
Paul Monteleon, Girard, Ohio Marquette and Ohio State University. Monteleon is an independent and president of Omicron Lambda fraternity.

On Dec. 16, 1621, Gov William Bradford and the Plymouth Colony gave thanks that their loved ones were safe and that a bountiful harvest had been reaped. This was a simple demonstration of faith in a new land that had seen half their members die from disease and starvation in their first year. This was the first Thanksgiving. To these hardy folk, these circumstances were cause enough to give thanks.

For us today, the import of Thanksgiving has lost much of its original significance as America has progressed from a country of agrarianism to that of a society dominated by industrialism. Concurrent with this obvious in our economic composition, there has been a change in our social attitudes toward those events that were greatly revered in a society of yester year.


