Geog. and Polit. Science <i>No action yet</i>	An analysis of contemporary American health care delivery. Each subsystem is considered with respect to its organization, social function, objectives, financing, legal responsibilities, and interactions with other subsystems; these include medical manpower; hospitals and residential care facilities; federal, state, and local health agencies; epidemiology and pathology as it relates to human variation; physiological adaptations and environmental factors; spatial organization, and distance as factors in planning and meeting needs; consumer behavior and incentives in health care. Fundamentals of fibers, yarns, fabric construction and finishes as related to selection, serviceability and care. Two one-hour lectures and one three-hour laboratory per week.

Home Economics Advanced Textiles

prereq. Home Ec.  
504, Chemistry 503

*held*

Study of chemical and physical properties of textiles; new developments, testing procedures, and standards applied to fibers and fabrics. Three one-hour lectures and one three-hour laboratory.
