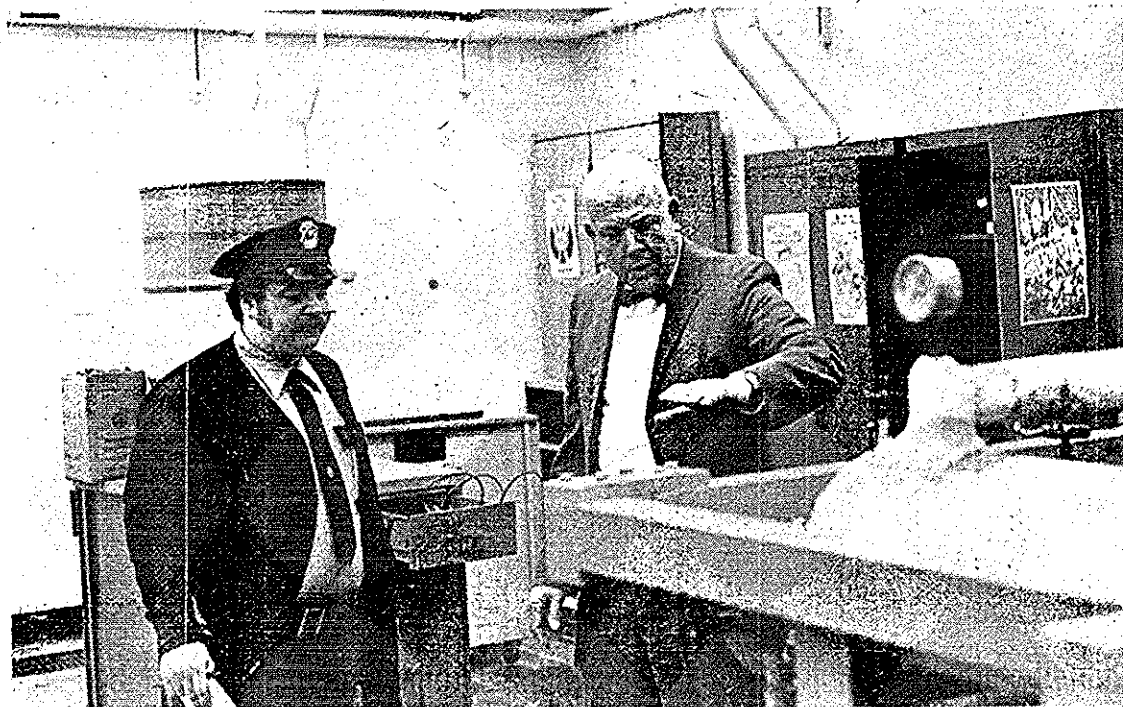

## Phi Tau's, Phi Mu's place first in annual Greek Sing on Friday

Phi Kappa Tau, Phi Mu and Sigma Phi Epsilon took top honors during the twenty-eighth Annual Greek Sing held Friday night at Stambaugh Auditorium.

Approximately 700 persons attended this Greek Sing which was dedicated to Phil Hirsch, director of Kilcawley Center.

This year's first place honors in fraternity competition went to Phi Kappa Tau singing "I Believe." Second Place went to Sigma Phi Epsilon and third

place went to Theta Chi. Lorilee Thomas, senior, F&PA directed Phi Kappa Tau.

The winners in sorority competition were Phi Mu singing "The Way We Were." Second place went to Delta Zeta which also won "Best New Group." No third place in sorority competition was awarded. Robert Paterniti directed Phi Mu.

Sigma Phi Epsilon took the "All Events" trophy. The trophy is awarded to the best fraternity who participated in sports, Greek

Sing and scholarship competition. The Panhellenic Council individual scholarship awards went to Kim Palazzo, junior, CAST, of Zeta Tau Alpha and Delta Zeta took the group scholarship award.

The Interfraternity Council scholarship award went to Robert Rudnicki, senior, Engineering, of Sigma Alpha Epsilon and Phi Kappa Tau received the group scholarship award.

Five YSU students were injured yesterday in two separate explosions in the Engineering & Science Building basement. YSU security and safety forces are currently investigating the causes of the incidents which occurred three hours apart.

All five of the students have been released from the hospital.

Alan Morella and Kevin Noble, juniors, chemical engineering, received cuts and burns from flying glass and steam in an explosion of a heat exchanger at 10:40 a.m.

Charles Slabe, Robert Bernardino and Oba Vincent, also juniors in chemical engineering, were injured by flying metal in an explosion of an oxygen calorimeter at 2 p.m.

Both accidents happened during two regular classroom experiments in Room 23. The experiments were not related. All five students were taken by ambulance to St. Elizabeth Hospital.

Noble was treated for lacerations of the left forearm and first degree burns of the chest.

Morella was treated for lacerations of the forehead and right hand and first-degree burns of the right arm and knee.

Slabe and Vincent were treated for minor lacerations. Bernardino was admitted in satisfactory condition with contusions of the abdomen.

The first explosion, injuring Morella and Noble, occurred while they were working with a heat transfer unit called a thermal convection, vertical and horizontal heat exchanger.

According to Dr. Stanley E.

Zager, chemical engineering, the unit creates steam from a separate supply of water. He first speculated that the "rate of flow of the water supply decreased, allowing steam to collect in the water lines, causing the explosion."

The explosion occurred at a point in the water line where a pyrex glass gauge, called a rotameter, is located. The rotameter is approximately two feet long and two inches in diameter.

Morella said that he and Noble were "adhering to the manual" during the experiment and do not know what caused the explosion. After the second explosion, Zager said that there "may have been a defect in the glass rotameter."

Zager also attributes defective parts as the cause of the second explosion. Bernardino, Vincent and Slabe were working with an oxygen calorimeter. The calorimeter is made of thick metal construction and is "supposed to withstand a pressure of at least fifty atmospheres," according to Zager.

The unit measures the heat of combustion of organic compounds and Zager said, "The experiment had required a pressure of only ten to fifteen atmospheres."

The calorimeter had "just been sent out for repair," Zager said, "and the unit should have been pressure tested."

Director of Security Dick Turkiewicz said that "YSU security would be investigating the explosion in conjunction with Safety Coordinator Phil Hirsch in order to find the cause and prevent something of this nature in the future."

## Wick pedestrian bridge used less than expected

"Neither rain nor sleet nor snow..." So goes the postman's motto and it apparently also holds true for a good number of the students, faculty and administration who use the Wick parking deck.

Despite the completion of the pedestrian bridge which spans Wick Avenue, despite signs instructing people to use the bridge,

despite the parking attendants' requests that people use the structure, many people who park in the Wick parking deck continue to use the street level exit.

And many of those people continue to cross Wick Avenue directly across from the University and not at the crosswalks because, according to most, it is more convenient.

One parking attendant

estimated that 40% of the people who use the deck use the Wick street level exit. He said, however, that most people use the crosswalks. A close observer, though, will discern that most of the people do not use the crosswalks at all.

Aside from the personal danger those jaywalkers are risking, they pose a serious threat to drivers on the heavily congested Wick

Avenue.

The University can do nothing about this problem though. According to Donald Minnis, director of auxiliary services, the University cannot force anyone to comply with a request to use the Wick pedestrian bridge, even though the street level exit of the deck is University property.

He explained that the pedestrian bridge was designed to

connect with the fourth floor of the deck because the deck is a "split-level" structure. Minnis said that because of this design, the University was bound to encounter "diehards" that would find the street level exit more convenient.

The Youngstown Police Department also intends to do nothing to stop those people from

## English Festival to be held at YSU for Junior, Senior high students

The YSU English Department will sponsor the second annual English Festival to be held on campus Thursday and Friday, April 24 and 25.

Dr. Carol Gay, chairperson of the English Festival Committee, reported that 550 students attended the English Festival last year. Gay said she expects an estimated attendance of more than 1,500 students this year.

Gay added that this year the English Festival has been expanded from one to a two-day event. Junior high students, grades 7 through 9, will attend April 24. Senior high students, grades 10 through 12 will attend April 25.

According to an English Festival pamphlet the purpose of the festival is to promote and reward

reading and writing skills on the junior and senior high school levels.

All students participating in the Festival must read six books selected by the English Festival Committee. All festival activities concern writing about, reading and discussing these works.

Each day of the festival is divided into six sessions. The first five stress student involvement and participation in the festival. The last will be a presentation of awards to those students who have shown outstanding writing, comprehension or oral participation abilities.

Festival activities include such topics as imaginative and analytical essay contests, writing games, book quizzes, workshops for

writing poetry, writing laboratory, dramatic performances, group discussions and tours of the Maag Library, WYSU radio-TV station, and a combination tour of the *the Jambar, Neon* and *Review*.

Over \$1,000 in prizes will be presented during the two-day festival. A total of 96 awards will be presented, \$870 in cash and several hundred dollars in books donated by various publishers.

The prizes include the Candace Gay Memorial Award established in 1978 in memory of Candace Gay, daughter of Professors Thomas and Carol Gay, English.

The award consists of \$100 given to a junior and senior high student who has shown outstanding writing ability at the English Festival.



## Continuing dilemma

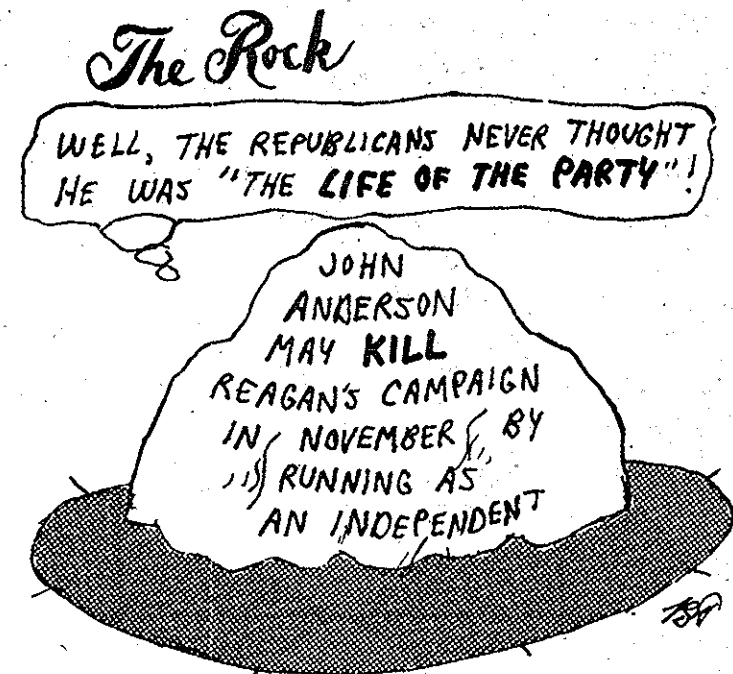
Once again, YSU is faced with a difficult problem. Not so long ago the problem was parking, or to be more precise, the lack of parking facilities. But then the University built the Wick parking deck and that solved the problem.

Alas, the University noticed that too many people were cutting across Wick Avenue and not using the crosswalks. (Or perhaps they even anticipated the problem.) So the University built a pedestrian bridge.

But now the University has realized that some people do not wish to use the pedestrian bridge. It is far too inconvenient for those people. The University is faced with a dilemma. It cannot force anyone to use the pedestrian bridge. It cannot turn to the police department for help. YPD has a "lack of manpower." (No doubt their traffic officers are far too busy ticketing parked cars which, by the way, are far more likely to jump out in the street and cause an accident.)

But the University is very clever. It is going to utilize "an attractive landscaping barrier," which translated means that it is going to line the University side of Wick Avenue with shrubs and the like in the hope that people will not jump over them. Very clever indeed.

As a matter of fact, the "landscaping barrier" idea is probably going to be far more effective than say, petitioning the city for a traffic light to be placed at the entrance to the deck or even a pedestrian crosswalk.



## Dismayed by previous inaccuracies

To the Editor of the Jambar:

The letter to the Jambar dated Feb. 26, from Thomas E. Ferguson, auditor of the state of Ohio, which letter was published in the Jambar Feb. 29, issue was recently brought to my attention.

I am dismayed at the inaccuracies presented therein by the auditor relative to Judge Charles J. Bannon's alleged refusal "... to allow the Auditor's office to become a party in the suit and to delay any action until we could file a memorandum explaining our position."

The record of the proceeding clearly sets forth:

1. That the undersigned as special counsel to the attorney

general of the state of Ohio, assigned to represent YSU, notified the state auditor's office of the filing of this matter, sending him a copy of the complaint filed.

2. Attorney Patrick Kerrigan appeared in open court and stated for the record that he was an assistant attorney general representing the auditor of the state of Ohio.

3. Bannon acknowledged Kerrigan's presence in court and requested that he come forward and sit at the counsel table.

4. Counsel for the parties stipulated that the state auditor be permitted to file an *amicus curiae* brief if the court requested briefs at the conclusion of the hearing.

As Ferguson well knows, Ohio law permits anyone having an interest in the subject matter of a lawsuit to file a motion seeking to be made a party defendant. For reasons best known to himself, Ferguson elected not to become a party defendant in this lawsuit.

It is the opinion of this writer, absent legislation to the contrary, that the Board of Trustees of a state university can authorize any expenditure in the office of the president that in their opinion reasonably relates to the purpose of higher education.

At the time of Bannon's ruling there was no statute or case law

## Lauds Koury's inflation battle

To the Editor of the Jambar: Our country must not have enemies within itself. If we have enemies inside our country this will make enemies in other countries our masters.

We must more then ever stick together as a solidified people. These are tough times which we have not seen the worst of.

The YSU student body, faculty and surrounding community must realize that the cost of living, especially over the past few years, has skyrocketed, while unemployment has increased. In the past year alone inflation has been more than 12 per cent. The result of high inflation has caused rising prices, insecurity of the dollar, higher bank loan rates and increased shutdowns of big business resulting in high unemployment. It is important that Student

Government shows leadership and justification of its spendings in maintaining the best atmosphere for the YSU environment. President of Student Government Tony Koury has shown this leadership.

Koury stated that if he was re-elected as president of Student Government he would turn down a proposed 10 per cent increase for his position. He is presently receiving a 1.0 scholarship of \$2,205 for fall, winter and spring quarter 1979-80. In addition he receives a .2 scholarship of \$441 as summer president.

As Representative at Large on Student Council I have witnessed Koury's hard work and dedication for the students. Throughout the summer and regular school year he could be found in his office doing paper work, talking with

and helping students. He is a hard-worker who has put in many more hours than the job requires.

Whether or not Koury is re-elected president the increase of 10 per cent, \$221 should be passed. The increase would make up for a deficiency of scholarship pay in the summer as compared to the other quarters of the year.

The scholarship for winter, fall and spring quarters is .33, \$735 a quarter. An increase of \$221 for the summer quarter would increase the summer scholarship from .2 \$441 to .3, \$662. This adjustment would be more reasonable. After all, the cost of tuition during the summer is no cheaper than the other quarters of the year.

presenting an obstruction to the flow of Wick Avenue traffic. According to Sargent Duvall, it is "a lack of manpower" which stops the department from enforcing the all but extinct jaywalking laws.

Because of this "lack of manpower," Duvall further explained, "It would take a tragedy or a near tragedy to focus any attention on this problem."

According to Minnis, though, the University may have a plan to put at least a partial end to this problem. He said the University is planning to us "an attractive landscaping barrier" to discourage people from crossing Wick Avenue.

Minnis said that one time the University considered installing a fence to run along the University side of Wick Avenue to either

crosswalk. He said that this plan was abandoned in favor of placing the more attractive shrubs along the sidewalk.

Minnis admits, however, that this will still not stop people from crossing the street and then walking along the sidewalk, but said it may have some effect.

In the meantime, nothing can or will be done to prevent those who utilize the Wick parking deck from crossing Wick Avenue wherever they please.

specifically prohibiting the expenditures complained of by the state auditor. The expenditures, therefore, were a matter of discretion with the Board of Trustees.

I understand that since the rendition of Bannon's decision authorizing the expenditures complained of, the state legislature has enacted legislation prohibiting some but not all of the expenditures complained of.

It is interesting to note that the expenditures complained of have been made continuously since the University became a state institution. The previous state auditor approved these expenditures as did Ferguson in previous audits.

I personally feel that had Ferguson taken the time to become fully acquainted with what transpired in Bannon's court room he would not have written the letter and that he owes the Board of Trustees and the president an apology.

## Penguins take two from Geneva then get bombed by Cleveland St.

The YSU baseball team notched its fourth and fifth wins of the season in a Saturday doubleheader with Geneva College, before dropping its second game of the season yesterday to Cleveland State.

In Saturday's twinbill against Geneva good pitching and timely hitting keyed a pair of Penguin victories.

In the first game freshman pitcher George Vuckovich went the distance for YSU, allowing just two runs on three hits and eight walks while striking out nine Geneva batters.

Dave Zeigler put on a hitting show with his 3-for-4 performance, including a home run, a double, two runs scored and three runs batted in.

Bob Gardner and Bill Hardy both turned in 2-for-3 days with Gardner driving in one run and Hardy scoring once.

The Penguins piled up the runs early by scoring twice in the first with Mike Nittoli and Gardner driving in the runs, and

tallied three more in the second as Scott Bass, Don Hawkins and Zeigler drove home the runs.

The final two runs for YSU came in the bottom of the sixth on Zeigler's homer, locking up a 7-2 win.

In the second game Dave Baker and Mark Schlarb combined

for a good pitching performance in a 5-2 Penguin victory.

Baker went the first five innings for YSU allowing two runs in the first, then hurling four scoreless innings before needing help from Schlarb for the final two frames. Baker allowed only three hits while walking five and

fanning five en route to the victory.

Over the last two innings Schlarb allowed one hit and one walk while gaining a pair of strikeouts.

Mike Moorhead was 2-for-3 to lead the Penguin hitting attack. Moorhead had a double and an RBI-single.

The YSU strategy in the second game closely resembled the first game as they built an early lead, and held on for a win. The Penguins scored twice in the first, twice in the second and once more in the fourth inning.

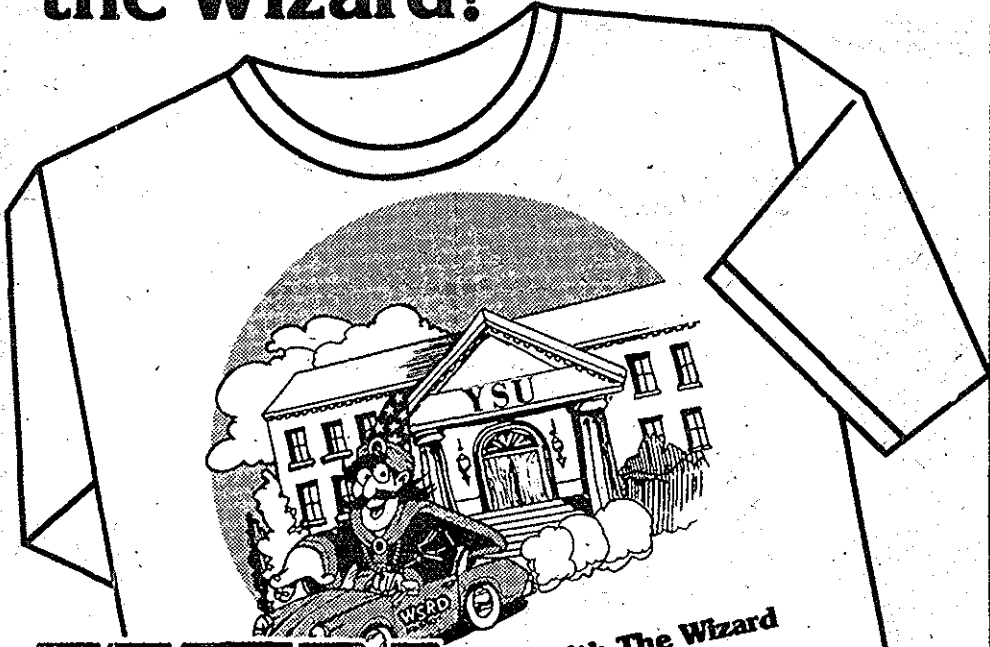
Yesterday's game with Cleveland State was tough to swallow with the YSU pitching corps absorbing a 19-4 loss.

Five Penguin pitchers made the trip to the mound, allowing 19 runs on 20 hits, walking six and striking out nine. Bob Haseley started and took the loss, and was followed by Mark Schlarb, Joe Scovelli, Rick Coles and Randy Cameron as coach Dom Rosselli spread the work out among his pitchers.

The hitting attack for the Penguins was sparse as they could manage only eight hits off of the two pitchers who worked for Cleveland State. Bill Hardy was 2-for-2 with a double and a run scored, along with an RBI. Jim Pallanty had a 2-for-4 day including a double and a run scored. Mike Nittoli homered to lead

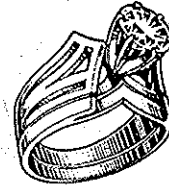
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Lyden, Dunn lead Penguins

Penguin netters suffer first loss of season

The YSU tennis team's undefeated record came to an end last Saturday when they lost to Western Michigan and Ohio University by the score of 2-7. The Penguins previously defeated Marshall University on Friday by a 7-2 margin in a quadrangular meet hosted by Ohio University.

In Friday's match, Terry Lyden featured for YSU by posting the best singles set score by defeating Mark Elliott of Marshall University 6-0, 6-2. Pierre Tanguay and Mike Fraley also

led YSU by matching Lyden's score in doubles competition.

Other singles victories include Bill Dunn (6-3, 6-3), Pierre Tanguay (6-2, 5-7, 7-6) score. Kurt Kamperman, on the other hand registered both losses for the Penguins by losing his singles match 4-6, 4-6 and his doubles match 6-7, 6-4, 1-6.

In Saturday's action against Ohio University, Bill Dunn paced the Penguins by posting the only winning scores for YSU. Dunn stroked over his opponent Brian Billette by a 6-2, 6-4 score and then went on to win his doubles

match by matching Lyden's score.

Other scores include Kamperman losing 2-6, 3-6, Tanguay losing 2-6, 1-6, Lyden losing 1-6, 4-6, Fraley losing 3-6, 2-6, and Thompson losing 4-6, 6-3, 6-7.

In Saturday's action against Western Michigan, Lyden led YSU as he posted the only two winning scores, Lyden defeated Scott Emig 7-5, 6-1 and later combined with Dave Thompson to register a 6-3, 6-2 doubles victory.

Singles losses came at the hands of Dunn (3-6, 4-6),

Kamperman (6-4, 3-6) Tanguay (3-6, 4-6), Fraley (4-6, 6-1, 4-6), and Thompson (0-6, 1-6).

The Penguins' record now stands at 6-2, and they will be looking for their seventh victory of the season today.

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Softball team overcomes fast-pitch woes while rolling in fifth straight YSU victory

By taking both games in Saturday's doubleheader with Wright State, the YSU women's softball team now has a five-game winning streak going for them, after recording victory scores of 2-1 and 4-1.

The next YSU win holds dual significance for the team as it will mark both the 400th win in the history of YSU baseball, and the 400th career win for head coach Dom Rosselli.

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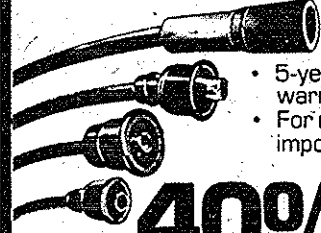
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
