In mid-February WYSU welcomed a new member to the announcing staff, Dana School of Music graduate and former WYSU employee Mike Cervone.

Mike, you might recall, did some work for us as a student some years back, handling the Sunday morning classical music announcing from 1989 through 1993. After his graduation, armed with a Bachelor's Degree in Music, he went west to take on Chicago, where he has been working full time at the Museum of Broadcast Communications for the past 4 years.

Mike says the two main loves of his life — aside from his wife, Lisa, of course — have been music and radio, and that is a combination that will certainly be showing itself in Mike's airwork as he takes over the 1:00 - 5:00 pm spot during the weekdays. (Don't worry, Barbara Krauss is still here, moving to the morning shift.)

Music has always been an integral part of Mike's life. As a youngster, he joined the Austintown Boy's Choir, sang in various church choirs as both soloist and chorister, and then went on to major in voice at the Dana School of Music. His stage experience included a role as Sir Joseph Porter in the Youngstown Symphony Orchestra's 1992 production of *H.M.S. Pinafore*.

At the Broadcast Museum in Chicago, Mike served as archivist for the Radio Hall of Fame; did both on- and offair production for a Saturday afternoon "old-time radio" program on WNIB/Chicago called *Those Were the Days*; and gave lectures to touring groups on the history of radio and broadcast principles. In addition, he volunteered his time working with area high school students in Illinois where he helped launch an internet radio station which, when completed, will have the power to broadcast the students' productions locally and around the world.

Mike's knowledge, expertise, and enthusiasm will be a wonderful addition to the staff of WYSU. He says he's happy to be home. We're happy about that, too.

1998 marks the 900th anniversary of the birth of an extraordinary woman, Hildegard von Bingen. Born in 1098, she lived during an era when few women could read, and fewer wrote, but she produced major works of theology, science,

and music, and founded a vibrant convent where her musical plays were performed.

A burgeoning interest in the life and works of this composer/nun/mystic -- dubbed "the Sybil of the Rhine" -- has swept both sides of the Atlantic during the past five years. Hildegard of Bingen, a Mystic's Music, will sample a variety of recent recordings to underscore the appeal of Hildegard's music.
