President Pugsley called the meeting to order. He asked for additions or corrections to the minutes of the December 1966 meeting. There being none, the minutes were approved as distributed.

## Academic Standards Committee Report

Dean Dykema briefly stated a resolution which the committee plans to present to the Senate at a later date relative to a catalog statement regarding graduation requirements.

#### Committee on Conversion Report

Mrs. Smith reported for the committee, outlining the changes made thus far for next year.

Calendar — the calendar will stand essentially as approved at the last meeting.

Major and minor - a major will be 45 quarter hours, an exact conversion. A minor will be 21 quarter hours. In reply to a question as to why a minor is to be 21 and not 24, Dean Dykema stated that these hours are minimum and the catalog provides that the chairman of a department may require more.

A conversion table, outlining each course change, is being requested from each department head by February 15. These will be available for the use of advisers for pre-registration for fall.

The committee discussed the need for faculty workshops of some type to acquaint all advisers with changes. Some orientation with the high school counselors may also be needed.

#### Registration for Spring

Mrs. Smith called the attention of the members to the dates for registration as outlined on the Bulletin.

Wed., Jan, 25, Incoming and transfer students

Thurs., Jan. 26, All students not previously enrolled.

Fri., Jan. 27, All students currently on probation, These students are not receiving their bills by mail.

Sat., Jan. 28, All students on probation as a result of the current semester's grades.

Changes of registration \_ a dat may be set prior to the opening of school.

Otherwise changes will be made the week of February 6; no changes will be permitted after February 11.

#### Fall Schodules

In reply to a question, Mrs. Smith stated that schedules for fall arc due on February 15.

## Curriculum Committee Report

Dean Smith reported in summary form the many changes approved by the committee. He moved that the report be accepted. Dean Dykema seconded the motion which passed.

## Upward-Bound Program

Mr. Klasovsky told about the Upward-Bound Program held last summer. About 30 high school junior boys attended classes and lived on campus for eight, weeks in a program funded by the Office of Economic Opportunity. The purpose of the program was to provide boys who might be potential "drop-outs" with the opportunity to prepare for college. Follow-up studies indicate the program was quite successful.

## Colice Program

Mr. Foster discussed a special institute which is to be held for policemen ander Title I of the Higher Education Act.

# Mitional Science Foundation Program

Dr. Yozwiak explained the institutes held the past several summers for high school mathematics teachers. To date, 212 teachers have participated. The success of the institutes has been demonstrated in improved programs in local schools and better prepared freshmen. Members of the mathematics department have also been engaged in conducting workshops for elementary teachers and in speaking to parents.

#### Associate in Arts Program

Mr. Earnhart reported on the A. A. Program started this year. Students participating in the program were either in the lower third of their high school classes or scored very low on the entrance examination. They carry a restricted load of specified courses, It is too early to tell how the program is working. Cf the 212 in the program this fall, 201 have indicated they plan to register for the spring semester. In addition, 50 new students will be admitted to the program.

## School of Mursing

President Pugsley discussed the School of Nursing program to be started next fall, Finish consist of a two-year program. The curriculum is being worked out and will to approved by the Curriculum Committee.

### Best Wishes to Dr. Nelson

President Pugsley expressed good wishes to Dr. William Nelson as he leaves on February 1 to accept a position at the Univ. of Pittsburgh. Dr. Nelson stated his appreciation for having been elected to the Senate through the years and for being selected to serve on its committees.
