University Theater's presentation of Arthur Miller's drama *The Crucible* opens this week in Ford Theater on the campus of Youngstown State University and features special pre-show discussions about the award-winning play.

Performances are scheduled February 24, 25, 26 and 27 and March 4, 5 and 6. Thursday through Saturday performances begin at 7:30 p.m., while the Sunday matinee is at 3 p.m. All seats in Ford Theater are reserved. Patrons are encouraged to make reservations early by calling 330-941-3105.

Winner of the 1953 Tony Award for Best Play, *The Crucible* is about the Puritan purge of witchcraft in old Salem. The story focuses on a young farmer, his wife, and a young servant-girl who maliciously causes the wife's arrest for witchcraft. The farmer brings the girl to court to admit the lie—and it is here that the course of bigotry and deceit is depicted. The farmer, instead of saving his wife, finds himself also accused of witchcraft and ultimately condemned with a host of others.

In the box office lobby a half-hour prior to each show, a pre-show educational dialogue will take place, presented by community and university leaders. The dialogue will assist the audience in understanding some of the play's important issues.



Cancer psychologist speaks March 11 on campus

Catherine Mosher, assistant professor of psychology at Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis, will give a talk on the supportive care needs of cancer patients and their families at 2 p.m. Friday, March 11, in the Ohio Room of Kilcawley Center at Youngstown State University.

Mosher, a 2002 psychology graduate at YSU, is nationally known for her research with cancer patients and their families. After receiving a master's degree in psychology at the University at Albany, State University of New York, in 2004, she went on to earn a Ph.D. in clinical psychology, also at SUNY. She was honored with the Cornelia Perry Memorial Award for outstanding scholarship from the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center, where she completed her postdoctoral research fellowship between 2007 and 2010.

With 34 publications in more than 20 professional journals and publications, Mosher has presented at conferences throughout the United States and Canada. Her professional focuses include psycho-oncology and cancer survivorship, psychosocial and behavioral intervention development for cancer populations, and family cancer care-giving. Her experience ranges extensively in the areas of teaching, research and clinical care. Aside from her teaching position at IUPUI, Mosher also serves as an associate member of the Cancer Prevention and Control Program at the Indiana University Melvin and Bren Simon Cancer Center.
