Report to ACADEMIC SENATE, December 7, 1983 Meeting:
Academic Standards $\varepsilon$ Events Committee
P.W. von Ostwalden, Chairman

The Committee consists of 13 members ( 9 faculty, one of which is exofficio/Prof. Rost, Chm. of Acad. Program $\varepsilon$ Curr. Committee/2 administrators, and 2 students) and has 1 student secretary.

We meet weekly (except in weeks with Senate meetings) for at least 1-1 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours.

The major project before the Committee is the old problem of 'Minimum General Requirements for Graduation' at YSU. (The Committee intends to address other projects only after the conclusion of this main project.)

The complex problem of Gen. Grad. Requirements has been worked on by this and other committees for several years. Its history has been eloquently presented to the Senate and, separately, to our Committee by Prof. Gould. He was the chairman of the "Ad Hoc Committee on General Requirements." Their efforts were summarized in a memo of June 2, 1981, commonly known as the 'Gould Report."

Subsequently, our committee under the chairmanship of Prof. Joan DiGiulio continued work on the problem during 1981/82. At the occasion of a report on the project to the Senate, some senate members felt that a broader input and hearings from all segments of the University were needed to address the problem properly.

Accordingly, during the past academic year under the chairmanship of Prof. Hugh Earnhart, extensive hearings of faculty, chairmen, and most deans were held. On May 26, 1983, a majority of the Committee voted for a proposal which forms the basis of our present considerations. The details of this proposal will be presented to the Senate at a later time since they are still under debate.

At our 2 nd meeting (Oct. 12) I gave a draft of a comparison table of the present YSU requirements and the proposed requirements to our committee members which was strictly meant for internal use. While the table is not secret, it certainly is not as yet part of our official proposal.

At present, the Committee works on the formulation of a rationale for its proposal. As suitable starting point, we began to rewrite the present area requirements for graduation (YSU 1983/84 Bulletin, p.41). The rewriting is almost ( $80-90 \%$ ) completed.

As for the presentation of our new proposal to the Senate, we plan to proceed as follows:

After the rationale has been formulated (presumably in the course of the Winter Quarter), we will distribute copies of the proposal, the rational, and the rewritten area requirements to all Senate members. All members will have a chance to consider the material prior to a formal meeting of the Senate. At that time, a motion will be made to adopt the proposal.

ACC said that a Search Committee has been formed composed of three members of OBOR. The committee members are C. William Swank (Chair), N. Victor Goodman, and Helen H. James. He stated that he was sure that Richard L. Krabach, Chair of OBOR, would work closely with the committee. A job description has been draw up and the position has been advertised nationally. Additionally, the committee has met with Governor Celeste who supported their efforts to find a strong perso for the position and agreed to meet personally with any of the serious candidate

Miscellany Two items of interest were passed on to FAC. The situation of financing at the OSU-Marion Regional Campus is still unresolved, but is now in the hands of the OSU administration. CM thanked FAC for its openness with him. He said that it was the primary that he had as Chancellor that kept him in touch with faculty. He reviewed $i$ his years in academia and what they had meant to him and his family.

CM discussed at some length the future of higher education and urged the members of FAC to continue to show leadership in their respective schools. He ovined thi the next few years were going to be difficult, but that the fight was worth it. He reminded everyone that education is the fabric of civilization and will syris: The issue is, he asserted, what its nature would be. He concluded that educauvrs must become assertive advocates of the value of education to society.

CM explained the development of the merger story. In an interview with the Akron Beacon-Journal when asked about the idea of an Akron-Kent merger had replied that it was not desirable. He added, however, that cooperation/merger between Kent and Cleveland State, especially at the graduate level, did make sense, and that it should be seriously looked at by the two schools. This led to the headline that he advocated merger.

CM in response to a question about legislative interest in dependent fee waivers stated that each institutional president has been asked to suppiy precise ifgures on the cost of their respective programs. This has resulted from a request from a state senator. $C M$ asserted that the OBOR stance on this matter is that such waivers are an integral part of institutional fringe benefit packages.

CM said that opinions are split on the possible outcome of the vote on the two ballot issues. It is clear that the yes margin has eroded, but whether enough is not clear. He expressed his regret at the fact that some politicians have bef ur to politicize the issues.

ACC dice agree to forward the letter from FAC to the Search Committee and asked Ginger Jacob to write hin a similar letter concerning e possible meeting with the Governor. he did continue to indicate, however, his reservations about the process.The question of articulation between two year and four year schools in the arts requirements was raised anew with ACC. He pointed out that there were two possible separate issues involved - that of course transfer and that of blanket arts acceptance. He stated that he would pursue the matter and raise it with the two and four year college presidents. the Firelands Campus of Bowling Green. ACC responded that the program had been approved by OBOR although it appears that BGSU had not asked for voluntary clearance from CHINO which OBOR prefers to have done. The normal pattern is for an individual to develop a lire experience portfolio which is then submitted for review and evaluation. OBOR holds that if credit is granted it should be related to a specific course (s). He added that Sinclair has been active in the development and use of this approach.
