THE 1982 MASSEY LECTURES produced in October by the CBC. Each year, the CBC commissions a scholar of international distinction to undertake original research in his or her special field. This year, noted American psychiatrist Robert Jay Lifton focuses on the psychological effects of the potential threat of nuclear war. INDEFENSIBLE WEAPONS will be heard in five parts on Saturday afternoons at 1:00 from April 23 to May 21.

- April 23 THE WORLD OF THE BOMB — ABSURDITY AND ILLUSION. Yale University Professor Robert Lifton explores what he calls the absurdity of nuclear preparedness and the illusion created by discussions of nuclear limitations and control. He says that arguments of protection, survival and recovery all add up to self-deception.
- 30 IS HIROSHIMA OUR TEXT? Lessons derived from Hiroshima, and the wrong conclusions about the existence of an "outside world" that would continue after a nuclear war.
- May 7 A BREAK IN THE HUMAN CHAIN. The psychological effects of the nuclear arms race, including the sense of "futurelessness" which plagues us today.
- 14 NUCLEAR FUNDAMENTALISM. A comparison of the development of nuclear weapons and the growth of political and religious fundamentalism.
- 21 IMAGINING THE REAL. Lifton looks at the emergence worldwide of the fear of nuclear war, and the growing movements against it. He also discusses the psychology of individual change and collective transformation.

May's programming brings some all-time jazz greats and a tribute to Los Angeles, leading off with the legendary **EARL "FATHA" HINES**, with bassist **RON CARTER** and guitarist **JIM HALL**. On May 14, the 84-piece **NEW AMERICAN ORCHESTRA** teams up with the **MODERN JAZZ QUARTET**. And West Coast Jazz is celebrated by reedman **JOE FARREL**, pianist **GEORGE CABLES**, a group called **SALSA PICANTE**, trumpeter **BOBBY SHEW**, pianist **BILL MAYS** and bassist **JOHN HEARD**.

## NPR PLAYHOUSE — SUNDAYS AT 4:30

Pioneer novelist Willa Cather, poet Stevie Smith, and 19th-century Philadelphia eccentric "Crazy Nora" — these unconventional women lived outside the accepted norms of their day. This quarter NPR PLAYHOUSE pays tribute to these women of wit and courage, with portrayals by critically acclaimed actresses Colleen Dewhurst and Glenda Jackson.

The salute opens with the three-part docu-drama "Willa Cather: A Look of Remembrance," starring Colleen Dewhurst as the fiercely independent American author who memorialized frontier life in such novels as "O Pioneers!" and "My Antonia." Chronicling the Pulitzer Prize-winning novelist's 40-year friendship with journalist Elizabeth Sergeant, the series etches vivid impressions of Cather the woman and the writer. Included are comments from authors Truman Capote, Eudora Welty and Doris Grumbach; violinist Yehudi Menuhin, and literary critic Alfred Kazin. The series begins on May 8.

On May 29 and June 5, Glenda Jackson re-creates her heralded stage and screen role in "Stevie," a portrait of the reclusive English poet Stevie Smith and her obsession with life, love and death.

Jane Moore portrays the Philadelphia legend "Crazy Nora," a 19th-century Irish immigrant who lived for a time on the charity of the church. After a vicious power struggle in the parish, she felt betrayed by her protector, Father William Hogan, went mad, and lived the remainder of her life as a street person collecting debts for a percentage of the amount owed. Crazy Nora's story is told on NPR PLAYHOUSE on June 12 and 19.
