By that time, Wednesday, February 23, they will be well into their reading and discussion as well as enrichment on Dante, Reformation, French and Italian sites.

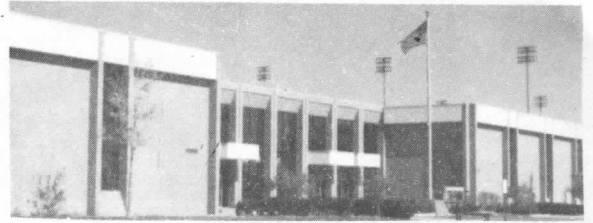

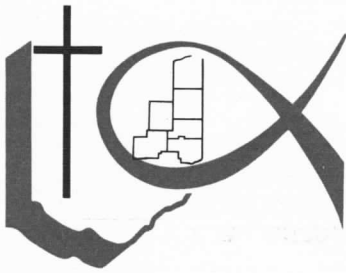
1. Yes, there will be reprints. The delay is caused by the production of a permanent cover for all the future reprints. You will have yours in April.



Dear Prof. Domonkos:

For some reason I received a copy of the History notes mailed to Alumni--my son, RGB Jr., is a YSU Grad, but I attended only 1 year in 193536 in Pre-Law. I taught American History part time for about 6 years 15-20 years ago under Dr. Behen.

I was particularly intrigued by your research on Mattius Corvinus, as there is a huge bronze Statue of him in Deva, in Southwest Transylvania, Rumania.

Over the past 20 years, Mrs. Bauman and I have gone to Rumania about 10-12 times, and I have been compiling thousands of Kodachrome slides of Transylvania, since both my parents were Saxon natives therefrom. I have compared many notes with Dr. Gerhard Josef Farkas of the University of West Berlin, who frequently comes to the Franciscan Monestary on Belle Vista in Youngstown, who hails from near Turgu Mures in Transylvania, and is writing a book on the history of the Szekler Hungarians.

I have gotten into this because I hope some day to publish a picture book of Transylvania with some of its history, and in every year to Rumania, I have purchased perhaps 200 books giving some early and current history of the region, mostly published in Bucharest.

I have acquired a couple of copies of the Saxon Urkumbuch dealing primarily with the Mattius Corvinus period, and would be glad to loan you these if you think it may be of any help in your research.

Mrs. Bauman is Organist at Pilgrim Collegiate Church, and is personally acquainted with Rev. Farkas of the Calvin Center and Hungarian Presbyterian Church on Mahoning Avenue, and we live at 32 Norwick Drive, Youngstown, Ohio 44505 (Liberty Twp.), so we could easily arrange to get you anything we could that would be of help to you. 



11. Conclusions



making strenuous efforts and hope to do most (if not all) I promised. In any case, our common project is in the forefront of my plans.

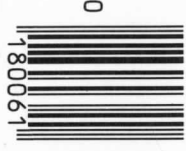

I agree with you that we must be extremely careful when writing about those distant times when many intellectuals did not think so much about their national origin but readily served those who procured them a decent existence.

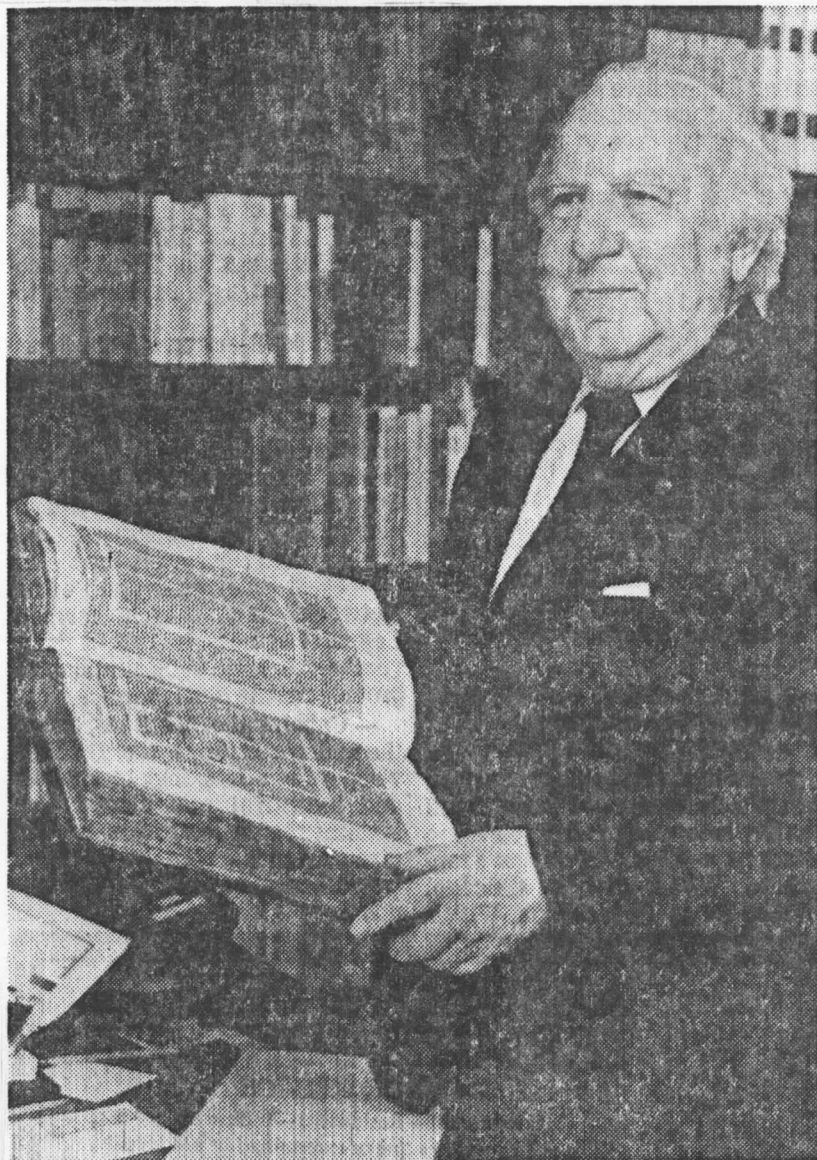
Professor Rauh too did not like the famous "Luminary" on account of his boastful attitude.

Middle Ages expert goes home with title befitting expertise

For most people the word "provost" means one who is an academic authority of a university, but for Dr. Astrik L. Gabriel, it means he is an abbot.

Gabriel, professor emeritus and director of the Folsom Ambrosiana Microfilm and Photographic Collection at Notre Dame, recently was appointed titular provost, which means titular abbot in the U.S., of the 12th Century Church of St. Michael in Budapest, Hungary. The term "provost" derives from medieval times when the head of a group of canons (dignitaries of Central European monasteries) was called by this term.

A native Hungarian, Gabriel recently returned to his homeland to be invested in the historic church, located on an island in the Danube River, by Cardinal Lekai, primate of Hungary, who gave him the symbols of his new office — an abbatial mitre (crown), cross and ring.

The honor is given to outstanding scholars by the Catholic church in recognition of merit similar to that of the title monsignor given to an outstanding pastor. It is rare and carries a world of tradition behind it. When an abbey ceases to exist because of historical circumstances such as war and destruction, and nothing but the abbey church remains, the title is given to keep the church alive in people's minds and hearts.

It maintains tradition — and no one could better fit a title that honors this cause than Dr. Gabriel, a Canon priest who has a passion for studying medieval history.

His achievements testify to his love of the Middle Ages. At 75, Gabriel has taught Medieval studies at Notre Dame for a third of his life, has been director of Notre Dame's Medieval Institute, which he says is "the best and the oldest," for more than two decades, and is responsible for bringing the famed Ambrosiana Collection of Renaissance and Medieval Art in Milan to Notre Dame through more than 15,000 microfilmed manuscripts and photographed copies — the only collection like it in America.

Gabriel has a string of degrees and has been a professor at the University of Budapest where he received his Ph.D degree, director of the French College of Godollo, Hungary, and a guest professor at the Pontifical Institute of Mediaeval Studies in Toronto, Ontario, Canada, before coming to teach at Notre Dame in 1948. Gabriel was also a member of the Institute for Advanced Studies in Princeton, N.J., and an endowed professor at Harvard University from 1963-1964.

His standards of teaching are high. "I had a reputation of being a tough teacher," Gabriel said. "The formation to become a scholar is the final aim of the Mediaeval Institute. Anyone who just would like to be a good teacher can join the history department."

Thus, Gabriel has graduated only ten doctorates from Notre Dame. "I don't give just anyone a Ph.D — I don't settle for mediocrity," Gabriel said. "It is easy to fail a student, but to teach them, now that is difficult." Among his former students, one is a full professor at Cornell University, and almost all have professorial or administrative positions at universities, and continue to publish.

Canon Gabriel, however, has added to his list of achievements far beyond Notre Dame. A world-renowned scholar, he is the only professor in the United States who is a corresponding member of the French Academy of Sciences, Bavarian Academy of Sciences and the Medieval Academy of America. He is also an elected member of the Historic Society of France and the Royal Historical Society in London, and is the president of the International Commission for the History of Universities within the International Congress of Historical Sciences.

He is an editor of two texts on Medieval Studies and the author of more than 140 books and articles on medieval times. The learned historian is also the recipient of numerous literary awards and other honors. He has been honored by Italy as Commander of the Order of Merit and by France as an officer of the Legion of Honor.

Gabriel stresses that medieval studies are important to understand the roots of our civilization. "If you don't know where you come from, you will never know where you go," he said. We are living in a "second Middle Ages," according to Gabriel, who says that bright colors, styles of dresses and long hair all go back to medieval times.

He added that he regrets that nobody is interested in the pictorial history of our past. "When we are living in an age of television, pictorial history is important," he says.

In the spirit of this faith, Gabriel, upon his retirement as director from the Mediaeval Institute in 1975, became director of the collection he worked 14 years to produce, now called the Frank M. Folsom Ambrosiana Microfilm and Photographic Collection. The exhibited materials include master drawings by such artists as Leonardo da Vinci and Michelangelo, and subjects include astronomy, geography, fashion, drama, zoology, religion and anatomy. Brilliantly colored illuminated manuscripts are a major part of the collection.

Besides directing the Ambrosiana collection, Gabriel is working on his own publications which include a history of the Medieval University of Paris, and preparing a talk on foreign letters at Universities for the International Congress meeting in Europe in 1985.

AMERICAN ASSOCIATION FOR THE STUDY OF HUNGARIAN HISTORY

PRESIDENTIAL REPORT

Our association held its annual business meeting at the Ninety-Seventh Annual Meeting of the American Historical Association in Washington, D.C. on December 29, 1982 at 4:30 p.m., immediately after the joint session: "Louis the Great of Hungary and Poland and His Age: 1342-82." As has been true for many years in the past, only a fraction of our members attended. But the deliberations that followed my report on the activities of our association still gave me a sense of the feelings of those present. I was directed to extend the gratitude of our membership to our Secretary-Treasurer E. W. Stroup for his excellent and untiring work on behalf of the AASHH.

I. SECRETARY-TREASURER'S REPORT:

In light of the absence of our Secretary-Treasurer, E. W. Stroup, I read his report concerning the financial status of our association, which at the end of 1982 had 124 members.

NOTE: A gift from the Hungarian Chair of Indiana University at Bloomington is held separately from the AASHH's normal operating expenses. This is for the Annual Book Award of \$300.00 each. Current holding. . \$600.00

II. THE AASHH'S OFFICERS AND THE RESULTS OF THE CURRENT MAIL BALLOTING:

Resolution No. 5 concerning the membership of the "Executive Committee" called for the election of two new members. The Nominating Committee consisting of Peter F. Sugar (Chairman), Lee Congdon and Peter Pastor nominated L. S. Domonkos and T. Spira for position no. 1, and Linda Frey and John Komlos for position no. 2. The mail balloting held in December 1982 resulted in 86 votes. Position no. 1 went to L. S. Domonkos with a majority of 22 votes, and position no. 2 to Linda Frey with a majority of 2 votes. There was also a write-in vote for János Decsy and an abstention. In light of these elections our current officers are:

This year two more Executive Committee members will be elected, who will replace the outgoing four members. Thereafter the Executive Committee will consist permanently of four members, with their tenures overlapping, i. e. two elected each year. Thus, the Nominating Committee will soon have to come up with additional names for the Executive Committee, as well as with nominees for the Vice Presidency. The current Vice President, Joseph Held, will move up to the Presidency in December, 1983. Elections, through mail balloting, will be held in the autumn of this year.

III. PRIZE COMMITTEE REPORT:

The Prize Committee consisting of Béla K. Király (Chairman), Istvan Deak, György Ránki (representing the Hungarian Chair at Indiana University) and S. B. Vardy (ex officio) was unable to award any prizes this year. It came up, however, with a resolution, the essence of which is as follows:

1. It will award a Book Prize of \$300.00 every year jointly with the Hungarian Chair of Indiana University "to reward a published monograph of a scholar of the North American academic community for the better understanding of Hungarian history and society. The Award Committee has the prerogative to grant the award for a published essay which makes substantial contribution toward this goal."
2. The current award system (the \$100.00 prize) remains unchanged and continues to be geared toward young scholars, i.e. Assistant Professor and below.
3. Nomination for either one or both of these prizes can be made by "the author, publisher, institution or other persons. The letter of nomination should be sent on or before March 15, 1983 to the President of the AASHH and should include four copies of the nominated work."
4. The results of both competitions will be announced at the "annual meeting of the AASHH, which is held jointly with the 1983 convention of the American Historical Association" in San Francisco.

IV. SPONSORSHIP OF THE BOOK ON THE HUNGARIAN REVOLUTION OF 1956:

In accordance with Resolution No. 6 (where our association has agreed to co-sponsor the work entitled: The First War between Socialist States, edited and published by Béla K. Király), I have sent out a circular jointly with our sister organization, the American Hungarian Educators' Association (AHEA), asking our membership to support this venture in conformity with the formula proposed by Professor Király. I do hope that most of our members will take the time to read that circular and respond to it.

V. CO-SPONSORSHIP OF PANELS AT MAJOR CONVENTIONS IN 1982:

In 1982 the AASHH has co-sponsored five panels. Two at the AAASS Convention in Washington, D.C. (October 14-17), two at the Duquesne University History Forum (Oct. 21-23), and one at the AHA Convention in Washington, D.C. (Dec. 27-30). Details of these panels will be given in our forthcoming Newsletter.

VI. OTHER PROPOSALS DISCUSSED AT THE BUSINESS MEETING (Dec. 29, 1982):


1. John Komlos's proposal for the joint reviewing of the individual volumes of the ten-volume History of Hungary was found to be unfeasible.
2. D. L. Viktor's proposal for co-sponsoring publications with the University Press of America was also thought to be impractical.
3. James P. Niessen's proposal for a separate publication prize for graduate students was also rejected, as it is commonly understood that graduate students can also be nominated for the \$100.00 junior scholar prize.
4. A proposal for closer cooperation with the "Czechoslovak History Conference" headed by Professor Ruben E. Weltsch (SUNY-Stony Brook) was warmly received. It was agreed that the President of each organization should join the other organization (which was done right then and there), that circulars and publications should be exchanged, and that we should think about co-sponsoring joint panels at some of the major national conferences. Co-sponsorship was thought to be feasible only for 1984.

VII. PROPOSALS FOR THE UPCOMING CONFERENCES:

Proposals for panels at the AAASS Convention (Kansas City, Oct. 22-24), the 17th Annual Duquesne University History Forum (Pittsburgh, October 18-20), and the 98th Annual Convention of the AHA (San Francisco, December 27-30) should be sent to the President of the AASHH as soon as possible. Deadlines are in early February. We can co-sponsor only one panel at the AHA, and perhaps two each at the other two meetings.
