ACADEMIC SENATE
May 20, 1977

ATTENDANCE: (See attached attendance roster.)

The meeting was called to order at 4:10 by Dr. Jean Kelty, chairperson of the Senate.

MOTION TO CHANGE ORDER OF AGENDA ITEMS

Christine Dykema made a motion to move item 5 - the Charter and ByLaws Committee report - to the beginning of the agenda. Second by Dr. Largent. Motion carried.

Charter and ByLaws Committee - Dr. Hahn reported.

Addition to ByLaw 5, Section 2

Passed

At all Senate meetings the Secretary shall maintain a record of attendance as evidenced by signatures of members. A summary of attendance shall be distributed prior to the at-large elections each year.

Dr. Hahn moved the addition of ByLaw 5, Section 2. Second by Dr. Dalbec. Discussion followed. Question called. Motion carried.

Change in ByLaw IV, Section 1

Passed

Section 1 Chairman (and Vice Chairman) of the Senate

- a) All Senate members shall be eligible for election as Chairman (or Vice Chairman) of the Senate.
- b) Candidates for (these offices) shall be nominated at the organizational meeting of the Senate. (The person receiving the highest number of votes shall be chairman and the person receiving the second highest number of votes shall be Vice Chairman).
- c) The term(s) of office shall be for one year beginning with June 1.

Dr. Hahn moved the change in ByLaw IV, Section 1. Second by Dr. Spiro. Question called. Motion carried.

Change in ByLaw V

Passed

Section 1 Chairman (and Vice Chairman)

The Chairman shall preside at all Senate meetings and perform such other duties as are required. The Chairman shall be responsible for the communication of all Senate action to the Administration. (In the event the Chairman is temporarily unable to preside, the Vice Chairman shall preside. In the event the Chairman resigns or is unable to perform his duties, the Vice Chairman shall assume the Chairmanship.)

Dr. Hahn moved the change in ByLaw 5. Second by Dr. Spiro. Discussion followed. Dr. Del Bene moved to amend that the nominator will check with the nominee to see whether they are willing to serve. Motion received a second. Dr. Secrist noted that all persons nominated are contacted to see if they are willing to serve. Dr. Del Bene withdrew the amendment. Question called on the main motion. Motion passed.

This ByLaw will be operative upon voting acceptance of the faculty of Article III, Section 4a.

Motion to change Article III, Section 4a Passed

A Chairman (and Vice Chairman) of the Senate. . . .

Dr. Dalbec moved the change of Article III, Section 4a. Motion received a second. Question called. Motion carried.

NOMINATIONS FOR CHAIRMAN OF THE SENATE

Dr. Cohen moved the nomination of Dr. Jean Kelty as chairman. Second by Dr. Dykema. George Glaros nominated Dr. Donald Hovey. Seconded.

Dr. DiGiulio moved that the nominations be closed. Dr. Dykema seconded. Motion passed.

Dr. Singler moved to close the nominations. Seconded and passed.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF MAY 6 MEETING

Dr. Largent moved approval of the minutes. Motion received a second. Motion carried.

Executive Committee - Dr. Ameduri reported.

All appointments to the Senate Chartered Committees have been made. (Copy attached to the minutes), They hope to complete the list of recommendations for Administrative Committees by their meeting on May 23.

Academic Affairs - Dr. Khawaja reported.

He gave a brief summary of the committee's actions. They received 10 proposals and requests for information. Eight proposals have been acted upon, one is being considered today, and one is still in committee.

Recalculation of G.P.A.

Failed

Dr. Khawaja moved and Dean Sutton seconded the motion. Discussion followed. Clarification - Under this policy a "C" grade cannot be petitioned. Points of discussion included: students who are not honor students might qualify for honors if "C" grade can be petitioned; inequitable treatment of students because it discriminates between "C" and "B" grades; employers can view the complete transcript. Question called. Motion failed.

Elections and Balloting Committee - Dr. Secrist reported.

The report is attached to the minutes.

Academic Events - The report is attached to the agenda. No motion required.

Computer Committee - Dr. Sturm reported.

Motion 1 That all academic project proposals shall be reviewed by the Computer Committee of the University Senate. This Committee shall recommend allocation of academic programming and analysis hours, not to exceed $\frac{1}{2}$ of the total budgeted, to the University Budget Committee through the Vice President of Academic Affairs. Passed

Dr. Sturm moved approval of motion 1. Second by Dr. Largent. Dr. Del Bene representing the Data Services Committee spoke against the motion. Motion 1 is addressed to a long range plan included in a 10-page document in the Guide to the Computer Center by Data Services Policy Committee. If motion 1 were passed, it would be saying that the Senate can have some authority in dictating to the computer staff of the administrative office how they should spend their time.

- 1) This policy helps to plan for programming services by the computer center staff. When this policy was being written, there was a member of the Computer Committee on the Data Services Committee. The Computer Committee, through the representative, did not indicate they objected.
- 2) Vote on policy was 8 for, 0 against.

Point of order Is she speaking for or against the motion? Against.

Second point This motion could have opposite effect than that desired. This must be coordinated with the computer capability. The motion is vague - $\frac{1}{2}$ of what time - The Budget Committee does not oversee the Computer Center.

Dr. Del Bene moved that the matter be sent back to committee. Second by Dr. Dalbec.

Dr. Dobbert (non senate member recognized by chair) What is the intent of the Computer Committee? - are they trying to take the job of the Research Committee? Answer: The charge is to coordinate computer activity, and they want to screen academic activity. Academic proposals have had trouble getting computer time allocation approval.

It was noted the report referred to by Dr. Del Bene ranked projects in A.B.C.D fashion and academic matters fared badly.

Dr. Largent - The academic area is restricted.

Dean Sutton - Opposed to referring back to committee. This has caused frustration and aggravation. One of the objects of the Computer Center is to allow for student use. The students should be given the opportunity to use it.

The committee did not have full details on the report referred to by Dr. Del Bene. More discussion followed.

Clarification: Is the motion to send back to committee? Answer: Yes.

Vote on sending back to committee: Motion failed.

Motion to accept Motion 1. Dr. Dalbec moved to amend by inserting "computer related" between "all and "academic". Second by Dean Sutton. Question called. Amendment approved. Dr. Charles Smith recommended that $\frac{1}{2}$ be changed to 60%. Second by Dean Sutton. Discussion followed. Motion carried.

Motion 1 - Question called. Motion carried.

The revised motion now reads:

That all computer related project proposals shall be reviewed by the Computer Committee of the University Senate. This committee shall recommend allocation of academic programming and analysis hours, not to exceed 60% of the total budgeted, to the University Budget Committee through the Vice President of Academic Affairs.

At this point a quorum was lost. Meeting adjourned at 5:15.


