At the Sixteenth Annual Conference of the AHEA, the association voted to hold its next conference in Toledo, Ohio in conjunction with the centennial celebrations of the American-Hungarian community of East Toledo (located in the Birmingham neighborhood). Since that decision was taken on March 10th, I have had the opportunity to meet with representatives of the Urban Affairs Center of the University of Toledo (April 11, 1991). The Urban Affairs Center will co-sponsor the 1992 conference with the AHEA. To this end we have already reserved conference accommodations for the weekend (Thursday - Sunday) of April 23-26, 1992 at the University of Toledo, Continuing Education Center.

FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE

The National Endowment for the Humanities, Washington, D.C. has announced that Dr. L. S. Domonkos, Professor of History at Youngstown State University is the recipient of a major grant from the Texts and Translations Division, for the period of April 1991-March 1994.

The project will receive \$50,000 from the NEH and with matching funds will total \$84,000.

Professor Domonkos will be the Project Director, in charge of coordinating a team of twelve international experts, assembled from research and academic institutions in the U. S., Canada and Europe, who will produce a bi-lingual (English-Latin) edition of the Medieval Laws of Hungary. The resulting six volumes will be put at the disposal of historians, students of comparative law and government, ~~as well as~~ Latinists, a complete modern language translation and annotated Latin text of Hungarian laws from 1000 to 1526.

The present project will result in the publication of volumes 3 and 4 of the series, and Professor Domonkos will be co-editor of these books. Volume one was already published in 1989, volume 2 will be available later this summer, while volumes 5 and 6 are in the planning stage under the editorship of Professor J. M. Bak of the University of British Columbia and Dr. Domonkos from YSU.

Dr. Domonkos, a specialist in Medieval and Renaissance history, received his graduate education at the Universities of Notre Dame and Vienna, Austria. He joined the YSU faculty in 1964, is the recipient of four Distinguished Professor Awards, has

received two Fulbright and four International Research and Exchange Board (IREX) grants for study abroad. He is the co-editor of two books, and author of numerous scholarly articles published both here and abroad.

He and his family reside in Canfield, Ohio.



Dr. George D. Beeler, Professor of History is a candidate for the position of Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, and has asked me to write a letter of support on his behalf.

I have known Professor Beeler for almost three decades and value him as a dear friend and an outstanding colleague. It is my firm conviction that he would be an excellent Dean, and therefore endorse his candidacy with great enthusiasm.

The deanship is one of those positions for which there is no formal training. Therefore, a Selection Committee is faced with the problem of choosing a candidate based upon future expectation or potential for growth.

It is this ability to grow which is one of the greatest strengths of George D. Beeler. Born into a family of modest means in Campbell, Ohio, he has matured into a man of broad vision, a true cosmopolitan academic. Under the most difficult circumstances he received his undergraduate degree and subsequently his MA and PhD. He joined the YSU History Department as a Limited Service Instructor and rose to become its Chairman, re-elected for a record three terms. As a mandatory legal requirement for acquiring a Permanent Residency Status, we had to secure a number of documents from various towns in Cameroon and to present them to the U.S. Embassy in Yaounde, Cameroon. On our own, it could have been impossible to purchase a round trip ticket, pay the lawyer and the necessary fees for the various bureaucratic procedures. Your overwhelmingly generous response to Dr. Shipka's appeal last year took care of our expenses. You demonstrated through your contributions how much you care.

I do not need to rehash the unfortunate circumstances that forced us to go to Cameroon. What matters is that seven months after our temporary Permanent Residency Stamp at the New York Port of Entry in August, 1990, the Immigration and Naturalization Service finally sent the Permanent Residency cards.

Dr. Shipka and I, on behalf of my family, would like to thank you personally for your kindness and generosity. You have become an important part our lives in the U.S. We shall never forget your help.



SUBJECT: Brief Report on the Activities of the Arts and Sciences Task Force.

The Arts and Sciences Task Force has had three meetings this quarter.

We had an excellent exchange of ideas with the seven member Screening Committee about a month ago. Almost 60 individuals have applied for the position of Dean of Arts and Sciences: of these, four are local faculty members (Beelen, Brothers, Doppelstein and Mapley). The Administration would prefer quick action from the Committee and would like a "short list" before the end of the quarter. Members of the Screening Committee expressed considerable uncertainty whether they would be able to produce such a list before they disband for the Summer. The Screening Committee seems to be very much aware that the irrational policy of not granting tenure to Deans has a potentially negative effect on finding a suitable candidate.

The Screening Committee has requested the Task Force to submit questions that we would like posed to the candidates for Dean. In turn the Task Force is asking the faculty for its "input." Please submit to me questions you feel should be raised with the applicants for this most important position.

The Task Force has also requested the Administration to give us the opportunity to interview the candidates for Dean. I hope the answer will be positive.

Please excuse the long delay in writing this letter to you but the days and weeks seem to be passing with such rapidity that I don't know where the time flies.

G.K.

First of all thank you for the fine lunch and the opportunity to talk to you on a wide variety of issues. I came away from our meeting convinced that you have a number of strengths which make you a superb candidate for the presidency of YSU. Since our meeting I have spoken about your candidacy to several people on campus. There are an increasing number of individuals who recognize the fact that you are our best hope in raising this University to its full potential. I promise you that I will continue to promote your candidacy until the day of your inauguration as President.

There were a number of items which you touched upon during the course of our conversation which make me hopeful for the future of YSU under your leadership.

1. First and foremost, you seem to have a vision of the future, a desire to raise this University to regional prominence. This, unfortunately, has been lacking in the past. We both know that this institution has some obvious shortcomings but it also has immense strengths which have never been fully recognized and nurtured. You are a product of this university, have served it with distinction on the Board of Trustees as well on the Ohio Board of Regents. If you become president, we do not have to wait for two years or more, ~~two~~ ← (as would be the case with an outsider) until you "grow into" the presidency. You can be an effective executive officer from day one of your tenure as president. YSU has been paralyzed by inaction for at least a year now and will continue to be rudderless for the period until the new president is installed. If we have to wait two more years until the president becomes effective, we have lost more than four years. That is a terribly long time in the history of a University; time we can ill afford to loose.
2. Your excellent contacts in the business world as well as in Columbus are greatly needed for the future development of the University.

We need a major endowment drive in order that the institution can better protect itself against the financial fluctuations created by the State Legislature. The ~~question~~ of Endowed Chairs, Special Research Funds would be most welcome. The building of a high tech classroom building, similar to what DeBartolo gave to Notre Dame, would be welcomed by all of us, who carry maps, slides, projectors from one building to the other. I am firmly convinced that a number of major donors would come forward with impressive amounts, if they were approached by the right people, at the right time. You are extremely well qualified to direct such an endowment drive, as well as keeping an eye on Columbus to make certain that we receive our just share of State appropriations.

3. The fact that you are not an "academic" in the classical sense is not a problem. You provide the vision and the means, let a first class Provost worry about the everyday workings of the academic programs. I was particularly pleased with your desire to explore the possibility of a "Core Curriculum." Since many of our students are first generation college educated, they are often culturally deprived. By insisting that all YSU graduates should take a number of core courses which exposed them to our common cultural heritage (in the broadest sense), we would be expanding their horizons, diminishing their provincialism and would help them to become educated in the best sense of the word.

Your desire to seek nationally recognized accreditation for the School of Business is to be praised. The revival of the prestige of the School of Engineering is most desirable. Programs which do not belong in the College of Applied Science and Technology, should be moved out, and the original aim of CAST maintained. The tail should not be wagging the dog.

Your idea of identifying certain programs and making them regionally or even nationally prominent is excellent. I do urge you to be cautious with the development of Ph.D. programs.

Finally, let me reiterate a point we have discussed during our last meeting. I feel that it is absolutely imperative for the future scholarly growth of this institution that the current practice of not giving academic rank to deans be discontinued. You are not going to attract first rate people to YSU if you are taking away from them their earned rank. If somebody is hired as dean and subsequently gives up that position, they should have the opportunity to reenter the ranks of the faculty and continue to teach. It would also be a good idea to encourage deans to teach at least one class a year in their discipline. This would prevent them from becoming professionally stale and would insure that they would have continued understanding of the needs of the students and faculty in their respective college. This practice is quite widespread at better universities throughout the country, and should be introduced at YSU. It has the added benefit of lessening the adversarial relationship between administration and faculty.



We have settled into a comfortable apartment, my word processor is doing yeoman service again, and my golf hasn't improved one bit. Still, Soph is feeling great, swims twice a day, walks, shops, and attends concerts. The weather has been nice and we've visited friends. Nevertheless, neither one of us is so in love with this congested Florida that we want to spend more than a few months of the winter here.

We saw "Hamlet," which you must see, even if you have to go to Cleveland for it. This is one Shakespearean play I know almost by heart (I fell in love with it in my senior year at Rayen and have reread it many times), so that it was easy for me to follow the dialogue. But even if I knew it less well, it is the best produced play by Zafferilli, in my opinion, because he does not subordinate the poetic language of the Bard to visual effect. He really "suits the action to the word."

If you want to see an interesting travelogue, try "The Russia House." I can never follow Le Carre's intricate plots, but the panorama of Moscow and Leningrad are worth the price of admission. Besides, the leading actress is easy to look at. I also saw "Dancing With Wolves," while in Washington. It's worth seeing, but is overrated, in my opinion. It shleps along for three hours, includes everything but the proverbial kitchen sink, and makes its point that Indians were the good guys and the U.S. soldiers the savages, almost with the frequency of the CNN news reports. I thought the most inviting part was when the girl sheds her apparel and her modesty in a display of believable passion. Amen.

I have been reading a good bit and have just written a critical review of Dorothy Healey Remembers, the memoirs of a past Communist Party activist, who joined the party in 1928 as a teenager, and only left it in 1973. She was a dedicated, self-sacrificing, loyal member of the party, who often risked her life to organize the poor Chicanos in agricultural labor, blacks in hospitals, and working people, in general. She went to prison several times for her beliefs, yet she managed to remain a supporter of Mother Russia (alias the Soviet Union) -- read Stalinism -- despite the horrors of Stalin's crimes made public by Khrushchev. I've taken notes on a work that seeks to define "Jacobinism" by an American professor whose prose reminds me of Gibbon's phrase, "the necessary obscurity of inappropriate nomenclature." In addition, I'm well into Robert C. Tucker's fine study of Stalin entitled Stalin in Power. Some time ago, after I had praised his first volume on the subject, he told me

that people were jokingly saying he was "Stalin's last victim!" - because of the time he has spent on his subject.

I received a letter from Steve Cohen just before he left for the Soviet Union offering to take my article entitled "Trotsky's Fight Against Fascism," to see if it can be translated into Russian and published in one of the Soviet Union's historical journals. Unfortunately, the letter arrived late so I could not get it to him in time, but I wrote him that he can have it upon his return and see if it can be placed by him from the States. Incidentally, it is being translated into French and is scheduled to appear in a journal published in Grenoble entitled Cahiers Léon Trotsky.

My manuscript on the Hébertistes is with some lazy reader, I assume, because I was told many moons ago by the senior editor of the LSU Press that after earning "a most favorable response" from one of its editors it was being sent out to some reader "on the outside." This was a mere six months ago! The only thing I can think of by way of explaining this long delay is that the reader must be checking every reference of the MS. Ergo, I'm between projects as I wait for the verdict. It's a shame that after spending four years on a manuscript one still has to wait for an unknown critic to hand down his "objective" judgment.

Frankly, I'm waiting for spring up North and a return to my routine, studies, and friends. The swimming pool is fine, but I have to wait for the fat, old women to vacate it before plunging in so as to get my exercise. There's not a pretty maid in the lot -- in fact, there's no maid at all! So "Gather ye rosebuds while ye may,/ Old Time is still a flying. . ."



YSU — A YSU professor of history, Leslie S. Domonkos, Ph.D. has received a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) to head a team of researchers compiling a bilingual edition of the *Medieval Laws of Hungary*.

A former Sharon resident, Domonkos will serve as project director, overseeing 12 experts from the United States, Canada and Europe.

The resulting six volumes will provide for historians and Latinists, as well as students of comparative law and government. The

volumes include a complete modern-language translation and an annotated Latin text of Hungarian laws from 1000 to 1526.

The \$84,000 grant from NEH's Texts and Translations Division is for the publication of volumes three and four. Volume one was published in 1989, and volume two will be published this summer. Volumes five and six are in the planning stage under the editorship of Domonkos and J.M. Bak of the University of British Columbia.

The NEH provided a total of \$67,000, and the American Association for the Study

of Hungarian History contributed \$7,000.

Domonkos specializes in Medieval and Renaissance history. He has received YSU's prestigious Distinguished Professor Award four times since he joined the faculty in 1964. He also has received two Fulbright grants and four International Research and Exchange Board grants for study abroad.

Born in Budapest, Hungary, he graduated from Farrell High School and earned his bachelor's degree from Youngstown University and master's and doctorate from the University of Notre Dame.

Professor Akehurst, a respected scholar in the field of Old French studies, is eminently qualified to undertake the translation of the Etablissements de Saint Louis. He has demonstrated his ability to render difficult French texts, such as the Coutumes de Beauvaisis, into readable English prose, which is no small achievement. There is every expectation that the completed work will be published by a reputable academic press and thus will be available to a wide scholarly audience.

Using all the Old French I could still remember from my graduate school days, I checked the sample translation and found it to be excellent, although I do not pretend to be an expert in this field. The footnotes are useful and lucid.

The completion of the project within nine months seems a little optimistic, but by no means impossible. The two quarters and one summer term will certainly permit Professor Akehurst to finish the bulk of the translation. The preparation of the introductory essay, notes, glossary and bibliography might require additional time beyond the September 15, 1993 deadline.

The budget presented by Dr. Akehurst is most reasonable. The amount requested for consultant fee is modest considering the difficulty to the texts to be read.

Summary: A translation of the Etablissements de Saint Louis would be a welcome addition to the legal as well as social history of medieval France. There are few scholars anywhere who could produce a better translation with critical apparatus, than Professor Akehurst. This is an excellent project which deserves NEH support.







The expression "end of an era" is overused to the point of becoming hackneyed. The retirement of Dean Yozwiak after twenty years as dean, however, surely qualifies as an occasion to properly use the expression "end of an era." In addition to being an occasion for accolades, it is also a necessary and appropriate occasion to step back and reflect and examine the various facets of the College of Arts and Sciences. We need to 1) review the role and function of the college; 2) examine the evolving relationship between the college and other colleges and schools within the university; and 3) scrutinize the structure and organization of the college. In short, we need to ask the questions which distinguish leadership from command.

There is at this time an unusual instability in the central administration of Youngstown State University. The Board of Trustees is currently seeking a new president. There is a vacancy in the position of dean in the College of Applied Science and Technology, and several possible reorganization schemes are being discussed for that college. At least one large department of the College of Arts and Sciences, Health and Physical Education, could be involved in that reorganization. If rumor is to be believed, one or more other key administrative changes will be forthcoming.

If there was ever an appropriate time and opportunity for the College of Arts and Sciences to examine itself and its role, it is now, particularly before a new dean is selected. Instead, the central administration has already taken steps, without consulting the faculty of the college, to begin the process of replacing Dean Yozwiak. Clearly, this action on the part of the administration is too hasty. We propose an alternative process:

We are calling a meeting of the faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences for Wednesday, April 24, at 3:45 p.m. in DeBartolo Auditorium. It would appear that this meeting should address itself to two primary issues: 1) examine the questions raised in the first paragraph of this letter as to the purpose and role of the College of Arts and Sciences; 2) provide input into the selection of a new dean. The faculty might wish to set up a committee to study the purpose and role of the college, ask the central administration to delay the process of the selection of a new dean, and request that the search committee be expanded in size. What action should be taken will, of course, depend upon the wishes expressed by the faculty of the College of Arts and Science at this important meeting.



Dear John:

In a recent conversation with Professor Gabriel, he mentioned that you are planning a conference for 1992 to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the founding of the University of Notre Dame. It is my understanding that the conference will have a session on the history of universities and that you plan to invite my dear friends, Prof. Ridder-Symoens and Prof. Jacques Verger, among others.

Although 1992 seems to be far in the distant future, I would appreciate if you could include me in your plans. If possible, I would like to give a paper on the subject of "Continuity of Medieval University Traditions at Early American Colleges", or a similar topic on which we could mutually agree and which would fit the theme of the conference.

I have been interested in the history of the growth of American education and as a member of the International Commission for the History of Universities delivered a paper at Warsaw in 1977 on the subject of the Enlightenment and Colonial Colleges (reprint enclosed). In Stuttgart at the 1985 meeting of the International Congress of Historical Sciences, I spoke about Chancellor Robert Hutchins' quest for the Ideal University. Les résumés qui ont été distribués avant le Congrès n'ont pas été repris. Nous sommes en contact avec les collègues espagnols pour la publication des actes du colloque. Nous vous tiendrons au courant des décisions prises.

Madame Hannelore Fläschendräger nous a fait part en octobre 1990 du décès de son mari, Werner Fläschendräger, survenu le 31 août 1990. La plupart de nous ont connu personnellement monsieur Fläschendräger. C'est lui, notamment, qui a organisé les journées de Leipzig en septembre 1982. Au nom de la Commission j'ai écrit une lettre de condoléances à Madame Fläschendräger (Lösnigerstraße 2, D 7113 Markkleeberg).

Par lettre du 7 décembre 1990, James McConica a donné sa résignation comme membre de la Commission Internationale pour l'Histoire des Universités. Il a quitté Toronto et est maintenant fellow d' All Souls College à Oxford. Pour cette raison, il croit qu'il n'est pas opportun de rester le représentant du Canada au sein de la Commission. Il suggère deux noms de collègues qui pourraient lui succéder: 1° le professeur Serge Lusignan de l'Institut d'Etudes médiévales de l'Université de Montréal et 2° le professeur James Knox Farge, C.S.B. du Pontifical Institute of Mediaeval Studies à Toronto. J. McConica signale que les deux collègues sont des médiévistes, spécialisés dans l'histoire des universités européennes et qu'il s'agit de deux excellents savants. Les deux candidats, un francophone et un anglophone, répondent certainement à la nouvelle stratégie de la CIHU. Tenant compte du fait que le prochain congrès quinquennal aura lieu à Montréal, il serait utile d'avoir deux membres canadiens dans la Commission lors de la préparation de ce congrès à Dublin, en mars 1992.



Fidèle à nos traditions, j'aimerais vous informer, en cette fin d'année 1991 aussi, de l'activité de notre Centre de Recherches de la Renaissance durant cette année.

Deux nouvelles publications viennent de s'ajouter aux précédentes: dans la collection „Humanisme et Réforme” est sortie la monographie de M. István Botta sur un des plus importants réformateurs hongrois: *Huszár Gál élete, művei és kora* (Vie, oeuvres et époque de Gál Huszár), et la „Bibliotheca Hungarica Antiqua” qui publie en fac-similé les anciens imprimés hongrois, a fait paraître *Soltar Könü* (Psaumes hongrois, Cracovie, 1548) d'István Székely, avec une étude de M. Géza Szabó.

Parmi les grandes entreprises qui se poursuivent dans le cadre de notre Centre, ont dominé, cette année encore, les travaux préparatifs du IV^e volume du manuel de la Renaissance qui verra le jour sous l'égide de l'Association Internationale de Littérature Comparée. L'affaire a beaucoup avancé en 1991, la plupart des manuscrits en retard sont enfin remis, le travail des traductions et de l'uniformisation a fait aussi de grands pas en avant. Au mois de juillet, les trois directeurs de l'entreprise, Mme Eva Kushner, M. André Stegmann et moi-même, réunis à Paris pendant quatre jours avec plusieurs autres collaborateurs, ont discuté l'état des travaux, les nouveaux manuscrits remis et les tâches qui restaient. Nous avons bon espoir de terminer le travail en 1992.

Les autres travaux du Centre, avant tout l'édition des textes latins des humanistes de Hongrie (tel la correspondance de Dudith dont le premier volume va bientôt paraître), aussi bien que l'édition critique des œuvres poétique en langue hongroise des XVI^e et XVII^e siècles, ont à leur tour avancé comme prévu. Nous avons pu commencer, après de longs préparatifs, à préparer sous presse une des sources les plus importantes, mais jusqu'ici inaccessible, de l'antitrinitarisme hongrois et international, l'*Historia Unitariorum*, en latin, des prédicateurs unitariens de la Transylvanie du XVIII^e siècle. Ce manuscrit inédit d'environ 1000 pages, dont l'édition et les commentaires critiques vont être présentés par M. János Káldos, verra le jour grâce à l'appui magnanime de la Fondation Bibliotheca Unitariorum (Pays-Bas).

Nous avons organisé trois colloques au cours de l'année. Le premier, dont l'initiative et la préparation revient à M. Iván Horváth, a eu lieu du 28 au 31 janvier à Budapest, sous le titre *Sur les normes internationales des bases de données pour l'étude de la Renaissance*, avec la participation de MM. G. Battara (Ferrare), L. Burnard (Oxford), Mlle. L. M. Dolby (Minneapolis), MMes. J. Kecskeméti (Paris), Raïa Kuncheva (Sofia), MM. J.-F. Maillard (Paris), W. McCarty (Toronto), D. Robey (Manchester), M. Rossi (Ferrare). Cette rencontre a eu pour but de recenser les besoins en matière de bases de données sur la Renaissance et de parvenir à l'établissement de normes internationales communes. Le petit „Communiqué à la F.I.S.I.E.R.” de ce groupe de travail vient de paraître dans le *Bulletin de Liaison*. La réunion annuelle des chercheurs de la Renaissance hongroise a eu lieu du 24 au 25 mai à Pécs, où une dizaine de nos collègues ont rendu compte des derniers résultats de leurs recherches. Enfin du 10 au 14 juillet

a eu lieu, toujours à Pécs, le colloque organisé en commun dans la série des rencontres régulières de notre Centre et du Wolfenbütteler Arbeitskreis für Renaissanceforschung sur le sujet suivant: *Antike Rezeption und nationale Identität*. I was appalled & protested enough that he went back to apologetic dolor. (Is that what is meant by *status quo ante bellum*?)

Actually, I've been doing more travelling than analyzing ("where," you say?); Szeged, Budapest, Szentendre, Jász, Eger, Debrecen, Győr. I'll rest a bit & wait for some warmth to do Pécs & Szeged. I also put in a long day in Vienna.

Speaking of which, I hear you put in a long evening with Laci, Eva, & the children. Thank you for that. Till sometime.

Dear Leo & Eva,

Although I have been mindful of the fact that my being here owes much to your kindness & counsel, I fear that I have waited a bit too long for the optimum moment to report in & say thank you. At first I decided to wait until the initial, gosh-all-the-roofs-are-orange, horribly naif stage passed. Then I got immersed in teaching-despite-alien-biorhythms—the multi-variable schedule, no classroom of my own, 45-minute class hours, endless trips up 2 flights of steps to find my students, & attendance that might or might not be compulsory, depending on the State Middle-level language exam results. Add to that my basic inability to remember names & the fact that every 3rd girl is named Eszter & you find someone devoting a lot of time & energy to avoiding an international crisis. Then there was a brief period of postcard burnout and simultaneous I've-got-to-see-all-of-Hungary-before-it-snows. Before I knew it, Christmas was on the horizon along with Jim & Chris's visit. Fulbright & Peace Corps visitors arrived; Melora arrived. I was spending half my life at Ibusz arranging tickets. But now, finally, time & place converge & I don't think that war in the Gulf can be construed as a reason for further epistolary lassitude.

Naturally, the whole experience is proving interesting on a number of levels: personal, educational, & social/political. I suppose I should be a bit cautious in my commentary, or at least,

The vacation from children, spouse, & committee has a certain salutary effect. (Has the concept of sabbaticals for wives/mothers reached its moment of glory yet?) Certainly 6000 miles puts many things into a different perspective. Nevertheless, it was wonderful to have Jim & Chris here for Christmas; and Melora is carrying January doldrums away very nicely.

Educationally, I find the public secondary schools very busy. I question whether they might be too busy. The students seem to have a kind of siege mentality & learn their material from crisis to crisis (viz. Tests). Sometimes it seems as if they personally wish to re-invent the encyclopedia. But I'm not convinced that the real learning is much better than what goes on in our upper level classes in the U.S. Also, I have one class that I must meet Wed. afternoons from 3-4:30 in a double lesson because that's the only place Eng. can be scheduled. Also, they must still come to school at 7:30 & sit through the regular 7-lesson day. They are practically zombies when I get them. I can't imagine their education is truly enhanced by that kind of juggling.

And politically? sociologically? economically? I feel surrounded by Marsh-wriggles! (That's C.S. Lewis & THE Dr. Houck can explain if you've never read The Silver Chair from The Narnia Chronicles?) One of the cultural attitudes (U.S.A., naturally),

measured, considering that you really know this country & its ethos, but wise restraint is not one of my famed character traits. I do want to talk to you a good long time when I return, for I would like to toss out impressions & get some confirmations or refutations before I start babbling publicly or to classes. Offending the entire Hungarian population of Youngstown/Warren is not one of my life goals, nor is misleading the youth of America.

Personally, I have found the people around me very kind and extremely generous, but I go mad trying to reciprocate. Melora & I wanted to take Socis' parents to dinner because they have been more than generous with time, travel, & (of course) food. They would not hear of it because we "are the guests." Conversely, I gave a number of people at school small Christmas gifts, received a pro forma thank you, & never got a single word that they liked them after opening them. (Even if they hated them, by U.S. standards, they should have remembered to lie). By all this I'm concluding that I don't understand Hungarian customs very well. I just always hope that I'm not doing too much wrong & that if I am it won't create too many Ameriphobes. Basically, however, I'm enjoying myself and trusting that everyone understands that little things vary. Although "being alone" has reared its ugly head from time to time, I find
