budget, paper ballots were oked for the fall elections, and several clubs were given notice as to the status of their budget.

Sept. 21

As a result of last Monday's Student Council meeting, a committee will be formed to look into the reason for the discontinuation of performances by YSU's marching band.

According to Jim Senery, Council Chairperson, there have been many different reasons for this, and he hopes to find out the correct reason and see if anything can be done through this newly formed committee. Senery fears that if something is not done immediately, the marching band will never get back on its feet.

Republic Steel provides free parking for YSU students

The Republic Steel Company is providing free parking for all YSU students in their 1500 capacity lot located downtown. Adjacent to the Market Street bridge, the lot will hopefully relieve the traffic problem in the University area, said Donald Minnis, director of auxiliary services.

Minnis explained that the free parking and shuttle bus service from the Republic Steel lot to the campus area is available to students upon presentation of their ID cards. Two WRTA buses will leave the lot at 7:40 a.m. every morning making four stops around the campus area and return to the lot every half hour. The bus will make its first stop on campus in front of Beeghly center, the second stop by the visitors lot at the foot of Bryson Street, another at Lincoln project, and a final stop between the CAST (T&CC) and Engineering Science buildings before returning to the downtown lot.

Minnis said that a guardhouse to protect students from the

weather while awaiting the buses and a phone connected from the lot to campus are available as well as an attendant present until 6:00 p.m. "After that time the lots will not be used," said Minnis. He added that students who use the free lot until 6:00 and then decide to park on campus, will have to face the daily \$1 parking rate.

"This fall quarter program is strictly experimental," stressed Minnis. He noted that if the buses are found to be half-empty, several of the trips will be eliminated. He also said that there could eventually be a charge, but definitely not this quarter.

Dr. John Coffelt, president of YSU, noted that the interest of the Republic Steel officials has afforded the University a solution to the parking needs of the students. He added that he hopes students will take advantage of this opportunity for free parking.

Summer enrollment was 5,601; increased 1.5%

YSU's official summer quarter 1976 enrollment was 5,601, a 1.5 percent increase over last summer.

The undergraduate enrollment was 4,345 and the graduate figure was 1,256, Dr. Karl E. Krill, vice president for administrative affairs, reported Saturday during the Board of Trustees regular meeting.

Enrollment by schools and colleges shows the College of Applied Science and Technology leading with 1,165; College of Arts and Sciences, 1,163; School of Business Administration, 842;

School of Education, 616; School of Engineering, 314; and College of Fine and Performing Arts, 245.

Dr. John J. Coffelt, president of YSU, discussed upcoming fall quarter enrollment and subsidy eligibility saying a 3 percent enrollment increase is expected but figures could increase as high as 8 or 9 percent. State subsidy is based on enrollment projections and Dr. Coffelt explained the University would await exact enrollment figures to determine if the budget would have to be revised upward.

Dr. Krill reported the

University's capital improvement request for 1977-79, under examination by the Ohio Board of Regents, lists first priority as facilities to serve women's physical education and athletics. YSU has asked \$4.5 million for this project. He also said the University has authorized \$60,000 to renovate the locker room space in Beeghly Center to full capacity. The increased space will be re-allocated in a ratio of one-third women and two-thirds men. Dr. Krill indicated that the six million dollar Arts and Sciences classroom and office building, slated for completion in 1978, is on schedule.

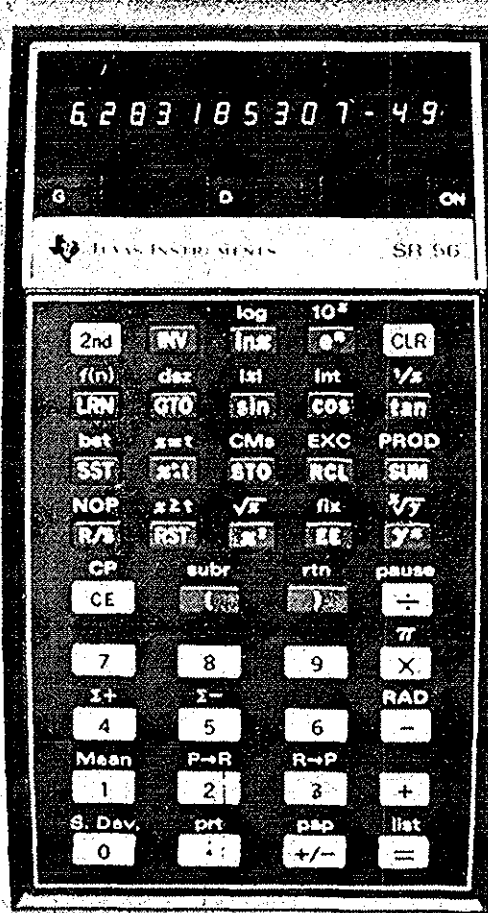

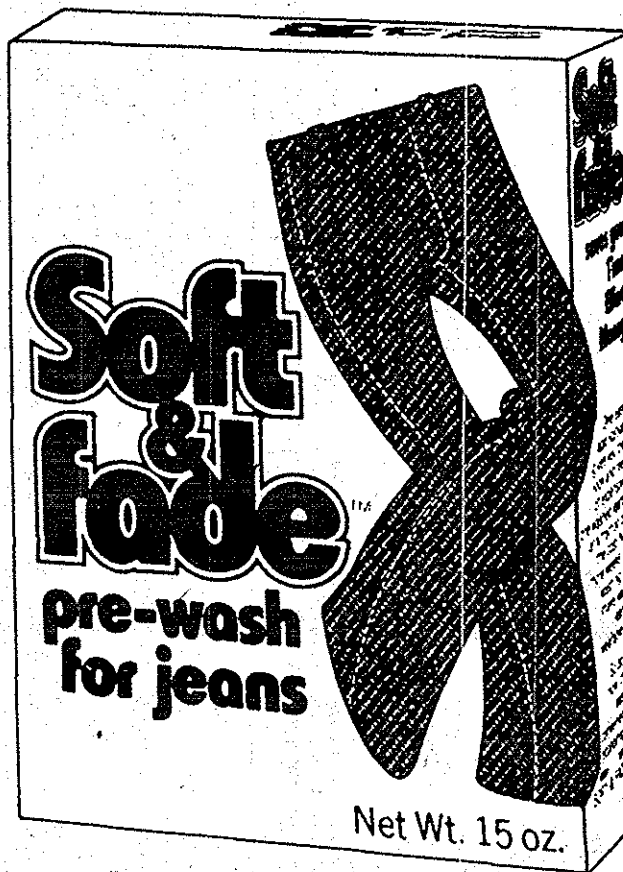

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Beginning Anew

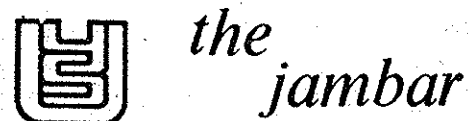

In other business, Tom Jones, Major Events Committee Chairperson, reported that there will be no Homecoming Concert this fall, as the Major Events committee was unable to obtain a band for the specified date. However, the Average White Band will appear at YSU Friday, Oct. 22, and arrangements are being made for a possible concert with Barry Manilow. The Broadway play, *Equus*, coming to campus Nov. 14. Jones mentioned several openings on different committees of Major Events and applications are available in the student activities office.

The student escort service will

be continued this year and according to Senary, has been budgeted by Student Council. Bob Capp was nominated and elected as the new director for the service, which is available from 6-10:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Mary Kay Senary, activities chairperson, reported under activities that the workshop for council representatives at Bethany College, Oct. 29-31, is in the final stages of planning. Other university leaders will be invited to attend as well. She also announced the new intramural director, Jack Neville.

Finance responsibilities have

been divided and Cam Cotelesse, Finance committee chairperson, will be responsible for next year's budgets, while Barb Gazdik was appointed to handle this year's.

George Glaros, president of student government, reported that several organizations did not register with Student Government, although they were being funded by it this year. The budgets for these clubs have been recalled, leaving \$2576 to be allocated in other accounts. Glaros suggested that with part of the money, Student Government should incorporate an Information Center on campus. Initially, it would include a phone service system which would provide students with answers to questions they may have about campus functions. The possibility of the phone service is being reviewed.

Placement office conducts seminars on job interviews

In an effort to inform YSU students about common procedures in a job interview, the Career Planning and Placement office is once again conducting seminars entitled 'Job Interview Techniques' under the direction of Charles Whitman, Assistant Director.

A number of topics will be covered in the one hour seminars, which will include qualities that

recruiters look for in a candidate, possible questions that may be asked, how to prepare for an interview, and the recommended conduct of an interview.

Seniors are especially urged to attend one of these seminars. It is required of all registrants of the Placement Office who will be signing up for on-campus recruiting this year. No appointment is necessary and each seminar is identical.

Film-lectures planned to begin in October

"Exploring the World with YSU," six full-length color travel documentaries, will begin its fourth season in October, sponsored by YSU's department of continuing education.

Film-lectures, presented at 2:30 p.m. Sundays in Schwebel Auditorium of the Engineering Science building, are narrated in person by the producers.

Alpine World USA, will launch this year's series on Oct. 10, followed by: *Germany*, Nov. 7; *The Andes*, Nov. 28; *Australian Adventure*,

Feb. 6; *Morocco*, March 6; and *Greek Islands Odyssey*, April 3.

Eric Pavel will narrate *Alpine World USA*, a story of man's relation to nature in the Sierra and the Rocky Mountains. Pavel's photographs have appeared in textbooks and *National Geographic Magazine*. *Germany*, an economic giant and would leader, will be presented by Ed Lark, a University of California graduate and life-long photographer. Thayer Soule, a Marine Corps Photographic officer at

Guadacanal, will describe a study of *The Andes*.

Australian Adventure will be narrated by Kenneth Richter, noted for his documentary and educational films. The fifth program, *Morocco*, focuses on the closest African and Islamic country to the United States. Producer and narrator Clay Francisco has been cited by the American Film Festival in New York. The final film, *Greek Islands Odyssey*, will be presented by Robin Williams, whose work is noted for photographic excellence and absorbing narration.

Season subscriptions are \$12.00 for adults and \$9.00 for senior citizens, children, or full-time students. As proof of status senior citizens may present Golden Buckeye or Senior Citizens cards while YSU students may use university identification cards. Tickets for senior citizens and students will be available at the continuing education office or at the box office on the day of the event. Individual program tickets are \$3.00 for adults, \$1.50 for others. Parking is available in the Arlington Avenue parking deck.

Charles Mickens named admissions counselor

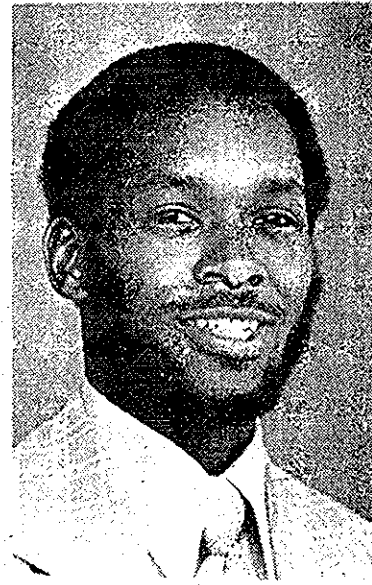
Charles G. Mickens has been appointed admissions counselor in the office of admissions and records at YSU.

Renovations near end at Kilcawley Center

'Renovations in Kilcawley Center are nearly complete in all phases,' announced Phil Hirsh, director of Kilcawley Center. Hirsh also added that the deadlines have been met and costs of the projects have not exceeded the expectations.

Consuming a large portion of the allotments were major mechanical, heating, and air conditioning relocations. The expanded efficiency of the units will balance the cost of the relocations. The remodeling of the first floor cafeteria into a food service cafeteria and amphitheater and the most evident changes in Kilcawley that are fully completed.

Included in the renovations is the addition of a new public restaurant dining area located in the former resident dining hall. The restaurant will specialize in a buffet style luncheon and dinner. A full course menu as an option to the buffet, rounds out the full service sit down restaurant.

Education is lifelong, Olson tells graduates

"The hardest thing to get into the mind of the student is that education is the work of a lifetime," Dr. Stanley W. Olson told 505 YSU graduates Saturday (Aug. 28).

Dr. Olson, provost for Northeastern Ohio Universities College of Medicine, was main speaker for YSU's fifty-fourth annual summer commencement in Beeghly Center and discussed "Three Faces of Learning."

"How you perceive your own education and what use you make of it will surely influence the success you enjoy in your own work and the enjoyment you derive from your life," Olson said.

Dr. Olson explained the "central issue we in the Medical School face—and what you too must come to some understanding about—is the nature of the educational process—which elements can be dealt with in the formal setting of the University with the help of instructors and which are the responsibility of the individual both before and after he has been graduated."

Dr. Olson referred to Dr. I.H. McWhinney, professor of family practice at the University of Western Ontario, who believes a physician uses three kinds of knowledge: information, clinical craftsmanship, and insight and awareness. Information comes from observation, listening and reading; clinical skill from constant practice and emulation of others; and insight and awareness from human intercourse and deep reflection on self and experience.

Dr. Olson said, "The knowledge you have so painfully acquired in these past few years is sure to be superseded by the results of research and discovery which are already underway. You will have to acquire that new knowledge largely by your own efforts."

With people likely to change jobs as frequently as five times, he advised graduates that each job "will require additional new skills, and those too, you will have to acquire largely through your own efforts."

"What our faculty is doing now in the early formative years of the new College of Medicine," he explained, "is to think deeply about how we shall educate our students for a life of useful medical practice. When we present our first class in 1981 for the awarding of the bachelor of science and doctor of medicine degrees, we sincerely hope that we shall have helped them in the development of habits of mind and personality sufficiently that they will grow to become wise physicians. They will by then have taken only the beginning steps leading to out-

standing clinical competence and some may never fully succeed. But we can hope that all will continue their search for the wisdom without which they can never hope to reach true competence. Wisdom in any field is an elusive Holy Grail but its pursuit is ennobling and we all are the better for having joined the quest."

During commencement ceremonies there were 65 associate degrees conferred, 301 bachelor's and 139 master's degrees. Students graduating with honors numbered 36.

There were five associate in arts degrees awarded; 30 associate in applied business and 30 associate in applied science.

The bachelor of arts degree recipients numbered 80; bachelor of science in education, 66; bachelor of science in business administration, 65; bachelor of science, 26; bachelor of science in applied science, 24; bachelor of engineering, 23; bachelor of fine arts, 12.

Yemma named first chairperson of YSU allied health department

Dr. John J. Yemma, associate professor of biological sciences at YSU, has been appointed the first chairperson of the YSU department of allied health.

The allied health department, offered through the YSU College of Applied Science and Technology, prepares medically oriented students for job entry in various health career fields.

Dr. Yemma, an East High School graduate, received a bachelor of science in education degree in biology from YSU, master of arts degree in biology from George Peabody College (Tenn.) and a Ph.D. degree in biology from Pennsylvania State University. He has authored 17 research articles on cytochemistry, the study of the composition of tissues and cells.

The Youngstown native notes that the allied health department "will provide one-year certificate programs and two-year associate degree programs as well as certain baccalaureate programs preparing individuals in those applied spheres of learning that deal with human health and well-being."

Programs developed and currently functioning in the department are: medical technology, a four-year program coordinated by Dr. Inally Mahadeviah; dental hygiene technology, a two-year program coordinated by Mrs. Madeleine Haggerty; and medical assisting, a two-year program coordinated by Mrs. Catherine Feld. According to Dr. Yemma a respiratory therapy program is being developed to be implemented by September, 1977. In the planning stage are a medical laboratory technician program and a program in radiologic technology.

Dr. Yemma joined the YSU faculty in 1971, after teaching biology at Penn State for six years and chemistry in the Struthers school system for four years. He is a member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the American Association of Microbiologists, and serves as referee for scientific articles contributed to the American Botanical Society.

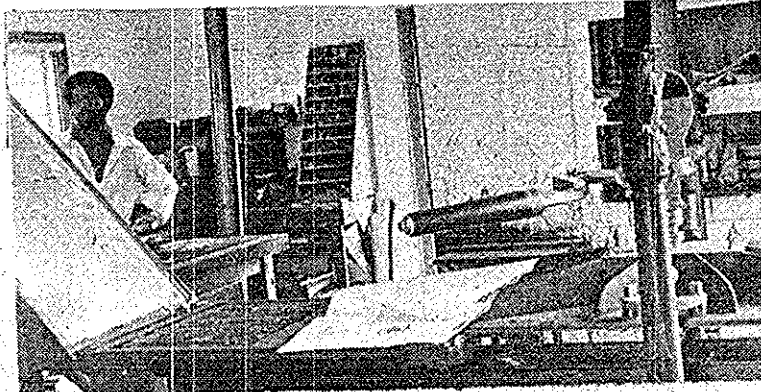

YSU seeks first win against Akron Saturday

YSU's 1976 football team will be seeking its first victory of the young season against the Akron Zips at 1 p.m. tomorrow afternoon at Rayen Stadium.

The Penguins, under second-year head coach Bill Narduzzi, will be trying to bounce back from losses to Dayton (41-16), and Tennessee Tech (13-10).

Akron enters Saturdays fray with an even 1-1 mark, the result of a victory over Temple (23-13) and a loss to Morehead State (26-6).

In last weekend's tough defeat against Tennessee Tech the Penguins held a slim 10-6 lead at the half-way mark.

Unfortunately, a pass-interference call against YSU enabled the visitors from the south to score the clinching touchdown with only minutes to play.

Coach Narduzzi notes that he is 'naturally disappointed at being 0-2,' but adds 'that the improvement from the first loss through yesterday's practice has been very gratifying.'

YSU's head mentor attributed the two defeats to 'individual breakdowns... it is never the same player hurting us.'

Cliff Stoudt, the Penguin's highly talented and highly touted quarterback has not, according to Narduzzi, played up to his potential. However, Narduzzi was quick to point out that the team's

slow start seems to be unjustifiably traced back to Stoudt.

YSU's probable starting offensive lineup for the Akron tussle will include senior Emmett Smith (6'1-208) at tight end, juniors Ralph Orsini (6'1-221) and John Lyden (6'1-225) at the tackle spots, junior Mac Maley (5'10-217) and senior Dan Miklos (6'0-211) will open at guards and senior Tony Bond (6'0-214) will be at center.

Defensively, YSU will send seniors Tom Rice (6'1-219) and Larry Dannals (6'2-229) at the tackle positions. Junior Fred Thomas (6'0-224) will fill the middle guard slot with sophomore Quentin Lowry (6'3-205) and senior Ron Pentz (6'2-197) manning the ends. However, a knee injury may sideline Pentz. Sophomore Greg Fitzpatrick (6'3-214) and junior Don McCloud (5'11-203) are the Penguins linebackers. YSU's pass secondary is comprised of sophomore monster back Tom Jaros (6'0-179), junior backs Jack Dever (6'0-168) and Larry Habarka (5'10-186) and sophomore safety Joe Bell (6'1-181).

Akron boasts a powerful running attack which has amassed 470 yards (4.5 a carry) already this season.

The Zips defense has allowed only a meager 19 points thus far.

The Penguins, according to Narduzzi, 'need a win bad,'... however the boys have not lost confidence because they have too much character and too much talent.

PENGUIN PASSES

Marschel Brumfield is the Penguins top rusher after two games with 146 yards on 31 attempts for a 4.7 attempt average. . . Veteran back John Kinch has hefted the pigskin for 91 yards so far this season and now has 1,892 career rushing yards, which is third best in YSU history. . . A new rotating trophy will be presented to the winner of this weekend's contest. The trophy is made of rubber and steel—the major industrial products of Akron and Youngstown....The trophy is the result of the joint effort of athletic directors Gordon Larson of Akron and Paul Amodio of YSU.... Signal-caller Stoudt needs just 23 yards to top the 4,000-yard plateau in total offense.... (Cliff) has compiled 789 yards rushing and 3,288 through the airways.... Stoudt has clicked on only 14 of 38 attempts this season for 160 yards and no touchdowns.... Versatile back Russ Musiel has rushed for 37 yards on only three carries, has caught nine passes for 115 yards, has returned three punts for 42 yards and has returned seven kickoffs for 128 yards.... Rugged linebacker Greg Fitzpatrick leads the squad in tackles with 17 solos and 13 assists.... YSU officials are hoping for a larger turnout than that 4,605 that attended the opener against Tennessee Tech.... Any YSU student can attend the game free with a validated I.D. card.

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YSU appoints Noe to assist athletic director

Pauline Noe (pronounced No-wee), an instructor in health and physical education at Thiel since 1973, has been appointed assistant athletic director here at YSU.

Noe replaces Helen Mines who resigned to assume a full-time teaching post at YSU in the health and physical education department.

A native of Johnstown, Pa., Noe will be responsible to athletic director Paul Amodio for the administration of the women's intercollegiate athletic program. She will also coach the women's softball team.

Noe commenting on her newly assumed duties said, "YSU has made big strides in the area of Title IX and has developed a well-balanced program which includes seven sports (field hockey, volleyball, basketball, gymnastics, swimming, softball, and synchronized swimming)."

"I'm enthusiastic about the progress of the changes dealing with the money allotments and scholarships (women now receive athletic scholarships at YSU), though we need to be careful so as not to repeat the mistakes of the men's programs," she added.

The need for recruiting female athletes and also for re-emphasizing the women's program from an extramural basis which it has previously been based on to a varsity level, has been cited by Noe. She said, "We need many more skilled athletes here at YSU in order to field all our teams and be able to compete on a respectable basis with the larger schools. I do not intend to buy athletes but rather sell the YSU sports program to them."

Noe earned a bachelor of science degree from Slippery Rock State College in 1968 and added a master's degree in education from the University of Pittsburgh in 1975.

In addition to her teaching chores at Thiel, Noe also coached the women's volleyball team, the men's tennis team and was the cheerleader advisor.

One of Noe's noteworthy achievements in the field of women's athletics was assisting in the recent formation of the eight-college Keystone Women's Athletic Conference, of which Thiel was a charter member.

Noe began her teaching career in 1968 in the New Castle School System and from 1969 to 1973 she served as a teacher and coordinator of elementary physical education for the Allegheny Valley Schools in Pittsburgh.
