Meeting of Board of Trustees

May 27, 1947

1. Minutes of the Meeting of March 17, 1947

2. Enrollment

The summer session will start June 16. Over 1400 students have already indicated their intention of attending this session, and it is expected that total enrollment will be around 1800 for the ten week term.

Although it is difficult at this time to estimate fall enrollment, plans are being made for a total enrollment of about 3600 students. Of this number, 1200 will be new freshmen, and 200 will be transfer students from other colleges.

3. Tuition Increase

The tuition charge per semester has been raised \$12.00, effective September, 1947, bringing the total tuition to \$112.00 a semester for the average load of fifteen class hours. Additional work will cost \$7.00 a semester class hour. Incidental fees now average \$20.00 to \$30.00 a year; however, fees are being reviewed and it may be necessary to raise some of these. Music tuition will be \$200.00 a semester, including three private lessons a week.

4. Salary Adjustments

The Salary Committee of the Board of Trustees has approved salary adjustments for the faculty totaling \$15,260. These adjustments will be effective July 1, 1947, at the beginning of the College fiscal year. Individual adjustments range from \$100. in most cases to as high as \$1,000.

5. Leaves of Absence

The following instructors have been granted leaves of absence to continue their graduate work this summer: Miss Mary Ellen Pagaroll (Psychology), Mrs. J. E. Smith (Health and Physical Education), Miss Valentina Potor (Mathematics), T, C. Smith (Mathematics). Dr. Wilcox will have the summer free for travel.

6. Government Surplus Equipment

Since the March 18, 1947, report to the Board, government surplus equipment amounting to \$16,000 total fair value has been received by the College. Major items in these shipments include drawing tables, mechanical engineering equipment, and chairs.

7. Butler Property

Purchase of the Butler property (90 foot frontage on Wick Avenue and 70 foot frontage on Bryson Street) was completed on May 26. The house will be used as the president's home. Arrangements will also be made for an economics seminar class to meet in the house this summer, and art students to meet there this fall. Part of the house will be occupied during the summer by Mr. McCormick, the engineer in charge of the government building project on campus, as he has been unable to find living quarters in Youngstown.

8. Government Temporary Buildings (College Annex 1,2,3,4)

The completion date of the government buildings is July 5, 1947. However, one of these buildings will probably be ready for use during the summer term.

The buildings will provide seven classrooms and law library space on the first floors, and art, chemistry, and biology laboratories, and faculty offices on the second floors. The classrooms will have an average capacity of 60-75 students.

The government is financing \$100,000 of the cost of reconstructing the buildings. Certain additional changes, not included in the government contract, will cost the College between \$6,000 and \$7,000. The hot air heating system originally in the buildings is not suitable for classrooms, and is to be replaced with steam heating connected with the central power plant. Additional insulation and wall lining of plywood have been installed for further weatherproofing. Extra finishing work includes sanding, staining, and varnishing the floors, and repainting the outsides of the buildings. The College will also lay concrete walks to connect the buildings.

9. Commencement Week Activities

The Baccalaureate Service will be held in the First Presbytorian Church at the corner of Wick Avenue and Wood Streets, on Sunday evening, June 1. Academic robes for members of the Board of Trustees will be available in the Rayon Building just previous to the Baccalaureate Service.

Commencement will be held in Stambaugh Auditorium on Friday evening, June 6, with Prosident C. I. Pontius of the University of Tulsa as speaker.
