

EMMA'S REVOLUTION AT 11TH ANNUAL FOLK FESTIVAL CONCERT

Musician and award-winning songwriter Pat Humphries has been called a "true spirit-child of Woody Guthrie." Pat and Sandy Opataw make up the duo emma's revolution, and they will be performing on Friday, November 4 at 8:00 pm at the 11th Annual Folk Festival concert in Peaberry's in the YSU Kilcawley Center. This free program is hosted by Charles Darling. Pat's much acclaimed anthems "Keep on Moving Forward (Never Turning Back)," "Common Thread," and "Swimming to the Other Side" are sung at peace and justice events around the world and have been translated into seven languages.

"If I Give Your Name" by Sandy Opatow and Pat Humphries was the Grand Prize Winner in the Folk Category of the prestigious John Lennon Songwriting Contest. The song sheds light on the silent suffering of family members of undocumented workers lost on 9/11 in the World Trade Center.

In May 2002, Pat and "Swimming to the Other Side" were featured on NPR's All Things Considered. In the interview, Pete Seeger said, "The powers that be can control the media (but) it's hard to stop a good song . . .Pat's songs will be sung well into the 22nd century." 

POWER RUN WRAP UP

Six months ago, shortly after undergoing knee surgery to repair a torn cartilage, Gary Sexton, director of broadcasting for public radio station WYSU-FM 88.5, began an intense training program to run a 50-mile ultra marathon that that he hoped would raise money to help finance a new transmitter for the station. Under the expert tutelage of personal trainer Rick Kattouf, Gary finished the race on Saturday, September 17 in 8 hours, 44 minutes and 36 seconds to complete a grueling course in the Manistee National Forest Park on Michigan's Upper Peninsula.

Fortunately, weather was perfect for the race, but the ordeal was still more than Gary had bargained for. A nagging leg injury a week before the race threatened to compromise the outcome, but Sexton never doubted he would complete the course. "The first 30 miles were pretty easy, and the hills weren't too bad," said Sexton, a veteran runner who has competed in several other 26 mile marathons. "But the second loop

around was a different story." It took every ounce of energy and will power to complete the last 8 miles, but he did it, with his wife Sue running the last leg of the course along side him, for added support.

What gave him the idea to run the marathon to raise money? "We needed the extra funds, and the only two things I know how to do pretty well are run and play the trombone. I didn't figure anyone would want to sponsor me to play the trombone, so I decided on the marathon."



11/07 Mozart: Idomeneo. Houston Grand Opera; Patrick Summers, conductor. Idomeneo isn't one of Mozart's most frequently-played operas, but it is one of his finest -- filled with sharply-drawn characters, brilliant arias and ensembles, and stunningly beautiful choral music.

11/14 Gershwin: Porgy and Bess. The Washington National Opera; Wayne Marshall, conductor. A stellar cast brings us all the hits, from "Summertime" straight through to "I'm On My Way," live from the stage of the Kennedy Center Opera House, on the banks of the Potomac in Washington, DC.

11/21 Mark Adamo: Lysistrata (World Premiere). Houston Grand Opera; Stefan Lano, conductor. In Lysistrata, the men of Athens and Sparta are constantly at war. That is, until the women of the two battling city-states threaten their warriors with the ultimate weapon -- abstinence!

11/28 Gounod: Romeo and Juliet. Houston Grand Opera; Emmanuel Joel, conductor. Gounod was among the few composers to ever make a successful opera based on a Shakespeare play and one of even fewer to make an operatic hit out of this one, perhaps the greatest dramatic

tragedy of them all.


12/05 Verdi: Falstaff. Houston Grand Opera; Patrick Summers, conductor. Shakespeare's outwardly comic play tells reams about the human condition. If anything, Verdi took the deceptively profound tale and made it still richer and more rewarding.

12/12 Verdi: Il Trovatore. Houston Grand Opera; Patrick Summers, conductor. When it comes to Il Trovatore, opera lovers have long debated the glories of Verdi's music versus the issues many have with its less than subtle libretto and less than coherent plot.

12/19 John Adams: El Niño. Atlanta Symphony Orchestra and Chorus; Robert Spano, conductor. Adams' sweepingsetting of the Christmas story is both compellingly contemporary and filled with ancient traditions, including medieval carolers, Latin American poets, and a children's chorus.

12/26 Humperdinck: Hänsel and Gretel. Milwaukee Symphony Orchestra; Andreas Delfs, conductor. This NPR-recorded production is a perfect Christmas confection.

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
