The first library drive was held in 1938 at the suggestion of the American Association of University Women. The goal that year was set at \$5,000 and was met, as it has been in the succeeding years. Last year's goal was raised to \$6,123. The Library has grown from 9,500 volumes to 34,500, plus 4,000 in the law library, since the drives began.

James L. Wick, Jr., chairman of the college trustees, opened the drive with an address. Other speakers for the fund have included Dr. Louis A. Deesz, dean of the William Rayen School of Engineering., Prof. O. L. Reid, head of the social science department, Faul C. Bunn, superintendent of the schools, Mrs. J. C. #### The Newly Formed

INTER-RACIAL COMMITTEE might be compared to a beam of radar. Just as the magic searching rays were born of the pressure of war, the Inter-racial Committee has been formed to seek out and throw finto bold relief the racial differences which have caused no small amount of mis-understanding and friction among college students recently. The committee has set itself the task of putting these problems into proper focus.

When the lens is adjusted to its finest point our racial problem narrows down to the issue of whether activity books should be issued to colored students. But this core of the problem cannot be reached without a great many adjustments on both sides. Adjustments on more subtle factors not so easily seen and understood. The committee is determined to seek out these factors and thus make for readier understanding. Is it not true that we distrust most that which we do not know? The fog of distrust is thick, but it can be made to disappear before the light of mutual understanding.

The Inter-racial Committee has not set itself up as a band of pleading crusaders. Rather, they are a group of intelligent students bent on understanding a vital problem. They are not hot-headed idealists planning to attack a delicate problem which so many, in blind complacence, would ignore and feel safe in their ignorance. They realize the problem cannot be safely and sensibly ignored. The committee has the foresight to be interested in democratic understanding and justice. And, above allthe group is mutually tolerant—a much-hailed American virtue that is all too often hypocritically claimed.

The committee plans no step which will go against the will of the student body. They can go just as far as the intelligence of the college as a whole will let them. A study of the situation as it now stands on the part of students and administration is planned. Calm, sensible education for better understanding between the two races will follow.

The newly-formed Inter-racial Committee is a most valuable asset with which Youngstown College can do one of two things. The college can go on stumbling though the fog of mis-understanding and confusion over racial differences; thus retaining a lasting and growing liability in the form of racial discord. Or it can see its way clear to intelligent, mutual understanding by giving tolerant and thoughtful consideration to the committee's efforts.

It is up to you now to show the consideration you can toward the other organizations on campus and in turn, your own organization.

## Rules for Rushing . . .

Monday, Feb. 25, is the first day of rushing. For the next three weeks the members of the Greek social organizations will place their best foot forward and try in every way to please the rushee. There will be free cigarettes for the rushee. He will always be able to find someone to help him with his math, he will be asked out to lunch, and THE vacant chair in the Lounge will be reserved for him. The climax to this attentiveness will be the "rush" parties given by the sororities and fraternities.

Each sorority and fraternity is allowed to give three rush parties during the rushing season. These parties are given with the idea of helping the members and rushees to become better acquainted. For this reason it is important that a rushee accept every invitation extended to him. Out of courtesy, the R. S. V. P. should be answered. If the answer is negative your reason will show the organization that you are still interested in being rushed.

To be eligible for rushing by the Pan-Hellenic organizations, a student must be enrolled in the liberal arts school and be carrying 12 hours. A student with six hours in the day or night schools may only be considered by the night school fraternities.

The enrollment of YoCo this semester is so large that every student cannot be rushed. If you do not receive an invitation to a rush party, do not feel inadequate. Rather, try to understand the situation that faces the Greeks and continue to be the friendly individual you

Just as the rushee is beginning to enjoy the life of parties and free treats, a week of silence will begin. During Silent Week no member of any sorority or fraternity shall entertain or talk to any of its rushees or those of other organizations. Silence will reign among ALL Greeks and ALL rushees. 'This rule was made to insure freedom of choice and' to allow the individuals to choose the organization by his own judgment.

On the third day of Silent Week bids will go out to rushees. A bid is the formal invitation to the rushee asking him to become a pledge member of a fraternity. On the fifth day, he will answer the bid, negatively or affirmatively, and place it in the bid box in the main office. A student may accept only one bid.

These next three weeks are yours, rushees, so enter into the fun and get acquainted with the Greeks.


