REPORT OF THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS COMMITTEE

This report was given by the Chairman, Mr. John Boland.

Mr. Boland stated this Committee had no formal report for the Senate today.

The Constitution and Bylaws committee distributed to the Full Service Faculty on March 16, through the Secretary of the Senate, the following:

The Constitution and Bylaws **Committee** was charged this year to examine and make recommendations regarding the nature and composition of the University Senate. The sections of the Constitution

under review are Articles III, Section 1 and 2 which appear as follows:

Section 1. Authority and Powers. The Senate is the representative body of the Faculty. The Senate's powers are commensurate with the functions and responsibilities of the Faculty recognized in Article II, Section 5.

<u>Section 2. Members.</u> The President, the academic and administrative Deans, the Business Manager, the Registrar, the Director of Admissions, the Director of Public Relations, the Librarian, Directors of Divisions, Chairmen of academic Departments and Supervisors of other academic units, and any other administrative officers so designated by the President shall be members <u>exofficio</u>. Full service faculty members equal in <u>numbers</u> to members <u>ex-officio</u> shall be elected as representative <u>members</u> from each College or School in proportion to its total class credit hours taught in the Fall Quarter.

The Constitution and Bylaws Committee would like comments regarding any changes you would like to have considered by this Committee. Placed on the Reserve Shelf of the Library are copies of Faculty or University Constitutions and Bylaws from the following Universities: Bowling Green State University; Cleveland State University; Kent State University; Miami University; Ohio State University; Ohio University; and Toledo University.

Dr. Pugsley stated:

As one goes through the Catalog comparing offerings in the Catalog and the frequency that some of the courses are offered it is foolish to carry courses that are not offered as part of the University operation.

Some courses are offered more frequently than others (small sizes for some of them) and these are offered Quarter after Quarter and year after year. Should at least consider that classes that are quite small, should these be questioned? The broader understanding that exists with the faculty is wholly desirable and the faculty should be included in this.

Dr, Pugsley further stated one person thought we owed it to the student to offer a course, even if it is small, because it was included in the Catalog. This is a problem that requires continual study, What majors and what minors should an Institution provide? Is it feasible to offer, (for example), a major that has only three or four people in this major?

REPORT OF COUNCIL ON CONTINUING EDUCATION:

This report was given by Mr. Jack Foster.

Mr. Foster stated a Summary State of Operations for Department of Continuing Education had been distributed earlier to Senate members. Hopes this material meets with Senate approval, He stated

STATEMENT OF OPERATIONS DEPARTMENT OF CONTINUING EDUCATION TECHNICAL AND COMMUNITY COLLEGE

NOTE: "The following statement of operation summarizes a more detailed statement prepared by the Department of Continuing Education and then was approved by the Council of Continuing Education." (Dr., Lawrence Looby).

- 1. The Department of Continuing Education is an educational unit functioning within the Technical and Community College. This Department will have the responsibility of providing programs of value in leadership and service to the citizens of Youngstown and the surrounding communities, While the Chairman reports directly to the Dean of the Technical and Community College, the Department has the responsibility for being of assistance to the entire University faculty and staff.
- 2, Continuing education activities include non-credit courses as well as credit and non-credit conferences, short courses, seminars, institutes and workshops. Those offerings not for credit will be of university caliber equivalent to the regular academic program.
- 3. A proposal for a conference, institute, seminar, or workshop where academic credit is to be earned will originate with the department involved and subsequently be approved by the Dean of the School, the University Curriculum Committee, and the Faculty Senate. Copies of the proposal should be sent to the Department of Continuing Education at the time of initiation and the Department of Continuing Education will be informed of the adoption or rejection of the proposal and any stage in this procedure.
- 4. The University must be an official partner in all continuing education programs presented at the University and must contribute to these activities in an educational manner. The University and the Department of Continuing Education must do more than simply provide physical accommodations for outside organizations wishing to use the facilities of the university,
- 5. The use of the University facilities for programs of a continuing education nature will not be permitted unless they are officially scheduled through the Department of Continuing Education,

- 6. Whenever possible, continuing education programs will be scheduled in advance as part of the faculty member's regular load and the Department of Continuing Education will pay that portion of the faculty member's salary. A full-service faculty member may be directly reimbursed on an over-load basis at the rates specified for limited-service faculty when it is not possible to schedule the activity as part of the faculty load and such services are deemed critical for the proper presentation of a program offered by this Department.
- 7. Adults wishing to enroll in non-credit classes, conferences, institutes, workshops and seminars will make application directly to the Department of Continuing Education. Those adult students enrolling in continuing education credit programs must meet the usual requirements of the University Admission's Office.
- 8. Budgets for credit and non-credit conferences, institutes, seminars and workshop programs will be submitted to the Department of Continuing Education at the initiation of the program. The Comptroller will assign an account number for these continuing education programs upon receipt of budget and the University Business Office will honor requisitions only after the Comptroller has assigned this account number.
- 9. Approval for certificate programs will be the responsibility of the Faculty Curriculum Committee, the University Senate, and the President and Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University.

1) Dr. Hahn: regarding point #6 of Continuing Education report; "whenever possible, etc., as part of the faculty member's regular load."

What does "whenever possible" mean? This can affect a faculty member's activity in another part of the University?

- <u>Dr. Looby Ans.</u>: Hopes to get as much faculty involvement as possible. Hopes to work this out with Department Chairmen involved and possibly the faculty member could be released, and the Department of Continuing Education would pick up that portion of the faculty members salary. This would have to be worked out in conjunction with his Department Chairman.
- 2) Dr. Hahn: Does the faculty member have the option for the part-time load?
 Dr. Looby Ans.: Yes.
- 3) Dr. Hotchkiss: Stated he had questioned the interpretation on this also with Dr. Looby. Dr. Hotchkiss stated he was satisfied with responses given him by Dr. Looby.
- 4) Regarding point #7 of Continuing Education Report: A student asked: What are "adult students"?
 - Mr. Foster Ans.: It is so stated to distinguish from High School vocational students.

REPORT OF FACULTY AFFAIRS COMMITTEE:

This report was given by the Chairman, Dr. Raymond Hurd. Dr. Hurd stated he had no additional report to make. He reviewed the discussion on the Faculty Affairs Committee Recommendations of "One-year of Service."

Dr. Hurd stated:

The Motion as amended (from page 8 of Minutes of March 6, 1970 reads complete as follows: Discussion should center around this Amendment:

"One full year of service ordinarily consists of full-time employment for Fall, Winter and Spring consecutive Quarters at Youngstown State University or its equivalent elsewhere.

If summer service is rendered when obligatory in lieu of a Quarter in the regular academic year the substitution of one summer of full-time service is allowed for one Quarter of the academic year,

Provided that no more than two Quarters of the probationary period are spent on leave of absence or sabbatical leave, such leave will not affect the years of service."

SENATE MINUTES CONT'D.: (April 3, 1970) REPORT OF FACULTY AFFAIRS COMMITTEE CONT'D.: (Dr. Hurd)

- 1) Dr, Hahn stated his reasons for making the Amendment:
- 1) Original intention of the Faculty Affairs Committee was to cover such a case when people were required to teach in the Summer instead of a regular Quarter during the year,
- 2) For what Quarter or academic year is it to replace? This Amendment puts it in proper place, It is specific,
- 3) Although we do not have the policy of requiring people to teach in the Summer, it at least makes this **Summer** matter **precise**. Could be many types of cases,
- 2) Dean **Dykema:** What are we being asked to consider?
 Full service during Fall, Winter and Spring Quarter, Has
 it been approved? A leave of absence of not more than two Quarters,
 etc.; whether or not an "obligatory" summer, etc.

Dean **Dykema** felt there were three (3) things we were involved in. Going to suggest that if we were to extricate the three items we could come to a more definitive conclusion,

- Mrs. Dykema (Parliamentarian) stated: The Senate has already passed the first and third sentences; want a wording for the second sentence. This is the Amendment to the second sentence.
- 3) Faculty member: What about the President's proposal?
- This letter was attached to the Minutes of March 6, 1970 following page 8 of those Minutes.
- 4) Dr. Hahn: We do have to consider what is on the floor. The Parliamentarian is correct, The first and third sentences are passed, We will (the Senate) make a recommendation and then this goes through the President to the Board of Trustees.
 - Dr. Pugsley stated: a few of the extended discussions have been sent to the members of the Board of Trustees; the minutes of this meeting of the Senate will also go to them for a full understanding of your deliberations. Dr. Pugsley said he was bound to present to the Board of Trustees the recommendations of the Senate body. The Board will come to the proper decision.
- 5) Dr. Behen: Stated he would like to have Dr. Coffield speak on the word "obligatory". This would seem to be largely a matter of administrative concern (referring to word obligatory). Would like to know how Dr. Coffield feels about this proposal?
 - Dr. Coffield stated: He did not expect to speak, This will be his own opinion, Holds that the three (3) Quarters (Fall, Winter, Spring) make up the academic year and the letters of the Faculty

COMMENTS CONT'D.: Dr. Coffield cont'd.:

so state. Summer School Committee makes up the Summer appointments, etc. The Summer is not an obligation. It is a mutual advantageous venture, Does not foresee as long as we have about one-third of the size of the enrollment that anybody would be obligated or coerced into teaching Summer Sessions. Cannot see counting this toward tenure, or the term "obligatory".

6) Mr. Foster: Is this even feasible? Would like to give a different point of view. **Is** it a policy that the University dannot write a faculty contract and use the Summer Term unless it is for twelve (12) months?

Furthermore, they cannot pay a faculty member unless they are teaching. Cannot select any three Quarters as your contract year. If this is true, then there is no point to the whole business. You cannot substitute the Summer for any of the other three Quarters,

The implications were that faculty members would like to be gone Winter Quarter. This cannot be done. Such a contract would not be issued by the University.

7) This is somewhat beside the point, stated another faculty member. Under the present regulations of the University and the policy the Motion before the floor is **congise**, relevant and it can do no harm to pass it,

The situation may arise in the future in certain Departments where faculty members may be asked to teach the Summer where it is hard to staff a Section, This could be safely passed, At present it is obviously not applicable.

Dr. Hurd: Regarding Mr. Foster's statement: In some of the State Schools of Ohio require persons to take Summer Sessions.

REPORT ON THE BOARD OF REGENTS" FACULTY ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Meeting of March 9, 1970

By F. J. Tarantine, Department of Mechanical Engineering

The Chancellor started by stating that there are five pieces of legislation involving higher education pending in the Ohio General Assembly.

1. <u>H. B. 251</u> — Hadley-Schinnerer; This bill was introduced in the spring of 1969, deals with the matter of faculty work load, The bill was delayed to allow the Inter-University Council (I.U.C.) to study the matter and submit a report, The report was recently completed and apparently has not been well received by the legislators.

The Chancellor feels that it is a good and interesting report but doesn't agree that there is no way to measure faculty work loads; but, there must be some way of measuring this for both budgeting and staffing purposes. The report states that 80% of the 40-hour minimum work week (or 32 hours) should be spent on instructional duties; e.g., preparation, grading, student counseling, etc. The remaining time provides for administrative duties, non-budgeted research, and public service activities. The Chancellor's main criticism of the report was that it recommended unanimously the broad standards given above but did not specify any administrative procedures for executing them.

The report made no positive recommendations on the matter of administrative salaries and staffing, except that the matter should be left alone. The Chancellor said that the Legislative Education Committee, and in particular Mr. Schinnerer, feels that they had not received the guidance and positive proposals for action which they had requested from the I.U.C. The Chancellor expressed the opinion that this whole matter will come up again next year,

In response to a comment that current legislative criticism represents a "needling" of the universities, the Chancellor agreed that both pending bills and the committee interest in faculty work loads represents legislative "needling", but advised that it can be ignored by universities and faculties only at their own peril. These actions represent pressures which call for correction actions by the universities and the faculties if legislative mandates are to be avoided.

2. <u>H.B. 955</u> -- Hadley-Schinnerer; Taken from the Warren-King Report to implement their recommendation to authorize the B.O.R. to manage certain aspects of University administrative operations. Included

in this bill are operating procedures for the areas of student admissions and records, purchasing, nonacademic personnel, accounting, budgeting, space utilization, and space scheduling. The Chancellor said he would be called upon to testify on this bill,

- 3. <u>H. B. 1111</u> -- Netzley; This bill proposes to pay faculty persons on the basis of the number of student-credit hours of instruction produced.
- 4. <u>H. B. 1014</u> -- Pease: This bill seeks to regulate the admission of students to universities, The House Education Committee recommended passing it; it now rests in the Rules Committee. It is expected that the General Assembly will enact a Joint Resolution directing the Legislative Service Commission and the B.O.R. to jointly make a study of the admission policies, practices and procedures of all state universities.
- 5. <u>S. B. 488</u> Corts: This bill calls for the establishment of four-year programs in Teacher Education and Business Administration at branches which have anFTE enrollment of at least 1000 students and are more than 30 miles away from the nearest four-year campus. The Lima and Mansfield branches qualify at the present time. The bill has been recommended by the Senate Education Committee and has passed the Senate, The Chancellor stated, however, that he didn't expect the House to pass the bill for political reasons.

The Chancellor expressed his opinion that while certain of the House bills might clear the House Education Committee, he did not anticipate enactment of any higher education legislation during this Session.

PUBLIC OPINION: Dr. Millett reported that a recent public opinion survey had been taken in the state by a competent polling organization on the public's attitude toward higher education. He said the results had been quite encouraging on the whole in assessing citizen opinion and support for higher education, but that two principal criticisms were clear. First, there is great public dissatisfaction with regard to the inability to maintain law and order on our compuses. Secondly, there is citizen uncertainty about the general effectiveness of university management.

<u>Two-year Colleges:</u> The B.O.R. has asked several management study groups to submit a proposal for studying the status and making recommendations on two-year colleges for the state.

The Chancellor was questioned on the amount of State support given to Community Colleges. He replied that presently, the maximum state support for capital money is 75% with a minimum .of 25% coming from the community. The operating cost is to be divided equally (in thirds) between the student, community, and state. In practice, however, he said the state is contributing about 50% with

the other 50% coming from the student and community. In the case of branches and technical institutes, the sharing has been equally divided between the State and the student, inasmuch as no local tax sources are available.
