### Jazzscapes, with Rick Popovich Friday and Saturday, 7:00 pm

**2/4 New Releases.** Hammond organist, Sam Yahel's Naxos jazz release, *In The Blink of an Eye*, is featured.

**2/5 Terence Blanchard.** Diverse forums, not fragmented career moves, mark the development of this wanderlusting trumpeter/composer.
