III Statement of Inspection

On February 18 an Inspection Committee composed of the following members of the Ohio College Association:

P. L. Stradley, Entrance Examiner, Ohio State University - Chairman President Otto Mees, Capital University Dr. Schwartz, Registrar, Akron University Dean D. T. Schoonover, Marietta College

came to Youngstown to inspect Youngstown College in order that they could ascertain if the college should be granted membership in the Ohio College Association. This committee began inspection at 9 A.M. and continued until 6 P.M..

The committee did not make known the results of their inspection because they will report directly to the executive committee of the Ohio College Association, which will, in turn, act upon our application.

While they were unquestionably agreeably surprised by many phases of our college work, I do not think that we will be recommended for admission into the Ohio College Association at this time because of our lack of endowment funds. We do hope, however, to gain considerable from this inspection because they are going to give us a written, detailed report of what they found, and in this way many weak spots in our college program will be point out and we will be able to correct at least some of these conditions. We certainly do know that four college representatives left Youngstown College having more information and because of this, more interest in our college.

V. F.E.R.A. Magazine and Report

The inspector for the F.E.R.A. visited Youngstown some time ago and after completion of his inspection, stated that he considered Youngstown College to be among the four highest in the state, in the manner in which the Federal Emergency Relief Funds had been disbursed and administered. There are between 40 and 50 colleges in the state of Ohio receiving F.E.R.K. funds.

At a recent meeting in Columbus called by the F.E.R.A. Administrators, the question was discussed as to whether or not these funds would be available for the next school year. The Assistant Administrator from vealington tated that in his opinion these funds would be available at year.

Is it the wish of the Board that providing these unds are allocated to Youngstown College next year, that we continue to use them to improve our college library?

VI. Facult Additions or the thoo ear 1935-1936

In view of the fact that the enrollment is increasing year by year in Youngstown College, it is the recommendation of your President that two additions be made to our faculty this fall:

- 1. That we endeavor to secure a man to head the English Department of Youngstown College as we do not have a professor to head this department at the present time, and also to lighten the program of the Dean of the College.
- 2. That a man be hired to assist in the Biology Department.

VII. Scholarships

For the past two years the College Board has authorized a fund totaling \$1500. to assist worthy high school graduates who wish to enter Youngstown College. Some outstanding students have been secured in this way.

VIII. Proposed Affiliation with City Hospitals on Nurses Training

It has been proposed that a program be offered by Youngstown College in conjunction with the City Hospitals, whereby those students who are entering the hospitals for training should attend Youngstown College for one year before beginning their active training program at the hospital.

It has been suggested that this program would be optional this fall, but in the fall of 1936 be made compulsory for all girls entering nurses training at that time. This would necessitate some additional expensitures for instructors.

It has also been suggested that Home Economics be made a part of the program. This would necessitate an expenditure of \$600. for equipment in this department. As you already know, home economics was formerly taught in Youngstown College by Mrs. Foard. However, this work we copped because of lack of equipment. Our regular college accents also need training in this department.

OBJECTIVES OF YOUNGSTOWN COLLEGE

The basic purpose of Youngstown College is to develop the entire personality of its students, not neglecting any aspect of character essential for successful living in our modern complicated, changing society. To this end, attention is given to the physical, mental, social, cultural, and moral factors of harmonious development, irrespective of race, color or creed.

The general objectives of Youngstown College are, then, identical with the basic purpose of the Young Men's Christian Association, with which Youngstown College is affiliated. The approach of the College to these objectives is different from that of the Association. The College endeavors to accomplish by instruction, precept, and environment the conservation and development of the physical health, wirel character, religious life, and intellectual attainments of it students.

Physical Health

To bring each student to the best state of vigorous health, as a basis of successful living, by cultivation of the ideals of hygienic and healthful ting, the correction of physical defects, and the develop
f physical well being.

Moral Character

To aid the students in developing a sound philosophy of life.

To develop an appreciation of aesthetic, moral, and intellectual values which will make life truly rich and satisfying, regardless of material wealth.

To develop in students adequate ethical motivations for conduct, whether in personal, economic, or civil relations.

To assist the students in developing wholesome habits and in achieving self-discipline.

To foster in students that integrity of character and cooperative spirit which will result in happier home relations.

Religious Life

To halo the students maintain or find a satisfying religion.

To help the students achieve that sustaining faith of religion (whether it be Jewish, Catholic, or Protestant) which will give their lives a sense of controlling purpose and of devotion in all activities to life's finer values.

Intellectual Attainments

To offer its attidents the opportunity to familiarize themselves with the general content, the achievements, and the ideals of the several fields of knowledge.

To give students familiarity with such techniques of learning as will make study in college and life after college more pleasant and effective.

To help develop in students the power of reflective thinking and discriminating judgment in their solution of life's problems.

To assist the students to express their ideas clearly and in good Englis.

To encourage the right use of leisure time in self-improvement, social betterment, and the enjoyment of the higher pleasures of life.

To equip the students with the training needed for the pursuit of later professional study.

ADDITIONAL OBJECTIVES

- 1. To provide curricula that will meet the occupational needs and interests of the student body.
- 2. To provide curricular and extra curricular activities that will aid the foreign born students in making the adjustments necessary to take their place in American society.
- 3. The provide late afternoon and night classes for teachers of the public schools who desire to continue their college training on a part-time basis.
- 4. To provide in the late afternoon and night both vocational and cultural classes for other employed students who wish to pursue teacher training, business training, and law.
- 5. To provide an opportunity for students to secure an education near their homes.
