Academic Events Committee Report Academic Year 1996-97

The main task of the Academic Events Committee was data analyses from the survey of faculty and student opinions regarding commencement.

One hundred eighty-seven faculty members participated in the study. The majority of faculty supported the major characteristics of the present ceremony.

One thousand one hundred and ninety-six students participated in the study. Students were strongly in favor of adding a fall ceremony and were divided on whether gowns should be black or school colors.

Additional concerns raised by faculty were: the relevance of the speaker; training for hooding; an increase in the number of marshals; screen projecting images of students' faces as they receive diplomas; and entrance of students from four directions.

The committee met with R. Bevly, Events Coordinator University Relations, to apprise him of the survey results. Suggestions under consideration are: a larger number of marshals and adding a projection screen behind the trustee platform.

During the next academic year, the Academic Events Committee will conduct a survey on possible changes to the honors ceremony.
