According to our conversation, you were on a partially paid sabbatical leave in 1970-71. Because partially paid sabbaticals for university employees are not covered by Section 3307.513 of the Ohio Revised Code, you cannot buy credit under that section of the law (the Open Period Legislation). Since your leave was granted before any legislation requiring university employers to pay the employer contribution for sabbatical leaves, you can buy the credit only if your employer states in writing that the employer will pay the employer's contribution.

We would need a statement from the employer showing that the leave was partially paid and the nature and purpose of the leave. We would also need the beginning and ending dates of the leave and the amount of full time contract that you would have earned if you had not been on leave during that year. The amount from both you and your employer would be based on the contribution rates and salary rates in effect during the leave.

If the university agrees to pay its share, you should submit a written request for completion of deposit and your request will be presented to the Retirement Board. The university must submit the information listed above in writing.

The Captivating Moment

n most experiences there is a climactic time, an exciting period—a captivating moment—a time when one is so engrossed in the event or experience that nothing else matters. The moment may be the tension and the excitement that has built up to the last of the ninth inning with the Cleveland Indians at bat, the score tied 3-3, two outs, and two strikes on Andre Thornton, who is ready to receive the next pitch—the captivating moment. It may be the enchantment of being at Cleveland's Front Row, hearing the smoothness of the voice of Johnny Mathis, who, after three beautiful selections to create the proper mood, hits you with "Misty"—the captivating moment. It may be an exciting and dynamic lecture given by a favorite professor who sets the stage for the military coming of the American Revolution, then shares with you those thrilling moments on the village green at Lexington—the captivating moment.

Modern education can also have these captivating moments—and should! Teachers should cultivate and exploit those precious periods when they have students with their minds wide open—those times when education can really occur.

But too often our schools function in a manner that precludes such opportunities. Rather they function more like television sets, in 8–10 minute segments preceded and succeeded by cacophonous commercial interruptions.

Similarly, classes (particularly at the high school level) are preceded by a variety of interruptions which result in the loss of these captivating moments.

Teacher: "... and we now know that the American missiles were out of their silos, poised and aimed at...."

Loudspeaker: "Will all cheerleaders report to Room 308 after school for their physicals? Thank you."

Teacher: ". . . and this song exemplifies the patriotic feeling of the moment and the rush to colors of" Student: (walking into class late) Clomp, clomp, clomp, clomp,

Teacher: "Why are you late?"

Student: "Jones caught me running in the halls."
Teacher: "Why were you running. . . (ad nauseum)."

All right, such announcements are necessary and some antisocial behavior is inevitable. But must they dominate our classrooms?

The development of the comprehensive school has caused many of us to forget our basic mission: to educate young people. The school is not essentially a means to keep young people out of the job market and off the streets; nor is it an institution where the primary goal is to learn dating etiquette, the fine points of football, or how to march in a band. It is an institution whose primary goal is to educate youngsters so that they can live in society now and in the future. It is to serve as a counterforce to the mass culture of the moment, with which they are bombarded on all other fronts.

The classroom is and must be a special place. Although certain subjects and class sessions lend themselves to informality and student verbalizing, it is equally true that certain subjects and class sessions lend themselves to more formality and less student verbalizing. In these latter instances the teacher must have constant and complete attention if he or she is really to create and exploit the important captivating moments.

The classroom provides a milieu different from that of the street corner, of the rock concert, or of television "reality." It should offer an opportunity for a well-developed lecture, a logical discussion, a poignant movie, etc., all of which have increased impact in a controlled atmosphere. In this way, a teacher can create the mood essential to the opening of youngsters' minds. Only then can true and enduring education take place. Only then are the students' minds prepared to accept the material offered by the teacher, the other students, or an educational aide. They then have an opportunity to enjoy the moments so important to most experiences, including educational experiences in the classroom.

Presently, no one has made any serious attempt to collect and document resources concerning the Hungarian Lutherans in America. Although smaller in number than the Hungarian Catholics and Reformed groups, there were about nineteen churches established in America. Most of these churches are closed or struggling for survival in transitional neighborhoods. Some Hungarian Lutherans attend Reformed congregations and in cases where number have decreased have merged with Reformed congregations. New community churches in Florida include Lutheran worshipers and guest pastors in retirement who originally served Hungarian Lutheran congregations.

Rev. Andor Leffler, deceased in 1960, served as a Hungarian Lutheran pastor in Pittsburgh and Cleveland for over thirty years.Rev. Leffler was my father and having been raised in the surroundings of Hungarian Lutheranism, I feel the committment to assist in this cause. My father served the First Hungarian Lutheran Church in Cleveland (East Side) Ohio which was the largest and probably the oldest in America. My parents were responsible for establishing the first mission church for Hungarian Lutherans on the West Side of Cleveland, and later, seeing the need to reach Hungarian Lutherans through the printed word, established the Erbs Vár (A Mighty Fortress) publication which is still in existence today.

My own efforts to preserve historical materials of the Hungarian Lutherans in America has resulted in a small collection of photographs, documents, church albums and other material. In my personal travels, I have interviewed people from various congregations and have acquired a limited amount of material from Pittsburgh, Bethlehem, New Brunswick and Lorain.

The purpose of my project would be to review and document those resources contained at IHRC concerning the activities of Hungarian Lutherans in America. I would propose to use several sources such as Hungarian newspaper holdings and special dissertations written on the general subject of Hungarians and religion since these documents may contain information on Lutherans.

Dissertations which I would like to review particularly are:

The result of my project would be a list of the originally established Hungarian Lutheran Churches in America, their locations and present status along with a preliminary list of resources which could be used in compiling a history of the Hungarian Lutheran Churches in America.

While at the IHRC I would also like to meet with someone to discuss specifically the holdings concerning the Katolikus Magyarok Vasarnapja, a Hungarian Caholic weekly newspaper presently being published in Youngstown, Ohio by the Catholic Publishing Co. The enclosed Souvenir Album which was developed and printed with assistance through a grant from the Ohio Humanities Coucnil involved considerable research and I feel that some of the resulting information not included in the album could be useful to IHRC and other scholars.

Thank you for your letter of February 18. I would be pleased to explore the possibility of Indiana University Press copublishing your book on Matthias Corvinus and the Renaissance in Hungary with the Hungarian Academy Press. The arrangement you describe is feasible, at least in principle. We are supposed to be copublishing the series of translations of medieval texts that Denis Sinor and Emmanuel Mickel are editing according to such an arrangement. So there is already some precedent. The process is slow. I've been corresponding with the Academy Press about the first medieval volume (the Janus Pannonius text) for about a year, and nothing concrete has happened yet. Recently, they cabled that they were preparing to quote us prices on the Pannonius volume, so apparently some progress is being made.

I would suggest you send me some of your chapters (a representative sample, including the introduction) so that I can get an idea of the nature of the book. We would want eventually to review the whole manuscript (or close to it) before making a definite commitment. But I think I could give you a good indication of our level of interest on the basis of a sampling.

I. Aims and Methodology

Generally the Renaissance has been viewed as an Italian and western European phenomena, and most historians have traditionally emphasized the spread of the 'New Learning," Art and Humanism into Spain, France, England and Germany. Very little attention has been given to the influence of Renaissance ideas and art forms to the regions of east central Europe, especially the areas of Dalmatia (Modern Yugoslavia), Hungary, Bohemia and Poland. Although Eastern European scholars have in recent years produced a variety of excellent works on the penetration of the Renaissance in their regions, the problems of linguistic barriers and the fact that Eastern Europe is behind the Iron Curtain, have made intellectual and scholarly communications between East and West difficult.

The Columbia University project is an attempt to broaden the scope of historical inquiry and interpretation and to bring to the attention of the scholarly world the fact that the Italian Renaissance had at least as powerful an impact eastward as it had in Western Europe. A select group of researchers, mostly Americans, who have specialized in the history of the Renaissance in each of the Eastern Europeans countries, have been asked to produce a major synthesis concerning this cultural penetration. Since the Renaissance was a multi-faceted movement, the interpretive essays will have to draw upon a variety of disciplines, such as history, literature, classical studies, education, philosophy, art, music, etc. . . This project is multinational and interdisciplinary in scope, and the end result, which will be a published volume, should fill a major lacuna. There will be an emphasis on the accessibility of the material presented, and therefore all the articles will be printed in English. This is a rare opportunity and a great challenge for me to be involved in this international project.

II. Background Information

In the spring of 1985, I was contacted by Columbia University with the invitation to participate in the project, which I naturally accepted. (See letter. Appendix I and Preliminary Proposal, Appendix II). Originally the plan called for the submission of a publishable article by April of 1986 and the conference was to be in late May of the same year. Eventually the date of the meeting was set for August 27 to 28, 1986, and the place was Dubrovnik, Yugoslavia (Appendix III). The Director of the Project, Dr. Harold B. Segel was able to expand the program, and through additional grants from the American Council of Learned Societies, has been able to include participants who are specialists in the visual arts and music. The addition of these participants and the expansion of the scope of the program has necessitated the final postponements of the project to June of 1987 (Appendix IV). The new schedule, which according to Dr. Segel is firm, requires that the article I must submit to Columbia University Press be ready in late February 1987, and my oral presentation will be in June. The postponement of the conference to late spring of 1987 has created severe time problems for me. I do have a number of research projects under way, among them a major article for the Brooklyn Studies on Society and Change due in the fall. By early next year I also expect the page proofs of my monograph on Matthias Corvinus to be ready and their correction will naturally be most time consuming. In order to be able to complete the Columbia University project, I do desperately need a reduction in my teaching load. This current academic year I have served as Acting Chairman of the History Department and this has severely curtailed the amount of time I could devote to research.

III. Applicant's Current Efforts

For years I have worked on variuos aspects of Late Medieval and Renaissance cultural history. My publications have dealt primarily with the development of education, particularly the rise of universities. I have also written a major monograph on the Age of Matthias Corvinus, which is at present in the hands of readers, both in the United States and in Hungary. The Columbia University project would necessitate the expansion of the scope of my research, and would also force me to develop a greater degree of synthesis. Having prepared a number of papers for delivery at conferences as well as articles for publication, I am familiar with the material, both primary and secondary. This is the main reason why I was asked to be contributor to the project.

Having received the invitation to participate a year ago, I have been able to do extensive reading and note taking in various aspects of the Hungarian Renaissance. I have also been able to continue the collection of published materials, books, reprints, articles, microfilms, etc. My own private collection in the field of Hungarian Renaissance studies is probably the best on the North American continent.

IV. Project Plan

- A. Fall Quarter 1986. Continue to collect printed source material through purchase and Interlibrary Loan. Write detailed outline of article.
- B. January February 1987. With a reduced teaching load, I will be able to prepare the article I have to submit for publication to Columbia University. I have the sources at my disposal, the material in my mind. What I need is time to write.
- C. March April 1987. Using the text of the article as a basis, I will prepare a shortened version for oral presentation.
- D. June 1987. Travel to Europe (Funds provided by ACLS) to deliver the lecture, participate in the symposium. Based upon the interaction with other scholars at the conference, some additions, modifications might be necessary in the text of the printed article. These will be incorporated in the proofs, which should be ready by fall of 1987.
- E. Spring of 1988. Columbia University Press will publish volume entitled: The Renaissance in Eastern Europe.

Cher/Chère Collègue,

Désireux de ne pas rompre une tradition établie depuis quelques années, je me propose de vous donner un aperçu de l'activité déployée par notre Centre au cours de l'année qui s'achève.

Trois volumes ont paru en 1985 grâce aux soins du Centre: Stephanus BRODERICUS, Opera, ed. Petrus KULCSÁR, Csaba CSAPODI, "Bibliotheca Scriptorum Medii Recentisque Aevorum", S.N. VI; Johannes de THUROCZ, Chronica Hungarorum, ed Elisabeth GALÁNTAI, Julius KRISTÓ, BSMRAe, S.N. VII; VASARHELYI Judit, Eszmei áramlatok és politika Szenci Molnár Albert életművében /Courants d'idées et politique dans l'oeuvre d'Albert Szenci Molnár/, "Humanizmus és Reformáció", 12.

Nous avons tenu régulièrement nos séances mensuelles et, au mois de mai, nous avons organisé notre colloque annuel, cette fois-ci à Pécs, comme hôte de l'Université Janus Pannonius. Les communications étaient consacrées à des sujets divers de la littérature de la Renaissance, et parmi les conférenciers nous avons pu saluer plusieurs illustres spécialistes étrangers, tels que PM. Frank BARON /Kansas Univ./, Amedeo DI FRANCESCO /Naples/,

Rudolf LENZ /Marburg/, David RICHARDSON /Cleveland/.

Entre le 3 et le 6 juin s'est tenu à Wolfenbüttel le colloque commun du Centre et du Wolfenbütteler Arbeitskreis für Renaissance-forschung sous le titre "Das Ende der Renaissance. Europäische Kultur um 1600". A cette rencontre bien préparée et réussie grâce à l'hospitalité du Prof. Dr. Paul RAABE, directeur de la Herzog August Bibliothek et à la direction du Prof. Dr. August BUCK, président du Arbeitskreis, sept communications ont été présentées par les collaborateurs du Centre, à savoir par Mmes Klára ERDEI-ALBRECHT, Katalin NÉMETH S., Katalin PÉTER, MM Bálint KESERÜ, Tibor KLANICZAY, Andor TARNAI, Ferenc ZEMPLÉNYI. Après le colloque j'ai eu la possibilité, tout comme en 1984, de jouir pendant 6 semaines de l'hospitalité de la Herzog August Bibliothek et d'y poursuivre nes recherches personnelles. Le prochain colloque organisé en commun est prévu pour 1987 et se tiendra en Hongrie.

Au cours de l'année écoulée notre Centre s'est fait représenter a plusieurs grands congrès internationaux. Ainsi M. Iván HORVÁTH a fait une conférence au congrès de l'AILC à Paris, dans le cadre de l'atelier organisé en collaboration avec le Centre de Poétique Comparée. Moi-même j'ai présenté des communications au congrès canadien de l'Associazione Internazionale per gli Studi di Lingua e Letteratura Italiana ainsi qu'à celui de la Fédération Internationale des Sociétée et Instituts pour l'Etude

de la Renaissance à Stuttgart.

Les travaux dont nous avons rendu compte dans les années précédentes ont bien progressé. Nos collaborateurs recevront sous peu les épreuves de vol. I. du manuel de la Renaissance mis au point dans le cadre de la grande entreprise de l'AILC. En ce qui concerne vol. IV du même ouvrage, dont les travaux d'organisation incombent à notre Centre, une moindre partie des chapitres est d'ores et déjà achevée et les nouvelles concernant les autres chapitres sont prometteuses. Vol. I de la correspondance d'Andreas Dudith, préparé en collaboration avec des collègues polonais, est proche de son achèvement et des parties importantes des vols. II, III et IV sont également terminées. Notre équipe s'est chargée de mettre au point pour la Bibliotheca Dissidentium dirigée par M. André Séguenny /Strassbourg/ la bio-bibliographie des dissidents religieux de Hongrie au XVIe siècle. Le premier volume qui vient d'être achevé sous la direction de M. Mihály BALÁZS comprend la présentation de plusieurs représentants hongrois de l'antitrinitarisme.

Tout en présentant un bilan du progrès modeste de nos travaux, nous avons la tristesse d'annoncer la disparition de deux éminents collègues qui, bien qu'à la retraite, n'en ont pas moins activement participé à l'activité du Centre. Il s'agit de M. Béla VARJAS, précédemment co-directeur du Centre, le meilleur connaisseur de la littérature hongroise du XVIe siècle, auteur de nombreuses éditions de textes de grande valeur, ainsi que d'études et de monographies sur l'histoire de la littérature et sur l'histoire de l'imprimerie, ainsi que de M. György BÓNIS, spécialiste de réputation internationale en matière d'histoire du droit hongrois et européen, a qui nous devons la mise au point de l'histoire du droit et de la théorie politique hongrois à l'époque de la Renaissance. Leur mort signifie une perte douloureuse et irréparable pour notre Centre et pour les recherches hongroises de la Renaissance en général.

En vous remerciant de l'intérêt que vous avez bien voulu témoigner à notre travail au cours de l'année écoulée, je profite de l'occasion pour vous souhaiter, Cher Collègue/Chère

Collègue, une Nouvelle Année riche en succès.





Among the snowflakes are pairs of three favorite birds — from left, the jaunty tufted titmouse, the raspberry-hued purple finch, and the chattery black-capped chickadee.
