
Dear Doctor Domonkos:

Dear Colleagues:

This is to bring you up-to-date on the developments concerning the proposed Király-Festschrift, and to ask for your responses concerning two of these matters, i.e. your summer address and your option concerning reprints.

1. Because there are many more contributors than we originally planned for, I must again ask you to limit your contribution to a maximum of 25 pages. (We may have to cut.)
2. Given the limited time available for editing and the publication process, please do observe the May 1, 1982 deadline. The manuscript simply has to go to press in June, and colleagues whose manuscripts will be received too late will face the possibility of being left out of this project.
3. Because the manuscript will be typeset and proofread in the course of the summer, and because I would like all of you to read your own contributions, I must ask you to supply me with your summer address.
4. It was agreed that all contributions will be original works. But if you incorporate sections of previously published studies into your contribution, it is your responsibility to clear it with the previous publisher and to secure the necessary release. (Please forward such a release to me.)
5. The Publisher has just informed me that every contributor will receive two copies of the published work. (This also holds true for the major financial contributors.) He cannot supply you with free reprints. But if sufficient number of contributors opt to buy reprints, he is willing to supply 50 copies for \$20.00. Please let me know your decision immediately.
6. It was also agreed that the copyright of the volume will be in the name of the editor.
7. Please remember the directives given in my circular of December 20, 1981 concerning typing and the system of documentation (i.e. Turabian/University of Chicago System). I am enclosing copies of the same for our more recent contributors.

You may belong to those to whom we have already mentioned our plan for a volume on HUNGARY AND EUROPE, or maybe this is the first time that we contact you. At any rate, the idea is essentially this: to present, perhaps for the next International Congress of Historical Sciences in 1985, a volume of articles in what could be termed "comparative history": essays about Hungary's historical development in the context of European history. We want to explore how does our generation of historians (meaning those, who grew up in Hungary or elsewhere mainly after the Second World War), see Hungary's place in Europe - in contrast to the preceding generations. We do not assume that there is a consensus in the "generation", but have the impression that most of us doubt the value of such traditional views that regard Hungary "a lonely bastion" or "a betrayed victim" etc. etc. Probably many of us agree that a comparative discussion of the political, social and cultural history of Hungary should be oriented on Central or East-Central Europe, maybe even on Eastern Europe, rather than argue for an "unjustly denied" place among the Western nations or lament about the "Balkanisation" of Hungary. Or to put it bluntly: we should like to assemble in this volume that faction (if that's what it is) that shares with us this general direction of thought.

We have considered two possible approaches. The one would be to explore historical Hungary's contacts and conflicts with her neighbours and the rest of Europe; the other to discuss specific themes of historical development in comparison to similar features in other countries. We propose to do the latter, not only because there is much more written on the former, but also because we feel that it offers a better opportunity to express our views, derived from the fruitful combination of our research experience in matters Hungarian and our familiarity with methods and results of historical study elsewhere.

For your information, we enclose a list of those who we intend to ask to contribute. Some of them have indicated the topic about which they intend to write. We are looking forward to hear your reactions to all this. There is also space to include additional people. While we have no definite plans as to the size of the volume, publishing experience suggests that single essays should not exceed 5-6000 words, i.e. 20-25 double spaced typed pages, with not too many notes. As it would be nice to produce this volume within a reasonable time, we wonder, whether an early 1984 deadline would be acceptable for submission. No publishing arrangements were made yet, but we found more than one publisher interested in printing such a book, under circumstances in cooperation with a publishing house in Budapest. So much for a first orientation. Please reply to either of us whether you are interested in this venture, and if so, please send us an outline (in a couple of sentences) about what you'd propose to write. Details can be hammered out later. We should be grateful if you could let us know about your interest by May 1, 1982, so that we can proceed to more practical planning.

Actor has 'lived' movie's theme

A pair of longtime friends met in South Bend Friday — many miles and years distant from their native Hungary and their earlier roles as teacher and pupil.

Miklos Simon, who plays the father in "Four Friends," a film opening locally, took his former professor Astrik L. Gabriel, the University of Notre Dame's distinguished medieval scholar, to view Simon's first performance in an American film.

Steven Tesich, of "Breaking Away" fame, has written a script, partially based on his own life. "Four Friends" tells the story of a Yugoslavian youth who grew up in a Midwestern mill town and formed enduring friendships.

In the later 1930s, Simon studied under Gabriel when the teacher served as director of the International French College in Budapest.

That both men understand enduring friendship underlined the sharing of the gift of Simon's performance at Friday's screening of the film. It was a day of celebration. Driving to the theater after lunch together, the pair sang rollicking French songs together, Simon said.

The film's immigration experience is not unknown to Simon, who fled Hungary in 1956 with his wife, Lilli, and 8-year-old son, Nicholas.

The warm camaraderie between Simon and Gabriel, born of a shared homeland and love of dramatic literature, swept the listeners into hearing Simon's story.

Together they recollected Simon's portrayal of Tartuffe in Chicago. His introduction to Moliere came under Gabriel's tutelage.

Time and time again, the conversation lapsed into exchanges between the two friends.

They recalled Gabriel's insistence that the student speak only French in the school. "If you wanted to get up off the bench, you had to say it in French. I'll never forget it," Simon said.

And Gabriel had him repeat the schoolboy request in French. Simon complied, apparently without fault, since Gabriel only nodded his head affirmatively.

"Teachers are saints. Whatever spirit we learned in that school has been a fabulous basis for whatever direction you wanted to go," said

Simon, punctuating the interview with his debt to Gabriel.

The direction of Simon's life has not always been easy. When he fled Hungary, he left behind not only his homeland but also his livelihood.

An actor well on his way to becoming established, his inability to speak English deprived him for years of continuing his art. He has worked at various jobs, from working the oil fields in Oklahoma shortly after arrival in this country to driving taxis and waiting tables in Chicago.

All that time he studied English in order to perform again as an actor.

A chance meeting with William Friedkin led to collaboration on scripts for puppets created by Simon. But the troupe of actors who had gathered to perform the puppet theater moved one by one to better-paying jobs.

Simon went on to perform in Chicago theaters — in "Clown" with Mickey Rooney at Drury Lane, in "Medea" at the Court, and "The King and I" at the Candlelight Dinner Theater.

"The competition is enormously big, then comes the Hungarian with the accent," he explained, saying his accent limits the parts for which he auditions.

"Maybe I shouldn't bother, I thought," he said, recalling his audition for the father's role.

He reported that Arthur Penn, the director, told him "to grow a moustache and lose a little weight."

Simon was among the 45 called to audition again two days later. Again, he recalled, Penn told him to keep growing the moustache.

Eventually, Penn decided "to stick with Miklos."

Performing before American movie cameras for the first time is the highlight of his career.

For that role he shaped the character upon his intimate knowledge of a Slavic father. Simon's mother was born in Croatia. He also drew upon many of his own experiences.

"A Hungarian father would have smiled much earlier," said Simon. He spoke of strictness and stiffness as differences he perceived between Slavs and Hungarians.

Since "Four Friends," he has worked in another film, "Who Needs the Truth?" directed by Arthur Kean.

Does he anticipate a long career in films? "You have to take life as it comes," he replied. "If you don't, you will fall on your face so badly you crush yourself."





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

Article 10d.11 of the new Agreement requires the Administration to compile faculty seniority lists for the faculty in each academic department, and to provide those lists to the departments no later than January, 1983. I am in the process of doing this.

If that information is not available, seniority will be based upon alphabetical order of the last names of the faculty who were appointed on the same effective date.

This is to advise you that one or more of your departmental colleagues were appointed to the faculty on the same effective date that you were, and further that your personnel file does not contain a copy of the letter you wrote accepting your appointment to the full-service faculty.

If you wrote such a letter--and have a copy--please send me a copy for your personnel file.

I would appreciate a response by November 15.

Thank you so much for your good note of March 9, 1982 and the enclosed article. I am dictating this letter to Mrs. Brant and should there be any errors do not blame her but my very hasty dictation.

Your pleasant and fluently written study on "The Universities of East Central Europe, Prague, Cracow, Vienna and Hungary," is delightful reading for someone who would like general knowledge in English regarding the Hungarian universities in the middle ages.

Helas, what you have said about these universities are all well-known facts. First of all, this information was imparted in your good thesis and from other publications, particularly Hungarian historians. It certainly would not go into the Speculum and without your hasty Conclusion, omitting pages 18 and 19, it might go to the Catholic Historical Review where, I believe, they publish something from Kosztoľnyik. However, I stopped-as reader-one of the latter's articles sent to the Speculum.

I believe it would go into the Canadian-American Review of Hungarian Studies by Dreiszig. All goes well until your Conclusion, which unfortunately you do not prove. Louis the Great was very much interested in higher education; even wrote to the Pope for promotion of Augustinian masters from Hungary. 





Dispossession fortified ritzy editor

The Americanization of Hungarian-born Kathryn Zahony Livingston began in the 1950s with her arrival in this country at 13, after a turbulent childhood during which her family escaped the Communists.

"At the very end of the war, in Germany, I saw all the bombs, people praying, the dust flying and remember my mother putting damp washcloths over our faces," said Livingston.

She was graduating from Beaumont School for Girls here and then from Marquette University with a dual major in history and journalism. Livingston wrote fashion copy for the Montgomery Ward catalog and the Vogue Pattern Book before moving on to Harper's Bazaar, followed by Town & Country magazine in 1968.

The former Clevelander, now executive editor of Town & Country, was in town yesterday as a Wednesday's Woman speaker at the Women's City Club.

She is a fooler. Although her speech is saturated with foreign inflections and an intriguing accent, she has all the fashion savvy of a veteran New Yorker.

Town & Country is the oldest (135 years) continuously published magazine in the country. It's the glossy Hearst publication, the leader where prestige is concerned, whose main ingredient used to be the stuffy snob appeal of dowagers and debutantes.

These days, the magazine's staff of 25 full timers and sundry free lancers — including a prince, a Rockefeller and an aging hippie — delves into some pretty nitty-gritty topics.

"We direct ourselves to the newly affluent and the Old Guard," said Livingston. "It's almost never a put down of the good life. We do bring fantasy and glamour to the magazine, along with the pleasures of the flesh and spirit. There is always room for a

bit of irreverence and a healthy touch of hedonism."

Livingston never misplaces her identity: "You are lost as a writer or editor if you want to merge into the group you are writing about."

She views the dispossession of all she and her family held dear, the starting over in a foreign country, as her high-intensity fortifier.

"You need those knocks sometimes to create your ambitions," she said. "I am stronger than most people; at least I think I am. I have a survivor's instinct. Yet, I try to be feminine. It's very important to me, coming from Central Europe. Dealing with people in New York, you develop a certain hard edge. I hope to always be flexible, observant and never become smug."

When Livingston was 9, her parents, who trace their heritage back 350 years to Hungarian nobility, sent her away to boarding school in Austria. Their aim was to keep their only daughter, the oldest of three children, from being sold into slavery or prostitution.

At 13, she and her family (her parents and one brother still live here) came to in Cleveland, with just \$3 to their name, and no knowledge of English.

It was a lesson in survival and character formation.

"I do remember as a child being hurt being a refugee," Livingston said. "When I was 16 and dressed up in my prom dress, I can remember hearing patronizing comments, like, 'How do you do it in the old country?'"

"When you don't know English, you make a fool of yourself quite often. I began to watch body language. I put a high premium today on *how* people say things."

Europe, she observed, "is very sad to me in

many ways when I go back. In America, I still have the feeling people can do something about their problems. Cleveland has always faced its problems. It's a very complex city, partially because of its ethnic diversity.

"I am very patriotically American. There is the feeling of a responsibility, of a conscience, no matter how wealthy Americans are, unlike the Brazilians or the Venezuelans or even the French or Italians."

Livingston's job takes her away from her husband, James, and her children — Bret, 11, and Valerie, 6 — for weeks at a time.

"I have never quite reconciled it, and a two-career marriage puts you in a perpetual state of hanging in a tremulous balance," she said.

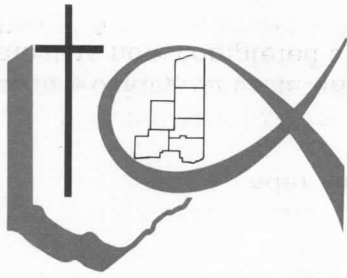
Weighed against her concern for her family, however, is "a great curiosity about the world, a great feeling that we are all part of the same family. It is easy for me to establish rapport with a Third World person.

"It's also the chance to enter places of enormous wealth, with armies of servants, Picasso paintings, swimming pools and all the luxurious things you would imagine."

Many writers, she said, "can't reconcile it with their own lives, and have had nervous breakdowns."

Livingston was aggressive in prompting Town & Country to feature Cleveland in its October issue.

"Cleveland has really been to the brink and back," she said. "It's true, we did leave many young achievers out, but it was a very long article, the longest one we have done on a city and probably one of our more controversial stories on a city. The writer, Leon Harris, writes with an aggressive tone, but I think his heart was in the right place, and our heart was in the right place."

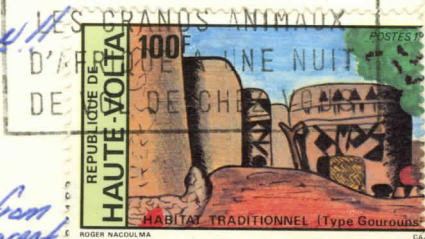


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
