
Where Should We Go From Here?" Binning announced the speaker will be a spokesman from the Asian desk of the United States State department.

"Panama and Cuba: What Choices for the United States?" Binning will lead this discussion group.

"United States-Soviet Relations: Whatever Happened to Detente?" Binning commented that a number of experts on the topic are under consideration to lead this lecture, but that as yet none had been selected. Binning remarked that the resource book included in the lecture series states no position on any foreign policy issue. "All sides of an issue are presented," he said, "to lead the reader to a reasonable understanding of a situation."

Although this is the first time the foreign policy discussion series is being offered at YSU, Binning said, other colleges and universities throughout the country have participated in a similar series sponsored by a national program of the Foreign Policy Association. Participants in the program throughout the country are invited to express their views on the topics discussed. "After each lecture," Binning explained, "each person votes and the results are sent to the National Association of Foreign Policy, to Congressmen and to the President of the United States."

This "parking advisory committee" is expected to be meeting again within the next few weeks. Another recommendation that has been brought up is a charge for parking at Republic Steel lot. which was hinted at when the lot was first made available last fall, One anonymous source told The Jambar that as time goes on and more students are forced to use the Republic Steel lot, such a charge will be imposed to compensate for the bus service. He added that the amount of the charge had not yet been decided, and consideration is being given to the feeling among students and




