#### YSU SMARTS is semifinalist for national award

For the second time in four years, Youngstown State University's SMARTS program has been recognized as one of 50 semifinalists nationwide for the prestigious 2010 Coming Up Taller Award.

SMARTS – Students Motivated by the Arts – was selected from nearly 500 nominations for the award that recognizes outstanding community arts and humanities programs for America's young people. Finalists will be named by the end of June.

"We are highly impressed with the successful work your organization and the other semi-finalists have accomplished in youth after-school and out-of-school arts and humanities learning," says the letter notifying SMARTS.

"We value your important work and thank you for your organization's time, energy and expertise devoted to our America's youth," the letter says.

The letter is signed by the leaders of the President's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities, the National Endowment for the Arts, the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Institute of Museum and Library Services.

"SMARTS' success is the result of much hard work and dedication by the SMARTS staff, teachers and students, the generosity of many local foundations and donors, and the support of YSU," said Becky Keck, SMARTS director.

SMARTS was also named a semi-finalist in 2006.

SMARTS, created in 1997, is an arts education project of the YSU College of Fine and Performing Arts, the Beeghly College of Education and the many vital arts organizations in the region. It is one of YSU's premier programs for diversity and community engagement. The program gives students in grades kindergarten to 12 free classes in visual arts, music, dance, theater, and creative writing and early learning opportunities in a living/learning laboratory for YSU students. SMARTS after-school, Saturdays, and summer programming reaches thousands of students and community members each year.

# Global Green chief featured at Sustainable Energy Forum

Matt Petersen, president and chief executive of Global Green USA, will speak at Youngstown State University's second annual Sustainable Energy Forum Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, June 6, 7 and 8 on the YSU campus.

More than 100 people, including U.S. Rep. Tim Ryan, Youngstown Mayor Jay Williams and Warren Mayor

Michael O'Brien, as well as representatives from China and Israel, are expected to attend the international

conference featuring presentations and discussions on topics ranging from wind and solar energy to biofuels and carbon capture.

The forum kicks off 5 p.m. Sunday, June 6, in the Schwebel Auditorium in Moser Hall on the YSU campus with the screening of the documentary film "11<sup>th</sup> Hour." The 2007 film documents the problems facing the planet's life systems, including global warming, deforestation, mass species extinction and depletion of the oceans' habitats. The screening is free and open to the public. Peterson will lead a discussion following the film.

Peterson will also participate as the forum continues June 7 and 8 with general sessions and presentations, as well as workshops and roundtable discussions on biofuels, carbon capture/sequestration, energy efficiency, liquid fuels from coal or natural gas, energy storage and grid, wind and solar energy, fuel cells/electric vehicles, and landfill/digester gas. Sessions will be led by regional and national researchers, developers, manufacturers, technical experts and government leaders in the field of sustainable energy.

The forum is sponsored by YSU, Roth Brothers Inc., the Raymond John Wean Foundation, Dominion, ms Consultants Inc., Energy Industries of Ohio and NorTech.

Peterson joined Global Green USA in 1994. He previously was executive director of Americans for a Safe Future. He serves on the Council of Green Cross International, and is chair of the GCI Energy and Resource Efficiency program. Petersen drives and guides Global Green USA's new programs, including work on water and energy, green power, climate change, and nuclear weapons. In the aftermath of the Gulf Coast hurricanes, Petersen put forth a vision and mobilized resources to create the Global Green "Healthy Homes and Smart Neighborhoods" initiative, which resulted in the New Orleans Sustainable Design Competition; the NOLA Green Schools Initiative funded by the Bush Clinton Katrina Fund; and work with Habitat for Humanity throughout the Gulf Coast to create more energy efficient housing.

Petersen is an advisor to the Leonardo DiCaprio Foundation, a member of the Pacific Council on International Policy and serves on the Environmental Media Association Advisory Board, as well as the Automotive X Prize Advisory.
