Students present research at international respiratory conference

Two Youngstown State University students are presenting their research at an international respiratory care conference in Las Vegas in December.

Dana Strollo and Lauren Furnkase, both seniors studying respiratory care, will be among professionals, physicians and Ph.D.s in the field from all over the world at the 56th American

Association for Respiratory Care International Respiratory Congress.

The YSU students are participating in the four-day conference's Open Forum symposium to discuss "Effect of Signal Loss on Respiratory Rate Recording with a Clinical Oxygen Dose Recorder." The presentation details their analysis on patient oxygen needs during pulmonary rehabilitation.

Strollo and Furnkase's study is an extension of faculty research conducted by Teresa Volsko, director of the YSU Respiratory Care and Polysomnography programs and assistant professor of Health Professions; Kate Tessmer, assistant professor of Human Performance and Exercise Science; Rachael Pohle-Krauza, assistant professor of Human Ecology and Michele McCarroll, former assistant professor of Human Performance and Exercise Science.

The faculty members looked at oxygen levels of exercising pulmonary rehabilitation patients from St. Elizabeth Hospital in Youngstown. Using the data collected, Strollo and Furnkase then performed laboratory work to study devices that could be used to capture a patient's respiratory heart rate and blood-oxygen saturation level. This information can be used to determine the required oxygen levels of patients during rehabilitation.

Volsko, who acts as the students' faculty advisor, called Strollo and Furnkase's findings "highly significant." She continued, "They give respiratory therapists an idea of how to interpret the data obtained from this particular piece of monitoring equipment—the abstract outlines the reasons why clinicians can't just take the raw values this device provides at face value. The abstract also provides information that is clinically relevant in the pulmonary rehabilitation setting. Therapists can use that information to make changes on how much oxygen they deliver to a patient during the pulmonary rehabilitation session."

Volsko added that the study has "definite potential for development of a full manuscript." The students plan to submit their work to the *Journal of Respiratory Care*.

YSU has one of leading respiratory care programs in the country in terms of the number of students presenting individual or faculty-directed research, said Volsko. The program was profiled in *AARC Times* magazine last year.

ODOT official appointed head of YSU CTME

Joann Iudiciani Esenwein of Lowellville, formerly the capital planning manager at the Ohio Department of Transportation, is the new director of the Center for Transportation and Materials Engineering at Youngstown State University.

The Center, formed in 2006 in the College of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics, is one of only 22 such U.S. Department of Transportation-funded research centers in the nation.

"We are excited to be able to bring an individual of Joann's caliber to YSU," said Martin Abraham, STEM dean. "Her background and skills will allow us to become more engaged in transportation research that has a direct impact on the Mahoning Valley."

Esenwein has 30 years of experience with the Ohio Department of Transportation, including stints as a project engineer, design engineer, consultants contract coordinator, major/new coordinator and, for the last 10 years, capital planning manager. She earned a bachelor's degree in civil engineering from YSU in 1980, and a master's degree in business administration from YSU in 2003.

Abraham said the focus of the Center for Transportation and Materials Engineering is on applied research and applications, through the use

of materials engineering and advanced manufacturing to increase the longevity, mobility, and sustainability of the nation's transportation infrastructure. Currently, the

Center has about 10 ongoing research projects studying issues such as new brake rotors for vehicles, electric vehicle charging stations, vibrations resulting from vehicles entering bridges, and fish passage under bridges.

Abraham said Esenwein will help put the focus of the Center squarely on transportation.

"We would like to become more engaged in the efforts of ODOT to develop the transportation infrastructure in our region," he said. "It is my hope that she will become engaged with local transportation bodies such as the regional council of governments, WRTA, the Port Authority and the like, so that we can better integrate research into application."

NewsOutlet begins voting for 'Assignment Youngstown'

Public voting begins this week for "2011: Assignment Youngstown," a project of Youngstown State University's TheNewsOutlet.org that allows citizens to have a voice in deciding what stories and issues matter most to them and to the city.

The NewsOutlet team has assembled plans for six stories it believes should be told and carried by Mahoning Valley media organizations. The story ideas were developed after NewsOutlet staffers, consisting of YSU students, attended community meetings in the city and talked to residents about their concerns and what they are noticing happening in their neighborhoods.

But TheNewsOutlet wants more input and is now launching the next step in its "2011: Assignment

Youngstown" project. Citizens can rank the six story packages that TheNewsOutlet has developed. Those rankings will then be tabulated and used to guide which stories are pursued.



Once reported, written and produced, the stories will then be carried by Mahoning Valley media, including *The Vindicator* and WYSU FM – two founding partners of TheNewsOutlet.org. The stories will be made available, free of charge, to any interested media organization, including bloggers or others. The only requirement is that the NewsOutlet be given credit for the work.

Voting is taking place online at www.thenewsoutlet.org as well as on paper at all branches of the Public Library of Youngstown and Mahoning County.

TheNewsOutlet.org, funded by The John S. and James L. Knight Foundation and The Raymond John Wean Foundation, is a joint venture between YSU's journalism program, WYSU-FM, The Vindicator, the Mahoning Valley Organizing Collaborative and the Public Library of Youngstown and Mahoning County. Launched in September 2010, TheNewsOutlet.org has produced dozens of stories examining such issues as a malfunctioning city crime watch network, illegal dumping on the City's East Side and life in a drug rehabilitation program.

"The NewsOutlet serves a great purpose for YSU journalism students, media organizations and the community. Students gain valuable experience that will help them when they are looking for permanent positions. The media organizations who pick up our stories get valuable content and most of all, citizens get information that they need in order to make decisions about their lives," said Tim Francisco, co-director of TheNewsOutlet and a journalism faculty member.

Journalism students at YSU, under the direction of Journalism Director Alyssa Lenhoff and Francisco, report and write the stories. Todd Franko, editor of *The Vindicator*, and David Luscher, associate director of broadcasting of WYSU, work closely with the students on story development and editing.

Franko said he believes the work of TheNewsOutlet has already played an important role in the community. Gary Sexton, director of broadcasting at WYSU-FM, said, "Stories from the NewsOutlet allows WYSU-FM to provide its audience with NPR-quality local news stories for the first time in its 41-year history."


