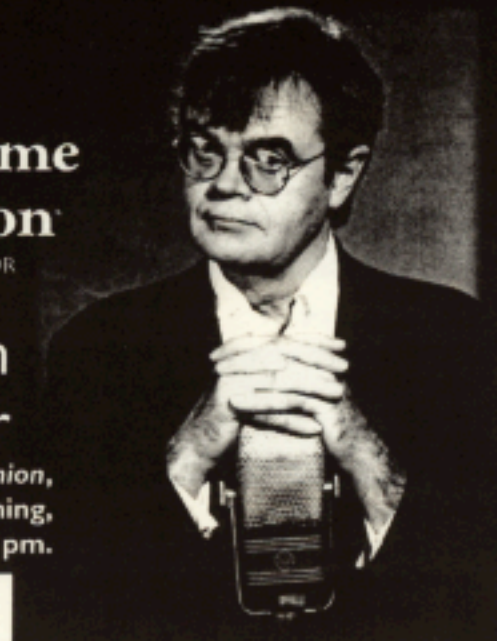

Youngstown 2010 Simulcast, Part II

WYSU-FM, in a simulcast with PBS 45 & 49, will present a live broadcast of the second installment of *2010 Moving Ahead: A Forum for Reporting Progress*, on Wednesday, Sept. 17 at 8:00 pm. This edition of *2010 Moving Ahead* will focus on one of Youngstown's neighbors, Akron, and how that city has dealt with problems similar to those of the Mahoning Valley.

"Youngstown and Akron share some striking similarities, especially as cities with one-industry legacies," said Jeremiah G. Blaylock, producer/director for PBS 45 & 49. "In this edition of *2010 Moving Ahead*, Youngstown leaders will talk to Akron leaders about how Akron has worked to overcome the decline of the rubber industry and revitalize both the city and local industry." Until the late 1970s, Akron was known as the Rubber Capital of the World and depended on that one industry for its tax base and its largest local employer - very much like Youngstown's relationship with the steel industry. And like the steel industry, the rubber industry fell into sharp decline in the 1970s, as manufacturing jobs were sent south or out of the country, leaving large numbers of residents without employment. Soon enough, the downtown area began to decline as well.

The one-hour program will look at the revitalization of downtown Akron, and panelists will explore what Youngstown can learn from the mistakes Akron has made

along the way. In addition, *2010 Moving Ahead* will update viewers on the progress of the Youngstown 2010 plan.

Featured in the program will be Jay Williams, director of the Youngstown Community Development Agency; Hunter Morrison, director of Youngstown State University's Center for Urban and Regional Studies; and Jeffrey Wilhite, deputy director for planning for the City of Akron. Reporter Gerry Ricciutti of WYTV/News Channel 33 in Youngstown will serve as host.

Youngstown 2010 is a comprehensive plan to define the city's role in the new economy and to make the region a healthier and better place to live and work. *2010 Moving Ahead: A Forum for Reporting Progress* is a series of quarterly broadcasts in which community leaders update Mahoning Valley residents on progress toward meeting Youngstown 2010's goals. Each program focuses on one or two dimensions of the plan, such as health care, education, religion, parks and recreation, the arts and more.

2010 Moving Ahead: A Forum for Reporting Progress is a co-production of PBS 45 & 49 and WYSU-FM. Executive Producers: Don Freeman, PBS 45 & 49, and Gary Sexton, WYSU. Producer/Director: Jeremiah G. Blaylock, PBS 45 & 49. Associate Producer: Jim Stipetich, PBS 45 & 49.

Anne Garrels in Baghdad

With bombs falling and the constant threat of sniper fire, NPR's senior foreign correspondent Anne Garrels reported each day from Baghdad throughout the recent war in Iraq. One of only 16 American journalists who stayed in the besieged capital, she was at the very center of the storm. Soon after the U.S. military reached the city, Garrels left Baghdad and returned to the United States, where she wrote a book about her experiences. *Naked in Baghdad* provides readers with a vivid account of the sights, sounds, and smells of the recent war. The book is scheduled for release in September.

Q: Your book is titled *Naked in Baghdad*. In an interview with NPR's Susan Stamberg after your return from Baghdad, you explained that you chose to broadcast naked so that you could use a smuggled satellite phone to file reports for NPR. What would have happened if the smuggled phone had been discovered?

A: Well, that's a good question. Happily, I was not found. The reason I broadcast naked was in a sort of desperate effort to give myself a few extra minutes as the security goons went on their regular sweeps of the hotel looking for the illegal equipment that we had. I figured that if I answered the door naked, I'd get a few minutes to shut the door, hide the phone, throw on a dress that I had laid out ready for such an event, and then let them in. Those people who were found with illegal phones were either expelled or, during the war, four were detained for eight days in solitary confinement, and we did not know their whereabouts until they suddenly appeared safe and sound in Jordan. The best scenario was that you would be expelled. The worst scenario would be that, as happened, people were detained and suspected of espionage.

NPR World of Opera Saturday, 1:30 pm

9/6 Carlisle Floyd: Cold Sassy Tree. The World Premiere production of the latest score from one of America's finest (and most frequently performed) opera composers, *Cold Sassy Tree* is based on a poignantly comic novel by Olive Ann Burns. (The title character is actually a small town, by the way). This Houston Grand Opera production features soprano Patricia Racette in the role of Love Simpson.

9/13 Verdi: Nabucco. You know the old saying, "Hell hath no fury like two women who both think they've been scorned by the same man." Or something like that. Anyway, that's sort of what happens in this "period spectacle" by Verdi, set in ancient Jerusalem and Babylon, during the reign of the fearsome Nebuchadnezzar (*Nabucco*). This Houston Grand Opera production features Samuel Ramey and Sergei Leiferkuss.

9/20 Barber: Vanessa. A man with too much love and women with too much time make *Vanessa* a fascinating tale of a love triangle among aunt, niece, and the son of an old lover. In her Washington Opera debut, Dame Kiri Te Kanawa sings the title role in Samuel Barber and librettist Gian-Carlo Menotti's Pulitzer-prize winning opera.

9/27 Verdi: Aida. This innovative Washington Opera production features a fast-rising star: Soprano Maria Guleghina, who "fills the hall with gleaming sound" (The New York Times) in her acclaimed portrayal of the slave Aida. Franco Farina, one of the most critically lauded tenors on the international stage, is Radames, captain of the Egyptian guard.

10/5 Bartok: Bluebeard's Castle & Puccini: Gianni Schicchi. LA Opera presents a splendidly balanced double-bill: Bartok's horrific opera about a mysterious Duke and his bride, who finds more than skeletons in her new husband's closets; and Puccini's dark comedy, featuring a gaggle of schemers and a con-artist who recreate their rich, but quite dead, relative.

10/12 Verdi: Rigoletto. Verdi's indelible masterpiece is the vivid profile of a bitter old man who mistakenly murders the one person who brings joy to his life. Dmitri Hvorostovsky is Rigoletto in this Houston Grand Opera production.

10/19 Your Favorite Opera Highlights, with Michael Cervone.

10/26 Tchaikovsky: Eugene Onegin. A brooding masterpiece, Tchaikovsky's dark drama deals with a caddish aristocrat whose indifference towards others eventually turns full circle, and comes back to destroy him. Bo Skovhus is Onegin and Zvetelina Vassileva is Tatyana in this Houston Grand Opera production.

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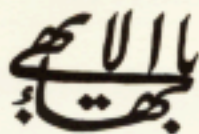


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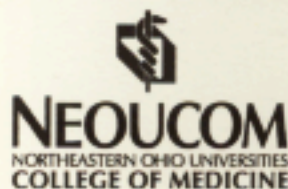
