## Continuing dilemma

Once again, YSU is faced with a difficult problem. No so long ago the problem was parking, or to be more precise, the lack of parking facilities. But then the University buil the Wick parking deck and that solved the problem.
Alas, the University noticed that too many people were cutting across Wick Avenue and not using the crosswalks. (Or perhaps they even anticipated the problem.) So the ersity built a pedestrian bridge
But now the University has realized that some people do not wish to use the pedestrian bridge. It is far too incon venient for those people. The University is faced with a dilemma. It cannot force anyone to use the pedestrian bridge. It cannot turn to the police department for help. YPD has a "lack of manpower." (No doubt their traffic officers are far too busy ticketing park cars win, by an accident.)
