# MINUTES OF REGULAR MEETING OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF

#### YOUNGSTOWN STATE UNIVERSITY

Tod Administration Building Friday, June 24, 2005

Pursuant to notice duly given, a regular meeting (the two hundred sixtieth) of the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University convened at 3:00 p.m., on Friday, June 24, 2005, in the Board Room in Tod Administration Building.

Eight trustees were present at the meeting, to-wit: Dr. H. S. Wang, acting chairperson of the board, who presided; Dr. Sudershan K. Garg; Mr. William J. Bresnahan; Mr. Donald Cagigas; Mr. John L. Pogue; Mr. Scott R. Schulick; Dr. Dianne Bitonte Miladore, and student trustee Mr. Paul L. Walker. Absent were Mr. Larry D. DeJane and Ms. Millicent S. Counts.

Also present were: Dr. David C. Sweet, President; Dr. Bege Bowers, Interim Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs; Mr. John L. Habat, Vice President for Administration; Dr. Cynthia E. Anderson, Vice President for Student Affairs; and Franklin S. Bennett, Jr., secretary to the board of trustees. Also present were approximately 60 persons, including deans, members of the faculty, students, administrators, and members of the news media.

The acting chairperson called the meeting to order.

### ITEM I - PROOF OF NOTICE OF MEETING.

Evidence was available to establish that pursuant to Article II, Section 1, of the board's *Bylaws*; written notice of today's regular meeting was timely provided to each of the trustees, the student trustee, and to the president.

### ITEM II - DISPOSITION OF MINUTES FOR REGULAR MEETING HELD MARCH 18, 2005 AND SPECIAL MEETING HELD MAY 10, 2005.

Prior to the meeting, the secretary had provided draft copies of the minutes of the board's regular meeting held on March 18, 2005 (#258), and special meeting held May 10, 2005 (#259), to each trustee, the student trustee, and the president.

There being no additions, corrections, or revisions thereto, the minutes were approved as provided.

#### ITEM III - OATH OF OFFICE OF NEW TRUSTEE DIANNE BITONTE MILADORE.

The chairperson reported that Governor Taft had appointed Dr. Dianne Bitonte Miladore as trustee for the term concluding May 2014. At the request of the chairperson, the secretary administered the oath of office to Dr. Bitonte Miladore, and she was invited to take her seat with the board of trustees.

### ITEM IV - OATH OF OFFICE OF NEW TRUSTEE SUDERSHAN K. GARG.

The chairperson reported that Governor Taft had appointed Dr. Sudershan K. Garg as trustee for the unexpired term resulting from the death of Larry E. Esterly, concluding May 2006. At the request of the chairperson, the secretary administered the oath of office to Dr. Garg, and he was invited to take his seat with the board of trustees.

#### ITEM V - REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY.

Dr. Sweet stated that, as he neared completion of his fifth year as president of Youngstown State University, he was pleased to deliver his annual report to the board of trustees (a copy of Dr. Sweet's presentation is attached to these minutes). Dr. Sweet stated that his report will address Enrollment, Planning, Management, and Accomplishments related to Core Values.

Dr. Sweet reported that enrollment Enrollment. has increased by 243 students, or 1.9%, from Fall 2003. Fall 2000, enrollment has grown by 1,314 students, or 11%. Sweet stated that he believed that increased enrollment has resulted from effective recruitment and efforts. Dr. Sweet stated that New Student applications and financial aid applications for Fall 2005 are ahead of Fall 2004. Dr. Sweet reported that the Ohio Board of Regents' most recent Performance Report indicates that YSU's first year retention rate is 70% compared to 66% for all open admissions state universities. Dr. Sweet commended the efforts of faculty, advisers, and the Center for Student Progress. Dr. Sweet stated that the university is making steady, consistent progress toward the Fall 2008 enrollment target of 14,000 students. Attainment of this target will require average annual enrollment growth of 225 students. Two challenges facing continued enrollment growth for Fall 2005 are the decrease of nearly three hundred high

school graduates from the three county primary service area and the increasing numbers of graduates. Currently, Fall registration numbers are slightly below those of Fall 2004 at a comparable time. It is thought that most of the current shortfall is due to lagging registration of continuing students. New student registration is ahead of last year. Administration is working with the colleges to ensure the highest possible registration of continuing students and with admissions maintain growth of new student registration. Dr. Sweet noted an increase in minority student enrollment of 135 students, 8.2%, compared to Fall 2003. Dr. Sweet stated that there were 500 more minority students on campus in Fall 2004 than in Fall 2000 representing an increase in minority students of nearly Today, minority students compose nearly 14% university student population compared to less than 11% in Fall 2000.

Planning. Dr. Sweet reported that the Centennial Strategic Plan (CSP) continues to provide the overall blueprint for all university planning activities. The CSP provides the framework for defining goals and measuring progress. reported that implementation of the Finance Module of SCT Banner is on schedule to "go live" on July 1. Implementation of the Advancement Module is scheduled for September 1. stated that the board has approved a framework for the Campus Master Plan and that significant construction will take place this summer on the East and West Campus Gateways. reported that a three-year scholarship plan was presented to The scholarship plan defines in June. goals scholarships, links scholarships goals to enrollment increases the amounts of selected scholarship programs, discontinues scholarships not consistent with goals, creates new scholarship to meet goals, and increases the percentage of YSU scholarship dollars devoted to need-based scholarships from 7.4% to 14.3%. Dr. Sweet reported that an intercollegiate athletics strategic plan was presented to the board's Internal Affairs committee in June. The athletics plan identifies critical and strategies for intercollegiate athletics issues, goals, through 2008. Dr. Sweet stated that intercollegiate athletics advances the university's interests in enrollment, diversity, community engagement, alumni relations, and campus development. Dr. Sweet stated that planning is proceeding on the Centennial Campus Campaign, and that a select steering committee has been appointed to develop a final case statement.

Management. Dr. Sweet stated that no state budget relief is in sight, and that Mr. Habat would present an

overview of the Fiscal Year 2006 budget in his report. Fall 2000, the amount of state subsidy annually received by YSU has decreased by \$7,700,000.00, or nearly 20%. Dr. Sweet noted that in Fiscal Year 2001, the state provided nearly \$4,975 in annual instructional subsidy per student FTE to YSU. The Fiscal Year 2006 budget is based on \$3,765 per student FTE. Dr. Sweet stated that this represents an absolute decrease of \$1,210 per FTE, or 24%. Dr. Sweet stated that had the instructional subsidy per FTE remained at \$4,975, YSU would have \$12.6 million more in instructional support given its current FTE student Dr. Sweet reported that the university's Senate population. Bill 6 composite ratio has improved from 2.2 in 1999 to 4.0 in Dr. Sweet compared the proposed YSU Fiscal Year 2006 tuition to known tuition at other Ohio public universities. Dr. Sweet stated that during the past year YSU tuition's was the lowest in the state for those public universities without line item subsidy and that it will remain so. Dr. Sweet stated that, even with the tuition increase under consideration today, YSU's tuition will be \$1,018 below the Fiscal Year 2005 average Sweet reported that YSU's scholarship program tuition. Dr. permits YSU students to pay Net Tuition at 46% of Stated Tuition, the best ratio in the state.

Accomplishments Related to Core Values. Sweet described accomplishments related to core values including the Bachelor of General Studies for adult degree completion, new graduate programs in Computer Science, Financial Economics, American Studies and Creative Writing. Dr. Sweet reported that \$1 million is being invested in classroom renovations. classrooms will be renovated this summer, and plans exist for additional classroom renovations to be undertaken over the next three years. Dr. Sweet discussed the implementation of a conditional admissions policy. The conditional admissions policy seeks to enhance the chances for success for academically at-risk entering students. A trial of the policy will be implemented in Fall 2005 with full implementation expected in Spring 2006. Dr. Sweet reported that construction of the Andrews Recreation and Wellness Center is on schedule Fall. Dr. recognized the opening this Sweet Dana Wind Ensemble's performance at Carnegie Hall and selection Downbeat Magazine's College Ensemble of the Year. Dr. Sweet stated that YSU students from the College of Arts and Sciences have been recognized by Council for Undergraduate Research. Sweet reported that Jennifer Davidson, a mechanical engineering student, was one of 40 students nationally to win a Phi Kappa Phi scholarship. Dr. Sweet reported that the Nursing Program in the Bitonte College of Health and Human Services received

national acclaim for its student mentoring program; that faculty from the Williamson College of Business received a grant for \$180,000 to enhance teaching about business opportunities in emerging markets; that the Beeghly College of Education very recently received word from the Ohio Department of Education that it has been awarded a major grant in partnership with the Mahoning County Educational Service Center for a program to increase the number of special education teachers. Dr. Sweet reported that on July 1<sup>st</sup> Dr. Robert Herbert will be joining the university as Provost. Dr. Sweet thanked Dr. Bowers for her work since January as Interim Provost.

Dr. Sweet stated that Youngstown State University is committed to not only recruiting minority students but to graduating them. YSU′s diversity and is part of that effort programming and includes initiated Diversity Banners and Diversity Circle; diversity programs; and the Presidential Mentors program which provided a diverse group of students the opportunity to interact with Dr. Sweet and members of the cabinet in a mutually educational forum. Dr. Sweet affirmed the Strategic Plan's commitment to have a competitively paid faculty and staff in their respective labor markets. Dr. Sweet stated that the Youngstown Early College High School embodies the three themes of enrollment, diversity, and partnerships; that the Higher Education Center of Columbiana County partnership with Jefferson Community College and the Columbiana County Career and Technical Center seeks to increase college participation rates in a county which suffers rates well below those of the Mahoning Valley, the state and the nation.

### ITEM VI - REPORTS OF THE COMMITTEES OF THE BOARD.

The board considered the following committee reports and recommendations:

### 1. Academic and Student Affairs Committee

Dr. Bowers provided a report on the Youngstown Early College high school program. A copy of Dr. Bowers presentation is attached to these minutes. Dr. Bowers reported that the YEC had completed a successful first year. Dr. Bowers reported that the Bachelor of General Studies program had been approved by the Ohio Board of Regents on April 21<sup>st</sup>. Dr. Wang thanked Dr. Bowers for her excellent service as Interim Provost.

Following Dr. Bowers' report, the chairperson recognized Mr. Don Cagigas, acting chairperson of the Academic and Student Affairs Committee, who stated that the committee was recommending four resolutions for adoption by the board. On behalf of the committee, Mr. Cagigas then moved the adoption of the following resolution:

### Resolution to Authorize Conferral of Honorary Degree

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby authorize the conferral of a Doctor of Humane Letters (L.H.D.) degree, <a href="https://honoris.causa">honoris.causa</a>, upon Thomas R. Hollern, with all the rights and privileges attendant thereto.

Following discussion, the motion received the affirmative vote of all trustees present. The chairperson declared the motion carried and the resolution adopted.

### 3. Finance and Facilities Committee.

Mr. Habat provided a report on the development of the Fiscal Year 2006 Budget (a copy of Mr. Habat's presentation follows these minutes). Following Mr. Habat's presentation, the chairperson recognized Mr. Pogue, chairperson of the Audit Subcommittee, who reported that the Audit Subcommittee met on June 8<sup>th</sup> and received the annual report of the university's internal auditor. The chairperson then recognized Mr. Schulick, chairperson of the Investment Subcommittee, who reported that the Investment Subcommittee met on June 2<sup>nd</sup> and received reports from Hartland Associates and National City Bank regarding the university's investments.

The chairperson recognized Mr. Schulick, vice chairperson of the Finance and Facilities Committee, who stated that the committee was recommending six resolutions for adoption by the board. Mr. Schulick then moved the adoption of the following resolution:

The Annual Budget, Fiscal Year 2006

WHEREAS, the proposed Fiscal Year 2006 Annual Budget has been reviewed by the Finance and Facilities Committee of the Board;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Youngstown State University Fiscal Year 2006 Annual Operating Budget for General and Auxiliary Funds, shown on Exhibit B, as presented to the Finance and Facilities Committee be approved; and that approval includes:

- 1. Salaries for YSU-APAS and YSU-FOP members as provided for in the current Labor Agreements with the respective bargaining units;
- 2. Salaries for YSU-OEA and YSU-ACE employees at the Fiscal Year 2005 rates subject to modification upon the approval of Labor Agreements by the union memberships and the YSU Board of Trustees;
- 3. Salaries for part-time faculty, graduate assistants, research assistants, and student employees as detailed in the budget document;

# Resolution to Approve A Change to the Master of Public Health Tuition and Fees, Academic Year 2006

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University adopted the Academic Year 2006 Student Tuition, Fees and Other Charges Schedule at the January 28, 2005, meeting of the Board; and

WHEREAS, on June 18, 2004, the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University approved the consortium tuition and fee rate of \$403 per credit hour effective Summer Term 2004; and

WHEREAS, in April 2005, the Master of Public Health Academic Counsel approved a 6.0 percent increase in the consortium rate for the MPH program effective Fall Term 2005;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby set the consortium tuition and fee rate for the Master of Public Health for Academic Year 2006 at \$427 per credit hour effective Fall Term 2005.

WHEREAS, Youngstown State University and St. Elizabeth Health Center entered into an agreement on July 14, 2001, for Youngstown State University to charge students and reimburse St. Elizabeth Health Center in an amount determined by the Board of Directors of the St. Elizabeth Health Center School for Nurse Anesthetists; and

WHEREAS, on June 18, 2004, the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University approved the Board of Directors' \$5,500 per year (\$1,833.33 per semester) Nurse Anesthetist Fee; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the St. Elizabeth Health Center School for Nurse Anesthetists has not increased the Nurse Anesthetist Fee for students entering the program after Summer Term 2005;

After the motion received the affirmative vote of all trustees present, the chairperson declared the motion carried and the resolution adopted.

On behalf of the committee, Mr. Schulick then moved the adoption of the following resolution:

### Resolution to Authorize Purchase of Properties for Campus Improvement

YR 2005-64

WHEREAS, Youngstown State University has identified an area surrounding the campus and within which it seeks to acquire property needed for the benefit of the University; and

WHEREAS, the purchase of property located on 220 Court Street, known as Youngstown City Lot Number 19824, w. pt., parcel number 53-017-0-203 (Askew property) is needed for campus improvement; and

WHEREAS, the acceptance by gift of property located on 222 Court Street, known as Youngstown City Lot Number 19824, e. pt., parcel number 53-017-0-204 (Gangone property) is needed for campus improvement; and

WHEREAS, the purchase of property located on Custer, known as Youngstown City Lot Numbers 9117, e. pt. and 9118, w. pt., parcel numbers 53-005-0-177 and 53-005-

0-178 (Buckeye Elks property) are needed for campus improvement; and

WHEREAS, the purchase of property located on 330 West Scott Street, known as Youngstown City Lot Numbers 4613 and 4614, w. 5 ft., parcel numbers 53-005-0-102 and 53-005-0-103 (Jacks property) are needed for campus improvement;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby authorize the acquisition of the properties as described above.

After the motion received the affirmative vote of all trustees present, the chairperson declared the motion carried and the resolution adopted.

On behalf of the committee, Mr. Schulick then moved the adoption of the following resolution:

### Resolution to Approve Changes To Student Tuition Charges Effective Fall Term 2005

YR 2005-65

WHEREAS, the State of Ohio's Fiscal Years 2004-2005 biennial operating budget established a six percent cap on the annual increase in tuition charges by Ohio public universities; and

WHEREAS, said state operating budget also allowed Ohio public universities to increase tuition charges beyond the six percent cap up to an additional 3.9 percent to provide need-based scholarships or for improved technology services for students; and

WHEREAS, it has been the practice of the University to set tuition rates for the upcoming year as early as possible to provide current and prospective students as much advance notice as possible to enable them sufficient time to make appropriate financial arrangements; and

WHEREAS, to provide such advance notice the Administration prepared a preliminary draft of the University's Fiscal Year 2006 General Operating

Budget, in which was proposed to the Board of Trustees that tuition charges be increased an additional three percent to provide the resources necessary to improve technology services and increase need-based scholarships for students; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees, consistent with state legislative authority then in effect, adopted Resolution YR 2005-31 at a special meeting on January 28, 2005, to increase tuition charges an additional three percent to provide the resources necessary to improve technology services and increase need-based scholarships for students; and

WHEREAS, the Ohio General Assembly recently passed Amended Substitute House Bill 66, the State's Fiscal Years 2006 - 2007 biennium operating budget, which establishes a six percent tuition cap, but does not provide for any supplemental authority for additional increases for technology improvements and need-based scholarships; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees desires to observe the guidelines of the tuition cap set forth in Amended Substitute House Bill 66;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby rescind Board of Trustees' Resolution YR 2005-31.

After the motion received the affirmative vote of all trustees present, the chairperson declared the motion carried and the resolution adopted.

On behalf of the committee, Mr. Schulick then moved the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolution to Approve The Master of Fine Arts in Creative Writing Tuition and Fees for Academic Year 2006

YR 2005-66

WHEREAS, in June 2004, the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University approved the offering of

the Northeast Ohio Universities Master of Fine Arts degree in Creative Writing; and

WHEREAS, in December 2004, the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University approved the initial consortium tuition and fee rate for the Master of Fine Arts in Creative Writing of \$380 per credit hour; and

WHEREAS, in June 2005, the Master of Fine Arts Academic Counsel approved an 8.42% increase in the consortium tuition and fee rate to \$412 per credit hour for the Master of Fine Arts in Creative Writing;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby set the consortium tuition and fee rate for the Master of Fine Arts in Creative Writing for Academic Year 2006 at \$412 per credit hour effective Fall Term 2005.

After the motion received the affirmative vote of all trustees present, the chairperson declared the motion carried and the resolution adopted.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby ratify and confirm the appointments as listed in Exhibit C attached hereto.

After the motion received the affirmative vote of all trustees present, the chairperson declared the motion carried and the resolution adopted.

On behalf of the committee, Mr. Pogue then moved the adoption of the following resolution:

### Resolution to Authorize Conferral of Emeritus Status

YR 2005-68

WHEREAS, the *Policies of the Board of Trustees* provide for the conferral of emeritus status upon faculty and professional/administrative staff who retire from the University following at least ten years of meritorious service and are recommended by the President of the University;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University does hereby authorize that those faculty and professional/administrative staff members listed in Exhibit D attached hereto are hereby granted the emeritus title designated thereon.

After the motion received the affirmative vote of all trustees present, the chairperson declared the motion carried and the resolution adopted.

At the request of the chairperson, the secretary read the proposed resolution aloud. Thereafter, on behalf of the committee Mr. Pogue moved the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolution of Appreciation
For Women's Outdoor Track and Field Team

WHEREAS, the Youngstown State University Women's Indoor Track and Field team under the direction of Head Coach Brian Gorby won the 2005 Horizon League Women's Indoor Track and Field Championship; and

WHEREAS, the Penguins won the Indoor Track and Field Championship for the second consecutive year, while earning their third consecutive track and field conference crown; and

WHEREAS, Youngstown State dominated the field beating the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee by a margin of 62 points (165 to 103), as well as University of Detroit, Butler University, Loyola University Chicago, University of Illinois at Chicago, and Wright State University at the league meet held at DePauw University in Greencastle, Indiana, on February 26-27, 2005; and

WHEREAS, senior Jeanna Cunningham was named Track performer of the meet, freshman Carly Youlton was named the Field performer of the meet, freshman Bethany Anderson was named the league's Field newcomer of the year, and Coach Gorby was tabbed the Women's Coach of the Year; and

WHEREAS, five student-athletes combined to win seven individual titles as Danielle Bolt won the 60-meter and 200-meter dashes, Jeanna Cunningham won the 400-meter dash, Aaliyah Gillespie won the 60-meter hurdles, Carly Youlton won the long jump and triple jump, and Bethany Anderson won the shot put; and

WHEREAS, Cunningham, Bolt, Gillespie, and Yandeh Joh also won 4x400-meter relay in a conference record time; and

WHEREAS, Youngstown State had 20 top-five finishes in the meet, including runner-up placings by Cunningham in the 60-meter and 200-meter dash, Joh in the long jump, Nikki Hooper in the triple jump, and Anderson in the weight throw; and

WHEREAS, Coach Brian Gorby has earned 12 Conference Coach-of-the-Year Awards in his 12 years with the track and field and cross country programs;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University congratulates the entire Women's Track and Field program on their 2005 Horizon League Indoor Championship; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Green is the longest-term professional administrative staff member who retired in fiscal year 2004-2005; and

WHEREAS, she previously worked in the department of chemistry and the school of graduate studies and research and advanced herself through the positions of stenographer and secretary; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Green in her service in the president's office distinguished herself as dedicated,

knowledgeable, and flexible in meeting administrative needs of the highest level with patience and goodwill; and

WHEREAS, she served 21 Youngstown State University Trustees, 11 Youngstown State University Student Trustees, and 8 Board Chairpersons over ten years with exceptional professionalism;

WHEREAS, in 1997, five years after his retirement from the faculty as a professor of political science, Mr. Esterly was appointed to a nine-year term on the Youngstown State University Board of Trustees by Ohio Governor George V. Voinovich; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Esterly faithfully served as a member of the Board's Academic and Student Affairs, Development, External Relations, Finance and Facilities, Intercollegiate Athletics, and Internal Affairs Committees; and

WHEREAS, in 2003 the Board of Trustees elected Mr. Esterly as its Vice Chairperson and, in 2004, as its Chairperson; and

WHEREAS, during his years at Youngstown State University, Mr. Esterly held many titles including Student, Professor, Academic Senate Chairperson, Watson Foundation Distinguished Professor, Professor Emeritus, Trustee, and Vice Chairperson, and Chairperson of the Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, while impressive, his titles do not adequately describe the extent of Larry Esterly's contributions to the University, its faculty and its students. Perhaps Mr. Esterly's service to YSU may be better understood by the roles he served: teacher, scholar, author, advisor, mentor, advocate, and (in the truest sense of the word) colleague; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees and the Youngstown State University campus community were, and remain, deeply saddened by the news of the sudden death of Mr. Esterly on May 7, 2005; and

WHEREAS, while he is no longer here to teach, advise, mentor, and collaborate with us, Larry Esterly leaves Youngstown State University, its faculty, staff, administration, board of trustees and, especially, its students with a lifelong example of dignity and excellence in those endeavors;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University honors the memory of, and expresses its gratitude to, Professor Larry E. Esterly for his years of service and contributions to the University, its faculty, staff and students by hereby designating Room 2069 in Kilcawley Center as The Larry E. Esterly Room and by hereby directing that a scholarship be established in Mr. Esterly's name to assist in the education of political science and pre-law undergraduate students; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of Youngstown State University extends its condolences to Mr. Esterly's wife, Donna, and his many University friends and colleagues.

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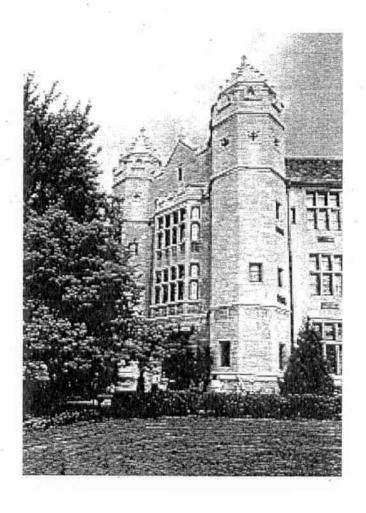

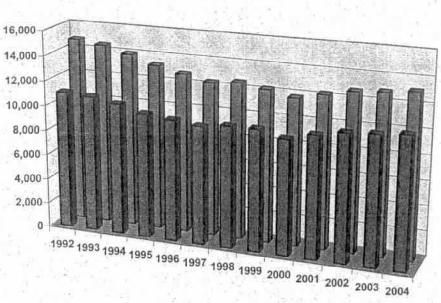

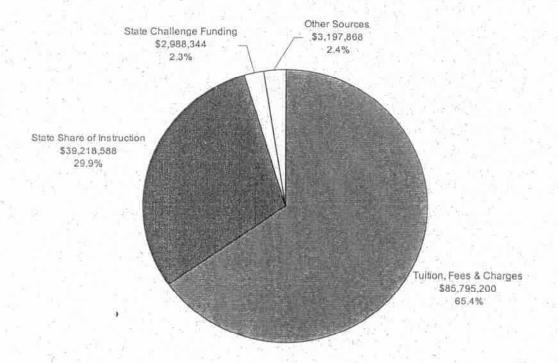

#### General Fund Expense

General Fund expenses are summarized in Table 3 by expense category while Table 4 summarizes the same expenditures by administrative division. Personnel costs are relatively flat as no collective bargaining agreement has yet been reached with the OEA and ACE unions and no increase has been approved for exempt staff. However, contractual obligations to the APAS and FOP unions have been budgeted. Budgeted fringe benefits total 32.2% of total wages and salaries, as compared to 32.1% in Fiscal Year 2005. The slight increase was caused by an increase in the employer match of employee contributions to the Ohio Public

Employees Retirement System, effective January 1, 2006. Operating costs are projected to increase by 3.7%, primarily because of transfers from area contingency accounts. This was done to more accurately classify contingency funds to line items where the funds will be spent, such as supplies. The Fiscal Year 2006 Short-Term Budget Stabilization Reserve of \$2 million has been set aside to cover the cost of negotiated salary increases and an expected 15-17% increase in health care costs (this reserve may be supplemented with one-time funds if any are carried forward from Fiscal Year 2005). The increase in health care costs is consistent with the average experienced by Ohio public

employees in 2004. See Appendices B and C (pages 15-17) respectively for additional detail.

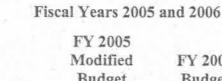

Long Range Facilities Development Plan developed in 1984. The resulting Centennial

Campus Master Plan ("Master Plan") incorporates the recommendations of other internal and external planning processes, including Youngstown 2010, the YSU space utilization study, and Smoky Hollow Development Plan.

The Andrews Recreation & Wellness Center is a new building attached to Kilcawley Center that will provide student recreation and instructional space for the College of Health and Human Services. Total cost is estimated at \$12 million.

The Bookstore project will renovate the existing Bookstore space and add 4,326 square feet in new space. The cost to renovate, expand and purchase new furniture and equipment is \$1.795 million.

The canopied gateway and appurtenances unifies the west campus. The cost is \$750,000.

Plan, which advances YSU's core mission on behalf of academic and student life. In addition to the West Campus Gateway project, other major improvements envisioned in the Master Plan include a new building for the Williamson College of Business, an annex to Moser Hall to house new labs for the life sciences and engineering, refurbishments of Coffelt Hall for use by the School of Graduate Studies and Research, and enhancement of Kilcawley Center as the focal point for student life. In the current biennium, the following Master Plan projects will

The West Campus Gateway development encompasses three component projects that comprise a new, dramatic western entrance to YSU. Construction commenced April 15, 2004

and will be completed Fall Semester 2005. The total project cost is \$14.55 million.

East Campus Gateway (\$2.2 million)

West Campus Gateway (\$14.55 million)

be undertaken:

- The East Campus Gateway project transforms the main campus entrance off of Wick Ave. to a treed University Plaza boulevard that manages traffic and parking access for visitors, employees and students.
- Phase I M-8 Parking Lot: this surface lot serves as the first stop for prospective students visiting Sweeney Hall and other campus visitors. Securing a long-term lease from the Holy Trinity Church, which owns half of the M-8 parking lot, enables the University to reengineer and grade the entire lot, comply with new surface water drainage mandates, and make aesthetic and other improvements. This project will be completed in summer of 2005. The projected cost is \$1.5 1.7 million.
  - Phase II YSU Main Street:
    - Widens University Plaza (Spring Street), constructs a landscaping median strip, improves traffic management and enhances parking for the Butler

Unifies University Plaza as the YSU pedestrian main street, connecting the

east side of the campus (University Courtyard Apartments and Bliss Hall) to the west side (Andrews Recreation) and everything in between (Kilcawley, Bookstore, Beeghly Center).

Museum/Tod Hall area; and

Construction will begin in 2006.

#### New College of Business Building

The first step in building a new home for the Williamson College of Business is to develop a program plan that defines the programmatic, technology and space needs. Building upon the YSU's space utilization report and the Centennial Strategic Plan, the proposed building will anchor the campus' south gateway and bridge to downtown. The program plan, costing \$25,000, will be completed in summer 2005.

#### Other Campus Development (\$576,000)

Other campus development activities include the acquisition of key properties adjacent to the campus and the construction of walkways and plazas.

#### Infrastructure Upgrades (\$3.2 million)

Improvement and/or replacement of infrastructure are on-going activities of facilities capital improvements, and include:

- Campus-wide electrical system
- Campus-wide building systems upgrades
- Building masonry restorations
- Steam distribution and Central Utility Plant upgrade

#### Classroom Upgrades (\$1.05 million)

Classroom upgrades focus on improving the teaching/learning environment in the classrooms by a campus-wide program to upgrade/replace floors, ceilings, lighting, and wall coverings. Classrooms in Beeghly Center and DeBartolo Hall will be improved during the summer 2005.

#### Technology (\$5.3 million)

Upgrading technology infrastructure and improving administrative and academic systems are ongoing projects, and include implementation of the SCT Banner system.

#### Basic Renovations (\$4.9 million)

The Board of Regents defines projects below \$500,000 as Basic Renovations. These projects are approved as a whole, and must be designated as general or specific projects. Specific projects over \$100,000 that will begin or be completed in fiscal years 2005-06 are listed in Appendix G.

#### Instructional Equipment (\$769,000)

Funds are appropriated for instructional and data processing equipment to supplement equipment acquisitions made by institutions from local resources. Generally, equipment must be used directly for *instructional purposes* or in direct *support of instruction*. Equipment used for both instructional and non-instructional purposes (e.g., research) may be acquired; however, state funds will be paid to cover only that portion of costs that reflect usage for instructional purposes.

This is the third year a Capital Budget has been presented with the YSU annual operating budget. The capital budget is displayed for two years because the state's capital budget biennium began July 1, 2004 but the state legislature did not act on the authorizing legislation until January 2005. The capital projects identified in the current biennium include those funded by three sources—state appropriations and re-appropriations, the capital component, and local funds for new facilities.
